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# Nikita Retired As Soviet Premier

## Deputy Kosygin Said Successor

Late Bulletin

MOSCOW (UPI) — Premier and Communist party leader Nikita S. Khrushchev was retired because of age and his posts taken by two aides, reliable sources said today.

There was no official confirmation.

There were unconfirmed reports that First Deputy Premier Alexei N. Kosygin became acting premier and Deputy Party Leader Leonid L. Brezhnev took over the Communist party leadership.

The reports said Khrushchev was relieved of his twin posts at a party Central Committee meeting Wednesday. According to the reports, an official announcement of the changes was expected soon.

Khrushchev was 70 last April 17.

He has been premier of the Soviet Union since March 27, 1958. Khrushchev was appointed first secretary of the Soviet Communist party Sept. 13, 1953.

The reports that Khrushchev was out as the Russian's top Communist newspaper Izvestia failed to appear on schedule. The absence of Izvestia usually indicates that a major announcement is coming.

Communist correspondents from Western nations received word to listen to the radio for an important announcement.

In the past occasions of Izvestia's failure to appear on schedule it has been published later, sometimes soon after midnight (4 p.m. EST) or later in the morning.

## Burns Flying To Bank In Nassau

United Press International Democratic gubernatorial nominee Hayden Burns flies to Nassau Friday to prove that his denials of a \$1.2 million bank account there in his name are not "worthless."

Burns says he hasn't got any money in any bank outside the United States but GOP candidate Charles Holley who came up with the information says Burns' denials won't be accepted by the public.

Holley says "they're (the denials) are worthless."

The Jacksonville mayor said in Lakeland Wednesday he will go over to Nassau Friday morning and instruct the Bank of Nova Scotia to give newsmen all information about the alleged cash account.

Holley, "making no charges or insinuations," showed photostatic copies of the bank account — listed under Burns' name — earlier this week to newsmen and asked that Burns explain them.

Burns threw the bomb right back, however, saying that the same "fake" records — with Holley's name on them — had been offered to him by a "political parasite" for \$500.

"It is up to him to bring forth proof," said Holley Wednesday. "If I have been duped as he claims, then he can easily prove it."

But the St. Petersburg Republican added that the fact that Burns is going to Nassau to tell the bank to answer the questions of newsmen does not indicate the account is not there.

"When you're playing with over a million dollars, you can get a lot done in a few hours. Anyone with strong enough connections to get over a million dollars into a foreign account without it being down also has strong enough connections to get it back out and block further investigations," Holley said.

The Republican said that Burns made only weak denials when he first learned that the account information was out, but after Burns "had stalled for time, his denials became stronger."

## Congress Action On Legislatures Asked

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (UPI) — The governors of 18 Southern states ended a harmonious annual conference Wednesday, marked by a turn from segregation as their main concern toward reapportionment and the battle for the presidency.

They turned down a request by Alabama Gov. George Wallace for a conference stamp of approval on the proposed constitutional amendment to make public schools exempt from federal rulings.

Conference resolutions need unanimous approval. Three governors voted against the Wallace proposal, and one abstained.

The governors passed 13 other resolutions, including one calling on Congress to cancel the effect of the Supreme Court's "one man-one vote" decision earlier this year.

The high court ruled that seats in both houses of state legislatures must be distributed on a population-or-based basis. The governors asked Congress to pass a constitutional amendment allowing states to apportion one House on some other basis.

Those who voted against the Wallace proposal were Elbert Carvel of Delaware, Edward T. Breathitt of Kentucky and William E. Barron of West Virginia. John Connally of Texas abstained.

"This seems to be a new element in the judicial process of this country," said Connally. Wallace's suggested method for passing the amendment — a demand by state legislatures for a constitutional convention — but has never been successfully used.

The conference elected Connally a long-time friend and personal ally of President Johnson, its new chairman.

The conference adjourned without selecting the city for its next meeting, but Sea Island, Ga., and Raleigh, N. C. extended invitations.

Mississippi Gov. Paul Johnson said Tuesday the conference should consider holding its next meeting in his state, which he said had been given a bad image by "Communists" and news media.

## Board Stays Survey Of School Facilities

A school facility survey, originally scheduled to be conducted by a State Board of Education team in November, was temporarily postponed by the Seminole County Board of Public Instruction during a special meeting Wednesday afternoon.

The board's decision to delay the study was prompted by the fact that there is a possibility of a community junior college being established in the county, the effect that several federally-sponsored projects would have on the present school program, and the growth of several space projects on Florida's east coast.

