Ten Year Old Child Saves Cousin's Life

Altamonte Springs - Ten-year old Alexandra Ghacel helped save her cousin's life Sunday in Altamonte Springs by providing 911 operators with the right information. At 5:18 p.m. Sunday, the Altamonte Springs Fire Department received a 911 call from the Cetty residence, 315 S. Wymore Road, Apartment 100. Four-day old Jennifer Cetty was choking and could not breathe. The mother, who spoke little English, was unable to communicate with the 911 operators. Alexandra called 911 and provided dispatchers with the proper information. She also provided interpretation for paramedics on the scene, helping emergency workers diagnose the problem. Paramedics treated Jennifer and all respiration was restored. After careful evaluation, paramedics released Jennifer back to the mother's care. Paramedics said that without Alexandra's assistance, Jennifer's condition could have been worsened.

Telemarketers plead guilty in land-fraud

SANFORD - Six code-defendants pleaded guilty Monday to a telemarketing land-fraud scheme in Seminole County that prosecutors say cheated hundreds of property owners - many of them elderly and living out of state.

Eugene Villani, who masterminded the scheme to get homeowners to buy ads to sell their land, pleaded guilty to racketeering, conspiracy, communications fraud and employing unlicensed telephone salespeople. For this he is expected to get a 4-to-8 year jail sentence. He had been facing 85 years.

The defendants began their operation in 1994 through The Land Solution Inc., a Longwood telemarketing company. They later shifted to two other businesses - The Land, Inc. in Winter Springs and Prime Property Enterprises in Casselberry.

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Nuisance ordinance rejected

SANFORD - The proposal to fine property owners responsible for excessive calls for service from police died 4-1 in Monday's Sanford City Commission meeting.

Property owners would have been charged for taking up law enforcement services beyond certain monthly allowances, under the proposed ordinance.

The commissioners said they were concerned that residents might hesitate to call the police if the ordinance passed.

"Just one person not calling could kill somebody in this town," commissioner Whitey Eckstein said.

Commissioner Velma Williams said the ordinance could be considered discriminatory to areas of the city such as Goldsboro, where the majority of properties that police said are responsible for excessive calls are located.

Several Goldsboro residents on Monday said they opposed the ordinance. Oscar Redden said residents are already hesitant to call police because of the proposed ordinance. He said the ordinance would harm relations between residents of Goldsboro and the police.

A comprehensive review by the Sanford Police Department found that certain properties take up the majority of police calls in Sanford. Out of 13 properties sampled, calls for service ranged from nine to 224 per year.

"All this is doing is asking property owners to take responsibility and control of their property," said commissioner Brady Lessard, who proposed the ordinance.

Police operations last fiscal year cost the City taxpayers \$6 million, or 94.3 percent of all ad valorem taxes.

"I feel that our police resources are being squandered," Lessard said.

Mayor Larry Dale said steps needed to be taken to address the use of police time by a small number of property owners.

"I certainly don't want people to not call police," Dale said. "I think if we have a property that police have to respond to 60 times a year, five times a month, we have to find some way to deal with that."

Mike Taylor, a Sanford Police Department Officer, said that police are working with property owners responsible for excessive police calls as part of their community policing activities.

The fines on property owners would have been primarily based on the number

Winter Springs OKs annexation

WINTER SPRINGS - The latest in a series of annexation issues that have been bones of contention between Oviedo and Winter Springs city officials ended with more of a whimper than a bang Monday night.

After politely listening to a letter of opposition presented by Oviedo city council chair Tom Hagood, Winter Springs commissioners unanimously approved the annexation of a 7.5 acre parcel of land located some 2,500 feet east of the Greenway and north of State Road 434. The land is currently vacant and zoned as Agricultural-1. Developers John and David Cathcart of

Oviedo propose to use it for a combination of office space and retail development.

Hagood's letter of opposition dealt with what Oviedo officials perceive as a renegeing on a spirit of agreement over joint input on future annexation issues that dates back to January's dispute over the development of a 300 acre parcel known as Battle Ridge that Winter Springs annexed along the east side of State Road 417. The Oviedo letter addressed issues of increased density as well as the placement of water and sewer lines versus the installation of wells and septic systems.

