SR 46 widening workshop Tuesday

Devastation in Mississippi opens hearts in Seminole

LAKE MARY — The city of Pass Christian, Miss., sits just 21 feet above sea level at its highest elevation, but Hurricane Katrina washed a 28-foot storm surge over the city leaving debris, foundations and death in her wake.

Lake Mary Deputy Fire Chief Ed Koch has seen the devastation first hand and shared that horror with county, city and local leaders at the kick off of "Gifts for the Gulf" a joint effort to bring holiday cheer to the residents of Pass Christian.

The hurricane destroyed about 80 percent of the small coastal city. Koch said 100 percent of the downtown business district was simply wiped away. Literally, the city has no income in trying to recover from the storm.

"People are trying to come back," Koch explained, but their future is very uncertain. Three months later, the area is still devastated.

Church volunteers and county and city workers from Seminole have traveled to Pass Christian to do what they can to help the recovery. Tent villages have sprung up

Critical tone caught county manager's ear

SANFORD — The past year or so has not been the easiest for Seminole County Manager J. Kevin Grace, he admits, and that fact led to what he called a mutual decision for him to resign Nov. 15.

He emphasized the hurricanes of last summer, which occurred just before two new board members were elected.

"Looking back, there was quite a bit of turnover on our staff," he explained from his office in Sanford on Tuesday. "Maybe the tone and tenor of our board meetings wasn't what it had been in previous years."

Asked to be more specific about the tone of the meetings, Grace said the board had much more criticism of staff.

Grace said he initiated discussions with the five members of the Board of County Commissioners about his role and leadership of staff. He

maintains he was not ousted as some reports said, but also adds: "Was it all 100 percent my decision? No."

Two commissioners, Chairman Carlton Henley and Dick Van Der Weide were incensed that Grace didn't receive more support from the other three board members, Randy Morris, Bob Dallari and Brenda Carey. Van Der Weide told reporters that Grace was forced out.

"To the degree that it was a mutual decision, I can see him having that perception," Grace said. If the board had decided not to accept his resignation, would he have stayed?

"I would have considered it," he said. "I had had discussions with each one of them. I had a pretty good idea of what would take place."

Grace came to Seminole County after serving as assistant county manager in

Group narrows plans for middle school rezoning

LAKE MARY — The Core Committee charged with rezoning middle schools in northwestern Seminole County rejected more plans Monday evening, but moved six forward for consideration at a community input meeting next week.

Members agreed to allow additional plans to be submitted through 5 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 23.

Not everyone agreed on the six plans moved forward, but the public will get a chance to give input on them Tuesday, Nov. 29 at 7 p.m. at Millennium Middle School in Sanford.

Most of the plans rejected Monday fell because they sent students from elementary schools of choice to middle schools that didn't continue the specialty areas.

For example, Midway Elementary east of Sanford is a choice school for the performing arts. Some plans had those students rezoned for the new Markham Woods Middle School, which will open in August 2006, or Greenwood Lakes Middle School. The performing arts middle school of choice, however, is Millennium Middle.

The same dilemma occurred on some plans not sending Goldsboro

Board: Residents need reliable transportation

SANFORD — In the coming weeks, the Sanford Housing Authority will be turned back over to the city.

In the meantime, U.S. Representative John Mica toured the facility last week, and U.S. Congresswoman Corrine Brown, met the new board members this past Monday afternoon.

Brown listened to the new Sanford Housing Authority board members concerns for the citizens in government housing in Sanford.

"We're in need of transportation, as well," Board member Barbara Green told Brown.

Brown, who was instrumental in getting \$9 million for Lynx buses in Orange County, which was partially used for 15 new buses, said she was willing to work on that issue.

Green said that residents are having trouble getting to doctor's offices who have moved out of the city, and paying some bills, such as electricity.

Of the 480 units of government housing, the majority of them do not have cars, the board

Friends assist cancer fight with Fischer

SANFORD — Five months ago, former downtown Divine Deli owner Drew Fischer was diagnosed with cancer and after months of chemotherapy and radiation, he is recovering.

But friends say recovering monetary costs associated with his treatment, is another divine obstacle.

Jeff Hess, who met Fischer at Northland Church in Longwood, recently began fundraising efforts to assist Fischer and his family.

Fischer and his wife, Jayne, found out in July that the religious deli owner and father of three young boys, had stage two squamous cell carcinoma — a cancer of the epidermal cells.

