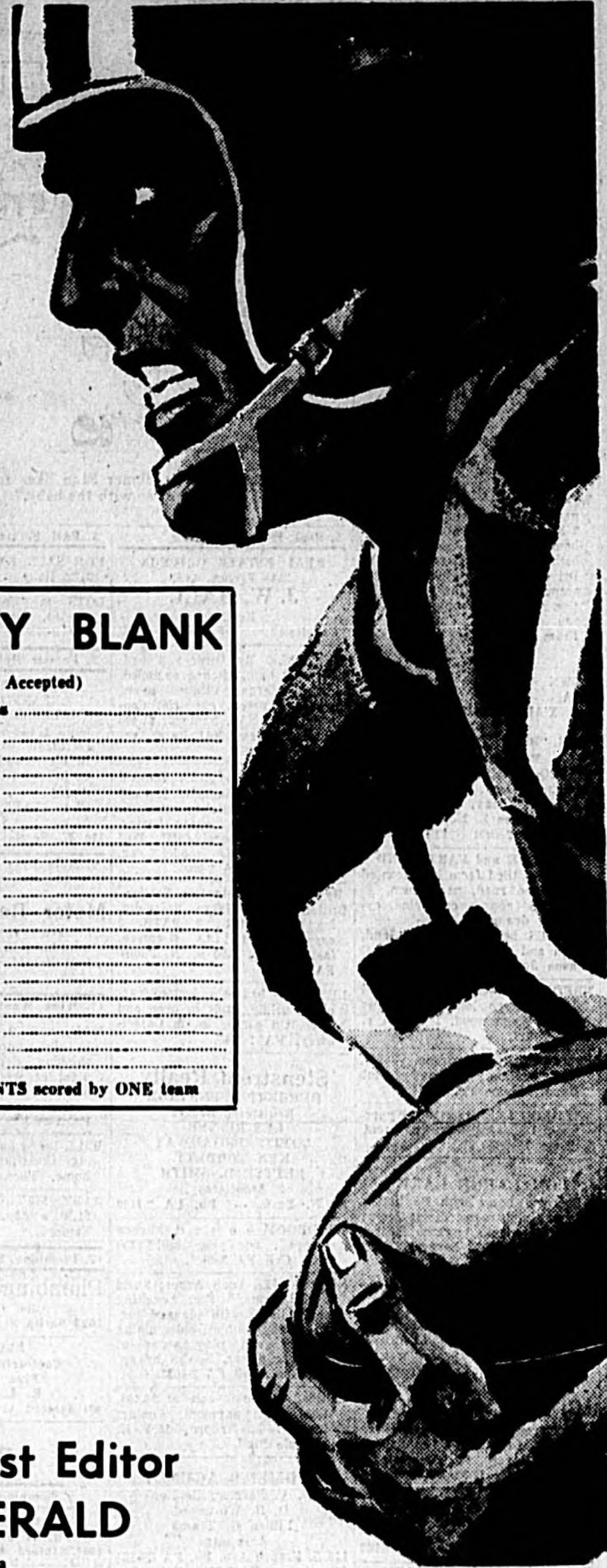

# Editorials

## Night Shopping Adds Convenience

Sanford merchants stayed open until 8 p.m. Friday in the first of a trial run of late Friday hours which is scheduled to last until Christmas.

Mr. E. C. Harper was one of the group which encouraged the stores to try the night hours and he said "we need to do it for the benefit of those who can't get out during working hours."

A poll of merchants revealed that they were willing to stay open, although it meant extra work for some and adding extra help for others.

We believe that the people who have responded in large numbers to the Friday night schedule in effect at the banks also will respond to the merchants' efforts to give them more convenient shopping.

## Know Your America

The Business and Professional Women's Club here is sponsoring "Know Your America Week" to remind our citizens that we're the most fortunate in the world, regardless of what problems we have.

Purpose of the week is outlined in the proclamation which the business and professional women got Mayor A. L. Wilson to make. It said:

"Whereas, it is necessary for Americans to appreciate fully their heritage of freedom and to rededicate themselves to the preservation of basic American principles and . . . whereas, it is essential that the City of Sanford make this occasion a notable expression of community interest as is being done in many other cities throughout the nation . . . therefore, I, Mayor A. L. Wilson do proclaim the period from November 22 to November 28, 1959, as "Know Your America Week" and call on all citizens of Sanford to contribute freely of their time and resources to participate in the commemoration of "Know Your America Week" in order to preserve human freedom and defeat communism."

