Capitalize On The Sea Around Florida—Kirk

MIAMI (AP) — Gov.-elect Claude Kirk wants Florida to capitalize on the sea around it, and has named an advisory council of specialists to help.

"The sea around us shall be studied to the maximum and its resources developed fully," Kirk said in naming the seven-man panel Tuesday. "With more than 1,300 miles of coastline... we have unequalled natural advantages."

Appointed to the council were Dr. Jacques Piccard, Swiss oceanologist and deep-diving submarine pioneer; Edwin A. Link, an authority on underwater research; John H. Perry Jr., submarine builder and publisher of 27 Florida newspapers; Dr. F. G. Walton Smith, president of University of Miami's Institute of Marine Science; Dr. Athelstan Spilhaus, former dean of University of Minnesota's Institute of Science and Technology; Fred Learey, newly appointed chairman of the Florida Council of 100; and Billy Burns, chairman of the Ocean Sciences and Engineering Council of Palm Beach County.

Lakefront - - Tops In City

There is no doubt about it — the top news story of 1966 was the Sanford marina... or the lakefront development plan as it is more properly called.

The action started in January when city commissioners gave the project the green light. In March they signed contracts with marina and motel operators and a dredging firm.

In May \$1 million in revenue bonds were sold and work got underway. Trouble appeared in June when the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission asked the state to order Sanford to stop dredging in Lake Monroe, but the order was later rescinded and the work continued.

Contracts for piers, docks and other portions of the vast project were let in the fall and as the year drew to a close the landfill was complete, building heading being finished and docks and piers were under construction in factories.

City plans for a "lakefront whiteway" all the way from Melonville Ave. to Interstate 4, got a promise of cooperation from county and state officials. Plans for beautiful harbor shell pier and moving the zoo were being studied.

OTHER TOP STORIES in the city during the year included the purchase of the Sunland water system.

Opening of a new \$1 million wing at Seminole Memorial Hospital, salary raises for nurses and approval for Mobile care aid.

VICE PRESIDENT Hubert Humphrey and Sen. Mike Mansfield stopped at Sanford Naval Air Station to pick up a stop dressing in Lake Monroe, the thrill of their lives; BAN on alcoholic beverages at the Civic Center were lifted; SANFORD NAVAL ACADEMY received accreditation and added its 12th grade; FRANCIS ROUMILLAT was named director of the Sanford Port Terminal and SANFORD-SEMINOLE JAYCEES brought home the Dan McCarty trophy as the top club in the state; MENTAL HEALTH Clinic with psychiatric service was opened, faltered for lack of support and then got a firmer grip with help from the state; CITY EMPLOYEES got a \$50,000 pay hike while the police department added a detective bureau and the City Zoo got a new leopard, a panther and a manilla; CITY TAXPAYERS got a break with a two-mill tax cut. LONGWOOD

