Deputies terminate dope operation

OVIEDO - Seminole County sheriff's deputies arrested 34-year-old Robert Paul Advent of Oviedo Wednesday morning as the ringleader of an extensive marijuana

growing operation.

Deputies confiscated more than 250 marijuana plants from inside Advent's home located on Kansas Street in the rural Black Hammock subdivision.

The plants, worth an estimated \$400,000 on the street, along with a pound

of cocaine and several guns were taken into evidence.

"This is a very elaborate and sophisticated operation," said Sammy Gibson, captain in charge of the City/County Investigative Bureau (CCIB), Seminole County's drug and vice unit. "This is high grade marijuana – an average of \$3,000 to \$5,000 per pound."

The break up of the growing operation occurred when county deputies were dispatched to Advent's home at approximately 2 a.m. Wednesday after a 911 "hang up" call was received.

According to reports, when deputies arrived to investigate the scene, Advent

Debate heats up over city's charter change

SANFORD - With election day less than a week away, about 85 residents turned out for a debate on whether the city should adopt a strong mayor form of government.

Hosted by the Sanford Woman's Club and moderated by University of Central Florida political science professor Aubrey Jewett, the debate featured Mayor Brady Lessard arguing for a yes vote on the March 4 referendum and Gulfport City Manager Robert E. Lee urging residents to keep the current city manager form of government form of government.

Lee cited three reasons he did not believe the referendum should be approved. First, he said residents should have more time to debate the issue and a charter review committee should have been appointed.

ormally, for changes of this itude, there is a bipartisan littee that takes at least six months to research the issues before offering a recommendation," Lee said.

Second, the proposed charter imendment places too much

power in the mayor's position.
"This charter amendment allows the mayor to chair the commission meeting, vote on issues, he appoints the directors, proposes the budget," Lee said. "This is a very powerful position. If one elected member gets more power, that means someone else loses power, and your commis-sioners will lose power." Third, Lee believes the city's

charter should require a profes-sionally qualified manager to run

"With a strong mayor, the only qualification is that he pay a filing fee and be registered to vote," Lee

Lessard countered Lee's arguments by noting that any change in the charter requires approval


by the voters.
"We're not giving ourselves enough credit," Lessard said, "by presenting this as some intricately complex issue that voters can't understand. The day we stop trusting ourselves to make decisions as a city is the day we need to call it quits and let some other

city annex us."

Sanford presents unique challenges, Lessard said. The city is home to one of the nation's fastest growing airports, is seeing a

12 historic trees saved by landscaping business

TA7 hen work began on the city of Sanford's \$10.5 million V Riverwalk restoration project in December, it seemed that the 85 mature Sabal Palms that have lined the waterfront

for more than 40 years would disappear.

But last week, 12 of those historic trees were saved, and taken to a new home at Historic Sanford Memorial Stadium. And thanks to the charity of Sanford Memorial Stadium. thanks to the charity of Sanford native Jim

Oyler, it didn't cost the city a thing.
Oyler's Apopka based business Dora
Landscaping Company, which has the
\$450,000 contract to landscape Sanford's historic Lake Monroe waterfront, removed

the trees free of charge.
"I was raised in Sanford," said Oyler. " The Lake Monroe shoreline has many fond memories for me and I have been interested in this restoration project for many

According to city of Sanford's Howard Jeffries, the city also got the assistance of Nations Rent, who donated equipment, Paul's Towing, who donated their semitrucks for transportation, and Andrew

Sellers, who donated staking kits. The original plan called for the 20- to 35foot trees to simply get chopped down because, Jeffries said, the city was original-ly told it would cost \$190 or more just to move each tree to another location within one mile of the original site. The cost went up even more if the city wanted to move the trees further than one mile.

"The fact that we got Dora (Landscaping) to arrange to have them (the trees) removed free for the city was a blessing," Jeffries said.

TechBridge offers youth chance at good career

SANFORD — Young people no longer in school and looking for employment in Seminole County can now enroll in TechBridge, a Sanford-based school where students learn the necessary skills to begin a successful career.

The engineering firm of Henkels & McCoy established TechBridge in 1982 in Rhode Island. Since that time, the company has worked with more than 65,000 youth in 40 states.

In October, Workforce Central Florida, a non-profit organization aimed at assisting the workforce in this region, contracted the firm to bring the program to Seminole

to bring the program to Seminole County.

"In Sanford, there is a group of young people who just didn't make it in the mainstream public school system," said Ron Goss, director of southeast training at Henkels & McCoy, "As a private employer we are looking to teach a different way so they can get a job, go to work and pay taxes.

"If we're not there, they will end up in jail," he added. "We see this firsthand with these programs. It literally changes their lives and that's why we do it."

The TechBridge program is designed for students age 16 to 21 who have either dropped out of

who have either dropped out of the public school system or grad-uated but didn't receive the edu-cation they needed to be success-ful in the working world.

With a focus on computers, TechBridge also works to increase

students reading and math skills as well as basic employee skills

such as resume writing.

