### The Comics

Any comedy appearing in about nine out of ten comic strips and comic books is there by pure coincidence. Readers may well wonder how the strips came to be called "comic", and how the comic section or the Sunday paper WASHINGTON, Oct. 7—(A)—came to be known as the "funny paper". The comics in their The bill to change the Social Se present form did indeed spring from newspaper picture strips which based their appeal on comedy, a little before the turn of the century. But a display recently gathered by the Library of Congress advances the proposition that the comics are a twentieth century development of the art of pictorial story-telling, going back to the cave paintings of the Neanderthal period, 20,000 years ago.

'If this proposition is an accurate one, the comics actualhave a foundation of serious nature, in which comedy appears mostly by coincidence. No one can ever know why the Neanderthal cave paintings were created, but the chances are that their purpose was not to amuse but to educate those who would see them. The were the best means at hand for recording ideas. Early Chinese and aboriginal Mexican drawings and the picture stories of early Greek temples, which are included in the Library of Congress chain of development, also were examples of the ability of the people of those times to make a record of ideas and happenings. This chain of development is brought forward in considerable detail, showing the appearance of words to supplement the pictures, and the growth of artistry.

If this is really the history of the comic strip, then it must be a modern attempt to record ideas by the means at \$66,000,000 a year. But the govern-band. 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