The study, normally made every five years, is based on the use of present facilities and anticipated growth to determine how many new classrooms and schools will be required to meet the needs expected within the next five-year period.

The board also discussed the possibility of attempting to assist financially in providing guards at certain school crossings. While individual members of the board were in sympathy with the need for adequate safety measures and crossing guards, they were faced with the fact that expenditures of school funds for such purposes are prohibited by law.

In another action, the board established a policy, to become effective immediately, which provides that no preschool age children or any person who does not attend a Seminole County public school, may be permitted to ride county school buses on regular designated runs. This rule will not apply to buses being used for a specific purpose approved by the school board.

It was pointed out that the new policy also will apply to pre-school age children of bus drivers.

## Two Guards For School Crossings

Two men will guard three school crossings during morning and afternoon hours, Police Chief Roy G. Williams reported today.

He said John Bellamy will guard the crossing at 18th Street and French Avenue. William Henry Benton will guard crossings at Third Street and French Avenue and at 15th Street and Sanford Avenue.

Chief Williams explained the difference in operating and closing of schools in the two areas permits Benton to handle both assignments.

The appointments followed City Commission action Monday night after the appearance of Westside Grammar School parents who made a "last resort" appeal for guards at the crossing.

## Adams Due Here

Secretary of State Tom Adams was scheduled to stop off in Sanford today to visit with friends and supporters here. Adams, who is unopposed in the November election, "is not campaigning, just visiting," a spokesman said.

## Disaster Crews Were Alerted

Disaster crews in Seminole County were placed on alert shortly after noon yesterday as hurricane Isbell began its move across the state.

A. B. (Bart) Peterson, Civil Defense disaster director, said today he received the word and began at once to pass it on to his aides throughout the county. He remained in close contact with state headquarters until midnight, he added.

Peterson said the hurricane was watched closely as it passed across the state to be sure it was following the predicted path. Crews were kept on a standby basis until the storm had gone out into the Atlantic Ocean in the Vero Beach area.

## Will The Working Woman Lose Her Job?

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — Most of the jobs held by American working women will be eliminated within the next 20 years because of the scientific revolution, a leading woman banker warned today.

Mrs. Mary G. Roehling, chairman of the Treason (N. J.) Trust Co. and the first woman governor of the American Stock Exchange, said "the industrial revolution which put women to work and it will be the scientific revolution which will put them out of work."

The speech was prepared for delivery to the national consumer finance asso.

"The economic force that allowed women to escape from the home and to work and earn a livelihood will, within 20 years, turn like Frankenstein's monster and destroy the job opportunities which are now open to most women," she said.

Mrs. Roehling defined the scientific revolution as "the hard fact that automation and the computer are steadily erasing jobs."

"Since 70 per cent of the women's work force presently is holding clerical positions they will be increasingly replaced by automation."

She urged the convention delegates to create a task force to seek a solution to the women's plight at the state and national level.

She also said women can seek higher education and professional jobs, which will be of great use in the nation's future.

## LBJ, Barry Both Mum On Jenkins Arrest

EN ROUTE WITH JOHNSON (UPI) — President Johnson campaigned side-by-side with former Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy in upstate New York today and called for his election as U. S. senator from New York.

The Chief Executive flew to Rochester, a Republican area which is a stronghold of Kennedy's GOP opponent, Sen. Kenneth B. Keating.

An estimated 3,500 persons appeared at an airport rally to hear the President speak on the first leg of the New York state campaign swing.

"The country needs Robert Kennedy," Johnson said. "I don't know who else will take his place."

Johnson said no one was going to win the election "by slinging mud at each other, or by tearing down our cherished institutions."

The statement, included in Johnson's prepared text for a speech in Rochester, was the closest the Chief Executive came to mentioning the disclosure Wednesday that White House aide Walter Jenkins had been arrested on a morals charge.

Johnson said the disclosure raised grave questions which only the President can — and must — answer," Burch said.

"The story up to now is only partially revealed."

"President Johnson, who talks about responsibility, now has the responsibility to explain why he covered up for five-and-a-half years — since Jan. 15, 1959 — that his top aide had been arrested on a similar perversion charge," Burch read a statement to newsmen after it had been disclosed that Jenkins had resigned as special assistant to the President following his recent arrest on a morals charge. The long time aide to the President was arrested on a similar charge in 1959, Washington police records showed.

