

Boston Braves Take Opener From Lobert's Phils, 2-1

PHILADELPHIA, Apr. 15. (AP)—Sixty-year-old Hans Lobert's debut as a full-pledged major league manager was auspicious Tuesday although his Phils dropped the season opener 2-1 to the Boston Braves before 10,150 fans.

Lobert's boys committed only one error afield while playing heads-up ball and a potent rookie lived up to advance expectations by blasting in the team's marker—and the first of the game—with a scorching double. In all they got eight hits to Boston's 10.

The rookie was Ronald Northey, up from Williamsport of the Eastern League, who sent Danny Murtaugh across the plate. Murtaugh had singled.

Boston came back in the third with a trio of singles off veteran Al Johnson which produced a run when First Baseman John Cooney came home. In the seventh, Cooney rapped two-bagger and scampered in with the winner on Friolay Fernandez's single to center. Righthander Al Lavery quelled a ninth-inning Phil rally. He gave up eight hits, two of them in the last frame, but was tight in the pinches.

Yanks Win, Ruffing Outpitches Hudson

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15. (AP)—Red Ruffing turned in a three-hit hurling performance as the world-champion New York Yankees opened the wartime baseball season in the nation's capital yesterday with a 7-0 victory over Washington before Vice President Wallace and 31,000 other fans.

Ruffing was in complete command throughout. Only one Senator advanced beyond first base. The veteran right-hander struck out five batters and issued only one walk.

The Yankees pounded young Sid Hudson for 10 blows and showed their customary ability to cluster the hits, scoring three runs each in the second and ninth innings. The other tally came in the sixth.

Hudson started flashily on the mound for the Senators by fan-

ning three of the first four Yanks he faced. But after Charley Keller singled in the second he walked Joe Gordon and Bill Dickey to load the bases, and boom went the ball game. One run trickled across on a slow grounder by Ed Levy and Ruffing rifled a single into dead center to score two more.

Reds Crack Nazi Line, Smash Ahead

Incessant RAF Raids Inflict Damage On Germany, France; Lose But 4 Planes

(By Associated Press) RAF bombers continued their incessant raids over Germany's vital Ruhr valley today and attacked St. Nazaire, the docks at Le Havre and airdromes in the low countries. Four planes were missing from the now forays.

Russian forces smashed forward today after knifing through the first line of German fortifications in the vital Bryansk sector, southwest of Moscow. Soviet dispatches announced the occupation of a dozen settlements abandoned by the Germans.

Fighting in the slash of a more definite mass battle-line, the Red Army was reported last night to have achieved a breakthrough in the first lines of the important Bryansk sector of the central front while preparing its counterattacks for the shock of the heralded German Spring offensive.

Although authorities made it clear that no decisive battles were in progress, front dispatches said the Red Army force which broke the first defenses of the Bryansk salient—now reputedly under the command of the former Nazi commander-in-chief, Field Marshal Walter von Brauchitsch—was approaching the second line in fierce fighting.

The Moscow radio reported that one Soviet plane was shot down in four months of fighting on the central front killed more than 20,000 Germans, captured 200,000 prisoners, including 100,000 Jews, and destroyed about 100 tanks and armored cars.

Meantime swarms of RAF fighter planes, some of them piloted by American airmen, were reported to have again, yesterday in the most sustained daylight offensive of the war, after a string of raids which had lasted at Ruhr war industries again Tuesday night.

Allies Are Awaiting Result Of Laval-Petain Conference

(By Associated Press) Pierre Laval, Nazi Collaborator and France's most powerful figure, returned to Vichy today from a conference with German leaders in Paris. The Allies are awaiting the result of Laval's scheduled meeting with Marshal Petain as speculation arises over the disposition of the French fleet.

All American residents of occupied France were asked last night by U. S. Consulates to leave for the United States at the earliest possible moment.

The U. S. consulates at Lyon and Marseille issued circular requests to all American citizens to leave immediately.

"There are a number of Americans on the Riviera and elsewhere in Southern France," stated the letter which went to the request directly with Pierre Laval's return to power in the Vichy government.

Foreign diplomats said yesterday that thousands of German soldiers and a considerable Nazi air force may be released from France for use against the Russians as a result of the Vichy government shake-up. They feared that eventually Hitler will get the French fleet.

