

## President For Less Interest, Longer Credit

Calls On Bankers Of Country To Aid In Business Recovery Throughout Nation

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—President Roosevelt yesterday called upon the nation's bankers to extend ample credit to business and industry and to expedite recovery by making easy interest rates available to real estate and securities as well as commercial paper.

He did not attempt to advance a general level for interest charges but indicated bankers should ask a maximum of six percent, preferably less, on real estate loans which provide a good risk. Studies are being made, he said, looking toward perfecting a uniform scale of interest rates throughout the country.

The relation of many money to the functioning of economic recovery occupied most of Roosevelt's time today. It was the second time, within 48 hours that the President has sought to impress upon bankers the necessity of extending private credit to business before the government can withdraw from the lending business.

Yesterday in New Orleans, delegates to the annual convention of the American Bankers Association, torn by a controversy over the New Deal, heard HPC Chairman Jones tell them about their shyness in making loans. Jones also read a message of greeting from Roosevelt.

In it he said he knew bankers were grateful because all banks now are in a strong position and added:

"I hope they will take full advantage of the new banking act and provide credit, when it can be done on a sound basis, to business industry and real estate."

It was interpreted as a gentle hint to the financiers that they still haven't taken their proper place in the battle against depression. He elaborated on his banking views today with newspaper correspondents. There is no reason, Roosevelt observed, why banks with portfolios choked with money shouldn't loan some of it to good land.

A reporter pointed out that these loans, in many instances in the past, had brought sharp criticism from bank examiners. This, countered the President, is a case where a banker has to use good judgment. First, he must be sure the land is a good risk and then should fit his interest rates accordingly. Also, Roosevelt continued, the banker shouldn't have too high a percentage of real estate loans.

He cited the case of a man who contracted to buy a farm and could only raise 60 percent of the sale price in cash. He shopped about at various banks to get a mortgage covering the other 40 percent and no one would quote him an interest rate lower than five percent.

That, the President emphasized, isn't helping recovery.

Generally, however, Roosevelt indicated "pirate" interest rates had disappeared. As an example, he said, persons in Georgia who wanted to borrow on farm land at one time, had to pay as high as 10 percent interest.

## Paving Work Is Started On City Streets

## Lighting Survey Made At Airport

Boundary, Entrance  
And Hazard Lamps  
Are To Be Placed

Reravaging of First Street  
And Park Avenue was started  
this morning, the Sanford  
Municipal Airport was surveyed  
today preparatory to lighting  
the field, and more  
than 200 women began work  
in four "work centers" in  
the county.

Two hundred and thirty-five  
men were assigned to the  
Sanford street projects, but less  
than 100 of them worked there  
today. Tomorrow will be observed  
by the WPA as a holiday, but on  
Monday full crews will be on the  
two important jobs.

The work started today was re-  
stricted to renewing service lines  
on First Street and to removing  
gall from the parking areas on  
Park Avenue, beginning at Tenth  
Street, preparatory to widening  
the Avenue. The soil is being piled  
up to the side, to be removed  
later.

Some of the water and gas  
service lines under First Street  
have been out for more than 50  
years, and those not in serviceable  
condition will be taken up and re-  
placed with new lines. The mains  
are reported as being in good con-  
dition. W. B. Earle is in charge of  
the work.

## Action Taken In Court To Force Homesteads Tax

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 15  
(AP) — The Better Life Asso-  
ciation brought mandamus pro-  
ceedings in Supreme Court yester-  
day in an effort to require Lee  
county to assess taxes against its  
homesteads on the ground that  
the taxes are needed to maintain the  
commercial market value of the  
county's bonds.

Homestead taxes are necessary  
to maintain market values on out-  
standing bonds, the association  
claimed, regardless of the fact of  
whether long debt can be paid  
from unassessed property  
taxes alone.

Lee county bonds issued before  
adoption of the homestead exemp-  
tion amendment and pending  
homesteads for security are held  
by the association.

