

## STORMS TAKE HEAVY TOLL IN MIDDLE WEST

### 17 Are Killed, Many Are Hurt And Much Property Damaged Done By Elements

CHICAGO, May 2.—(AP)—Echoes of the stormy weather which swooped down over the Mid West yesterday killing 17 persons, injuring many others and destroying property valued at many thousands of dollars was felt in Chicago today in the form of a heavy rain and hail storm.

The Windy City's touch of the elements was the aftermath of a series of tornadoes, electrical and wind storms which played havoc throughout Nebraska, Missouri, North Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois and Iowa.

Six persons were killed and several scores of others injured, many seriously, in the tornadoes which struck Tekamah, Neb., early last night, and swept on to six other towns in Nebraska before cutting into Iowa.

The other Nebraska towns hit by the storm are Pender, Homer, Jackson, Wray, and Lincoln and Waltham, all in northeast Nebraska.

Doctors were hastily summoned to Tekamah from nearby towns and those injured badly enough to demand hospital care were brought to Omaha after the Tekamah facilities had been exhausted.

## Tax Collectors Can Not Refuse Payment

TALLAHASSEE, May 2.—(AP)—The State Supreme Court held in effect today that tax collectors of Florida have no legal authority to decline to receive payments for personal property taxes on motor vehicles separately from taxes due on other personal property. The court granted a preliminary writ of mandamus to Sterling Hooper of Marion county requiring the tax collector of that county to accept Hooper's payment of personal property tax on his automobile separately from other personal property assessment. Hooper, through his attorney, alleged he attempted to pay his motor vehicle property tax separately and that payment was refused by the tax collector who demanded settlement of the whole item of personal property taxes aggregating about six hundred dollars.

## Continued Flood Conditions Will Result In Serious Situation In Rich Farm Areas

ORKEECHOEBEE, May 2.—(AP)—Swelled by unprecedented spring rains several streams flowing into Lake Okeechobee have left their banks and inundated fields in some places to a depth of three feet causing considerable damage to be felt among farmers along the southeastern shore of the lake.

According to Howard Sharp, editor of a Canal Point newspaper and member of the State Legislature, people in the threatened area are expressing fear that if the overflow continues general flood conditions will reach dangerous proportions.

Similar flood conditions have been reported near Clewiston, the lowest of the sugar cane belt. The lowwaters here are said to be clear but many farm lands are covered with water.

The indirect casualty resulted from the flooded conditions today when a car driven by Will Austin, pastor of the Church of God, plunged through the railing of the Kissimmee River bridge overlooking Mrs. Austin who was riding in the car with her husband.

Mr. Austin managed to crawl to safety, but the glass out of the door. The spot where the automobile took its fatal plunge was in normal conditions only a shallow hole but now a pool is fast deep due to the flooded conditions.