His doctors were unsure how the seemingly

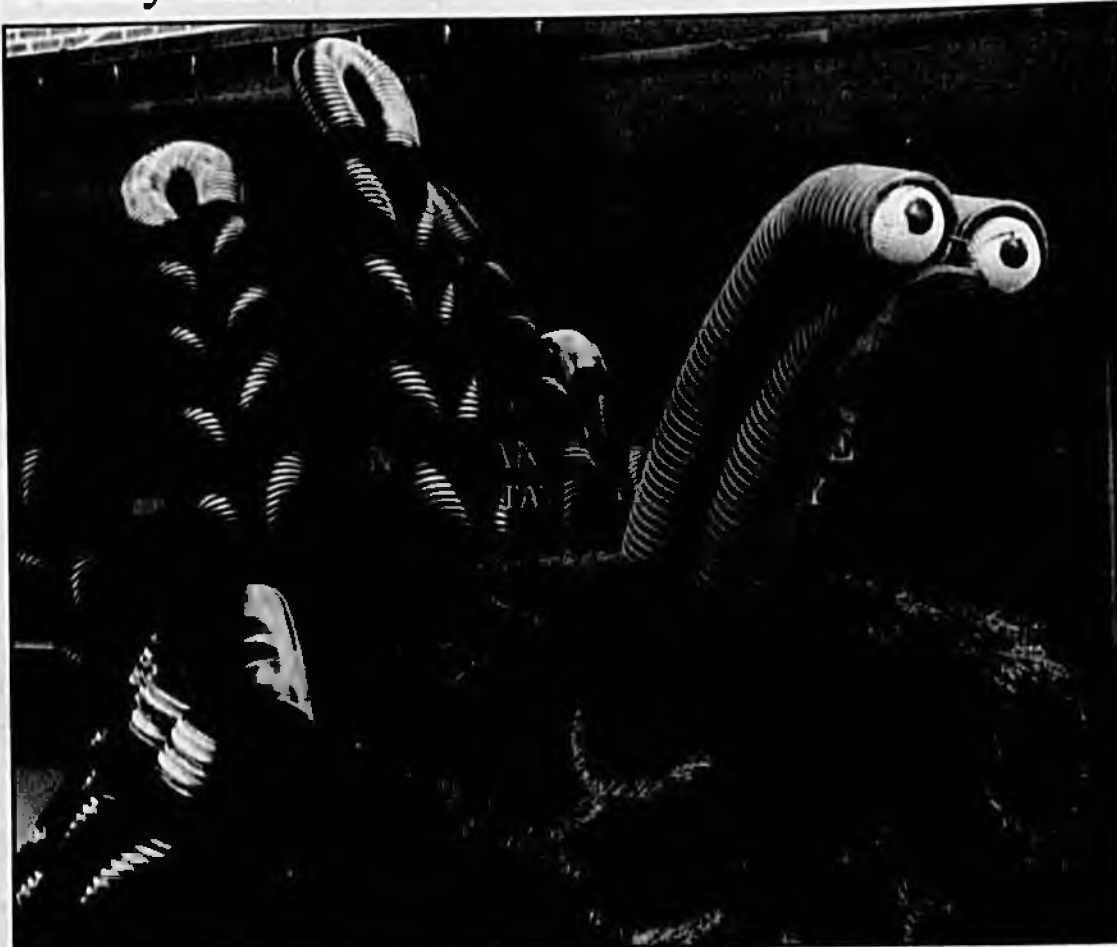

around Pass Christian for residents to rebuild their lives with practically no personal belongings.

Seminole County government, the seven cities, the Chamber of Commerce and the Seminole County School Board as well as church and business groups are asking county residents to once again give.

"Their needs are tremendous," said Carlton Henley, Seminole County chairman. He urged residents of Seminole County to help the drive. "We've always been a giving people in this county."

Many have already contributed to the recovery, but the devastation is so complete in areas like Pass Christian that the needs will continue.

"Maybe we need to give each other a little less in order to give people up there a little more," Henley urged.

County and city fire stations will accept donations for the drive through Dec. 9.

Residents need basic living essentials, but specific items requested include:

New, unwrapped toys, bikes, games, puzzles, books, crosswords; toiletries (especially gift sets), cologne, perfume, shower caddies; new (any size) shoes, pajamas, slippers, robes, hats; new socks and underwear; sheets, pillows, towels, shower curtains and other linen; blankets and sleeping bags; battery operated portable lights and alarm clocks; new child/infant car seats; folding chairs, card tables and door mats; non-perishable food and coolers; first aid kits and bug spray; luggage and area rugs; eating utensils and food storage containers.

