Development question answered

Mayor fields concerns about lakefront plans

SANFORD - Sanford Mayor Larry Dale conducted a town meeting Thursday night at the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce. The meeting room was filled to capacity as the mayor and others explained plans and responded to questions regarding the hotel and conference center proposed for Fort Mellon Park.

Chamber President Doug Sills, who opened the program, said the meeting was necessary to clarify what was true and untrue about the project. He also introduced Larry Strickler, who served as master of ceremonies.

The mayor said he was clearly aware of a number of misconceptions about the proposed development which he openly has favored. He said he knew there was considerable opposition to the plan. Dale commented, "Even Moses, going into the Promised Land,

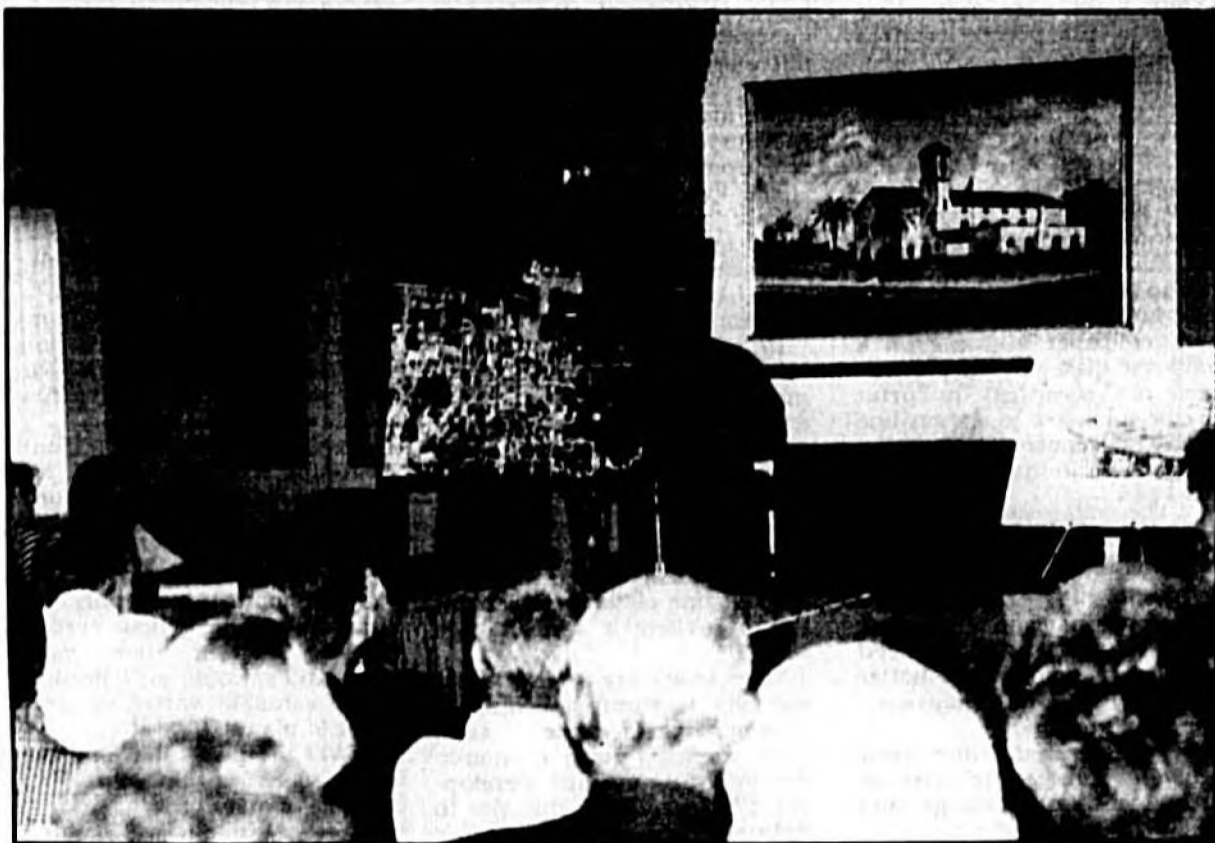
was faced with a lot of opposition."

Later in the meeting however, the mayor was reminded by an opponent to the plan that Moses didn't actually reach the Promised Land.

The plan calls for the construction of a 300 to 450-unit hotel in the eastern end of Fort Mellon Park, plus a multi-purpose conference center. Dale said the hotel would consist of approximately 150 rooms for extended stay customers, while the rest would be normal hotel rooms.

He assured the audience that a park would still remain at some of the present site, "but it is designed to have lit fountains, walkways and will be open to the general public. He added that there are two piers planned out onto Lake Monroe, one for fishing and the other for boating. The lakefront edge between the piers will have a beach area.