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Tornadoes that spread scattershot fashion ahead of Isbell's northeastward slash across the Florida peninsula accounted for most of at least 50 injuries and the battering given buildings, house trailers, airplanes and vehicles near Cape Kennedy to Miami.

There was one fatality in Florida attributed to the storm, 62-year-old Paul Kertis of Lake Worth, who suffered a fatal heart attack while boarding up his home.

Isbell, ninth tropical storm and sixth hurricane of the season, also left at least four dead and heavy crop damage in western Cuba, which it crossed Tuesday.

## Fast Moving Isbell Aims At Carolina Coast

MIAMI (UPI) — Hurricane Isbell curved its 100 mile an hour winds toward the Carolina coast today.

The Weather Bureau said it expected to order hurricane warnings posted. Meanwhile, it ordered gale warnings and a hurricane watch from Charleston, S. C., northward to include the entire North Carolina coast.

"Hurricane Isbell is making a broad turn and is now moving northward about 25 m.p.h. and is expected to turn toward the northwest, probably reaching the Carolina coast this afternoon," a special advisory said.

At 9:30 a.m. EST, Isbell was centered about 240 miles east of Brunswick, Ga., near latitude 31.0, longitude 77.5.

Forecasters warned the Carolinas that the storm has the potential to produce 8-foot tides slightly to the north of where the center reaches the coast.

The land-loving storm hit western Cuba Tuesday and raced across southern Florida Wednesday, generating a dozen tornadoes that caused widespread injuries and property damage.

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## Jenkins CO In Air Reserve: Goldwater

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Walter W. Jenkins who resigned as a top White House aide following his recent arrest on a morals charge, is a member of an Air Force reserve unit commanded by GOP presidential candidate Barry M. Goldwater.

The Air Force said Jenkins is a colonel in the 9029th Air Reserve Squadron made up largely of congressmen and Capitol Hill employees. Goldwater, an Air Force reserve major general, is in command of the unit.

The brochure outlines credits which must be acquired, tests which must be taken and information on state and private colleges in Florida, as well as technical and nursing schools.

It also points out that all senior boys must register with the Selective Service office within five days of their 18th birthday, or be in violation of the law.

Included in the information are notices concerning the various branches of the military service with emphasis on the excellence of service-connected educational programs and schools.

Scholarships and how to obtain them is also outlined in the brochure. The guidance office offers to confer with parents and students during study hall, before or after school. It is requested that appointments be made several days in advance.

## Homemakers

By Mrs. H. L. Johnson

Since it is almost that time for Mr. Cold Weather and you have to purchase new sweaters, here are some tips from Miss Elizabeth Dickenson, clothing and textiles specialist of the State Home Demonstration office.

Regardless of how much or how little you have to spend on sweaters, you'll be more satisfied if you know how to judge quality. Check these things when you shop for one:

**Material:** Is the fabric firm? Firmness is protection against pulling and snagging of yarns and loss of shape by stretching or shrinking. Fibers: Wool, nylon, orlon, cotton or blends, as well as other fibers may be used in knitting sweaters. Choose the fiber best suited to your needs. Neckline: Fits snugly and comfortable and does not ride up on neck. Holds shape. Ribbing that is double with a fold on the neck edge has less stretch than a single neck ribbing. How shaped: Full-fashioned sweaters are best and most expensive. The shape is knitted into the sweater. Shaping around back, front and sleeves is done by increasing or decreasing the number of stitches. Seams: Better made sweaters have looped or overlocked seams. Both are good seam finishes. Front openings: A good opening follows one lengthwise rib of the sweater. Better grades of sweaters have ends of knit bandings covered neatly and firmly with tape. Then watch the buttonholes, buttons, sleeves, shoulders and bands. Size: Sweaters should be a size or two larger than your dress size for easy fit. And be sure to look for colorfastness, finishes, shrink-resistance and moth-proofing. Care: Dry clean or use a proper method of washing, blocking, drying and storing.

With so many new convenient foods available homemakers are devoting more time to preparing new and different homemade foods. This new approach to menus has resulted in better and more balanced meals. Convenience is not synonymous with higher prices. A study by the USDA shows that increased use of labor-saving and time-saving food preparations need not increase the family grocery bill. In many instances commercial foods not only satisfy the convenience demand but stretch the homemaker's dollar.