News of Laval's return to power in France has not been published in Russia but foreign quarters were informed and their attention was centered on Washington's reaction.

In addition, the greatest repercussions of the Vichy charges would be felt on the Russian front as based on the insistence of Marshal De Gaulle, collaborationist editor and close friend of Laval, that the French air force "dominate the French skies" and that the French army become active.

The French air force is estimated at 1000 modern and obsolete planes.

United Service Club May Be Set Up, Woods Says

The chance for the establishment of a United Service Organization in Sanford is good, according to Major George Woods of the Salvation Army, who stated this morning. There are over 70 U. S. O. clubs operated in the United States for the benefit of men in the services. These clubs are under the management of Salvation Army officers.

"The prospects are that we will have a club here if we have a camp," the Major stated. "If we do, the local captain will make donations in cash, as the captain here will not be able to spare time collecting pledges, welcomed as they are."

The U. S. O. clubs recently held open house day, and according to Major Woods, many attendances records were broken. Along with the celebration a national hookup was staged with 120 broom-making companies participating.

"I personally do not believe such a day will come whether it soon is up to you," said the director at the annual meeting of the American Society of Newspaper Editors.

New Gas Reduction Goes Into Effect

WASHINGTON, Apr. 16 (AP)—New, severe reduction in gasoline consumption is effective today in the east and Pacific northwest. Petroleum rationing regulations which will limit use to 40 to 50 percent less gasoline than normal. The overall curtailment is raised to one-third, or about 15 to 20 percent over the 40 to 50 percent reduction.

MIAMI, Apr. 16 (AP)—Fred Pine, former Dade County Solicitor, yesterday was found guilty of conspiracy to violate the Federal White Slave Law.

The conviction, which carries a maximum penalty of two years' imprisonment and \$10,000 fine, grew out of his activity in connection with the notorious La Paloma night club, which once was raided and wrecked by the Ku Klux Klan.

It was Pine's second trial in six months. Previously, a Federal jury found him guilty.

Thousands Throng Orlando For Parade

ORLANDO, Apr. 16 (AP)—Thousands of Central Floridians thronged Orlando yesterday to witness a mile long centennial parade featuring costumed marchers of a century ago, covered wagons, antiquated horse-drawn vehicles of many kinds.

Pioneer citizens, those who had lived in Central Florida for 40 or more years, were the honor guests of the celebration, many of them dressing in clothes retrieved from musty trunks.

A costume ball, old fiddlers contest and square dance last night were the closing events of the celebration.