It would do us all good now and then to reflect on the "basic American principles." They're still as basic as they were when the nation was dedicated to freedom in 1776.

## Rev. Brooks Named Counseling Prexy

The Rev. W. P. Brooks Jr. was re-elected president of the Family Counseling Service at the meeting of the group held at the First Baptist Church on Monday evening.

Others elected to serve with Mr. Brooks include Judge Wilson Alexander, vice president; Mrs. B. E. Chapman, secretary; and Mrs. V. C. Messinger, treasurer. The nominating committee was composed of Dr. John Morgan, Mrs. A. R. Key and R. F. Cooper.

In a resume of the work accomplished by the Family Counseling Service, Mrs. B. E. Ives III, chairman, stated that there are now 119 active cases being counseled. Since January, 1959 the counselor has interviewed 192 families. Mrs. Ives said that in most cases problems stem from marital difficulties and in a good many instances from parent-child relationships.

Because of the participation of the Family Counseling Service in the United Fund in the area, a policy was adopted at the meeting to charge a fee of \$5 for out of county patients, after the initial visit.

Mrs. Ives told of securing a film, "A Family Affair" which is being shown to a number of civic clubs in order to acquaint them with the work of the Counseling Service and its importance.

In October Mrs. Ives spent time with the National Association of both Family Counseling Service and Retarded Children. She also attended the Florida State Mental Health conference in Jacksonville Nov. 9-10. Further work included attendance at the nominating committee for State Mental Health Association held in Orlando.

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## Assignment Washington

ANTARCTICA — John Dearborn and his goodie! He spends six days a week inside a big parking garage over a hole in the ice of Ross Sea freezing almost to death but nevertheless collecting goodies.

I took one look at a sea spider that looked like a tangled yellow straw a foot long. "Ugly!" I said, and it was. Dearborn corrected me. "Beautiful," he said.

Almost every day, biologist Dearborn finds a "goodie." A goodie is something unusual that he hauls up out of the sea. So far this young man of 34 from Cape Elizabeth, Maine, has plucked more than 1,000 different species of animal life from the icy waters.

Up in his laboratory, three miles above the ice on a windy hillside, he showed me his collection of bottled and preserved goodies, perhaps the strangest assemblage of sea life collected under one small roof.

Most horrid creature was a bulbous sea squirt which has two identical protruding mouths. One is the intake. It draws in the Antarctic sea water. Through the other it filters out everything but microscopic sea food.

It was an uneasy feeling in that laboratory. You open the refrigerator and something splashes out toward you. Dearborn has the refrigerator filled with living things, most of which look like prehistoric crabs. I stumbled over a bucket of ice-slushy water and out crawled an octopus. From another pail Dearborn hauled out his goodiest, mucky of the week, a starfish carrying a load of yellow eggs ready to hatch.

From all this fishing, the young ice scientist hopes to determine how living things survive water of 27 to 29 degrees. This could be a help someday for humans trying to beat subzero climates.

Everything you turn around in this fantastic continent you come upon something new. Like Matt Pryor and his bugs.

Matt, whose home is Knoxville, Tenn., led me to his corner of the lab where his 44-power microscope was focused on a spring-tail, a bug the size of a flea.

Spring-tails — some people call them snow fleas — keep their tails hinged to their side until they're disturbed. Then they un-hinge and awish the tail.

They way Pryor finds insects in these icy wastes is a story in itself. He hunts for a "likely" place, like near the foot of a glacier. Then he digs through three or four feet of snow, six inches of ice and about four inches into the soil.

There's no sign of life there. So he puts a plastic cover over the hole and lets the sun shine through for 24 hours. Next day, Matt comes back and, lo, the hole is crawling with life!

This means those bugs have lain dormant for a long time — two years, three years — or, as Matt said, and his whiskered face lit up, "Perhaps tens of thousands of years." Could it be possible for life to remain dormant a thousand years?

I asked Matt about the "prehistoric" wingless flies he was supposed to have found here. He looked a little embarrassed. He did find a wingless fly. But only one. And he was so anxious to find out more about this prehistoric creature that he alarmed it to a laboratory in the states.

Antarctica is full of "goodies." And, someday, from these uncovered secrets a new, fascinating chapter of science will emerge.

## Loft Bombing Rules Approved By Pilots

Interest in the scheduled A3D vs A4D loft bombing contest continued to mount after Cdr. Bill Barrow and Cdr. Ken Rowell met at Sanford to discuss final contest rules.

Cdr. Barrow, commanding officer of VAH-7, both seemed pleased with the rules so far and felt that they provided for an equal contest.