## Kirchhoff Will Open Another Produce Mart Over Islands

Old Hill Lumber Yard  
Property Will Be  
Converted For Use  
As Public Market

## Quezon Inaugurated First President; Murphy To Stay As High Commissioner

Establishment of another produce market in Sanford is announced by W. E. Kirchhoff, Jr., operator of the Mayfair Hotel, who is converting the old Hill Lumber yard property for the purpose. He said today he hopes to have the new market ready for business by Dec. 1. The location is at French Avenue and Thirteenth Street, practically adjoining to the Sanford State Farmers Wholesale Market. Mr. Kirchhoff plans to operate the new mart personally.

A loading platform 276 feet long has been built, but this can be nearly doubled in length if or found more room is needed, Mr. Kirchhoff stated. Floors of the shed have been reinforced with two-inch planks. A total of 32 stalls will be available in the new market.

The transition of autonomy actually began last night when Frank Murphy ceased to be governor general and took oath as American high commissioner.

This comparatively simple ceremony was performed in the presence of Secretary of War George H. Dern, representing President Roosevelt, and a congressional delegation headed by Vice President John N. Garner.

As high commissioner, Murphy will be the official representative of the American government here. Quezon, taking oath as the first president of the commonwealth, told a colorful inaugural program that he favored conservative policies.

"There will be no violent changes from the established order of things except as may be necessary to carry into effect the innovations contemplated by the Constitution," President Quezon, elected for a six-year term, declared.

Office rooms will be provided in the new building at the entrance to the market grounds, and in the rear there will be a restaurant, pool room, barber shop and shower baths. Sleeping quarters for truck drivers may also be provided later.

Mr. Kirchhoff said that arrangements are being made to provide a citrus grading and packing shed, and that a number of celery growers have importuned him to put in a pre-cool plant.

Purchase or lease of the old Hill Lumber Yards sheds as an addition to the wholesale market was considered a few weeks ago by Commissioner of Agriculture Mayo and Market Commissioner Rhodes and the proposition was taken up with the local committee at its last meeting. The State officials and committee members viewed the property, but negotiations were never carried through to a conclusion.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Asserting that a "considerably increased amount" of war materials is being exported from the United States, Secretary Hull today directed attention of American businessmen again to President Roosevelt's warning that any transactions they have with Ethiopia and Italy are at their own risk.

"The American people are entitled to know there are certain commodities such as oil, copper, trucks, tractors, scrap iron and scrap steel which are essential war materials although not actually arms ammunition or implements of war, and that according to recent government trade reports a considerably increasing amount of these is being exported for war purposes," the secretary said.

"It is directly contrary to the policy of this government as announced in official statements of the President and Secretary of State as it is also contrary to the general spirit of the recent neutrality act."

Italian correspondents in Ethiopia today reported the capture of strategic city of Harar was imminent.

Italian forces, numbering about 20,000, under General Giuseppe Graziani, who had been sent to the front to support the Italian troops, were reported retreating in disorder after a pitched battle yesterday.

**DROP CAKES**

Place in a mixing bowl,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup of sugar, Yolks of 2 eggs. Cream and then add: 4 tablespoons of shortening,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cups of flour, 3 teaspoons of baking powder, 1 teaspoon of vanilla, stiffly beaten whites of 2 eggs.

Drop by spoonful on well greased baking sheet. Bake in 400 deg. oven until lightly browned.