As the mayor spoke, Fort Please See Town, Page 2A

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Officials to review short list of city manager hopefuls

SANFORD - Members of the City Manager Selection Advisory Committee have compiled a list of who they believe are the most qualified candidates for the position. The City Commission is scheduled to discuss the choices during a work session meeting Monday afternoon.

The selection committee broke the 135 applicants into classifications; qualified, maybe qualified, not qualified, and late. Approximately 95 candidates were placed into the qualified list, three of whom are females.

As the position was advertised nationally, only 18 of the applicants in the qualified list indicated they resided in Florida. They included candidates from Lake Mary, DeLand, Orlando, Edgewater, Apopka, South Daytona, and Winter Park.

From that point, members of the 11-person committee voted for their top choices. Tony Vanderworp, who has received the public endorsement of Mayor Larry Dale, was the only candidate to receive a unanimous vote from the committee. Vanderworp is Seminole County's Director of Economic Development and Special Projects.

Former Seminole County Manager Ron Rabun, listed as a resident of Lake Mary, who resigned his post in October, 1996, received votes from 7 of the 11 members.

James McFelin, presently of Nassau Bay, Texas, who had served as City Manager of Longwood for a period, received only one vote. Please See Manager, Page 4A

Mellon Park was packed with people, but the majority were attending youth league baseball. When the question arose regarding the heavy use of the park, Dale said it was mostly for baseball, "and we had previously decided to move the ball fields anyway," he said, and called Sanford Parks and Recreation Director Mike Kirby to explain.

"We have determined that the two fields at Fort Mellon Park are simply too crowded so we are arranging to have four fields built at Chase Park. They will be cloverleaf fashion so they don't interfere with each other, and will be much better for our local needs."

Dale responded directly to objections written in a letter to the editor in the *Seminole Herald*, from Doug Groseclose, (Wed. April 8, page 3A). Groseclose had held two community meetings regarding the proposal, both of which reportedly had a majority of attendees in opposition to the development if it was located at Fort Mellon Park.

"He indicated that there was widespread opposition to the development," Dale said. "In effect, I've taken it before the people more times than you could imagine. I took it to the Waterfront Committee and it came back with their overwhelming support."

He said he also took the plan to the Community Redevelopment Agency, Sanford Main Street, Chamber of Commerce, and Historic Trust, where it received unanimous support from all. He also conducted three public meetings, and had seen a number of news articles and two editorials about the matter. "No one could say that this has been kept a secret," Dale said.

"The only way to revitalize our city is through economic development," Dale said, "and we can't have economic development without developers. I believe this is the way to right-size our taxes in bringing in development. It will improve the tax base and through the income the city will be better able to pay for other needs including our park system."

He added that Groseclose indicated the mayor, being a developer himself, may have some type of interest in the project. "I assure you, I have no interest in the development or any other aspect. I just believe it's the right thing to do to help our downtown area."

Following opening comments, Strickler moderated the question and answer portion of the meeting. Dale gave a response to each question, occasionally drawing applause from both proponents and opponents. Some of the audience remarks came in the form of comments rather than actual questions.

Q - What will happen to the civic center and marina if you develop the park?

A - Nothing will happen. They, as well as this Chamber of Commerce building and the Sanford Museum will stay right where they are. Only the eastern part of the park is being considered.

Q - You are sacrificing our children's park.

A - But they are going there to use the ball fields, not because the park is on the lakefront.

Q - You mentioned financing by the developer. Does this mean that the city will have no bond money being used?

A - No, not city bonding money. We have developed a CRA (Community Redevelopment Agency) in cooperation with Seminole County, and the CRA would supply the money which will be needed.

Response from the floor - Don't go taking any more of our tax money. I can't afford any more. Mayor Dale introduced Bill Royster, chairman of the joint CRA who explained that money for the bonds would only become available when certain property becomes more valuable, and it would only become more valuable when development is planned.

Q - Will the public have access to the waterfront or will the hotel take control of it?

A - Yes, the public will be able to use the beach, waterfront, piers, and the park areas.

Q - Why couldn't they use the parking lot (east of the Seminole County courthouse) for development, then we could save more of the land for a park?

A - We wouldn't want to lose that because need the parking to keep the court house downtown.

Q - Why don't you put this up for a public referendum, then we could vote on whether we want it or not?

'Electronic nose' helps sniff out infections

An electronic "nose" is providing striking results in the detection of pneumonia in hospitalized patients.

The computerized nose, an aroma-analysis device used widely in the perfume, beverage and food industries, shows promise as a tool to diagnose lung infections and a host of other diseases earlier, faster, less invasively and at a fraction of the cost of current diagnostic techniques, according to research presented at the American Society of Anesthesiologists annual meeting.