"Paul Henkels, the chairman of the board, believes Henkels & McCoy should do things in our community to help kids stay in school and to give them skills to make them productive in society," said Goss. "We are here to help these kids pick up the pieces, so they can come to work for companies like ours and others."

The nine-month contract, which began in October, between Henkels & McCoy and Workforce Central Florida is estimated at \$300,000. The U.S. Department of Labor footed the bill under the Workforce Investment Act of

Workforce Central Florida recently allocated nearly \$1.3 mil-lion on this and other programs within a five county area, includ-







Our city faces a unique mixture of challenges unlike any municipality in the region. Sanford has one of the fastest growing airports in the nation; is ranked in the state's Top 20 of fastest growing cities; and is experiencing an increase in development and property values. The city also has a deteriorating infrastructure, the highest tax rate in the county and the largest number of economically depressed neighborhoods.

By voting "Yes," we give our elected leaders the authority to move the city forward and solve these challenges. We also give them enough rope to hang themselves. They must perform or be held accountable. That accountability is greatly lacking in the present city manager system where elected leaders and city staff can pass the buck when promises don't match performance.

Don't let the buck-passing continue. If Sanford is to be a better place for all of her citizens, the city needs strong leaders who can provide answers, action and accountability. A "Yes" vote on Tuesday is the way to achieve it.

Your View

For Sanford to evolve, people need to vote yes

To the editor
On March 4, the citizens of
Sanford will make an important
decision that will define the direcdecision that will define the direc-tion of the City for years to come. During the past eight years, I have served as a volunteer on a number of boards and commissions for the City. I have had many good expe-riences in trying to move our City forward under a managed growth philosophy.

forward under a managed growth philosophy.

Unfortunately, a number of roadblocks created by our current form of government did not allow for proper execution of many of the ideas (including a curtailment to the boom in apartment complex construction). Additionally, it always appeared to me that the way the City Commission received and disseminated information through the City Manager seemed to be very disjointed and ineffective.

These situations and observations once again prompted me to ask Mayor Lessard his thoughts on a change to a strong mayor form of government, something we had discussed five years ago. His response was enthusiastic not because it might mean more money for him, as some might want you to believe. Rather I believe that he felt there might be hope that other people perceived the same inefficiencies and lack of accountability that he was experi-encing first hand as mayor.

I hear repeatedly that Sanford is a city with tremendous potential, but that there is a lack of vision to guide it and a lack of ability to execute the mission of the City. The City is in need of: someone who can respond quickly to prob-lems as well as opportunities; someone who is accessible to the citizens; and someone who can spread the vision and execute the mission of Sanford with the help of the employees as well as the cit-

This task just cannot be com-pleted with the City Manager form of government. In business terms, the management structure, under its current form, is far too restric-tive for the flow of information and proper lines of reporting and communication are too complex.

The opposition to the change in the form of government will tell you that it will cause corruptell you that it will cause corrup-tion. Corruption can occur in just about any situation in today's environment. You need to look no further than the recent problems within the accounting profession, one which is supposedly guided by a stringent code of ethics, much like that of the professional city managers. Elected officials must make annual financial dis-closures, unlike a hired profes-sional city manager.

sional city manager.

The opposition also contends that changing to a strong mayor will place too much power into one official's hands. If you take time to review the proposed amendment, it still takes three yours on the City Commission to

amendment, it still takes three votes on the City Commission to approve or deny an item. This system of checks and balances exists today for the City and will exist under the strong mayor form of government.

Lastly, it seems to me, that the opposition feels that we, the voting public in Sanford, are not capable of evaluating a candidate's credentials and ability to lead our City. This is one of the most disturbing ideas implied by their opposition to this referendum. History shows that while Sanford may not turn out large Sanford may not turn out large numbers for elections, those who do vote take a tremendous amount of time to understand issues just like this one.

As Tuesday approaches, most importantly go to the polls to vote. However, just as important, if you want to keep Sanford evolving into a City we can all be proud of and have a voice in, you must vote "Yos." must vote "Yes."

boom in development and an increase in property values. At the same time, much of the city's infrastructure — like the aging stormwater system — needs replacing and city officials must find ways to spur revitalization in areas that are among the most economically depressed in the

region.
"I'm not advocating that a strong mayor form of government is right for every city,"
Lessard said. "Sanford has special needs that I think are best met when you give the mayor the ability to effect positive change. "Wouldn't it be nice if we could

assign blame and assign credit," he added. "The citizens of Sanford need to know where the buck stops. That's accountability, and it occurs not every four years as some would have you believe, but every night a 11:30 when a citizen calls you to say a water main is broken or every morning at 6 when you get a call telling you of some problem that needs correct-

Lessard noted that a city is "a eries of small companies," utility, finance, recreation, etc. that requires good management skills but not necessarily an advanced degree in all phases of

city operations.
"The mayor's job is not to go out and make arrests or fix the potholes or design the bridges," Lessard said. "His or her job is to make sure the directors of each department have the resources to do their job.

Lee reminded those at the debate that any decision on a city's charter should be made with great care.

"This is the most important Sanford will make for possibly decades," Lee said. "This is not something that gets change often, and it shouldn't.

