

### SOP Must Produce Drama, Wooing Of The East', If November Election Is Won

CLEVELAND, June 18.—(AP)—The one lingering impression of the big Republican show at Cleveland has to do with the constant, insistent pressure of the party leaders to turn eastward from the party leaders away from traditions they have cherished for years.

In terms of the drama, the party could well be entitled "The Wooing of the East." Its action centered completely the picture which had become more of a standard over a period of a generation.

At a long succession of such gatherings, the big question had been how to propitiate the western organization men, in firm control of the conventions but fearful of election repercussions in the plains states, had figured that concessions must be made to the Dillivers, the LaFollettes, the Norrises.

This time, the westerners, who marched on the convention under the banner of Alf M. Landon, had a similar problem about the east. Even before the party hosts assembled at Cleveland, the western leaders began to look forward to national leadership and the steps accordingly.

They sent emissaries eastward, the burden of their representations was that in 1936 the west meant to take command, but had no intention of being bull-headed about it. They asked what it was necessary to do, so that a western nominee might have the most possible chance to carry the hat in November.

They found the easterners receptive. For months it had been agreed among the top men of the party that a western man must be the candidate. The way they put it was this:

First of all, you must give us convincing evidence what candidate from its own section the west prefers. Then you must give us assurances, written in the party platform, that western leadership will not run wild if it is put at the party throttle.

At Cleveland the Landonites set out definitely to meet both of these requests. They pressed the case for their candidate on the Pacific coast trail over which it is found that he suited the west will be possible to ride horseback as shown by the character of his or bike 2,500 continuous miles on western support. neither alienate that support nor offend the east.

That, in brief, tells the story of Cleveland. The general theme was echoed in convention details, from the day the convention began.

Some were surprised, for instance, at the number of old-line easterners delegated by a Landon-controlled resolutions committee which wrote the platform.

The answer was that the western leadership was anxious to avoid any appearance of ignoring the east.

For the future, the trend at Cleveland is most significant. It means that the new western leadership is counting on the west as the November nest egg, and means to do what it can to annex the additional needed votes in the east; a process quite contrary to that prevailing in past years.

It means that the east is to be made a real campaign battle ground—from now on.

### Minimum Wages Paid By Ford's Farms In Britain

### Worker Able To Earn \$5 A Day Through Co-Operative Effort

BOREHAM, England, June 18.—(AP)—As high as \$5 a day is being earned by farm workers operating a co-operative agricultural experiment here on about 2,000 acres of Essex land.

The experiment, called "Fordson Co-operators," was launched two years ago by backers including Henry Ford, American motor-car magnate, and Sir Percival Perry, chairman of Ford's British company, to show that there is scope on the land both for more men and higher incomes.

Workers are formed into three co-operative societies, each running a farm. Seventy-three permanently employed men rent and work the land through the societies.

Sir Percival Perry, who was director of food production for the British government during the war, has stated that the men probably are the highest paid agricultural workers in the world.