Researchers at the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, collected breath samples in plastic bags from the ventilators of 19 postsurgical intensive care patients (nine of whom were known to have pneumonia) and fed the samples into the aroma-detection device.

The device interacts with volatile molecules and displays varying electrical resistance's to those molecules in two-dimensional "maps," or dot patterns, on a computer screen. The device demonstrated its ability to distinguish infected patients from noninfected patients by "mapping" the breath samples of the two groups in distinctly different patterns, anesthesiologist C. William Hanson III, M.D., reported.

...lung infections. He said. Bacterial cultures take two or three days to produce results, and chest X-rays are not always an accurate test for infection, he said. Please see News, Page 4A

A - Our form of government is representative and people are elected to make decisions. If we brought everything that comes before us to a referendum, we wouldn't need our form of government.

Q - Why can't there be another location for the hotel and conference center? Why not further down the lakefront near the city hall?

A - Dale asked architect Jerry Mills to respond. "Several years ago," Mills said, "we contracted with the University of Florida to do a study of the lakefront. One of their designed proposed a hotel west of city hall, but developers took a look at it and immediately said there wasn't enough room. Then, the study was improved to where it is now, and developers said the Fort Mellon area was most acceptable, that it had the most potential of anywhere along the lakefront."

Q - Will this do anything to the taxes we pay? Will my homeowners taxes go way up?

A - I don't know the answer to this right now, but a study is being done. I believe however, that with the income from room taxes, the job increase and the increase in property evaluation, the tax income will be going up. We'll have more income from taxes, but as far as I'm concerned, you won't be seeing any tax increase, at least I'll never vote for such a thing.

Q - You say this hotel and conference center will bring new businesses into downtown Sanford. What kind of businesses? Won't the hotel have its own businesses?

A - Every type you could imagine: stores and shoppes, service industry business and others. The hotel will have limited retail and it shouldn't interfere with the downtown business.

At this point a member of the audience, who identified himself as a downtown businessman, commented that he had previously had a business in Jacksonville, six blocks from where a similar development occurred. "There were people who were against that development," he said, "but in just a short time, my business improved by almost 2,000 percent, so I believe this is going to do us a lot of good here in Sanford."

Q - Why couldn't the marina island be developed for this rather than our park?

A - I would love to see that, but I don't own it and the people who hold the lease on the Marina Hotel have not been agreeable to looking into anything like this. Also, there are

a number of other lease holders out there, and development like this just wouldn't be able to be arranged.

Q - You talk about the conference center. Do we have anywhere around here that can hold 1,000 to 1,500 people?

A - None. That's why our schools are going to Orlando to hold their graduation ceremonies.

Q - Explain when you plan to tear down the civic center.

A - There are no plans to tear that down. The Civic Center, Chamber of Commerce and museum will all stay right where they are. In fact, there is even a proposal where the museum might be able to expand.

Q - How do you plan to handle traffic to and from the conference center?

A - First Street will be one way east, and Second Street will be one way west.

Q - But what about the streets leading in from the south? What about Mellonville, Sanford Avenue or Park?

A - These are still in a development stage of infancy. Nothing fully has been planned.

Q - Why not develop the hotel and conference center out near Interstate-4?

A - No developer wants to be out there. The lakefront is the attraction.

Other comments included a spokesperson from the River-ship Romance who reported they were turning away thousands of people who call for information, asking where they

could stay in hotels, hold weddings or have a meeting area. She said they were told there was no adequate facilities, and Sanford was indeed losing money because of this lack.

Millard Hunt of the Sanford Historic Society told Dale that while he had met with other organizations, he had not met with the Society. "At our next meeting I'm going to strongly recommend that there are too many questions which need to be answered before they could go along with this proposal. You have a very questionable policy taking untaxed land and converting it to development. This needs to be looked at. I also believe the Advisory Board of the Museum is going to raise questions about this."

Strickler wrapped up the two-hour town meeting by asking the mayor what steps will be needed before the development might get under way. Dale responded that it would take a rezoning of the property for the hotel, presentation of plans to the city's Planning and Zoning Board, approval from the City Commission, Corps of Engineers, St. Johns River Water Management, and others. "It could take one to two years to get that accomplished," Dale said.

"I'll be surprised if it is that quick," responded Strickler. "But I close this meeting by saying that the best way to manage change is to have everyone think about it, and talk to our city officials. The only way this can come about is if everybody stays involved."

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Fact, fantasy folklore in Seminole County

SEMINOLE COUNTY - "Fact, Fantasy and Folklore in Seminole County" was his topic when Charlie Carlson spoke to local historians at the recent Sanford Historical Society meeting. Carlson, a native of Sanford and a tenth generation Floridian, is the author of "Strange Florida and also When Celery Was King."