Here is Mary T.'s Onion Shortcake recipe.  
**ONION SHORTCAKE**  
To make the shortcake, take 1 cup flour, 1/2 tsp. salt, 2 tps. baking powder, 1/2 tps. shortening, 1/2 cup milk, 1 egg, slightly beaten, 1/4 tsp. paprika.  
Sift the dry ingredients together. Work in the shortening. Combine the milk and

For those who do not like so much fruit in "Fruit cakes" try this recipe. It has only citron and almonds but is still considered a fruit cake.  
**CITRON-ALMOND CAKE**  
1 cup chopped blanched almonds  
1 cup diced citron  
2 cups sifted flour  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 tps. baking powder  
1 1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup butter or margarine  
2 tps. vanilla extract  
1/4 tsp. almond extract  
4 large egg whites, unbeaten  
1/2 cup milk  
Mix almonds with citron and set aside. Sift together next 3 ingredients and set aside. Gradually blend sugar with butter or margarine and vanilla and almond extracts. Beat in egg whites, one at a time. Stir in almonds and citron. Add flour mixture alternately with milk, mixing well after each addition. Turn batter into a well greased cake pan. Bake in pre-heated oven 350 degrees for 1 hour and 10 minutes. Cool in pan for 10 minutes. Turn out onto wire rack to finish cooling. Store airtight.

Someone requested a good Pumpkin Chiffon Pie recipe. This one was sent in to the

half of the beaten egg and add to dry ingredients, stirring only until mixed. Spread in a deep, greased pie tin and cover with cooked onion topping recipe below.

**PUMPKIN CHIFFON PIE**  
1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
1/2 cup cold water  
2 large eggs, separated  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg  
1/2 tsp. ground ginger  
1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
1 cup mashed cooked pumpkin  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup mixed glace fruit  
1/2 cup heavy cream  
1 tsp. sugar

Soften gelatin in cold water. Combine egg yolks, 1/2 cup of the sugar, salt and spices. Stir in pumpkin and milk. Cook over hot water until thick, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in softened gelatin. Chill until the mixture is cold and begins to thicken. (Place over ice water to shorten chilling time.) Fold in fruit. Beat egg whites until they stand in soft peaks. Gradually beat in remaining 1/2 cup sugar. Carefully fold into the mixture. Pour into a cold baked 9-inch pie crust shell. Chill until ready to serve. Whip cream and sweeten with the 1 tsp. sugar. Spread over the top as desired. Garnish with ground nutmeg.

**ONION TOPPING**  
1 tps. chopped parsley  
6 medium white onions  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 tps. butter  
1/2 tsp. paprika  
Sprinkle the onions with salt and place in a frying pan in which the butter has been melted. Cover and simmer, stirring occasionally, until the onions are very tender but not browned. Add chopped parsley and paprika. Let cool while preparing shortcake. Mix the remaining 1/2 beaten egg with 1/2 cup of milk and pour over the onion topping. Place in a hot oven 425 degrees and bake 25 minutes, or until shortcake is done. Serve at once, cut in wedge shaped pieces. This could be used as the main course at dinner or luncheon.

**CHICKEN SALAD IN CUCUMBER BOATS**  
1 1/2 cups diced chicken  
4 tps. chopped pimento  
3 tps. chopped sweet pickle  
1/2 cup chopped celery

Mix as listed until all ingredients are thoroughly blended. Chill and serve in cucumber boats which are prepared as follows:  
Wash medium sized cucumbers and cut in half lengthwise. Remove the seeds and soft pulp and marinate in French dressing. Chill. Add the cucumber seeds and soft pulp to a little mayonnaise and serve over the chicken salad or combine it with the salad ingredients. On each side of the boat, place narrow strips of pimento for the oars.

## Proper Blanching Essential Step In Freezing

If you're freezing any vegetables, be sure to blanch them. Food specialists in the U. S. Department of Agriculture's laboratories at Beltsville, Md., say this is an important step in freezing practically every vegetable. If vegetables are not heated before freezing or not heated enough, the enzymes which have helped the vegetables to grow and mature will continue to be active. The vegetables may develop off-flavors, discolor, or toughen so that they are soon unappetizing.

Check your freezing manual for the correct blanching time. It varies with the vegetable and the size of pieces. Bulletins, Home Freezing of Fruits and Vegetables, Home Freezing of Poultry, Freezing Prepared Foods, can be had by calling the Home Demonstration Agent's office, 322-7128.