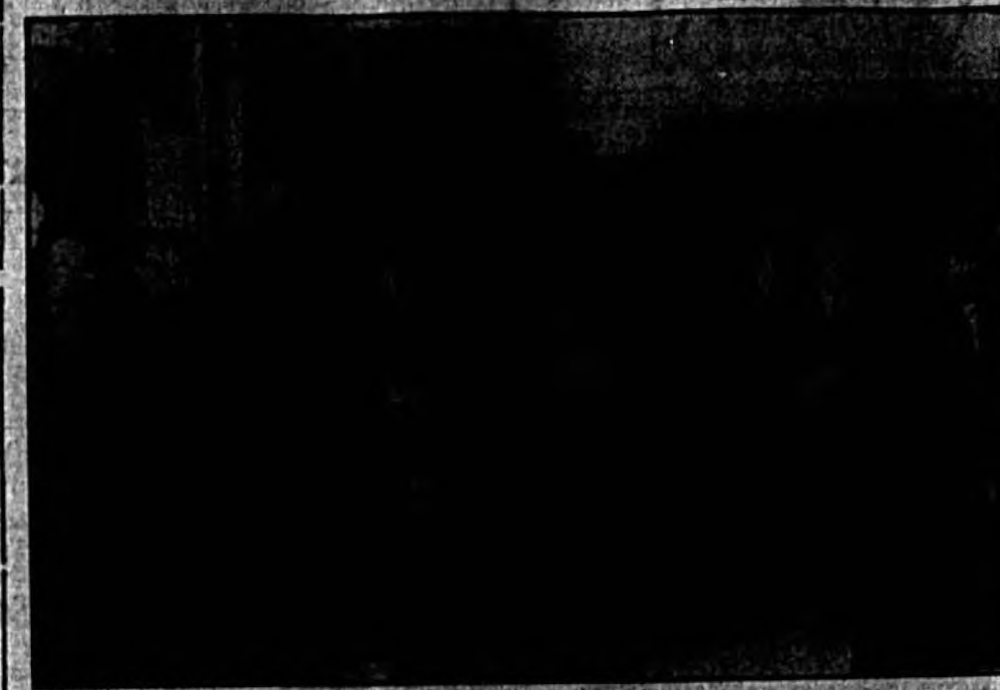
Two societies, working 1,229 acres, Sir Percival said, made a profit of more than \$14,000 last year, the average income of many of the men being above \$1,000, or about \$20 a week. The highest wage averaged \$32.50 a week.

These figures compare with the legal minimum wage in the district of \$7.75 a week.

The third farm, however, operated at a loss, thought due to a nevertheless were paid the society's standard rate, 25 per cent above the district minimum.

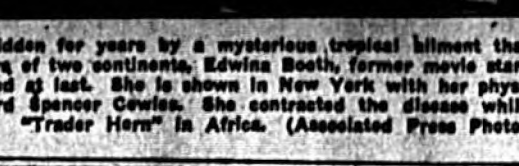

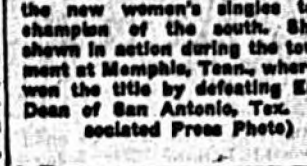

On the political front, the cabinet formed quick Majority of the Croix de Feu and three other rightist groups described as "anti-par groups"...

Authorities sought repatriation of capital with a big prevailing prospect of Frenchmen who fall to declare what gold and securities they have abroad.

The cabinet approved a bill which would permit the general federations of labor and industrial corporations representation on the regents' council of the Bank of France.

A weekly Bank of France statement disclosed a new 7-day gold drain of 950,000,000 francs (\$23,814,000).

The Senate all but completed parliamentary action on Blum's labor bill by approving a collective bargaining measure. The vote was 70 to 6.

Strikes, in their twenty-fourth day, still were widespread in France.

However, the first break in two weeks of occupation of 100 department stores in Paris by their employes came with a settlement at one store, which will re-open Saturday.

Strikers still were in charge of plants in such widely-scattered cities as Strasbourg, Rouen, Toulouse, and Marseille.

Minister of the Interior Roger Salengro, Minister of Justice Marc Rucart and Minister of Economy Charles Spinasse will confer on that problem today.

The hospital employes promised to go back to work today after the wage-hour settlement was reached at a conference between the hospital of strikers at the ministry of public health.

Officials at the hospital which was established in 1913 and now occupies one of the finest buildings in Paris, agreed to increase wages of workers to those prevailing in the city hospitals, to establish a 40-hour week with two weeks paid vacations, and to consider other demands.

The hospital heads declared the government had refused to out the workers until part of the demands had been met, and then forced the strikers to accept a compromise under threat of expulsion from the premises.

However, they said they had reserved the right to close the institution "if it became necessary because of the new expense."

They estimated the workers' demands would add 600,000 francs (\$25,400) to the current deficit of 1,000,000 francs (\$40,000).

London To Clean Up State Affairs Early

TOPPEKA, Kan., June 19.—Gov. Alf M. Landon, Republican presidential nominee, had moved today to clear away a troublesome state problem of social security legislation in preparation for the opening of his campaign for the presidency.

He called a special session of the state legislature for July 7 and made plans to take a vacation in Colorado until that date.

Although Landon will submit a proposed constitutional amendment to the assembly, that body may take up any other matters it chooses.