"We believe there are three parties to that agreement," said Hagood. "My council feels this

NAS vets return to base

SANFORD - Marine Lt. Paul Feakins was one of the first pilots to train at the Naval Air Station in Sanford.

The year was 1943. Feakins, who lives in Orange City, says that 22 men reported on June 1 that year, all having qualified in twin engine seaplanes at Pensacola. At Sanford, they began flying SNBs (Beechcraft Wichitas) and PV-1s (Lockheed Venturans).

"The SNBs were great small engine planes - a pleasure to fly," Feakins said. "The PV-1s were bastards."

Fifty-six years later, Feakins is one of a dozen World War II veterans coming to the 31st Reunion

since the closing of the Naval Air Station in 1968. More than 200 others who served later at NAS Sanford will also attend the three day event - June 25-27.

"Life at the base was no bargain," Feakins said, recalling a Navy Wave who was in charge of the mess hall. "She was determined to make vegetarians out of us," Feakins told Gerald Bohm, the reunion organizer.

Bohm, a Navy Chief Mechanic, has fonder memories of the air station. He arrived in 1951 - six years after World War II. He was just into a 20-year service career.

Born in Aurora, Mo., Bohm fell in love with Florida. He remembers pleasant trips to the beach in Daytona and square dancing at an American

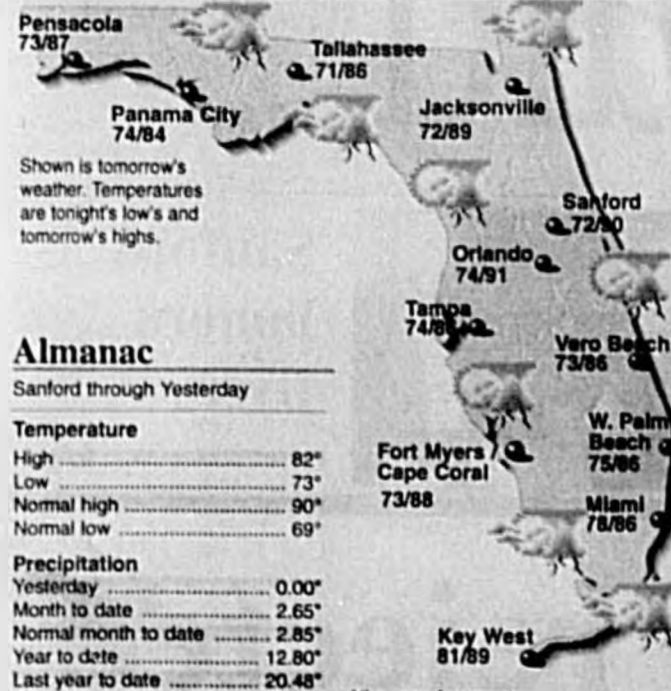

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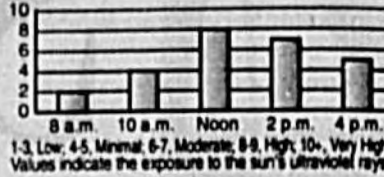

Legion Hall in Orlando. "After a couple of years at NAS Sanford, I was transferred," he said. "I struggled like heck to get transferred back, and it finally happened in 1956. I'd been other places but this is where I wanted to be." Bohm has attended 29 of the 30 reunions - missing out one year when he and his wife, Elaine, went on a cross country camping trip with some ex-Navy buddies and their wives. "Just about everyone who comes back has wonderful memories of the air station and the people of Sanford," said

Bohm, who lives in DeBary. "We were treated well in Sanford. And when we went to sea, we knew our families were safe and secure." In May 1942, the Navy selected a site 2.5 miles southeast of Sanford for a base for the Naval Air Operational Training Command. The surprise attack by the Japanese at Pearl Harbor five months earlier required the U.S. to get qualified pilots in the air ASAP. Near the end of World War II, there were more than 2,000 men and women at NAS Sanford - 358 officers, 1,385 enlisted men