Chief Craig Haun of Lake Mary and Chief Leeanna Raw of Seminole County were both on hand Monday to let people know that the

county and cities have 31 fire station locations.

The Rev. Charles Holt, pastor of St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Lake Mary, also spoke of the urgent need in Pass Christian. People from his parish have traveled to the area and have adopted St. Patrick's Church.

The Mississippi parish's school needs 200 volunteers a day.

The school serves as a volunteer center and Holt suggested that Seminole County residents may want to give even more than material goods.

More than 2,000 people a day come to the volunteer center for help, Holt explained.

Anyone who wants to volunteer there can give as little or as much time as they want, he said.

He suggested that people who want to volunteer call St. Peter's and they can get people in touch with the volunteer camp in Mississippi. St. Peter's Church number is 407-444-5673.

Regina Klaers of Seminole County Public Schools said the district is leaving the drive effort up to individual schools, all of which have already contributed to the recovery in previous drives. She said people can also drop off items at the Educational Support Center on Lake Mary Boulevard.

"What a great lesson this is for our students, that we are part of a greater organization," Klaers said Monday.

Lake Mary Fire Marshall Wendy Niles said all the items would be coordinated and distributed from the Lake Mary fire station on Wallace Court. Trucks from DuPont are expected to bring the items to Pass Christian before Christmas, she said.

Elementary students to Sanford Middle, even though both are close in location and have science and technology components.

Some Core Committee members wanted to move plans forward even if they had this problem and met other parameters. They wanted to let the School Board decide this kind of issue.

"I think we can decide that," said Ron Pinnell, who moderates the Core Committee meetings for the school district. He added that Midway students have an automated link to Millennium if they apply for the choice school on time.

The six plans that moved forward were Plans 20, 28, 30, 33, 34, and 35. Plan 20 is one of only three that progressed out of the previous Core Committee meeting Nov. 7.

Plan 20 would move students from Midway Elementary to Sanford Middle, so that goes against the wishes of committee members who wanted the schools of choice to feed each other. So its fate is questionable.

Five out of the six plans moving forward meet the parameters for percentages of free and reduced lunch, black and Hispanic students. Plan 35 has a small problem with its percentage of students with free and reduced lunch.

Plans 20, 28 and 30 all move more than 2,000 students. Plans 33, 34, and 35 all move under 2,000 students with Plan 35 the lowest at just 1,714 students.

Actual numbers at the schools will vary because of students eligible to attend choice schools. They can apply to the magnet schools, but they must meet

criteria and they must apply on time, officials pointed out. The district will also allow current middle school students to remain at their original school if rezoned, but parents will have to provide transportation.

The choice system was set up to integrate the schools better in conjunction with a U.S. Justice Department consent decree, which has been in place for almost three decades.

School district officials keep saying the county is almost out from under the decree or is very close to moving out from under it.

Parents, as usual, would like to have their children go to the nearest school in most cases.

The handful of parents who attended the Monday Core Committee meeting acknowledged that the middle schools are very close academically, but distance

appeared to be a main concern.

The most exciting part of the night Monday happened when concerned citizen Chad Cole unveiled new programming that shows clearly each cell, where it will be relocated according to each plan. It also allows the user to switch cells to a different school with a few clicks of the mouse.

"Now that's what I'm talking about," Pinnell said his reaction was when he first saw Cole's program. Officials said they would provide a link from the district Web site as soon as possible.