Carlson was introduced to strange phenomenon of the area by his grandmother, Anna Belle Hawkins, who would spin yarns to an eager and interested youngster. This early fascination with strange events led him to continued research into such happenings and a book was eventually written.

Those at the meeting were introduced to "The Howler of Fort Florida" who fishermen in the area claimed howled or screamed and scared them

ally. There was also the "Lady in Paola" who copped off her husband's head and put it in a pond near Wilson Corner.

Another tale involved a "Haunted Piano" which three different owners were unable to move out of a two story house in Paola—it kept going back in! On Orange Boulevard there was a "Haunted Outhouse"; the door would flap open as would the toilet seat, and weird noises were heard.

Maggie Bell of Lake Monroe was a medium. No one would claim visiting her, but her front room where she held seances was usually full of people. Carlson displayed her "spirit table" which he now owns and claims that it would levitate and fly around her room. Voices also came out of the wall during her seances. And the buckets of sand from the cemetery that she would pour over graves and plants would cause them to grow like crazy.

Maggie promised to come back to haunt people and several professed seeing her ghost or smelling her pipe. One claimed healing of her headaches by Maggie's ghost.

Then there was the "St. Johns River Monsters". Sightings of him were reported in several newspaper articles 1956-63 and in 1972 a dragon was reported to have reared his head out and back again. Back in 1891, a sea serpent on Jacksonville Beach chased bathers.

And, of course, there was the "Skunk Ape". He chased some Boy Scouts out of their camp in 1959 and in 1966 he watched a woman change a tire on a lonely road. There were other sightings and all claimed that he was a big, hairy beast with the body of an ape and the face of a human. And the terrible odor emanating from him was like that of rotten cabbage.

Sanford is not for sale

In the Seminole Herald Tuesday, March 31 edition, Sanford Mayor Larry Dale was quoted as saying that the city has in writing, offered to sell City Hall to the county. What an utterly ridiculous statement, even if it is true. Of course, this is not the first time the mayor has spoken out about city services and departments on his own.

After reading this report written by Herald Staff Writer, Nick Pfeiff, I contacted the members of the Sanford City Commission by phone and was able to speak to three of them as of this writing. Commissioners Eckstein, Lyons and Williams agreed that the selling or offering for sale of the City Hall has been discussed for quite some time, but no formal action or vote has been taken to make this offer.

The commissioners I spoke with said that there was a consensus of agreement for the mayor to bring this to the county. Mayor Dale, was quoted in the article: "The members of the commission have agreed unanimously to offer to sell the City Hall to the county. I have just sent letters making that offer to each county commissioner. We'll make them a good deal and with the land the city owns in that area, it will allow the county to have sufficient area for the new courthouse."

This is another example of the mayor deciding what is best for the city and it seems now he is beginning to tell the county what's best for them, as quoted above. Until and unless the members of the city commission exercise their opinions as the voters elected them to do and not cow-tow to the mayor, these types of actions will continue. The city commissioners were elected to be representatives of the citizens of Sanford and to exercise their vote on matters that come before the commission. They are NOT doing what the voters elected them to do when they are not able or willing to stand up to the mayor.

Of course, as one commissioner stated to me, there are times when the commissioners and the mayor are in sync and then the mayor will and can speak for the others. The mayor has been bullying the airport authority, the mayor has been doing his best to turn all or part of the police department over to the county sheriff, the mayor has been beating the drums for selling the refuse department, the mayor has been doing all he can to promote the apartment project on West SR 46A, sell the lakefront property east of downtown to a developer to build a much needed" ho-

Passover honors religious, political freedom

On Friday, April 10, Jews throughout the world begin the observance of the Festival of Passover and it will be observed for seven days. (In Diaspora for eight days.) In the Torah in the Book of Exodus 12:14 we read "This day must be one that you will remember. You must keep it as a festival to God for all generations." There are many Biblical references underlining the importance of Passover on the Jewish calendar and its message for all times and generations.

Passover being of Biblical origin commemorates several universal themes: First, it marks the birth of the Jewish people as an independent nation "Z'man Hicuntenu", the Season of our Liberation. Exodus 13:3 states, "Remember this day as you left Egypt, the place of slavery, when God brought you out with a show of force."

Second, Passover is associated as one of the Three Harvest and agriculture festivals: Passover, Shavuot (Giving of the Law) and Sukkot (Tabernacle). Third, Passover is also known as the Pilgrimage Festival "Regel" which recalls the religious practice and requirements of "alya la'regel" making a pilgrimage. Thus Jews residing outside of Jerusalem had to make plans to sojourn to Jerusalem with their "korbanot" gifts to the Temple. And finally, Passover is being celebrated at Spring Season

our young and old, men and women, so that we may serve Him." The message of the Passover festival expresses mankind intolerance to slavery and oppression. "Love the stranger because you have been strangers in Egypt." the Torah commands the Jewish people. Thus, the Book of Exodus spells out the beginning of religious and political freedom for the Jewish people and mankind.