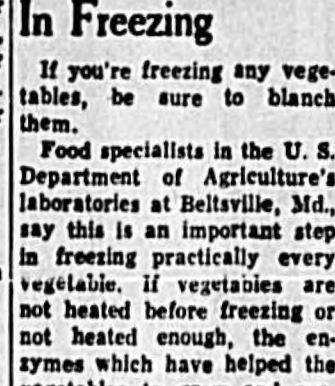

## SENILITY RESEARCH

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif. (UPI)—It is generally assumed that the cause of senility is hardening of the arteries of the brain.

This may not be the cause in some cases, according to a scientific exhibit displayed here at the annual meeting of the American Medical Association. The trouble may be a too-high level of carbon dioxide in the blood, depriving the brain of oxygen. And the cause may be inadequate breathing. The evidence: in a 27-month study, patients ostensibly senile were treated with a respiratory stimulant drug (Emivan). Symptoms disappeared or were reduced.

¼ cup margarine  
1½ cups sugar  
6 eggs  
3 cups vanilla wafer crumbs (12-ounce package)  
¼ cup milk  
1 cup chopped pecans  
1½ cups (about) flaked coconut  
Creamy Sugar Frosting  
Chopped pecans, or toasted coconut (optional)  
Cream margarine; gradually add sugar. Then beat until fluffy. Add eggs one at a time; beat well after each. Alternately fold in crumbs and milk. Stir in pecans and coconut. (Batter may appear curdled.) Spoon into 9-inch tube pan which has been greased, floured and lined on bottom with waxed paper. Evenly spread batter in pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour and 10 minutes. Cool in pan 15 minutes.

Remove cake to rack and remove wax paper. Cool thoroughly. Frost, letting some of frosting run down sides of cake. If desired, sprinkle pecans or toasted coconut around edge. (Cake may be stored in refrigerator, in covered container, or may be wrapped in rum-soaked cheesecloth before storing and before frosting.)  
Cake may be baked in 13x9-inch pan 45-50 minutes.

**CREAMY SUGAR FROSTING** (1 cup)

¼ cup light cream  
¼ cup sugar  
¼ cup margarine

Combine ingredients. Boil 3 minutes. Let cool; then beat until spreading consistency — 5 to 10 minutes.

