

Plane Crash **Death Toll** Reaches 1

CHICAGO (UPI) - Investigators today sifted the flame-blackened rubble of a residential neighberbood where a four-engine cargo plane tore a fiery path of destruction, killing 11 persons.

Four teams of experts tried to miece together the twisted bits of wreckage to find why the Trans World Airlines Super-H Constellation erashed before dawn while trying to make an emergency landing at Midway Airport Tuesday. One aviation expert said a loss

of power might have caused the explosive, roof-shearing crash in the densely populated area.

The Civil Aeronautics Board said a public hearing would be held after investigators have meticuously pieced together and examined the wreckage in a TWA hanger at Midway.

Local officials also were planning an investigation.

Cook County (Chicago) Coroner Walter E. McCarron said he would summon a blue ribbon jury to take evidence. McCarron said residents of the stricken neighborhood told him planes were "flying too low," nometimes only 20 feet above the

However, families living in the long rows of bungalow-type homes have become inured to the neverceasing noise of planes over-head. They learn to sleep soundly, despite the roaring airplane engines.

The Froat Warning Service here said readings would be as low as 35 in the extreme northern sections. of the state.


Temperatures this morning slid to as much as 20 degrees below those of Tuesday as the leading edge of the cold air mass moved into the state.

It was the Limited States' such straight failure to launch a moon rocket.

Dr. A. K. Thiel of Space Technology Laboratories said "something went wrong in the upper stage, and the satellite, including that beautiful payload, fell into the ocean."