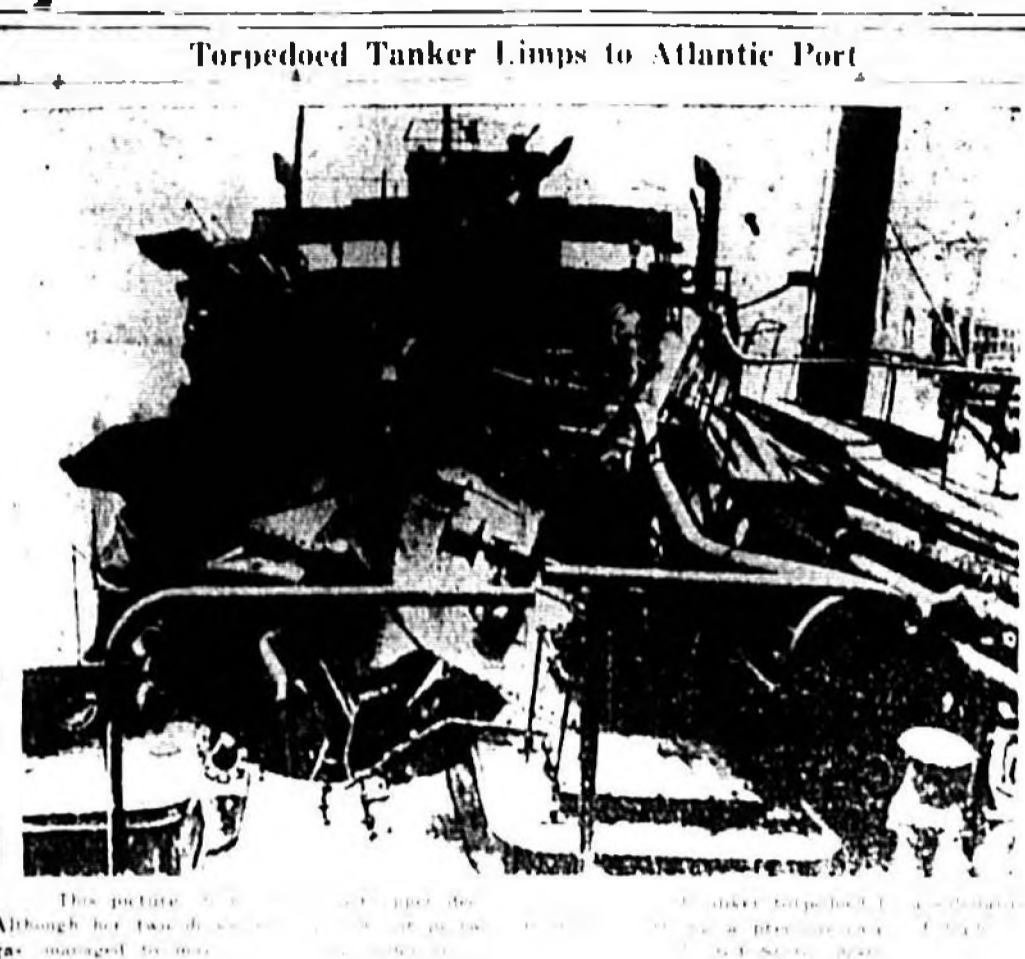

10 Million More Will Do War Work

CLEVELAND, Apr. 16 (AP)—Ten million more workers will be absorbed into our war industries this year, Brig. Gen. F. J. McSherry of WPB's labor division declared yesterday.

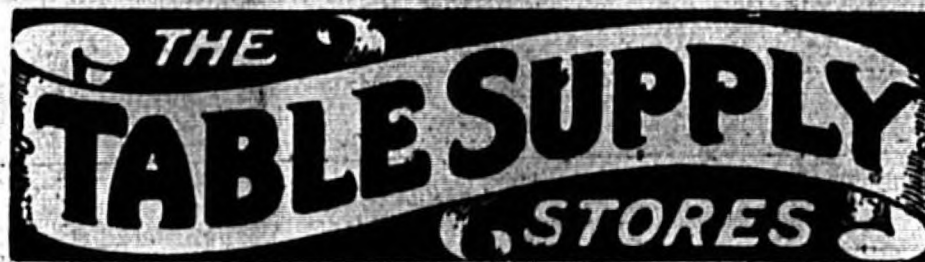

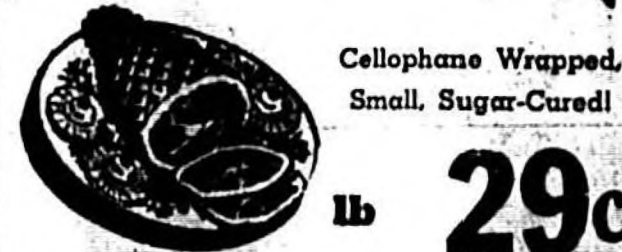

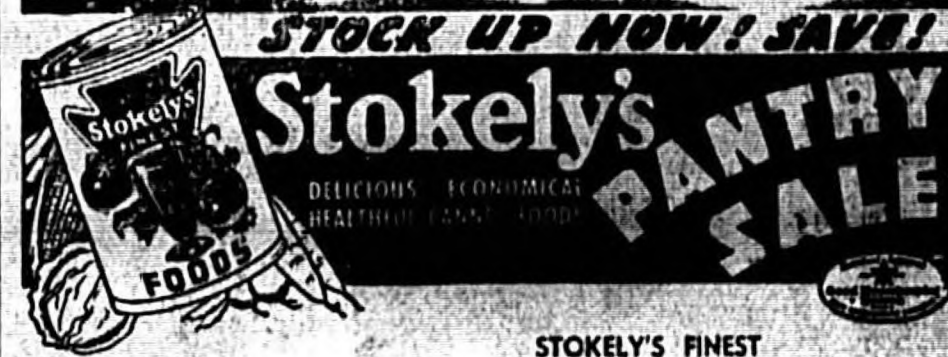