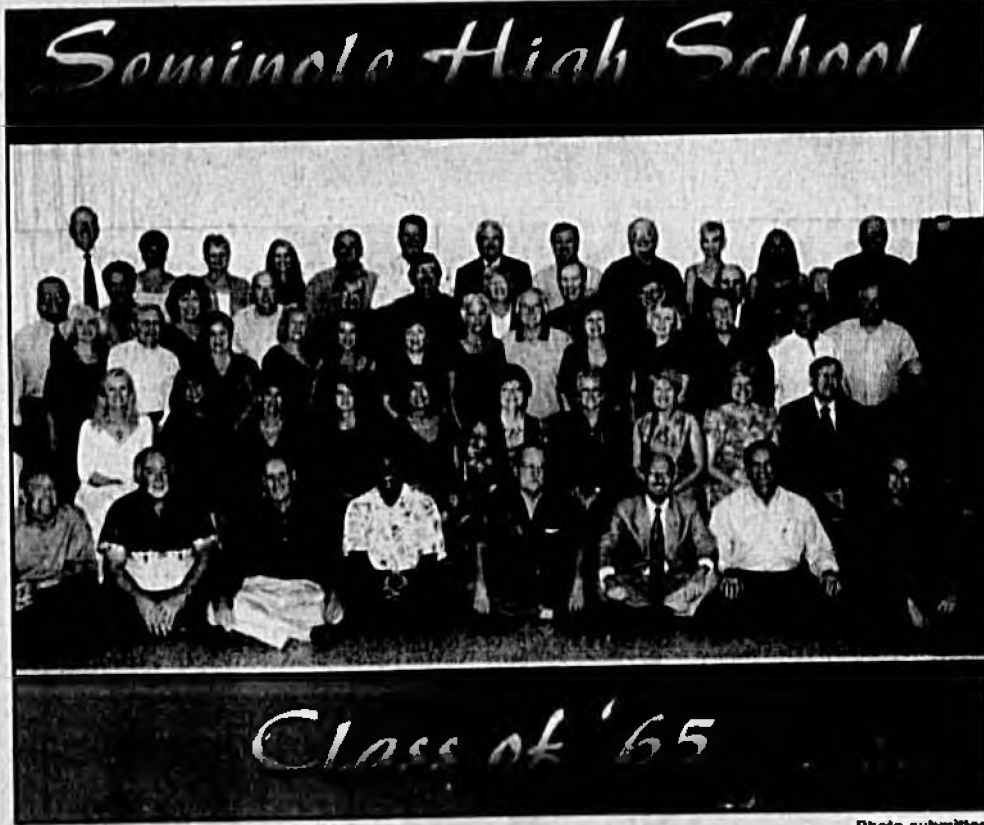

healthy Fischer could have developed the cancer. "I don't fit the mold," Fischer said.

The couple closed Divine Deli shortly after the news, and Fischer began treatment right away. Fischer said that he knew God had given him the cancer for a reason, but he wasn't sure what that reason was. He told his wife that his ultimate goal was to have people see him go through this and see how God was a cornerstone through this obstacle.

Hess said that while he is assisting in fundraising efforts, Fischer is feeling better and recovering. For now, Fischer is done with the chemotherapy and radiation, but doctors have determined that his lymph nodes from his neck up must be removed, in case there are any more cancer cells.

"He's hanging in there, he and Jayne," Hess said. "She's really been his strength."

So far, Hess has collected close to \$4,000 for the family. A Web site, www.drew-jayneandtheguys.blogspot.com, offers four ways to help the Fischers. The first way to help is to pray, the site asks. Second, is to bleed. By joining Drew's Blood Brothers and Sisters, through Mid-Florida Biologicals in Altamonte Springs, you can donate plasma and use that cash to donate back to the family.

Charlotte County. He worked as deputy manager here until 1998 and left for a year and a half before returning as manager.

The amazing part of his resignation, he said, was after two or three weeks of discussion with board members, more people didn't know what was coming. He regrets that rumors surfaced about problems with staff.

He said, for example, that he did not resign because commissioners wanted him to fire Fiscal Services Director Lisa Spriggs.

"It's not true as it relates to the majority of the board," he said. "We had a more difficult budget work session with the board than normal."

Fiscal Services has been under pressure lately. Staff there had to deal with boxes and boxes of backup documents to collect \$40 million in reimbursements from the Federal Emergency Management Agency in the wake of last summer's hurricanes. Grace also said the department was working with new financial and budget systems.

"Were there some concerns, yeah, but I supported the department's work," he said.

So could anything be done to change Grace's mind at this point?

"I don't think so. I'm at peace with it," the manager said Tuesday. "I'm very fortunate. The community has been great as well as the county. I've got nothing but good things to say about Seminole County. I'm not leaving with any bad feelings or malice at all."

He likens this mutual decision to a sports coach that leaves a team he has helped create. There is a need for a different face or voice.

"This was not a performance issue," he said Tuesday. "No one said, 'Kevin, you ought to leave because of this or that.'"

Grace will stay on as county manager until Jan. 1 and remain on the payroll through the end of the fiscal year as an advisor. He can pursue or accept another job although he has nothing lined up yet.

"I want to take 30 or 60 days to clean out the cob webs," he said. "I'm blessed with a number of opportunities. I've had several job offers since last Tuesday."

Grace said he wishes he could have completed plans for stormwater funding and library expansion.

The original idea was that a plan for library expansion would go to voters in 2005, but the board couldn't reach a consensus. "I think we will get it done next year," he predicted.

said. Brown said there are grants that could help assist in transportation, and that she would assist the board and the city.