Physical and spiritual preparations go into effect for several weeks prior to the Passover Festival. Jewish homes must clear from hametz leaven products. These include changing dishes, utensils used during the rest of the year. The second part of the preparation is for the seder, the ritual meal retelling the exodus story which is conducted for the first two Passover nights.

Key elements of these activities is the involvement of the young children in searching for the chametz the night prior to Passover eve and eventual burning of the next day, symbolically of the complete removal of all leaven. Thus, the Jewish household is prepared to usher in Passover in accordance to halacha Jewish law. All food items used for Passover carry the label of Kasher L'pedach Kasher for Passover-in the community adherence to these requirements are varied.

To our community we extend the traditional greetings, "May you have a Happy and Kosher Passover, where family and friends are gathered to celebrate mankind's freedom."

Model seder prepares youth for significant Jewish holiday

Preparation and participation at Congregation Beth El of Central Florida's Model Seder is the way the Congregation's younger members share in the learning by experience method of one of the Jewish calendar's most significant holidays.

Passover, the first of the Jewish holidays mentioned in the Torah, "ha'chodeah ha'ze la'chem Roah Chodashim".... "This month (Nisan) shall be the first of all months", commemorates the Jewish people's liberation from four hundred years of slavery in Egypt.

Passover, the anniversary of all years and Jewish holidays, begins Friday evening at sundown, April 10, with the First Seder, and extends through Saturday, April 18, sundown. During this eight day period, no leavened products are to be found in the home, or eaten. Passover makes a strong statement to the Jewish people and has throughout history, through its periods of greatest pain and suffering. Under the most difficult circumstances, even in endangering their own lives, they have celebrated Passover with wine and matza.

The Passover message is ever new to the Jewish people and to every generation.

While the exodus from Egypt took place over 3500 years ago, the fight against persecution and slavery is an ongoing struggle of mankind. Thus, the

Jewish people are commanded to fight against any and all forms of bondage, discrimination or prejudice towards any people.

Age old customs are still practiced universally. "Spring Cleaning" is derived from clearing cabinets and food storage areas of all crumbs and particles that may have been prepared with yeast, called "chametz". During Passover's eight days only unleavened bread is eaten.

There is the universal call to all who are hungry to come share in the festive meal, all who are naked to be clothed, and all who are needy to be helped at this time of joy and gratitude. And the prayer is universal as well, "As we celebrate Passover with our family and friends, let us give gratitude to God for sustaining us and enabling us to reach this wonderful season."

An open letter to the unchurched

As a pastor of 28 years, one of my favorite activities is talking to unchurched people. When I have asked the question, "Why is it that so many people are not attending church these days?" The two most popular responses have been, "I am too busy," and "lack of interest." After further exploration, many of these same people have expressed deep-seated religious beliefs. But disappointment, discouragement, and aggravation have left them sidelined.

Unchurched? One thing is clear to me. The church needs sincere, open, honest people like you, and you need the church. But the church is full of hypocrisy! True enough. But scripture admonishes us to "not give up meeting together..." (Heb. 10:25 NIV) And gives us three reasons for coming together. 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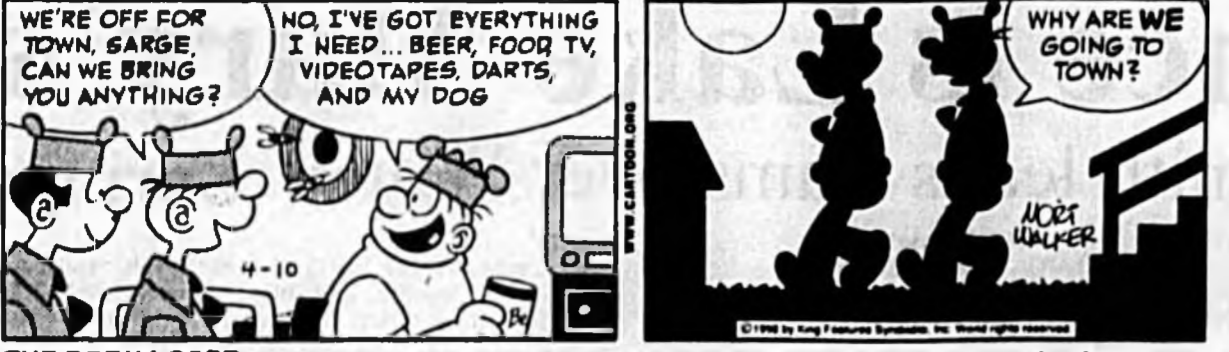