and 289 civilians. "Sadly, we've losing most of those who were here in the beginning," Bohm said. "I'm delighted Paul Feakins is going to be at the reunion. He's one of a dozen from the early 1940s." Bohm said that one year there were nearly 500 at the reunion - a good many from the World War II days. One of those who attended that early reunion brought a roster of names and it helped Bohm make contacts throughout the U.S. for future reunions. "The other night - almost at midnight, I received a call from

a man in Lexington, Ky." Bohm said. "He found the reunion news on the Internet. The Navy lists reunions now on the Internet. He said he wanted to be with us. That he didn't know we had been meeting." Today, the veterans will find the Orlando Sanford Airport where the base at been. They'll see jets arriving every other minute at the busy terminal. They'll see several of the surviving Navy buildings including the main hangar. "They'll also find hospitality," Bohm said. "That we guarantee."

action is in direct violation of that agreement."

Winter Springs officials were unanimous in their response over the latest annexation flap.

"We're trying to help manage growth, too," responded commissioner Michael Blake.

"When this issue first came up we had lengthy discussions with the developer. We attempted to schedule several meetings with Oviedo, but unfortunately, those meetings never happened. We even agreed to bring the pizza."

Commissioner Edward Martinez, returning to city com-

mission duties following single heart bypass surgery, pointed out that in his estimation, Oviedo came to the table too late in discussing past and current annexation issues.

"Oviedo refused to join the planning and sign a joint development agreement," he said.

"Winter Springs is surrounded on one side by Casselberry, another side by Oviedo, another side by Longwood, and another side by Sanford. We have to have some opportunity for commercial development in order to hold the tax millage rate down for Winter Springs residents."

In other city commission action Monday, the board gave unanimous approval, with changes in language to address archaeological and nature trail concerns, to designate approval on first reading of Ordinance 727-designating the Wofford/Slapney property (7,558 acres) on the Future Land Use Map as "Commercial," and in a parallel vote dealing with the same parcel, approved Ordinance 728 on first reading, which reclassifies that parcel on the City's zoning map from C-2 (General Commercial and Industrial) to C-1

classification.

City commissioners deferred action on two others public hearings dealing with community development and planning. They tabled a second reading of adoption of Ordinance 724-a Proposal to adopt the GreenWay Interchange district Large Scale Comprehensive Plan Amendment until a July 6th workshop and a second reading scheduled for July 12. They also postponed until July 12 a first reading on Ordinance 725, dealing with the adoption of the GreenWay Interchange Zoning District Text and Map.

Prior to addressing annexation issues, city commissioners heard complaints from a handful of residents that questions stemming from last year's Tuskawilla Beautification Project have not been properly answered. Mayor Paul Partyka directed city manager Ron McLemore to rewrite a cover letter and expand the city's response to address each and every question that was raised, and provide concerned Tuskawilla residents with a copy of the city's official response.

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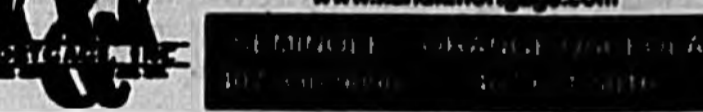
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Oh, behave baby! Cops compete in police games

of calls per month, personnel costs and damaged equipment.

Property owners would not have been charged for making calls to police themselves. The police would not have counted responses caused by false reports initiated by others for the purpose of harassment.

Police would also not have included criminal activity that starts elsewhere and comes on a property, despite reasonable efforts to keep it off the property, as a service call.

Nuisance calls would have been defined by the proposed ordinance as loud music, disturbance with threats, harassment, noise, domestic disturbances, drug investigations, and prostitution.

However, City Manager Tony VanDerworp said Monday armed disturbances would not be included in the final ordinance as nuisance calls.

Single family residences or duplexes would have been allowed five calls or 10-man hours of service. Multi-family residences, including apartments, hotels and motels would be allowed five calls or 30-man hours of service.

Businesses with under 5,000 square feet would have been allowed 10 calls or 20 man-hours of service. Businesses with more than 5,000 square feet would be allowed 10 calls or 50 man-hours of service.

The proposed ordinance was based on a similar law in Daytona Beach Shores, where police received a high number of repeat calls to individual properties, especially during Spring Break.

The commission also did not approve a proposed law to assist the city in fighting against prostitution. Based on a similar California code, the law would have prohibit loitering to engage in prostitution.

