#### Late Bulletin

MOSCOW (UPI) - Premier and Communist party leader Nikita S. Khrushchev has been retired because of age and his posts taken by two aides, reliable sources said today. There was no official confirma-

tion.

There were unconfirmed reports that First Deputy Premier Alexel N. Kosygin became acting premier and Deputy Party Leader Leonid L. Brezhnev took over the Communist party leadership.

The reports said Khrushchev was relieved of his twin posts at a party Central Committee meeting Wednesday. According to the reports, an official announcement of the changes was expected soon.

Khrushchev was 70 last April 17.

#### He has been premier of the Soviet Union since March 27, 1958. Khrushchev was appointed first secretary of the Soviet Communist party Sept. 13, 1953.

The reports that Khrushchev was out as the Russian's top Communist swept Moscow after the government newspaper Izvestia failed to appear on schedule. The absence of Izvestia usually indicates that a major announcement is coming.

Communist correspondents from Western nations received word to listen to the radio for an important announcement.

In the past occasions of Izvestia's failure to appear on schedule it has been published later, sometimes soon after midnight (4 p.m. EST) or later in the morning.



"This particular class was also awarded in excess of \$100,000 in scholarships," Mrs. Bateman pointed out. Information brochures were







SAN FRANCISCO, Callf. (UPI)-It is generally assumed that the cause of senility is hardening of the arteries of the brain.

Projects planned for the coming year were discussed at length by various speakers. The Sanford Garden Club was host to the conference and was credited with having the highest percentage of members present.


#### Sites Proposed

## A Look At Amendments

On the November 8 general elec. tion ballot voters throughout Florida will be given the opportunity to vote on 18 Constitutional amendments.

From now until the election The Sanford Herald will look into these propositions and provide our readers with a brief review of each. If we believe an amendment deserves or does not deserve our recommendation we shall share our thoughts.

As most voters know, amendment number one deals with the problem of legislative reapportionment,

This amendment would give constitutional sanction to the existing apportionment formula of the Florida Legislature.

For example, it provides for 42 Senatorial districts on the basis of economic affinity, geographical area and population.

However, there would be 43 Senators, one from each district with the most populous county having two senators.

Meanwhile, Florida's House of Representatives would be composed of 112 members. Each of the 67 counties have at least one representative and the remaining 45 representatives are assigned to the larger counties in proportion to their population. This amendment provides for reapportionment of the Legislature again in 1971 and every 10 years thereafter.

Although recent Supreme Court decisions may make such a proposal unconstitutional, it is at this time still on the ballot and voters-unless a change is announced-must decide if this is the plan they want.

It is evident that this plan will give the state's larger counties a more powerful bloc of legislative power than it has had in the past and that the vast number of the state's smaller counties will be deprived at least of some of the power it has maintained in past decades.

Which way should Seminole go? Seminole has not been ranked with counties whose long-time legislators have maintained "control" over the state. On the other hand, Seminole has not been counted among the larger counties which have charged the smaller counties with "hamstringing" progress.

One Seminole County official recently observed that this measure could give five counties in the state the balance of power and that Seminole County would not be counted in that number.

But another official of the county countered with the observation that he was "sick and tired" of driving on four and six lane highways through Florida's small counties while traffic congestion was "choking to death" the transportation and economy of some of the larger counties.

In view of Seminole County's projected growth — which various sources say will rank it among the 12 fastest growing counties in Florida — we feel that voters in this county should support the amendment.

We will be among the first to agree that perhaps it is not the best plan for all of Florida. But until a better apportionment proposition is presented to the voters this is the best for Seminole County.







TOKYO (UPI)-Red China set off its first atomic bomb today. It then immediately NO. 301 proposed a world conference Nikita Thrown Out In Disgrace to ban the use of nuclear weapons.

The official New China News Agency (NCNA) said the blast was set off at 3 p. m. Peking time (3 a. m. EDT).

It said the bomb was exloded in the "western region ST. LOUIS (UPI)-World of China," but did not pinpoint the location.

However, observers believed t probably was detonated somewhere in the remote regions of Sinkiang Province or Mongolia, both of which border on the Soviet Union.