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've just been diagnosed with "preacher's knee," but I'm not a minister. What is this condition?
 DEAR READER: Some orthopedic ailments are common to certain occupations or activities, and have become part of the vernacular. Here are some examples:
 — Preacher's knee (or housemaid's knee) is a chronic infection or inflammation of the joint covering near the kneecap. Usually caused by repetitive kneeling, it is marked by pain and swelling.
 — Jumper's knee is a painful inflammation of the tendon at the front of the knee, a common sports injury in basketball and volleyball players.
 — Lover's fracture is a broken heel bone, named for the type of fracture that might be sustained by a suitor, who fell — for one reason or another — that he had to exit the boudoir through the second-story window.
 — Snowboarder's fracture involves a particular broken bone in the ankle.
 — Little League elbow refers to inflammation and injury of the elbow joint, frequently seen in young pitchers.
 — Tennis elbow, inflammation of tendons in the elbow, is also common in people who use a screwdriver for prolonged periods.
 — Gymnast's wrist is a compression injury from repetitive weight-bearing on the wrists.
 — Gamekeeper's thumb is a chronic injury to the ligaments of the thumb. It is sometimes called skier's thumb.
 Such illustrative, colorful and memorable terms are simply a form of medical shorthand. You don't have to be a preacher, a jumper, a Don Juan, a snowboarder, a baseball player, a tennis enthusiast, a gymnast or a gamekeeper to suffer injuries to the knee, heel, ankle, elbow, wrist or thumb — but, for example, some young men might feel more complimented by having a lover's fracture than simply being diagnosed with a broken heel bone.

The good on the Good

 As this is Good Friday, let's feature a deal containing good declarer play. It comes from the 12th Cap Gemini Invitational pair event, held last January in the Netherlands. The winners were Tony Forrester, Britain's top player, and Zia Mahmood, the colorful Pakistani who divides his time primarily between England and the United States.
 The opening one-club bid was part of the Polish Club system, which usually hides a minimum balanced hand, but sometimes a much stronger collection. The one diamond response signaled a bust, and one heart described a minimum with four hearts. Then Forrester (South) entered the auction with a takeout double. After that, many murky moves resulted in a final contract of three no-trump.
 West led the diamond nine, promising the 10 as well. East unblocked his queen under dummy's king. Understandably, Forrester cashed dummy's club ace, then took the losing finesse of his jack. West continued with a low diamond, declarer discarding a heart from the dummy and letting East's jack hold the trick. Now a heart switch defeats the contract, but East led the spade queen.
 After winning with his king, Forrester cashed the diamond ace (discarding a second heart from the dummy), followed by his two club winners. East, forced to keep three hearts, had to discard one spade. Declarer exited with a spade, won the heart return with dummy's ace, and played another spade. Back in hand with the heart king, Forrester took the last — and his ninth — trick with the artistically preserved spade two.