VanDerworp said the U.S. Supreme Court struck down a Chicago, Ill. law that that banned loitering for the purpose of prostitution. The commission did not vote on the proposal.

Other issues on the commission's agenda included:
• Approval of a \$1-million bid for construction of the 50-meter city pool that will be built on four acres near Seminole High School. The city, county and

school board are splitting the costs of the project.

• Approval of a request to place 400-watt lights on city streets in the Goldsboro area. The lights would cost \$300 a piece to replace.

• Approval of a newsrack ordinance would regulate the placement of newsracks city-wide, and mandate that newsracks in the downtown and historic district be colored black.

to see a major road named after Barber.

"I think he stands for everything that is right about this city," Eckstein said.

Sanford resident Gene Rogero requested that the city rename the park after Barber.

Barber was a baseball play-by-play announcer for three decades. He announced for the Reds (1934-1938), Dodgers (1939 to 1953) and Yankees (1954-1966).

Born in Columbus, Miss., Barber moved to Sanford with his family in 1918 when his father accepted a locomotive engineering job with the Atlantic Coast Line.

Barber's mother taught school at Sanford Grammar and later at Southside Primary School.

At Sanford High School, the 5-foot-3 inch tall Barber played second base for the baseball team and halfback for the football team.

He began his broadcasting career as a student at the University of Florida. Barber would become a staple

for New York baseball fans.

Roger Kahn, author of the book "The Boys of Summer," described Barber's voice as a "siren-sweet Southern tongue."

Barber called play-by-play for the major league's first night baseball game in 1934 with the Reds.

When Jackie Robinson played his first major league game in 1947, breaking baseball's color line, Barber was announcing for the Dodgers.

During his sportscasting career, Barber covered 13 World Series, four all-star games, five Army-Navy games, one Sugar Bowl, two Rose Bowls, eight Orange Bowls, and four National Football League championship games.

Barber was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y. along with fellow Yankee broadcaster Mel Allen in 1978.

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Mike Kirby, director of recreation for the City, said the park's final name could be Walter "Red" Barber Park.

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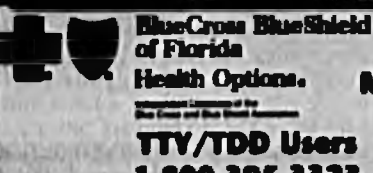

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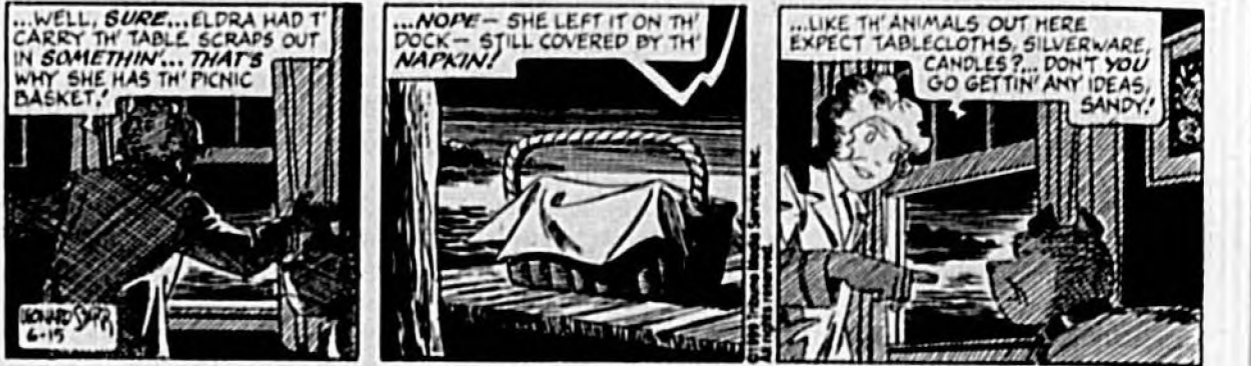