"If you can help the children and the elderly, the rest of us can help ourselves," Brown said.

After the meeting, Brown told *The Herald* she was pleased to come to Sanford and meet the new members of the Sanford Housing Authority.

A major responsibility of the government is to provide safe, secure housing, Brown said.

She will be back soon to tour the housing, she said, and to discuss transportation and healthcare issues further.

"This is something we can work on," Brown said.

"I'm not leaving with any bad feelings or malice at all."

All seven cities in the county have stormwater funding, he said. "The county will have to face up to that," he added.

Many have touted the construction of the Criminal Justice Center as his biggest accomplishment because it was under budget and on time. He agrees, but for different reasons.

His role was to get a consensus on funding the project without raising taxes, yet constructing a dignified courthouse. The county had study after study and talked about building a new justice center for 10 years, he explained.

He is also proud of the little things that simplified government, such as the once cumbersome county agendas. Adding tabs to the agenda with a single number for each item allowed everyone to find items quickly during meetings.

Another was the merger of fire services with the city of Altamonte Springs.

"Ultimately, that will lead to other agreements," he said. The first responder agreement was the precursor for the more formal fire service contracts, he suggested. Whatever station is closest to an emergency responds, whether it is a city or the county.

"It makes no sense for taxpayers to pay for seven or eight fire services," he said. "There's no reason for the taxpayers to pay for that kind of duplication."

His time will be taken up with some family matters, namely choosing a college for Kim and Kevin's youngest daughter, Alisa, who is a senior at Lake Mary High School. The couple's first born, Nicole, is 22 and is a graduate student at Columbia University in New York City.

He didn't completely rule out a run for an elected office, although he said it would be a long shot.

"I've been approached on that, but I've told them all no," Grace said.

SCC basketball teams taste defeat

SANFORD — The Seminole Community College men's basketball team got two things it did not need Friday night, an injury and a tightly called game. Those two factors had a huge bearing on the court as visiting Broward Community College held off a tremendous rally by the Raiders to hand the hosts their first loss of the season, 89-80, at the SCC Health and Physical Education Center.

With only seven players in uniform anyway, the last thing the Raiders needed was to get someone hurt, and then when that someone was leading scorer Freddie Williams, things did not look good for the locals.

But SCC was able to stay close for most of the half behind the play of the inside-outside duo of point guard Renaldo Bell and center Jerome Boyd, who combined for 23 points. Small forward Haakim Johnson also had a good half for the Raiders with nine points.

But the hosts could find no one to handle the Seahawks' Athur Coney, who sliced through and shot over the SCC defense for 26 first half points as Broward took a 48-37 lead into the lockerroom at intermission.

The Raiders also got out of the first half with only minor foul problems as only Houston Wright had three fouls.

SCC was able to hang with the Seahawks over the first 10 minutes of the second half, but then foul trouble started to set in as Stephen McMillan, Johnson and Boyd all picked up their third fouls early in the half and then McMillan and Boyd both got hit their fourth personals before the beginning of the final 10 minutes of the game.

Still, the Raiders were able to make a run at BCC and closed to within 54-48 behind 12 points from Johnson and eight points from Houston Wright.

Then the foul problems set in again as Dexter Lewis was whistled three times in a short period of time and

fouled out, leaving SCC coach Bobby Washington Jr. with only five players, and two of those on the floor had four more.

The Seahawks took advantage to go on a 21-7 run to build a 75-55 lead with five minutes left.

That's when an interesting thing happened, the Raiders' offense woke up and Boyd fouled out.

Most figured that would be the end for SCC as that only left them with four players. But Williams, who was not supposed to play because of a possible separated shoulder, came into the game and gave his teammates a lift.

The Raiders used several turnovers, missed shots and missed free throw attempts, the visitors were only 9-for-21 from the charity stripe in the second half, to slowly eat into the lead.

And when Williams and Bell hit back-to-back three-pointers, SCC was back to within 83-78 with 1:48 left.

But that was as close as the hosts would get as Broward scored on a lay-up and then hit four straight free throws to close out the game and the Raiders' shots started coming up short as they began to tire noticeably after the amazing effort to get back in the game.

Bell and Johnson finished with a co-team high 21 points, while Boyd dropped in 14 before fouling out. Wright had eight, Lewis seven, Williams five and McMillan four to close out SCC's scoring.

The Raiders' defense did a much better job on Coney in the second half, holding him to 12 points, but the sophomore from Sunrise still had a game-high 38 points.

