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More Hurdles Confront McGovern

Senator George McGovern now appears headed for a first ballot nomination by the Democratic National Convention for the office of President of the United States.

This seemed almost beyond doubt after his win of delegates in the New York primary, last of the 23 in which the South Dakotan did battle with some formidable fellow Democrats, and emerged with less than 200 needed to reach the 1509 required for nomination.

Thus the Democratic party has on its hands an unexpected development at a time when its own nominating convention reforms are being tried out and the Miami Beach gathering on July tout takes prace with the tiges of the nation focussed on its accomplishments.

Indeed, how the Democrats perform will be an answer of sorts to the pasic problem of democratic government to make this form responsive to the public will and, at the same time, name a slate of candidates which will make debate on national purposes and policies honest and understandable

This is the "nitty-gritty" of the challenge which has now been flung at the feet of the South Dakotan. Assume he has won the primaries, asume that the Democratic convention will avoid the machinations which would show the primaries a very wrong way to produce such a candidate and the simple conclusion is that McGovern must now unify this major political

Republicans may be smiling at this situation and continue to be in the state of euphoria which the Peking and Moscow performances by the Nixon team has created

Yet there is deep political trouble in their own ranks. It would take only another such fiasco as the weekend disclosure of what seems to be an attempt to "bug" the Democratic National Committee headquarters in Washington to make the Nixon credibility gap become a chasm that would become unbridgeable.

Democrats, however, have immediate and critical danger spots which must be healed. Intra-party rivalries could become so bitter that defeat of the ticket could be brought about by such a weakening of the basic strength of the Democrats that a second-term for Mr. Nixon would not even have to be fought for by the GOP. When McGovern saw the better-than-

How Will They Affect The Election?

WASHINTON-When Americans tgo to the polis to elect a president in November, one of the most important influences on the outcome will be a potential 25.1 million new

Of this 18-through-24-year-old group who have never voted for president before only between 13 million and 14 million are expected to actually register and cast ballots. Although there are no official registration figures by age so far, the Democratic Party is claiming the new voters are registering Democratic by a 2 or 3 to 1 margin-a claim

disputed by the Republicans. There are some other indications, however, that the younger voters do lean more toward the Democratic Party and some scientific survey work has been done on why this is

What is not clear of course is what impact the personality and orientation of the candidates selected by each major party at their nominating conventions will have in forming the final choice of the new voters, or what effect the trend of national and world events will have on that outcome.

Would a sudden and favorable end to the Vietnam war cause a major change in voter preference? Will the new agreements President Nixon has negotiated with the Soviet Union have a favorable or unfavorable impact by November on his chances of re-election-assuming of course he will be the Rebublican candidate

These are questions not even the voters who will make the decisions can answer at this time. But there are some

elements in this equation that can be examined. For example, of the 25.1 million new presidential voters 11.4 million will be under 21 years of age. Some 4 million will be in college and 900,000 will still be in high school. Another

800,060 are in the armed forces. 1.6 million are housewives and 4.1 million are employed workers. Perhaps of much more importance in shedding some light is an in-depth study done by pollster George Gallup last fall. He attempted to probe the thinking and motivations of American youth in the 16-through-29 age group-a more inclusive, but nevertheless applicable, sampling than the 18-

through-24-year-old group that will affect the presidential election for the first time The survey, undertaken for the New York University national security education program, tested the views of 1,523 persons across the nation,in every state, and from a wide variety of communities and backgrounds.

For purposes of analysis the sample was divided into three groups-16 through 19, 20 through 24 and 25 through 29. The published results show that voters in all three age groups are more favorably inclined toward the Democratic Party than their parents were

The study concluded that young people tend to think as their parents do and when they depart from those views it is usually to go tarther in the same direction. If the parents were Democratic the tendency was to

move further to the left, if Republican, further to the right. If the children love and respect their parents, the study said, they are more likely to follow parental views. Young persons with extreme leftist views tended to hold their parents in relatively low esteem.

Global View Soviet Cash-In On Mideast Eyed

It appears from letters reaching this reporter from Tokyo the Russians are on the verge of receiving a major payoff for their Middle East adventuring. The unsettled state of Middle East oil has led to Japanese offers to heavily fund the development of oil and gas in the Siberian areas of the Soviet Union. Tokyo is deeply concerned over the possibility of major petroleum cutoffs to world markets (especially to Japan, of course)

and the likelihood of continually rising prices. As one longtime Japanese industrial friend, a leader in this development, writes, "It has become very necessary for us (as a result of the Middle East situation) o consider such other petroleum sources . . . we are therefore interested in cooperating in the realization

objectives of purchasing their natural gas and petro-The Russians therefore are apparently on the verge of getting the sizable inputs of Japanese capital and echnology they desperately need. The same arrangements

may make Japan quite heavily dependent on Soviet What the Soviet Union has requested specifically is a ow-interest loan of one billion dollars from Japan to be paid over a 20-year period beginning in 1978 with 20 to 10 millions tons a year of petroleum from the Tyumen

Though the Russians and Japanese have been talking of mutually-funded development programs in Siberia for some years now, it is only of late (after the last series of crises in the Middle East) that the major development talks seemed to make recognizeable headway.

The new developments are also part of a new Soviet frive to build contacts with Japan in an attempt to move lokyo a little from its close alliance with the United States and to prevent Japan from edging too far toward overly close relations with Peking.