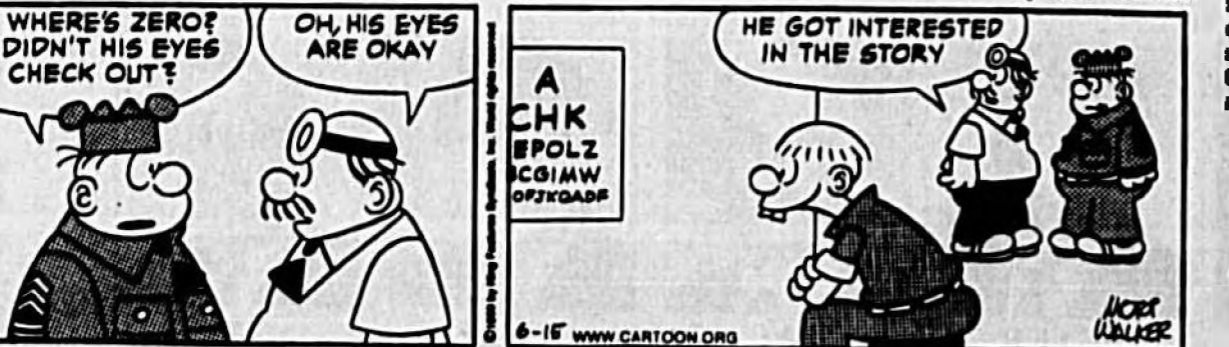

WIN AT BRIDGE

Two chances are better than one

It doesn't matter how well you know the probability tables if you fail to take the whole deal into consideration. Sometimes, there are two strings to your bow, not one. And it is much better to combine them whenever possible.

This deal bears some marked similarities to yesterday's, but the best line of play is different. Again, you are in three no-trump, and West leads the heart queen. What is your approach?

In the modern game, North's three-diamond rebid is invitational but not forcing. With a stronger hand, North either begins with a two-diamond strong-jump-shift response or rebids two hearts, fourth-suit forcing, which artificially sets up a game-force. In

both cases, North repeats his suit on the next round.

You have seven top tricks: one spade, two hearts, two diamonds and two clubs. The other two tricks might come from either minor suit. And as we discovered yesterday, a 3-2 diamond break is more likely than a 3-3 club split.

However, here you can have your vitamin pills and swallow them too. After winning trick one, play off dummy's two top diamonds. Do both opponents follow throughout? If so, play a third diamond. You will use the spade ace as the dummy entry for the established diamonds. With this layout, though, West discards on the second round. Now you must turn to the clubs, playing three rounds of that suit and hoping for a 3-3 break.

This line wins if either diamonds are 3-2 or clubs are 3-3. This combines to produce a 79.2 chance of success.

ASK DR. GOTT

Walking around with pneumonia

DEAR DR. GOTT: My boyfriend had "walking pneumonia." How does this differ from real pneumonia?

DEAR READER: He did have "real" pneumonia — but he was walking around with it.

This past winter was a terrible season for pneumonia. Barely a day went by that I didn't see an otherwise healthy young adult with pneumonia. Most were of the "walking" variety, but occasionally a patient would walk into the office and collapse in a chair. I called this "crawling" pneumonia.

Like any infection, pneumonia runs the gamut from advanced to mild. Some forms of lung infection are so severe that they are life-threatening and must be treated in hospital with intravenous antibiotics. Other, less serious types — such as your boyfriend's — cause symptoms no more disabling than cough, malaise and low-grade fever. The "real" pneumonia you referred to — with oxygen tents and delirium — is not the standard presentation anymore in young adults. (It's still a problem in the elderly, however.) In fact, many patients may not even know they have pneumonia until they are medically

examined.

I don't know how my young patients (or your boyfriend) contracted their lung infections. Clearly, such infections are contagious and are more common in smokers. I suppose that the best way to avoid pneumonia during the winter season is to get more rest and be cautious in a crowd. But such advice seems pitifully inadequate as a turn-of-the-century epitaph in our high-tech world.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 16-year-old girl. For the past few months, I've been listless and tired all the time, even though I've made an effort to eat right and get more sleep. Also, I've had nausea and abdominal pain. Could I have mononucleosis?

DEAR READER: Your symptoms suggest a variety of possibilities, rang-

ing from stress and depression to pregnancy. While it is true that mononucleosis is associated with being run-down, most adolescents with the disease complain bitterly of sore throat and swollen glands, neither of which you mention.