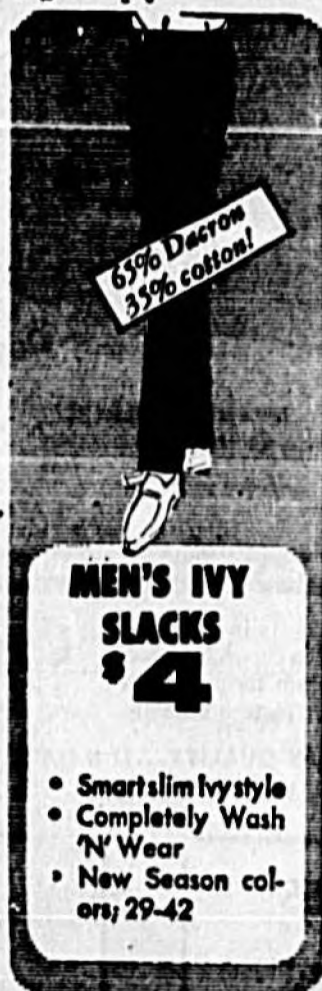

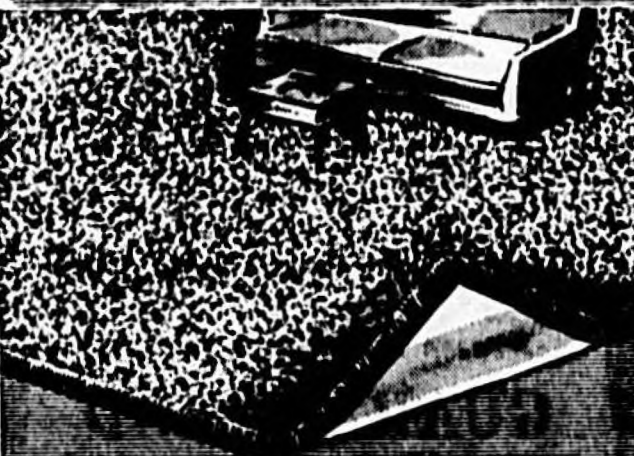

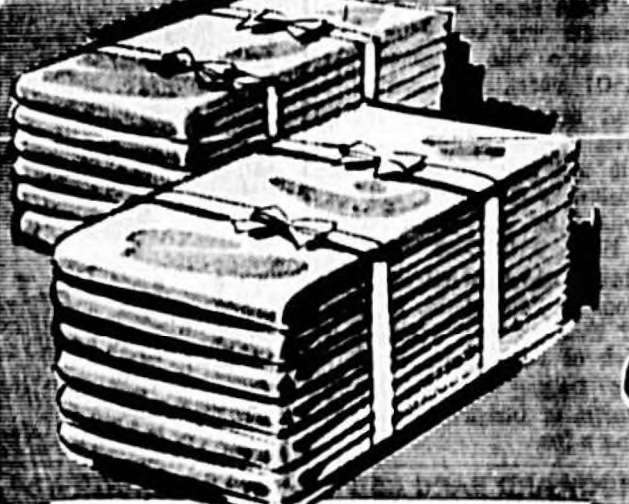

## Relief For Road Flooding Set By County

With an eye toward hurricane Isbell, county commissioners look to correcting a road flood condition on Rest Haven Road near Lake Harney.

And it will be up to the property owners to cooperate by donating rights of way to permit the county road crews to elevate the road level.

Commissioners will ask that property owners donate 30 feet of right of way on both sides of the road so that the soil can be used to raise the existing road. The sides would be graded and seeded to take care of the runoff and the road level raised as much as possible.

Rest Haven Road was under water by a considerable depth during recent storms and passage to homes in the area had to be made by boat.

In other action yesterday the Commission decreed that free-flowing artesian wells in the county must be capped to preserve the water table. They said such wells left uncapped will be reported to proper state authorities for legal action to get them capped. The owner of the well is held liable for the condition, commissioners reported.

They also agreed to hold open house at the new County Agricultural Extension Service offices on Highway 17-81 on Oct. 21. Details of the program are being worked out.

## Americans Grab Their Seventh Gold Medal

TOKYO (UPI)—Al Oerter of West Babylon, N. Y., his body encased in adhesive tape to protect a rib injury, won the Olympic discus throw for the third straight time Wednesday leading the United States to smashing victories in four sports on land and sea. Along the way, the powerful American team piled up seven gold medals, gained a triple winner in swimmer Don Schollander and regained world supremacy in the 100-meter dash and eight-oared rowing. Bob Hayes of Florida A. & M., wearing borrowed shoes, started the parade by winning the 100 meters in a world record tying 10 seconds flat. Then came Oerter, grimacing with pain at every throw. In the first swim event tonight, the 18-year-old Schollander of Lake Oswego, Ore., grabbed his third gold medal of the games by setting a world record of 4:12.2 to win the 400-meter free style. Schollander, a student at Yale, earlier won the 100-meter free style and anchored the triumphant U. S. 400-meter free style relay team. At his peak Wednesday, he clipped five-tenths of a second off his own world record set earlier this year to win easily from Germany's Frank Wiegand. Roy Saari of El Segundo, Calif., was fourth and John Nelson of Pompano Beach, Fla., was fifth.

## Army Getting Navy For Its Air Force

CHARLESTON, S. C. (UPI)—The Army is getting a navy so it can take care of its air force.

At present, the "navy" is only one ship, and it took Lt. Col. John F. Sullivan two years to sell the higher brass on the idea of putting to sea. It was all his idea.

Sullivan got the idea when he was stationed in Corpus Christi, Tex., as director of production control for the Army Air Defense Materiel Command (ARADMAC). With the Army dispatching units all over the world on "fire brigade" missions—and more and more of those units dependent on helicopters and light planes for transportation, reconnaissance, supply and fire cover—there was an obvious need for some mobile airplane repair shop to fill in where there were no other facilities, or where they had been destroyed by conflict.

And what's more mobile, mused Sullivan, than a ship? He first planned on using a baby flattop, fitted out with a complete machine shop and crew of trained mechanics, ready to sail off for any trouble spot, anchor offshore, and patch up the wounded and worn out war birds that have replaced the jeep as primary transport in some battle area — such as Viet Nam.

He knew the Navy had plenty of baby flattops sitting idle in mothballs.

He fought for his idea, pushing it upward through the channel of command, first selling the head of ARADMAC, several intermediate layers of superiors, the Department of the Army, and finally, the Defense Department.

In the meantime, Sullivan was spending more time in Washington pushing his brainchild than at his desk in Corpus Christi. Finally, another office was set up for him in Washington. He also hopped across the globe from Army post to Army post, gathering information for his project. He made trips to Germany, Viet Nam, Korea, Japan, Hawaii, and both coasts of the United States.

Judge Vernon Mize, association president, says that if enough memberships are sold a fourth attraction, possibly the Florida Symphony, will be added to the series.