Barrow will take his VA-12 bombing team to Yuma, Ariz. next week for "Operation Top Gun," the Naval Air Weapons Meet of 1959. He will return from Yuma when the Mighty versus Mite contest takes place Dec. 11.

Rowell will also be in Yuma and show the loft bombing technique of the A3D as part of the fire power demonstration.

Meanwhile, the loft bombing contest to be held in Sanford continues to gather interest from all associated with military aviation. The results of the competition will be announced Dec. 12 when the victor will step forward to receive the winner's trophy for the most unique bombing event to take place in recent years.

## Washington See-Saw

We don't go in for writing book reviews. But, out of Washington comes now a book that every American should read—and read right away. It is written by a man who knows what he is talking about: J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the FBI. Title: Masters of Deceit. It is the story of Communism in America and what the Communist bosses are doing to bring us to our knees. It is an expose of the Communist Party from its beginning down to the present.

The book is liable to scare you. It scared us. It was written, not so much to frighten Americans, as to wake them up. Today, following Mr. Khrushchev's visit, many of us are inclined to feel a bit relaxed toward Communism. Remembering the sometimes jolly look on the tubby man from behind the iron curtain, we might get the feeling that maybe we should give a little. Or that maybe we think we have been wrong in our attitude toward the Russians. Many Americans are beginning to think we should "go along" with him—at least some of the way.

If you believe the menace of Communism to America is a thing of the past, read this eye-opening book by the one man in America who knows more about it than any other.

Hoover says that: "International communism will never rest until the whole world, including the United States, is under the hammer and sickle. Ever since 1917, I have observed the rise of international communism with great concern, particularly communist efforts to infiltrate and infect our American way of life. The Communist Party, USA, started in 1919 as a small, disorganized group of fanatics. Today it is a dedicated, conspiratorial group operating under modern conditions as an arm of revolution. There is no doubt that America is now the prime target of international communism."

Coming from some folks, this statement might be passed off as sensationalism written for the purpose of selling a book. Hoover can't be accused of that. He is known in Washington as one of our more quiet, modest and retiring public officials.

In his book, Hoover tells how the Communist Party began in the United States, why it has appeal to certain Americans, how the Party operates in its efforts to eventually take over our government. "The ultimate aim of the Communist Party," he says, "is the establishment of a Soviet America. For more than a generation, never for a moment have American communists forgotten their allegiance to the Soviet Union. This is the ultimate strategy of the Communist Party, USA."

He feels that the time of greatest danger is when people are lulled into a false sense of security—and he is trying his best to wake us up. And isn't that exactly what is happening?

Let's face the truth. Mr. Hoover visit softened up a lot of Americans. Many who were making bitter speeches against Russia and the Communists a few years ago are today advocating that maybe it might be a good idea to admit Red China to the United Nations. Some are suggesting that we relax our trade restrictions against Russia. Many are saying that the days of Stalin are gone and that we should shake hands with Mr. Khrushchev and let bygones be bygones.

Those who read Mr. Hoover's book—and accept it as coming from a man of authority on the subject—won't fall for that line. Read his book—and you'll shudder every time you hear the word "relax and go along" with Russia talk. Read his book—and you'll lose a few nights sleep. And one sure thing—it will make you stop and think.

# Is Your Navigation What It Should Be?

Are you a "circum-navigator"? A circum-navigator is a person who is so busy she is just going in all directions at once. 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### Nehru Warns Red China Of All-Out War Possibility

NEW DELHI (UPI) — Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru warned Communist China today that if war is thrust upon us we will fight with all our strength. The aroused premier, raising his voice to emphasize India's determination, spoke in Parliament at opening of a debate on India's border dispute with Peking. As Nehru was speaking hundreds of socialists who have followed his mid approach to the crisis gathered outside Parli-

ment and shouted anti-government slogans. Police prevented them from entering the building. Inside Parliament, parliamentarian broke out when Nehru accused the opposition socialist party of using the Peking troubles to further their own political ends. The speaker died when he quickly apologized. "It is a strange turn of events that India, which has stood for peace so long, is now faced with the possibility even of war," Nehru said.

He emphasized that India would not fight a hot thing and he said India would work to avoid it. But his speech was one of the most forthright he has delivered on the current Indo-Chinese tension. He said at no time since India had achieved independence was his military in better shape to defend the nation's 9,000 miles of borders. And he said India's industrial might was equally able to back up military preparedness. The formal agreement ended haggling on the exact scope of the review which started three weeks ago when Russia suddenly accepted such studies after 10 months of opposition to Western
