

PLAYERS SWAP 45 DURING ANNUAL SESSION

Best Trading Orgy in Years Sends Many Men To New Fields

CHICAGO, Dec. 15. (AP)—As the season and the roar of the crowd died down and the players scattered back to their ball parks, a re-check yesterday disclosed that 45 major league players had been shuffled to new scenery in the wild trading and selling spree that closed the 1933 season.

Directed by the important five-man deal of Connie Mack, the American league clubs, once noted for their reluctance to swap players among each other, gained an edge over their national league rivals in the big exchange. A total of 80 players were shifted by the American clubs to 15 by the National League teams.

Trading rookies broke into the major leagues in large numbers, replacing some of the old stars who big show back to the majors.

GARDEN NOTES

By MRS. W. E. WATSON

Ed. Note: The following is one of a series of articles taken from a notebook of the writer. It gives a fair idea of how judges decide the winners of the lighted Christmas tree contest each year.

"Community Christmas Tree Lightings."

It is my pleasure to tell you of the Christmas Tree Contest sponsored by our Garden Club, with a very substantial prize given for the selected tree by the Florida Power and Light Company.

The chairman of Christmas Tree lighting had quite a thrill, with her well-chosen judges, as they rode over town and out to Geneva to view the one tree in the county section all finding it difficult to decide on the prize winner, resultant in a splendid report to the General Club of "why and why not" of those entered.

There was of course first in their minds, the fact that the prize offered was for a living tree. In that, they were right, because the motive of this annual contest is to promote the planting and lighting of a living tree. Then came the fact—the entered tree lighted when they made their tour of decision during the specified period? These judges balloted for decision and they hope they have met points toward an impartial decision that will make all contestants happy. There is always in the heart of every judge of contests the wish that there was much more to give in prize offerings, so they wish to present a "role of honor and commendation" of very lovely displays not quite in the run of competition because of attendant errors in entry, and those not entered, and ask that the club present for consideration another year the lighting of doorways and shrubs.

The prize of ten dollars has been awarded to Mrs. J. E. Courtenay of 2200 Palmway Avenue with Mrs. Henry Watson a very close second, so close that several visits and balloting resulted for a decision.

The judges report they decided in favor of the Courtenay tree because of the location of the tree, the proper amount of lighting, and touch of festiveness.

The H. M. Watson tree was wonderfully symmetrical and the colors and the distribution of lights were very good.

The Frank L. Miller tree was a lovely bouquet of flowers, as was the shrub at Mrs. J. M. McCaskill's.

The M. S. Wiggin's place was not lighted the night the judges visited, but they did go back another time and report it for special honorable mention, but on it there is reservation as an entry in that it was group lighting and not a tree in the sense that would permit it to qualify with individual living tree entries.

Therein is where the dealer comes to us to offer some reward for a distinct class that would include many of the very lovely doorway lightings. In these lightings the message of the spirit of Christmas is so charming that it must be encouraged in a manner that will give the appreciation of a community where the spirit of Christmas is so beautifully expressed.

Three men, heavily armed, held up and robbed the Bank of Orange City of approximately \$2500 at 11:11 o'clock this morning, and made their escape after attempting to lock the bank's president and cashier, and two customers in the vault.

Arrest of the trio might have been accomplished in the heart of Lake Monroe had Sheriff J. E. McClelland and Chief of Police Roy G. Williams been notified of the robbery five minutes earlier, for they arrived in Lake Monroe only a few minutes after the trio had passed through the town after a wild ride which nearly saw them halted by a plunge into the St. Johns River and possible death under the wheels of an Atlantic Coast Line freight train.

Two of the robbers, unmasked, entered the bank building shortly after 11:00 o'clock leaving the third robber in a new Plymouth coupe whose motor was running.

D. B. Tuten, bank president, and Hobson Haight, bank cashier, were the only occupants of the bank at the time the men advanced to teller's window, whipped out guns, and ordered them to "Stick 'em up."

Obeying the command of the armed robbers, Mr. Tuten and Mr. Haight lay down on the floor, and the robbers entered the teller's cages, scooping up all available money.
