Meningitis Cases Are Highest Since 1927
WASHINGTON, Mar. 5, 1943.—The Public Health Service report of yesterday that 503 cases of meningitis reported during the week ended Feb. 27 exceeded the number reported in any previous week since 1927.
The week's total included delayed reports on 19 cases in Virginia which occurred in previous weeks, and compared with 328 cases reported during the previous week.

Children At Home

It is necessary that Americans consider the starving,
homeless children of occupied countries. Food must be
sent them, care given, as soon as may be. But it is necessary
also to consider children at home. Bad effects of the
employment of women in war industries are already appearing
on juvenile courts, social workers, are greatly concerned
about what they are finding.

The best children in the world cannot grow up to be
useful citizens without sensible adult supervision during
the growing period. When not only one family of children,
but a dozen in the same neighborhood, are left at loose
ends day after day, the worst can be expected and is now
happening.

The younger ones get into small mischief, and at best
are not properly fed or looked after. Slight illnesses develop
into serious ones. The older youngsters get into big mischief.
They break windows, destroy fences. They steal, they
amuse the younger ones. Too many young girls get
into personal troubles whose nature and consequences they
are too young to understand.

Some of the military organizations will not take any
women with children younger than fourteen. Industry
ought not to take mothers with young children unless the
children are assured of proper supervision and safeguards.
This problem becomes more pressing day by day. It's not
an easy nut to crack, but it's tomorrow's men and women
whose foundation of health and character are thus being
destroyed.

South American Enemy

Hispanidad or Spanishness is a force to reckon with in
South America. It is opposed to the United States, and
is one of the chief helps of the Axis schemers in Argentina
and its neighbors. Yet little has been said about it in
this country.

One reason may be its youth. Only as lately as Nov.
2, 1940, did General Franco, the Spanish dictator, decree
the establishment of a Grand Council of Hispanidad. Its
aim is to turn Spanish America into a Greater Spain, not
necessarily by annexation, but by the formation of a
Spanish bloc which would promote the doctrines of Spanish
Fascism. Portugal and Brazil would be included, too, and
the more excitable followers of Hispanidad look to the
return to the Spanish world of the English, French and Dutch
colonies in Central and South America and the West Indies.
The movement is hostile to democracy and liberal ideas in
Latin America and elsewhere. Needless to say, it is bitterly
opposed to the United States.

Its strength is hard to judge. Its followers are few,
but rich and influential. One seems to be Enrique Ruiz
Guzman, the Argentine Foreign Minister, who has made
several speeches along the line of Hispanidad. This may
account in part for Argentina's failure to break with the
Axis. In general, however, the movement does not seem
to be gaining. The watchwords of the day in Latin
America are not Pan-Hispanism and Fascism, but Pan-
Americanism and democracy.

Wise Guy, Eh?

The Lord only knows how many stories there are
concerning leather lunged drill sergeants and hapless
rookies enmeshed in the intricacies of close order drill.
One sergeant is reported to have roared at the ragged
line before him:
"Didn't you birds know how to line up? Everybody
fall out and look at the terrible line you've made."

Another one gave an order for the whole company
to raise the right leg. One confused draftee raised his
left leg in error. The sergeant looked down the line and
saw the upraised left leg of one soldier right next to the
upraised right leg of the recruit beside him.
"Who is that smart aleck in the middle of the line?"
he bellowed, "who raised both legs?"—Winter Haven
Herald.

Draft Status Of Men Over 38 Is Changed Again

(Continued from Page One)
May 1, which is roughly the beginning
of the heaviest season of farm work.

Four other new selective
service regulations were issued last
night designed to keep agricultural
workers on the farms. They provide:

1. When a man is granted
deferment for farm work, local
boards have "no further discretion"
and must keep him deferred.
If this makes the local board
unable to meet its quota for the
armed services, the military call
"should be left unfiled."

2. Any man with farming
experience now in other work is to
get farmer deferment if he
returns to farming before he is
notified to appear for induction.


3. A farm worker in danger
of losing his deferment through failure
to meet production requirements
must be referred to the
county farm war board and 30
days must be allowed for his
placement in another farm job
before he can be drafted.

4. County farm boards may
request the deferment of farm
workers or appeal draft board
rulings if the worker himself or
his employer does not act.

The effect of today's order is
illustrated in this case:
Mr. B, who is 40 and classified
4-F, is told that he will be
reclassified under circumstances
which hint of a possible military
call. Mr. B is single and in
essential work. He knows that he
is due to be reclassified 1-A (F).
Then, if drafting of 38-year-olds
were resumed, he would be one of
the first to go. But if he gets a
farm job by May 1, however,
deferment must be granted.
Experienced in his job, he is
reclassified 3-C (H) which
would make his drafting much
more unlikely. If he were
married, his taking a farm job
would make him 3-C (H).

Civil Service Has Openings For Pupils

Federal agencies of the United States Civil Service Commission will train persons to do scientific and mechanical work in government laboratories while paying them as much as \$140 a month.

The positions are called trained scientific and technical aid, and requirements are few. Applicants must be at least 18 years of age, and must have completed one unit of high school study in physics, chemistry, mathematics, biology, or general science. They must pass a written test designed to measure aptitude for learning and adjusting to the duties of the position.

The positions to be filled are in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. In such agencies as the National Bureau of Standards, the Weather Bureau, the Bellville Research Center and the Bureau of Home Economics of the Department of Agriculture, the Bureau of Mines and others. After a brief training period, trainees may become eligible for promotion to higher grade positions with prospects of further promotion.

Most of the positions pay \$1440 a year plus overtime, but some may be filled at \$1260 and \$1320 a year. For a lengthened work-week of 48 hours (including 8 hours of overtime) the added pay increases. A \$1440 a year salary to \$1752; \$1320 to \$1678.92; and \$1260 to \$1532.88.

Any student interested in Civil Service should see Mr. McKay, who has additional information.