"It's important to remember that this is not about the mayor, it is about the form of government," he added. "Remember to, that leadership is not about power, it's about who has the best ability in consensus building."

Though he proposed the referendum and is advocating it's position, Lessard said win or lose the city will "not fall into the lake."

"In a way, I think victory has diready been achieved because we're having this debate," Lessard said. "Whether the referendum passes or whether it falls, when people wake up on March 5; they're going to know what kind of government they have."





Lake and Sumter. "We are loosing a lot of youth who are not in school or working," said Willie Cooper, program manager of Workforce Central Florida. "They have no future. This program gives them direc-lion and hope. It is important for an individual to acquire a skill to earn money. It gives these indi-viduals a chance to build their self esteem and their future."

Each student who participates in TechBridge classes, being held

at the First Shiloh Missionary Baptist Church in Sanford, will build a state-of-the-art computer. At the end of the program, pro-vided the student increases their math and reading levels and learns the basic employee skills, they are allowed to keep the com-

"You really need computer skills to run any type of business these days," said 19-year-old TechBridge student Christopher

After completing the program, White hopes to open a five-star restaurant in Seminole County in order to give back to the commu-

As well as teaching the students computer skills and workrelated training, it also breaks down barriers built up through their life experiences.

"We look to see what is in the way of them learning and take care of the problem so they can succeed," explained Goss. "Many are pregnant teens. Some have other obstacles such as lacking basic necessities, including food, shelter and transportation. We try to be a broker and liaison to get them help, which sometimes includes enlisting Department of Children and

Teshonda Butler of Sanford enrolled in the TechBridge program in January after having difficulty finding a job. Although the 21-year-old completed high school in Seminole County, Butler quickly discovered she didn't have the skills required by potential employers.

"The Seminole County School System is just not for everyone,"

said Sheryl Jones, a TechBridge instructor. "There is nothing wrong with the system, but Techliridge gives them another option to help them become successful."

Butler recently finished building her computer and once she complete the TechBridge pro-gram, she plans to attend college and become an emergency medical technician.

"That will give me a great opportunity to help people," she

Upon completion of the pro-

gram, organizers follow up with the students to see how their newfound knowledge is paying off. According to Cooper, the success rate has been extremely high.

"It's hard to describe, but when you see someone succeed and they come back and tell you thank you and that they feel you and the program are the reason for their success — you can't beat



Angry Floridians protest Bush's proposal to close state library

More than 300 Floridians, many of them professional librarians and historians, gathered at the Cocoa Civic Center on Feb. 19 to voice their anger at Gov. Jeb Bush and his proposed elimination of the State Library of Florida.

This is an issue that has provoked a large and vocal responses," said Dr. Nick Wynne, the Executive Director of the Florida Historical Society. "Just to give you an idea, the Society created an on-line peti-

(www.floridahistory.info/petltion) about midday and just three full days later, more than 4,000 e-mall signatures have been attached. Another 700 email signatures are walting to be verified. The outcry is so large, our system has almost crashed."

At issue here is the governor's proposal to eliminate or relocate the State Library, to place the State Museum of Florida under the State Parks System and to virtually emasculate the Division of Historic

Bush is proposing the changes as part of a budget-cutting move and is making plans to move about half of the state library's 1 million volumes to Nova Southeastern University in Fort Lauderdale.

The State Archives will also be moved into the Department of Management services. These proposals were contained in Bush's e-budget that was released earlier this month.

The State Library was offered to Florida State University, but T. K. Wetherell, the University's president, rejected the offer because the state dld not offer any additional funding for physical facilities or support personnel.

The state has negotiated with several public and private institutions to find a new home for the Library, in apparent disregard of the 1845 law which created the Library and specifically placed its location at the State Capitol.

The Florida Historical Society and the Florida Library Association are examining legal avenues to forestall this action. Although the official response of the governor's office is that any action to implement Bush's plan will take the approval of the State Legislature, which convenes in March, the Division of Historic Preservation, staff members who man the field offices have been sent letters informing them that their jobs will end on July 1.

In addition, personnel who currently occupy space on the first floor of the R. A. Gray Building where the Library and Museum are housed have been told they must vacate that space so that it can be renovated for a vast new office suite for incom-

Hood, former mayor of Orlando.

Museum employees have already been informed that their jobs will also end on July 1, but that they could apply for new jobs with the Park Services department.

"Governor Bush plans to present the Legislature with a fait accompil," Wynne said. "I seriously doubt whether this group of legislators has enough courage to oppose the governor. He must think he can ram it through or he would not have proposed it.

'As for Glenda Hood," Wynne continued, "I am reminded of the story of Winston Churchill, who, when assuming the office of British prime minister at a critical time, informed the British public that he dld 'not intend to preside over the dissolution of the empire. Apparently, Hood's political ambitions are so great that she is willing to accept a position that will result in the elimination of the major components of the Department of State. Talk about selling out for a 'mess of porridge...'

Citizens in Washington Arkansas and Iowa have had to deal with the same issue and have successfully repulsed it. For more information, call the Florida Historical Society at 321-