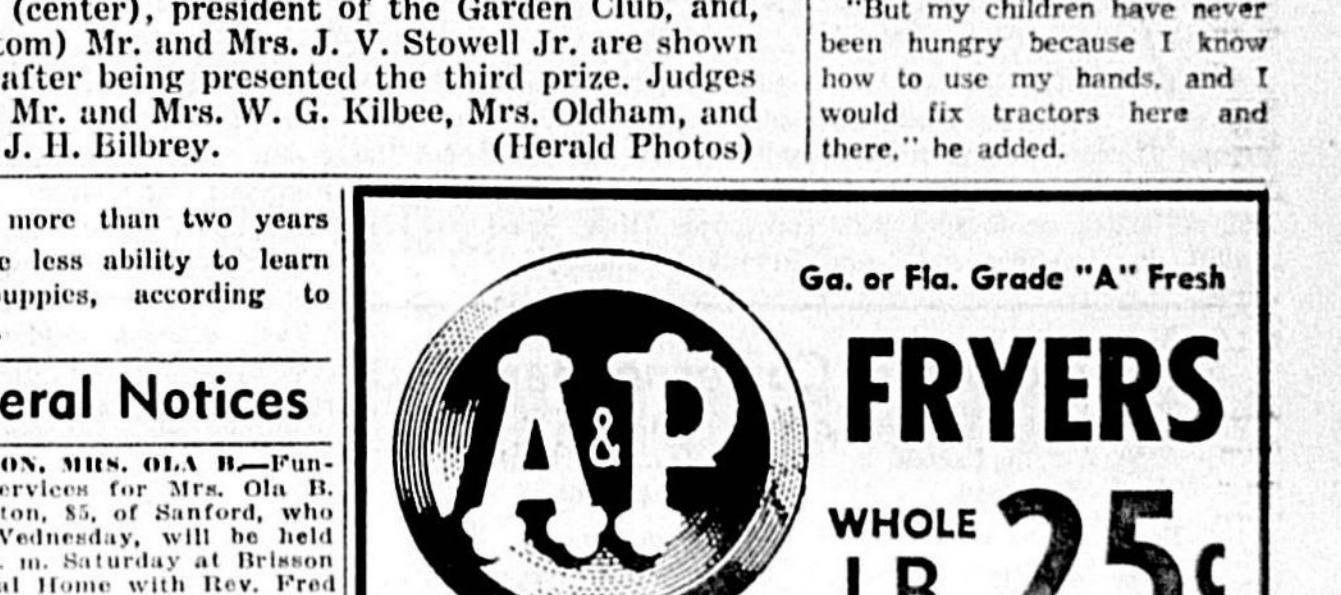

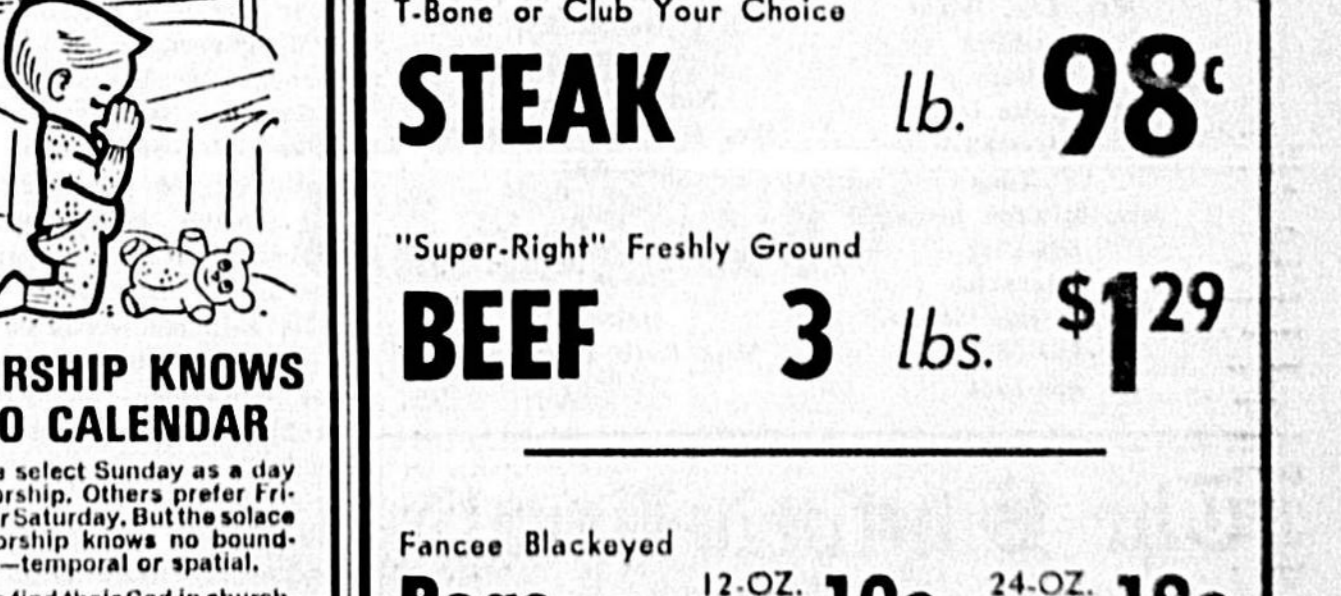

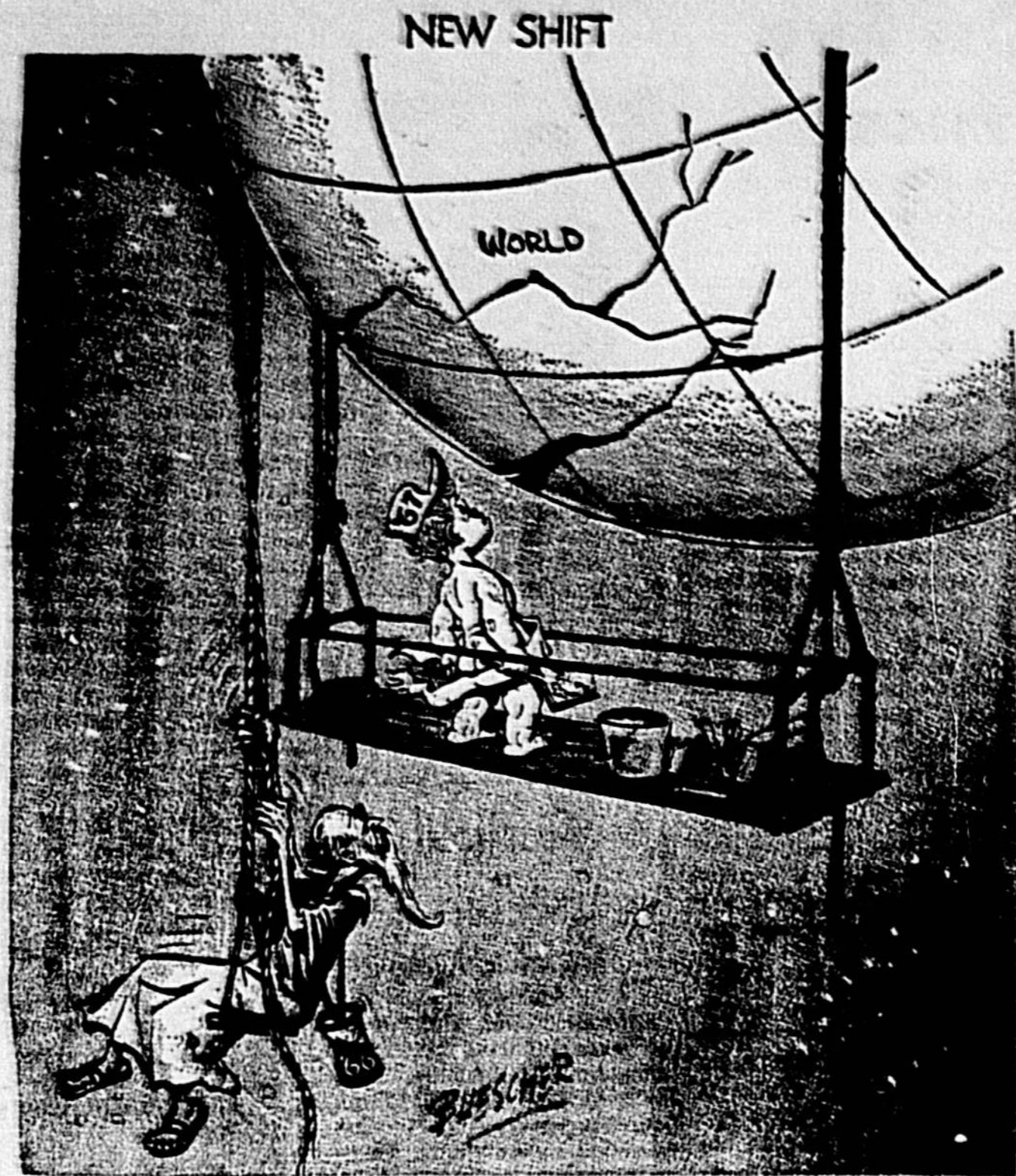

but evaluations on property were raised. MANY BUSINESSES, including the local banks, expanded, added new services or remodelled. THE SANFORD HERALD built a new plant, got new presses and expanded its services. THREE Seminole High School football players got scholarships to FSU and the hand got handsome new Indian uniforms. JUDGE ROBERT WARE was honored by the Florida Bar Association after 50 years of practice and MRS. SHEILA ROBERTS was named to the Blue Book of Outstanding Young Women of America.

ON THE DARK SIDE of the ledger, the top news story was the announcement that Sanford Naval Air Station would be closed and its operations moved to Turner Air Force Base in Georgia.

After a bitter fight, city and county officials resigned themselves to "The Knife" and began to make plans to utilize the base facility for future industrial expansion and an airport.

OTHER BAD NEWS included a vicious attack on School Superintendent R. T. Milwee by an irate parent.