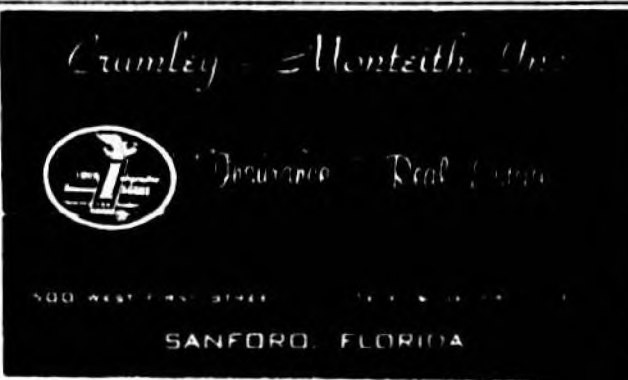

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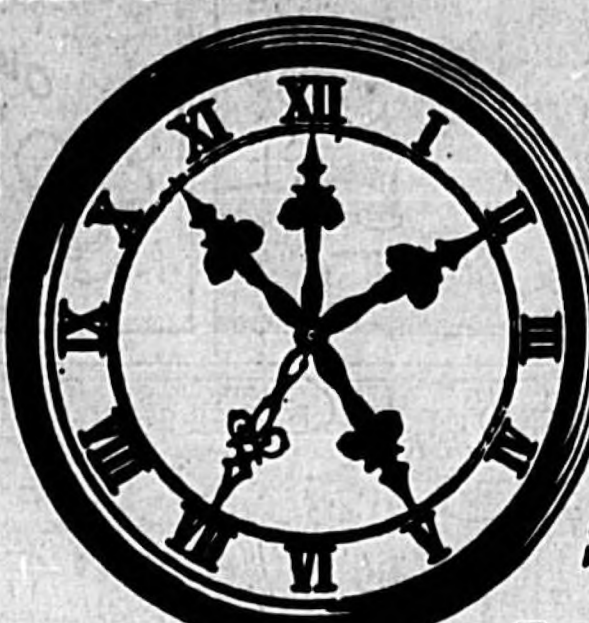

# Red China Does It—Explodes A-Bomb



It was only a few weeks ago that Walter Teague, an administrative officer for the county school system, predicted that there would be 15,300 pupils enrolled in Seminole by Christmas. As of Oct. 1, Teague reports that there were 15,276 children enrolled. He's got to have a net gain of 24 by Christmas.

Everyone in our county — that includes you and you and you (yup! and me) surely benefits at LEAST three cents a day because of the activities of the 10 agencies that belong to the United Fund and who do FINE work for others; work that each of us alone just cannot do. Agreed? All right, then; let's give at LEAST one dollar a month to this deserving community benefactor, our United Fund.

The campaigners will be happy to have you pay it monthly, quarterly, semi-annually; yes, mightily happy if you'd give it all at once, like NOW!!! But the big point is — PLEDGE IT, GIVE IT.

We wonder what is going to happen to the Seminole harness horse training and track layout at Casselberry. Some of our localities were real interested in that project when it was getting under way and racing dates were requested of the Racing Commission. It was predicted that it would be a BIG thing for our county's business community.

Right now, however, the astute businessman of Winter Park, Carl Langford, as court-appointed re-organizer, is plumbing plans to keep over 400 creditors with long past due bills on his side to permit the operation of the racing plant and thus attempt to recoup their losses for them.

With about 500 stalls available for the racing ponies (yeah, they're called "horses") it is felt that some revenue can be produced, even without the benefit of racing and the "take" from parimutual. The breeders and trainers will pay between \$50 and \$75 per stall per season, and the stays go. From this income the operators would have to pay to keep the track in good condition, pay for the electricity and water. There appears to be a margin that would justify the attempted rejuvenation.

Unlike the beginning of the adventure when we are told, many of the interested principals were concerned with getting money OUT (without putting much IN), the creditors and others who want to see the track continue will probably be asked to lead financial support just on the HOPE that Langford can make "the old mare trot."

Have you noticed how nice the driveways are at what used to be our county home, now that it has been taken over by the county engineer and other Seminole officials? REAL nice!

My-ob-my, what an improvement that traffic light at Oak Avenue and West First Street makes! Took a long time to get it, and the Herald long ago called attention to the traffic tie-ups that occurred there, but, buddy, it's worth whatever it cost. (And Pete Knowles says that it was "plenty!")