**MAGIC BUTTER ROLLS**

3 cups bread flour	2 cake yeast
1 teaspoon salt	1 tablespoon sugar
1-2 cup butter	3 eggs
1-4 cup cold milk	1 cup chopped almonds
1-4 cup hot milk	1 cup sugar
1-2 teaspoon vanilla	1 tablespoon cinnamon

Sift flour, then measure. To  $\frac{1}{2}$  cups flour add salt and shortening, combining as for pie crust. Combine hot and cold milk. When lukewarm add the yeast and 1 tablespoon sugar. Blend well and then stir into first mixture, beating until very smooth. Cover and let stand 80 minutes in a warm sheltered place. Then add the eggs and beat vigorously. Beat in the vanilla and the remaining  $\frac{1}{2}$  cups flour. Stir until smooth. The dough will be stiff but slightly sticky. Tie the dough loosely in a square of thin muslin and drop it into a pail of cool water (70 to 80 degrees F.) In about an hour the dough will rise to the top of the water. When it does, remove it from the pail. Cut off pieces the size of an egg, using a teaspoon and roll each one in the mixed sugar, cinnamon and nuts. Twirl each piece into a figure eight and place on a buttered baking sheet. Let stand 5 minutes, then bake in a hot oven (425 degrees F.) about 15 minutes. Remove from baking sheet immediately on removal from oven.

Yield: 3 dozen delicious rolls.

**BAKING POWDER BISCUITS**

2 cups flour	1-2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking powder	4 tablespoons shortening
About 1-3 cup milk	

Sift flour once, measure. Add baking powder and salt. Sift again. Cut in shortening. Add milk all at once and stir carefully until flour is dampened. Then stir vigorously until mixture forms a soft dough and follows the spoon around the bowl. Turn out immediately on slightly floured board and knead 30 seconds. Roll out desired thickness. Cut into desired shapes. Bake on ungreased baking sheet in hot oven 450 degrees 12 to 15 minutes.

**CHEESE PINWHEELS**

Roll biscuit dough into oblong sheet  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch thick. Brush with melted butter. Sprinkle generously with grated cheese. Then sprinkle with salt and paprika. If necessary, moisten edges with milk. Roll up like jelly roll. Cut into  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch slices. Place  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch apart on baking sheet. Bake in 450 degree oven until golden brown.

**COOKED SALAD DRESSING**

(made without a double boiler)

4 tablespoons butter	2 teaspoons dry mustard
4 tablespoons flour	1-2 cups water
4 teaspoons sugar	2 eggs, well beaten
1-2 teaspoon salt	1-2 cup vinegar

Melt butter. Combine dry ingredients. Add slowly to the melted butter. Then slowly stir in the water. Cook over low heat until thick. Blend beaten egg and vinegar. Slowly, while stirring, add the hot mixture to the egg mixture. Return to sauce pan. Cook over low heat 3 to 4 minutes. Remove from heat immediately. Pour into jar. Seal. Cool.

Yield: 1 pint dressing.

### Encouragement In Election Results For Both Parties

#### Each Made Gains But Losses Were Also Sustained By Both

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—(AP)

Placed end to end, the comments of political leaders on the 1935 election returns get nowhere.

To an unusual degree, everyone professes to be pleased, no one admits anything. The inescapable conclusion is that both sides have found something to be encouraged about and something to think about.

Politically, however, is not all a matter of figures. There are reasons why the returns from these two states cheer Republican hearts to a degree out of proportion to the gains as recorded in cold mathematics.

First of all, this is the first encouragement the party has had, on so wide a front, since the palmy days of the 1928 Republican triumph. A few congressional districts, or an isolated state here and there, have astonished even its own leaders by its overwhelming strength.

Tammany, after several rocky years, came back with a vengeance. The only two congressional elections were in New York City and they resulted in Democratic majorities far greater than those of a year ago. three times only to lose the ball on the Landon 8 yard line on a fumble and then on the second threat the local boys were held on the Landon 16 yard line by the strong Lion line needing only a few inches for a first down and perhaps an other touchdown. The third march down the field by the Celery Feds was an aerial attack that scored Seminole's lone touch on a long pass from Billy Zachry to Leland McClelland for 21 yards placed the ball on the Landon 1 yard line where Zachry went over for the score, the pass for the extra point was incomplete.

Zachry and McClelland led the backs.

A five yard penalty and a 21 yard