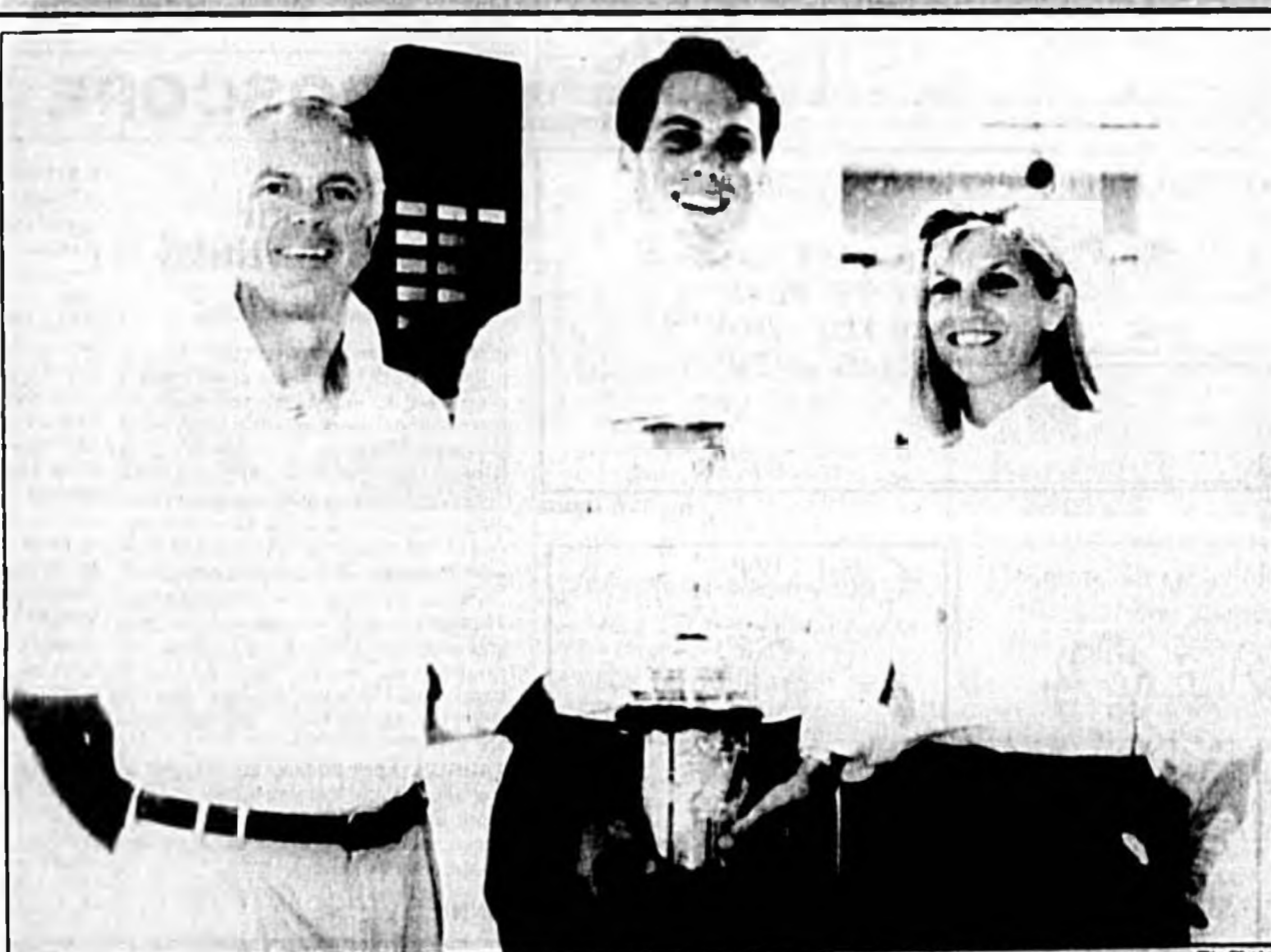

How do you become a dietician?

DEAR DR. BLONZ: I am currently a college student, and I am working on a research paper. I am researching careers in diet and nutrition—specifically, the jobs of dietitians and nutritionists. Would you be able to tell me the difference between a dietician and a nutritionist? Also, I'd like to get your perspective of requirements for entry and success in this field. In other words, what training or education and personal attributes would ensure success as a dietician or a nutritionist? Any information you can give me would be greatly appreciated. Thanks in advance. — G.G., Purchase, N.Y.

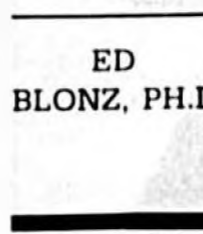
DEAR G.G.: A dietician receives college level training on the basics of nutrition and food science with a special focus on dietary planning. There is a registry for those dietitians who take the coursework and then participate in an internship at a hospital or other appropriate site. Before they can receive their R.D. (Registered Dietitian) certification, they have to pass a basic competency exam.

Your education isn't over after you receive your R.D., as you have to take continuing education courses on a regular basis to maintain your registered status. If you are interested in becoming a dietician, you should contact the American Dietetic Association in Chicago, or visit their web site at <http://www.eatright.org>. Dietitians of Canada is located in Toronto and can be found on the web at <http://www.dietitians.ca>.

The word "nutritionist" is a more generic term; unfortunately, it has no specific meaning aside from the fact that it denotes an individual who works in the field of nutrition. Those having advanced research degrees (M.S. and Ph.D.) in the nutrition sciences might rightfully consider themselves to be nutritionists, but so might employees at a health-food store who have only

on the job training.

You also might find practitioners such as chiropractors, naturopathic physicians or even massage therapists referring to themselves as "nutritionists." Amidst all this nutritional confusion is the fact that medical doctors—the professionals to whom, surveys tell us, people most often go for nutrition advice—tend to have little training in the science of nutrition. All this makes it difficult for the lay public to know who's who and who knows what.

The requirements for entry in the field vary with the type of job, as do the personal attributes for success. The field of nutrition includes the often solitary work of the bench scientist, as well as positions that involve face-to-face counseling of individuals about diets and health. Whatever you choose, though, training in the biochemical sciences is essential if you want to succeed. Having experience working on a research project will help you develop critical-thinking skills and a respect for the scientific process. I became interested in nutrition and went to graduate school to be trained. It was a long road, but it provided the essential foundation that allows me to interpret new science as it emerges. Whatever you decide, though, it is essential that you have a firm understanding of the limits of your knowledge.