Dart (12), Wright (11), Abramov (11) and Porteous (10) were also in double figures for the Seahawks.

SCC drops to 3-1 with the loss and will head to St. Petersburg this weekend to take part in the St. Petersburg College Classic, taking on Hillsborough Community College on Friday at 6 p.m. and then bat-

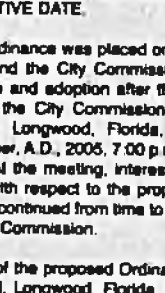

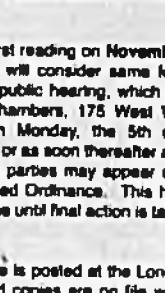

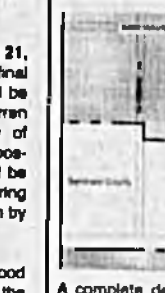

Inaugural C-USA Football Championship set for noon

ESPN will televise the game live nationally

The game time for the Inaugural Conference USA Football Championship Game presented by Xbox has been set. Commissioner Britton Banowsky announced today the game will kickoff at Noon EST at the Florida Citrus Bowl in Orlando.

ESPN will televise the game live nationally and ISP Sports will provide national radio coverage of the game.

UCF is the host of the game after completing its remarkable turnaround from 0-11 last season to 8-3 this year. Under the guidance of second-year head coach George O'Leary, the Golden Knights are the most-improved team in Division I-A this season and are one victory away from posting the largest improvement in NCAA history. UCF has become just the seventh team in NCAA annals to become bowl-eligible just one season after going winless. The Golden Knights will enter the league championship having won eight of its last nine games.

UCF's opponent will either be UTEP (8-2, 5-2) or Tulsa (7-4, 6-2). If UTEP wins on Saturday at SMU, the Miners will tie Tulsa for the West Division championship and will earn the berth based on a head-to-head victory over the Golden Hurricane. If UTEP loses, then Tulsa will win the West Division outright and face UCF in the championship game.

Tickets for the inaugural Conference USA Football Championship Game presented by Xbox went on sale Tuesday and the initial response was tremendous with several thousand tickets purchased by noon either on-line or by phone, while UCF students lined up for hours on campus to purchase tickets at the Student Union.

Tickets went on sale this morning at 9 a.m. and the sales

have been fast and furious ever since," said Matt DiFebo, the director of customer service and sales for UCF Athletics. "We have gotten a great response from our season ticket holders, students and other fans so far, and there appears to be no let up."

The game is set for Dec. 3, at noon in the Florida Citrus Bowl. UCF earned the right to host the championship game as a result of its 7-1 record in C-USA play and will play either UTEP or Tulsa. Ticket prices are \$30 for lower level sideline seats. End zone ticket prices are \$18 while UCF students can purchase tickets for a reduced rate of \$8. Groups of 20 or more can purchase tickets in the endzone at a reduced rate of \$10. UCF season ticket holders must call 407-823-1000 by the end of business Friday, November 25 at 7 p.m. if they want to purchase the same seat location as their season tickets. Great seats are also available for the general public. For general public ticket orders, fans must call Ticketmaster at 407-839-3900. Fans can also order their tickets online at www.ticketmaster.com.

All on-site parking is \$10. Reserved parking is only available for those who were Golden Knights Club donors during the season and must be purchased at the time you place your ticket order. Those Golden Knights Club donors will be assigned to a priority parking lot, with every effort being made to have donors in the same lot they used during the 2005 season. However, donors may be assigned to a different lot because of time constraints. Parking for the general public will be on a first-come, first-served basis on the day of the game in the parking lots south of the 408 expressway. Parking passes for UCF students are \$2 while supplies last.

Unless tickets sell out in advance, there will be tickets available the day of the game at the stadium, but DiFebo said he suggests fans purchase their tickets in advance to reserve the best seats.

WEST VIRGINIA RALLIES IN SECOND HALF TO DEFEAT UCF
Former Seminole Community

College All-America center Yalena Leuchanka recorded a double-double with 20 points and 17 rebounds as West Virginia (1-1) earned a 77-63 second half win over host UCF (1-1) in the final round of the UCF Golden Knights Classic at the UCF Arena on Saturday night.

After the two teams entered the intermission with the score knotted at 38, WVU opened the second half with two quick three-pointers by junior guard Meg Bulger (13 points). The Mountaineers continued to build upon their lead as they hit 14 of 24 chances from the field (58.3%). A layup by sophomore center Olayinka Sanni (19 points) with just under two minutes remaining to play gave the visitors a 15-point advantage (77-62), their largest of night.