Moscow's moves aim, in addition, at using Japan as a means of checking Chinese influence in East and Southeast Asia. Moscow has already suggested to the Japanese, for example, that they should put a great deal more effort into building relations with North Korea in an effort to wean Pyongyang a little from its close rela-

Behind the scenes the Soviet Union has also been quite blatant in urging the Japanese to strengthen their ties with anti-Chinese nations and those with anti-American

But Moscow, nevertheless, in order to win cooperation from Japan, has assured Toyko that it does not at this time demand renunciation of Japan's security treaty with the United States. Further, Moscow has gone so far as to hint that four of the islands the Soviet Union took from Japan at the end of World War II might be returned if Japan cooperates.

Thus far the Japanese have shown great interest in economic cooperation. But they have shown very little interest in any deals which would weaken their ties with the United States or hamper their prospects for building closer business relations with Peking.

The men in the Kremlin are finding that Tokyo can drive hard bargains of its own and that as of now it is in no mood to trust the Russians politically. Especially since it is quite clear that Russia is grinding its own axe.

ant has come up with a similar diagnosis. "Never before has the American worker been so important to the nation's economy as right now," says Roy Walters. "But in the present business environment. with its emphasis on productivity at all costs, we may be losing sight of our human resources.

Yet another management consultant, citing the nation's failure to create a full employment economy compatible with stable prices, suggests we need a fundamental reevaluation of our traditional concepts of free enterprise

Before World War I, when much of the economy was in the hands of the self-employed and small family enterprises, we enjoyed virtually full employment and stable prices, writes William McDonald Wallace in an article in the Wall Street Journal. But as big business rose to dominate the economy, it

made a tragic mistake in its approach to labor, he says. It opted for a bureaucratic social order in response to the classical economists' assumptions about "economic man. This "economic man" is a different species from the social animal we know as man. Belongingness, esprit de corps and camaraderie are emotions and motivations unknown to him. He sells his services impersonally to the highest bidder and moves on without regret in response

of new programs initiated in the 1960's increased 300% during the first five years. If the taxpayer knows the uture costs, he will think twice about the true worth of the program.

2. Evaluate all spending programs at least once every three years.

Determine their need and effectiveness and see what costs can be eliminated. This is zero-based budgeting, which means that an appropriation for a program must be justified from scratch. If needed it should be re-enacted. If not, eliminated. As it stands now, almost \$175 billion of the proposed \$247 billion budget for Fiscal 1973 would be spent automatically—about \$2,650 per family.

Pilot test every proposed major Federal program. See if it will work before full-scale operations are funded. If it works, then and only then should Congress put it into nationwide operation. This procedure will

avoid many expensive projects that look good on paper but don't solve the problem. As Senator Abraham Ribicoff said in urging that the proposed Family Assistance Plan be pilot-tested: "Right now we have 168 programs at a cost of \$31 billion to alleviate poverty, and we've got more poverty in this country than we had

4. Designate a joint Congressional Committee to evaluate the Federal budget in terms of priorities.

Today no committee is responsible for the total budget picture. The Federal budget is a thing of bits and pieces a scrambled multibillion dollar jigsaw puzzle. Each committee has a favorite piece and tries to squeeze it in somehow. No committee evaluates the budget in terms of balancing tax receipts and expenditures. Excess costs are simply added to the national debt. A total review by one committee, to be made public, could help balance the budget.

5. Subject special Federal programs, such as Social Security, Medicare and Highways to the discipline of controlled spending just as other tax-supported programs are.

There are over 800 trust funds, which do not come under the annual appropriations review. An annual look might change priorities substantially as times change.

These five points can bring the budgetary process under control. Until the American public insists on steps like these, election results will be meaningless. What's needed is millions of Americans talking to their friends, neighbors, colleagues and public officials about ways to bring spending under control.

This writer has been tooling around in a borrowed Porche 9115,69 vintage with the 190 horsepower engine. Several things stand out about the car. The first is that out of an engine of 121 cubic inches you are seeing approximately 1.8 horsepower per cubic inch. The engine is quite peaky, showing real power between 5600 and 7200 RPM. The two litre engine doesn't develop the torque of the new 2.4 litre Parche engine. However, the 2.4 litre engine has a lower RPM range so the top speed of the 69 911S and the 72 911S is about the same. The car is capable of traveling at over 140 miles per hour and, unlike our American cars, the little beast will travel at top speed for miles and miles without any mechanical difficulty. Porche builds a durable, externely fast, great handling and at the same time very unforgiving vehicle. If you make a mistake at the wheel of a Porche you're in trouble friend. A really great car is the Porche 911 no matter what year it was made.

I also had a bonded knit dress dry cleaned as directed, but not pressed, and when I brought it home and started to press it I noticed the binding and material had separated in several places. tried to steam press it but the fabric had wrinkled so I took the dress back to the cleaners and they said they could do nothing since I had used the

steam iron on it. Please help me with some advice.

DEAR POLLY-With macrame knotting so popular others may be interested in the way I keep the long strands of thread from knotting. I measure off the re quired length, start about 12 inches from the end I will work from and I wind the thread around three fingers until I get to the end. Using a twist tie such as comes on bread from the bakery I make two or three turns, in a spiral, around this small skein being careful that it is not too tight. The thread then easily pulls out from the center but if it seems too tight untwist slightly. Happy knotting.-MRS. L. W. M.