Fatigue, nausea and abdominal pain might reflect anemia or infection. You should see your family doctor. By talking with you and performing a simple examination, she may be able to find the answer to your difficulties.

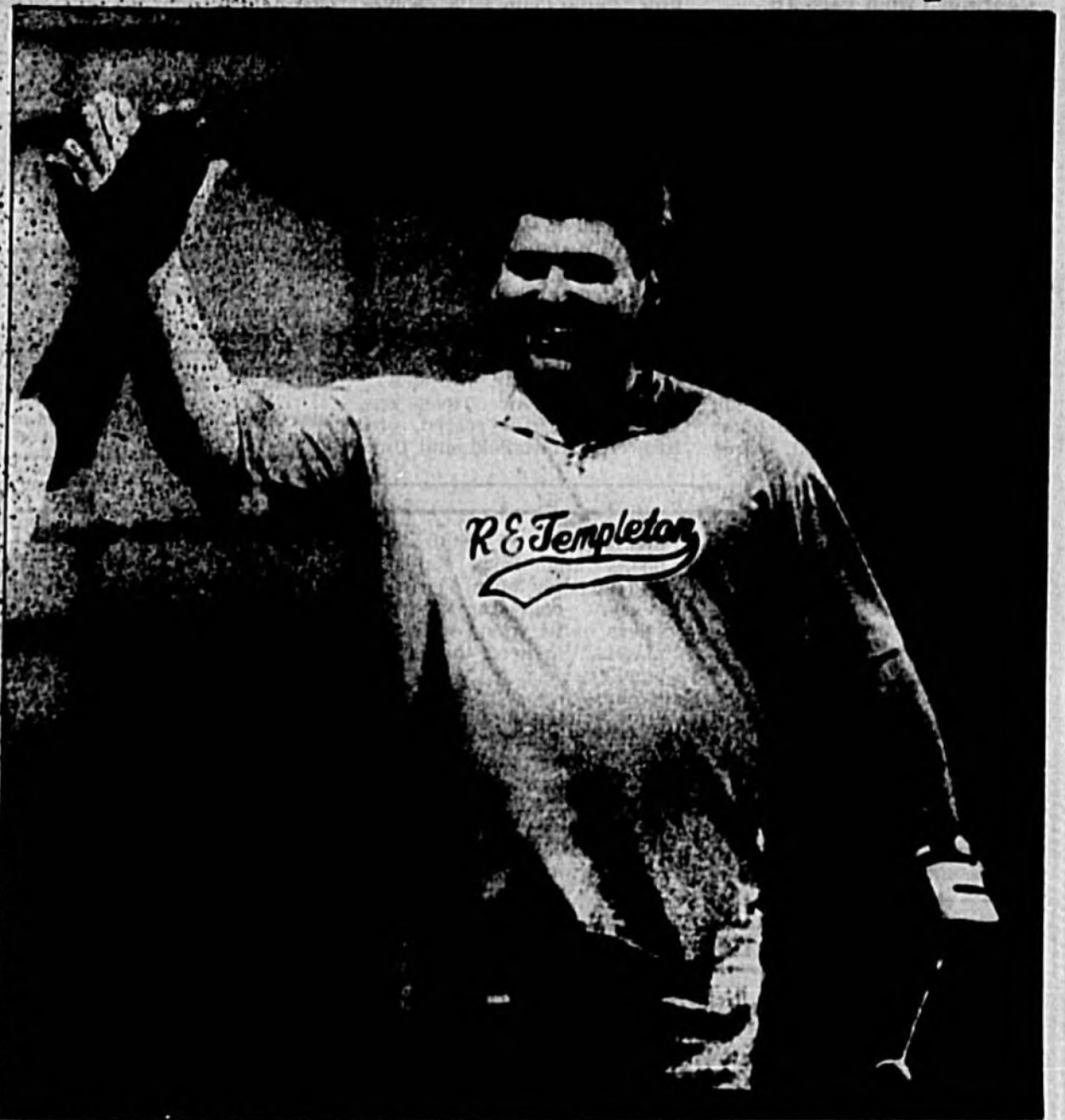