On the other end of the court, the Golden Knights, who shot 44% (11-for-25) from the floor in the first half, went 7-for-26 (26.9%) in the second period and finished the game at 35.3%. WVU also outrebounded UCF by a 45-27 margin, but the Golden Knights accounted for only 12 turnovers to West Virginia's 18. The Mountaineers finished the game shooting 58.3% from the floor.

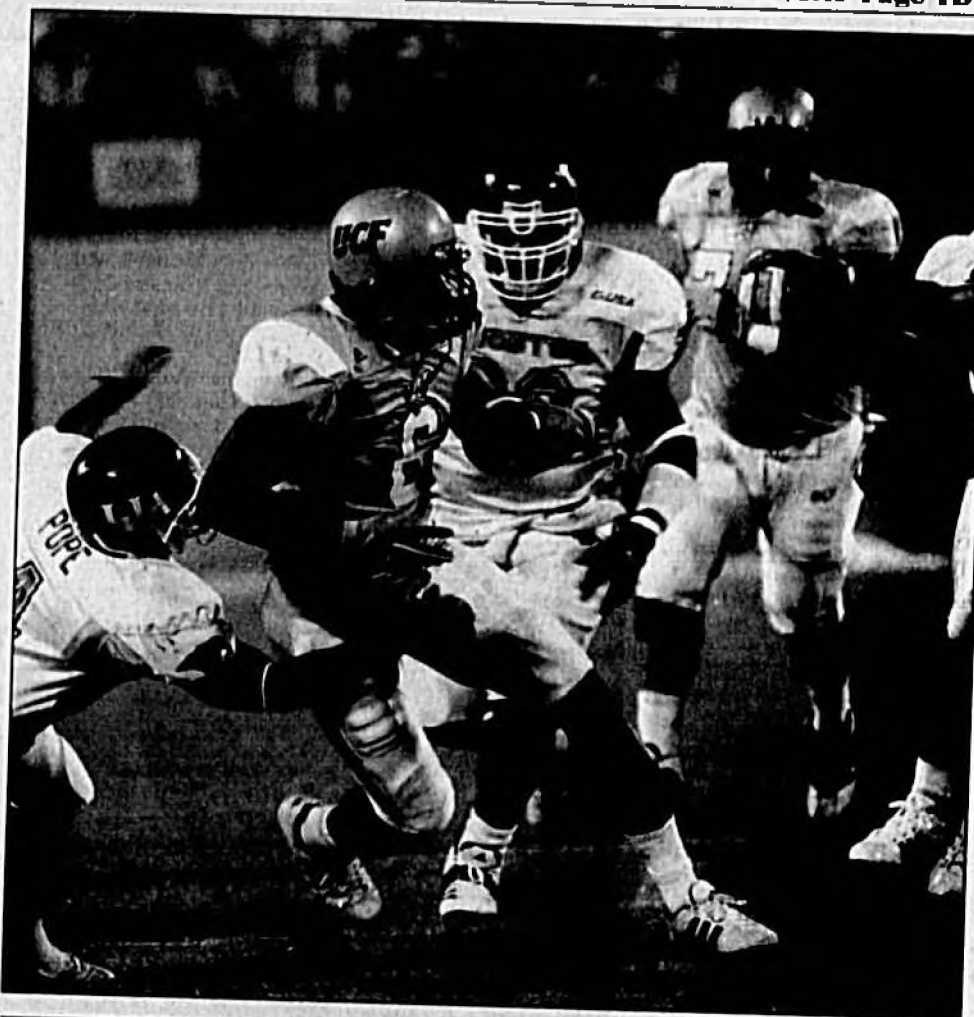
Sanni scored WVU's first points just 20 seconds into the contest. UCF took over the lead for the first time at 16:31 on a three-pointer by junior guard Francine Houston.

West Virginia jumped back out to a one-point lead on Bulger's layup less than 30 seconds later and increased their advantage to as much as nine at 5:26 before UCF began to chip away. A jumper by senior guard LaShay King tied the game at 38 all with 15 seconds remaining in the half.

UCF's outside shooting game was successful in the first period as the team hit five of 11 chances. As a result, Houston finished the night with a team-high 17 points, while King had 11. In the second stanza, the Golden Knights were 0-for-5 from behind the arc.

Freshman center Jackie Akers also contributed 11 points for the Knights.