TWO DEVASTATING FIRES occurred. On Aug. 16 the Naval Air Station base exchange burned the ground and on Dec. 6 the Sanford Boat Works was destroyed.

YOUNG VANDALS broke into several schools and some of them wound up being expelled by the school board.

WORST TRAFFIC ACCIDENT of the year occurred when Howard Gordie, Sanford Junior High teacher and his student son were killed when their car ran in the path of a city police car chasing a speeder. In the aftermath, the widowed mother filed suit against the city for \$500,000.

SCHOOL LUNCH ROOMS wound up \$21,000 in the red at the close of school year, with problems continuing this year as SHS students boycotted the lunchroom and complaints rolled in from both students and parents.

TEENAGERS had more troubles than two teenage "night-club" opened briefly and then folded with the youth of the city protesting bitterly. As the year closes city fathers are in the process of trying to make arrangements for another club, at a better location.

SCHOOL HAZING pranks got out of hand in the spring and landed several boys in the hands of the law. THROWING ROCKS at Santa Claus during the Christmas parade got some more boys in serious trouble and landed them in jail.

RTZ THEATRE closed after 11 years of operation, again with the youngsters again protesting, but there are promises of a new, modern theater at Sanford Plaza.

TALLAHASSEE — Commissioner of Agriculture Doyle Conner predicted today that Florida's four-billion dollar agricultural industry will enjoy another banner year in 1967, but warned that unfair and valuations, farm labor shortages and unhealthy competition from lower-priced imports would appreciably reduce the farmers' profit margins in the citrus, vegetable and dairy enterprises.

As he released his outlook for the coming year, the state's chief agricultural official expressed the hope that county tax assessors in Florida "will take into consideration present agricultural land use rather than speculative land values when assessing property and preparing the tax rolls."

"We simply cannot stand idly by and watch our farms be taxed out of existence," the commissioner said. "The new tax guide prepared by the State's Comptroller of Finance should prove to be of immeasurable aid to the tax assessors and, if they follow the guide's recommendations, our farmers will receive some needed tax relief."

Farm labor continues to be a problem in Florida, Conner said. Unless the situation can be solved to the mutual satisfaction of labor and grower, the commissioner predicted that the trend toward mechanization will be greatly stepped up. "Wages must be realistic and in line with the profit margins of the growers," he explained.

Increased imports of agricultural commodities, particularly vegetables from Mexico, have resulted in price drops on a number of Florida products, according to Conner. Agriculture's contribution to the state's economy is second to none, he pointed out, adding that "Washington officials, as well as those of our Florida counterparts, must help in protecting this most important industry."

The commissioner said the following comments are based on reports received from his own staff and the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences and a United States Department of Agriculture, Florida Fruit and Vegetable Association.

Florida's agricultural industry has grown at a phenomenal rate in the last two decades. Farm income has tripled since the mid-1940s and in 1965 was just under the one-billion dollar mark. Preliminary data suggest we will top one-billion dollars by the end of 1966. No other agricultural state can match the rate of growth in agriculture that Florida has recorded.

Economists are not in agreement over economic conditions in 1967, but consumer incomes are expected to remain at a high level. The demand for agricultural products is expected to increase, although perhaps at a lower rate than in 1966.

It appears that Florida's gross farm income will remain at a high level. However, increasing costs, particularly for labor and feed, will depress profit margins. Net farm income is likely to decline in 1967.

The record 1966-67 Florida citrus crop totalling 186,100,000 boxes exceeds the average of the preceding 10 years by 62 per cent and is 23 per cent more than produced in 1961-62, the previous record year. Such a large crop is going to result in sharply lower prices, particularly when compared with the attractive prices growers have received for citrus in recent years. However, actions being taken by the citrus industry to stabilize commercial supply and increase sales point to a healthy long-range outlook for Florida citrus.

Most of the increase in production has occurred in oranges. While fresh sales may increase modestly, most of the 42-million box increase over last year's output will be used for processing which is the normal outlet for over 4 1/2ths of the crops.

This season is opening with stocks-on-hand of orange concentrate and canned orange products well below a year ago. A marketing agreement for pooling a part of the concentrate pack is being planned.

Florida vegetable production will be substantial in the 1966-67 season. Some downward adjustment is a distinct possibility because of an uncertain labor supply, competition from imports and other factors.