DEAR DR. BLONZ: A friend told me

that it is not safe to eat the skins of baked potatoes, even if they have been washed before baking. The reason, according to my friend, is that there is toxic material in the skins. Is this true? — L.B., Oceanside, Calif.

DEAR L.B.: Your friend is probably referring to solanine, a bitter-tasting, poisonous compound that can be present in potatoes that have been allowed to sprout or that have a greenish tint to their peel.

The solanine develops when a potato is exposed to light or allowed to sprout. This is one reason why it is recommended that potatoes be stored in a cool, dark place.

Washing is not an effective way of removing solanine, as it is most concentrated in the sprouts and is present just below the greenish-tinted skin. Although small amounts of solanine are relatively harmless, you should always remove all sprouts and peel away any skin that has a greenish tint prior to eating a potato. You should also discard any potatoes that have a bitter taste. If there are neither sprouts nor green skin, it is safe to eat the entire potato. The skin contains dietary fiber and small amounts of several vitamins and minerals.

I never intended to become an addict. Nobody does. I just wanted to try it because all the "cool" people did drugs, and I wanted to be "cool," too.

It has been three years since I've touched any drug, but it's still a daily struggle. I was very lucky to have received help. By the time I turned 16, I weighed 85 pounds and had more cocaine, methamphetamine, marijuana and alcohol in my blood than any human body should have been able to tolerate. Because of drugs, I have also had to bury three friends I used to "party" with.

Today, I'm doing wonderful things with my life and am proud of my accomplishments. Abby, if just one person who reads this will stop and think about what experimenting with drugs did to me, then everything I've been through will not have been in vain.

DEAR OLDER, WISER AND CLEAN: I hope that other teens will take your painful and hard-earned lesson to heart. Nothing teaches as effectively as the voice of experience.

DEAR ABBY: Last summer I had a life-changing experience. I was watching a television program that featured a segment on obsessive-compulsive disorder. I didn't pay much attention until I heard a list of symptoms that characterize OCD.

suffering from a very common disorder. OCD is characterized by recurrent, unwanted and unpleasant thoughts (obsessions) and/or repetitive, ritualistic behaviors the person feels driven to perform (compulsions). Typical obsessions are dirt, germs and contamination; inordinate concern with order, arrangement or symmetry; inability to discard useless or worn-out items, etc. Typical compulsions include excessive washing (particularly hand washing or bathing); and repetitive actions such as counting, arranging and ordering or hoarding.

After seeing a psychiatrist, I was prescribed medication and started behavioral therapy. I now feel normal for the first time in my life. Please, Abby, publish the symptoms of obsessive-compulsive disorder, not only to increase awareness for those who are suffering and don't know why, but also for people who are close to someone who is suffering. People with OCD hide their behavior well. This disorder is still very much in the closet.

DEAR ON THE MEND: That's good advice for divorcing parents everywhere. As I say in my teen booklet, the real victims of divorce or separation are too often the innocent bystanders—the children. I tell the children of divorce: "Don't make your burden harder to bear by feeling in any way guilty about the split. Children are seldom, if ever, the cause—or even a factor—in a divorce or separation."

DEAR ABBY: I, too, used to silently condemn able-looking people who park in handicapped spaces. Then my husband devel-

oped lymphatic cancer at age 39 and needed chemotherapy and radiation treatments.

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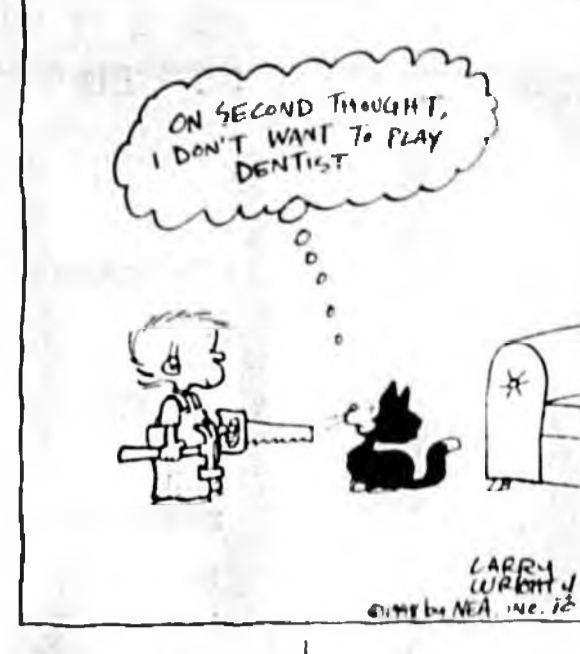