JASON VENSON NAMED C-USA DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

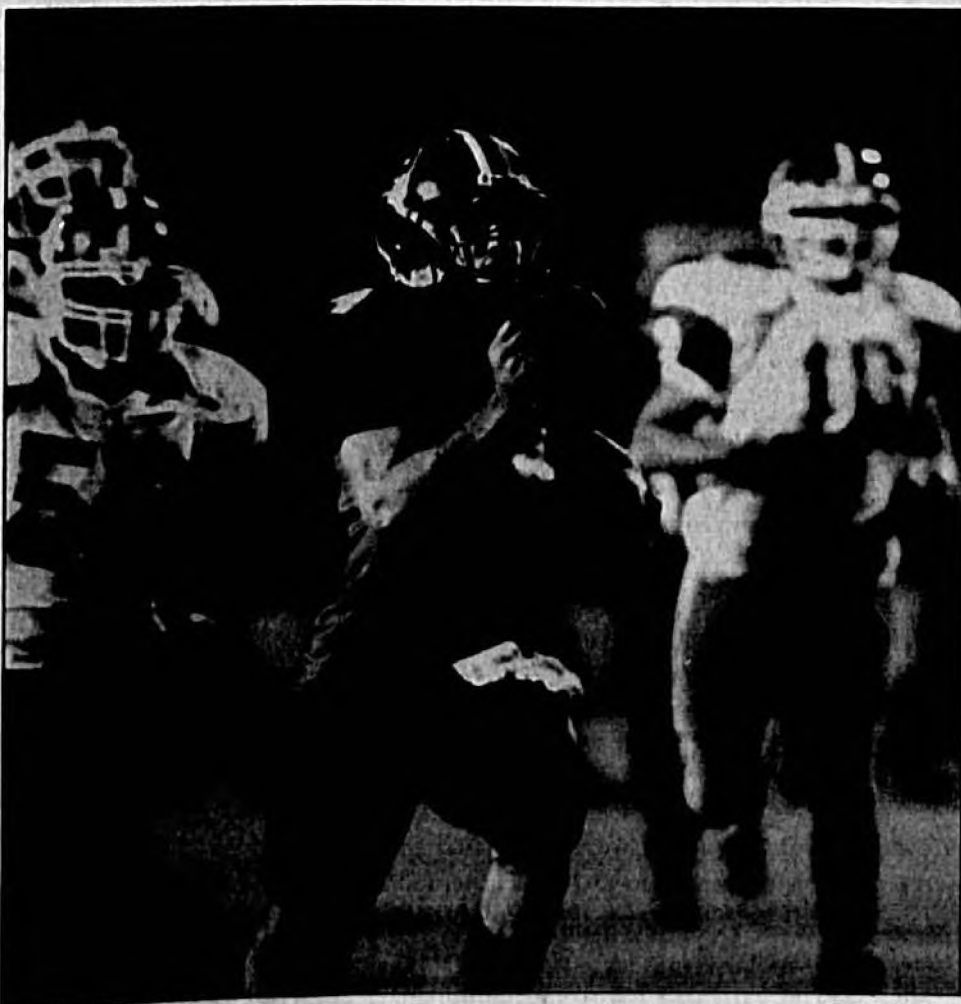

The Golden Knights (1-0) finished the game with a 45-32 edge on the glass and held the

Tars (1-1) to just 36.4 percent shooting from the floor.

The game was played in front of 3,051 fans - the seventh largest crowd in UCF Arena history.

In the win, senior guard Justin Rose posted his first career double-double with 12 points and a career-best 10 rebounds. He added five assists, two blocks and a pair of steals.

From the field, UCF shot 39.2 percent (20-of-51) and made 7-of-22 (31.8 percent) from three-point range.

"It was a typical first game in a lot of ways," said UCF head

coach Kirk Speraw. "You have to give a lot of credit to Rollins... they executed their style very well. We just didn't score. We missed open shots and did not move the ball very well."

Rollins got within three points with 12 minutes to play in the game after Jonny Reibel drained a three, but the hosts responded with an 8-0 run to put the game out of reach.

Junior forward Lavell Payne started the stretch with a layup and then Lindbeck sank two consecutive treys to hand UCF a 50-39 edge.

Senior forward Anthony Williams totaled 10 points and

seven boards for the Golden Knights. Payne finished with nine points.

"Our guys also did a lot of good things," said Speraw. "Obviously, this is a starting point, but we still have a long way to go."

However, although 58 percent of Florida respondents are aware that stomach ulcers are a common side effect of continuous use of certain pain medications, fewer than half (36 percent) of them actually perceive themselves as risk of developing one in the next ten years.
