London Bishop Finds U. S. Lack Of Religion

SOUTHAMPTON, England, Oct. 6.—(AP)—The Bishop of London said today he was surprised to find that 60 per cent of Americans "have no religion at all." But those who belong to a church, he told newsmen, "live up to their religion more strongly than we do in Britain." The Church of England prelate, Dr. John W. C. Wand, disembarked from the Queen Mary this morning after a six week visit to the United States. Dr. Wand said in England practically everybody owns to having a religion. "If he is not very sure about things and does not go to church regularly," he said, "he says he is Church of England." The bishop said American churches "are more up to date efficient than ours."

Miami Judge Fines Beach Men \$1200 For Contempt

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Three attorneys and the president of the Miami Beach Citizens' League were fined a total of \$1,200 today by Circuit Judge George E. Holt on charges of contempt of court.

Attorney David Koller was fined \$500 and attorneys R. K. Holt and C. Frederic Brown each fined \$100. Herbert Scott Young, Citizens' League President, was fined \$500.

Judge Holt ordered the quarter held in jail in the event they failed to pay the fines into the Registry of the Circuit Court.

Judge Holt adjudged the four in contempt for their actions in seeking to have the federal court issue an injunction restraining the Helmar Hotel from bulk loading and constructing a swimming pool on oceanfront property. The action came after Judge Holt previously had denied a restraining order and had threatened to jail the entire Miami Beach City council unless it issued construction permits.

Most divorces are due to money squabbles, and I wouldn't be a bit surprised if they start by the little woman saying, 'I have nothing to wear!'"

Miss Rose says she's chiefly exercised by the speed with which the "new look" grew old, apparently to be replaced by flapper styles of the '20s—short evening gowns, lower waistlines, flat chests. 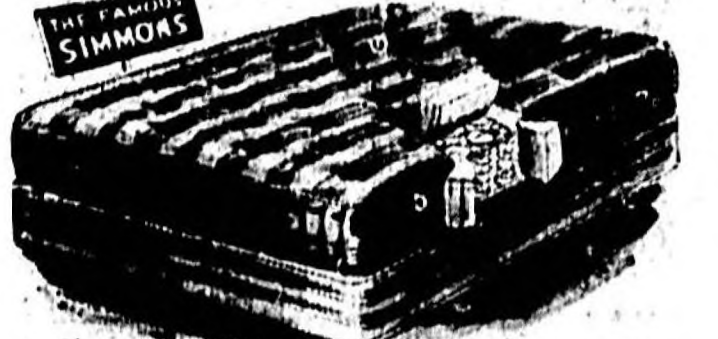

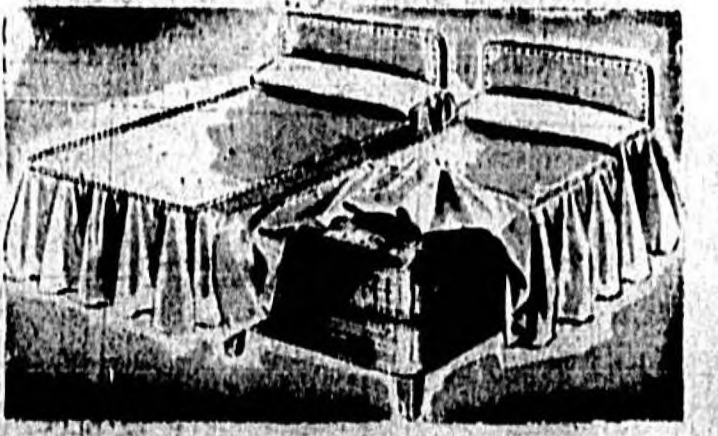

Brannan Hits Flexible Price Support Plan

Vote Is Expected On Farm Bill Tonight; Senate Accepts Ban On U. S. Sales

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Brannan jumped into the sizzling Senate controversy over farm price support today with a letter to Chairman Elmer Thomas (D-Ola) of the Senate Agriculture Committee. Thomas claimed the Brannan letter backed a flat 90 per cent parity for basic crops—corn, wheat, cotton, tobacco, rice and peanuts, in preference to the flexible 75 to 90 per cent support plan now pending.

U. S. Budget Deficit Above \$2 Billion

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The government's budget deficit climbed above the \$2,000,000,000 mark in little more than three months after this fiscal year began July 1. The Treasury reported today that through Wednesday, budget expenditures exceeded receipts by \$2,021,309,938.53 for fiscal 1950 to date. Estimates on the final showing when the year ends next June 30 range from a \$2,000,000,000 deficit to about \$4,000,000,000. Administration experts recently have planned their guesses on about \$4,000,000,000.

Herald Fire Blamed
On Careless Smoker

MIAMI, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The Mi-
ami Herald's \$600,000 warehouse
fire last weekend "possibly started
from five cigarette butts," reported
Fire Chief A. M. Willis.
It was Miami's costliest fire and
was "accidental" and "from natural
causes," Willis said in his report,
to be filed today.
"The investigation adds up
strongly to an accidental fire,"
Willis added. "It was a perfectly
normal trash fire without accel-
eration from other causes."
The fire was small when it
started in a waste paper collection
box and progressed until it was
deep in the rolls of paper, and
then to a point where it was very
difficult to handle because of un-
favorable factors involved, Willis
said in his report.
"The open, wooden container
filled with loose paper was all
that was needed as a source of
ignition," the report said. "Con-
trol of smoking was not too good
and men who were smoking passed
within a few feet of the box. It
is possible that live cigarette butts
were the cause."
The fire broke out Saturday
night in the four-story warehouse
adjoining the newspaper's pub-
lishing plant. Sufficient newsprint
was on hand on enroute to con-
tinue publication without inter-
ruption.

Whatever the decisions, "some criticism is inevitable," Radford went on, adding that "agreement solely for agreement's sake on vital national issues is dangerous."

When he got down to discussion of the B-36, Radford said the case for it hinges on the point of whether it has a reasonable chance to attack successfully without sustaining overwhelming and unacceptable losses.

"If it has not, the B-36 is a billion dollar blunder," Radford said. He said his own judgment of the B-36 is this: "It can be intercepted and destroyed in unacceptable numbers if unescorted."

It is not a precise bomber at high altitudes, especially at its 40,000-foot battle ceiling.

"I maintain that the B-36 can not bomb successfully from the high altitudes which are said to constitute a major factor in the alleged invulnerability, unless it is intended to be used for mass area bombing."