Now that some "pretty good merchandisers" from Allied Stores chain have told our local business folks what to do to help themselves and the community — thanks to host Gene Tucker—we wonder what revolutionary plans we will see developing along First Street to put the suggestions to work. Ideas without effectuating action reap few rewards.

## Program Unveiled At Deltona To Sell Florida To Nation

A stunning advertising program destined to put the phrase "Wouldn't You Rather Be In Florida" in every home in the United States was unveiled last night at Deltona. It will be called "Florida Sun Fiesta."

Overnight the world's number one Communist failed into obscurity, and at least six other top government officials were reported to have been given the axe along with him.

The cleaning out of Khrushchev's lieutenants was undertaken by the country's new leaders—Leonid I. Brezhnev, Communist party chief, and Alexei N. Kosygin, premier.

The announcement of the giant promotion was packed into a 45-minute meeting in the Deltona Community House and visibly stunned the representatives from throughout Central Florida.

There will be 25 vacations to Florida with the National City Bank of New York footing the bill through its travelers' checks.

## Dr. Munson Speaks For Medicare Bill

"Sickness is a tragedy and it shouldn't be," Dr. Leonard Munson declared yesterday as he spoke out for a "workable medical care program under the direction of the federal government."

Dr. Munson spoke at the luncheon meeting of the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees in the Civic Center.

He recalled the start of Social Security and how it now allows retired persons to "walk down the street with their head held high" instead of being a burden.

He attacked the Kerr-Mills bill which he labeled "the baby of the American Medical Association" and which he called "the biggest lobbyist in Tallahassee and the second largest in Washington."

Dr. Munson said he dropped his membership in AMA more than 25 years ago "because I didn't want my money (dimes) used for political means."

## Barry Rally To Hear Knowland

Former U. S. Senator William Knowland of California will address a Goldwater for President rally Saturday at the Seminole Plaza in Casselberry at 4 p.m.

At 3 p.m., Knowland will be met by a Seminole County motorcade at the Orange County line. The party will proceed north on U. S. 17-92 to Sanford, east on Seminole Boulevard to Mellonville, south to First Street, west to Park Avenue and return to Casselberry.

Knowland left the Senate in 1958 and made an unsuccessful bid to become California's governor that same year.

He was chairman of Senator Goldwater's successful campaign speech was broadcast live by Radio Station WTRR.

## Peking Asks World Parley To Ban Use

TOKYO (UPI)—Red China set off its first atomic bomb today. It then immediately proposed a world conference to ban the use of nuclear weapons.

The official New China News Agency (NCNA) said the blast was set off at 3 p. m. Peking time (3 a. m. EDT).

It said the bomb was exploded in the "western region of China," but did not pinpoint the location.

However, observers believed it probably was detonated somewhere in the remote regions of Sinkiang Province or Mongolia, both of which border on the Soviet Union.

A spokesman for Fordham University in New York City said the seismograph there registered what appeared to be a "very strong quake" at 3:13 a. m. EDT between Mongolia and the Kurile Islands north of Japan.

In a statement issued by the Red Chinese government, Peking pledged that it never would be the first to use nuclear weapons in warfare.

Then it called for a world summit to ban the use of nuclear weapons and their ultimate elimination by destruction.

Through its successful test, Red China joined the United States, the Soviet Union, Great Britain and France as the world's atomic powers.

It came 17 days after Secretary of State Dean Rusk said Red China would explode a nuclear device "at any time." But Rusk pointed out that it would be a long time between such a test explosion and Red China's possible possession of a stockpile of such weapons with a modern delivery system.

The historic explosion came less than 24 hours after the announced ouster of Nikita S. Khrushchev as premier and Communist party leader in the Soviet Union.

Khrushchev had led the Russian dispute with Communist China over the best way to pursue communism and had been instrumental in withdrawing Soviet support from the Chinese nuclear program about five years ago.

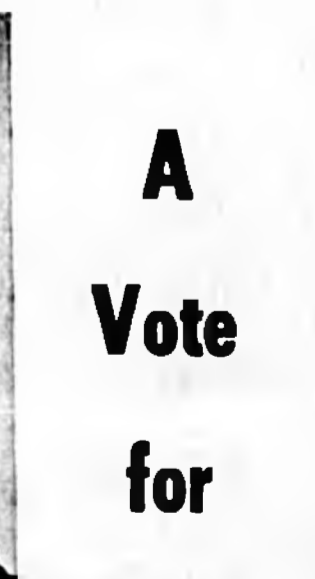
