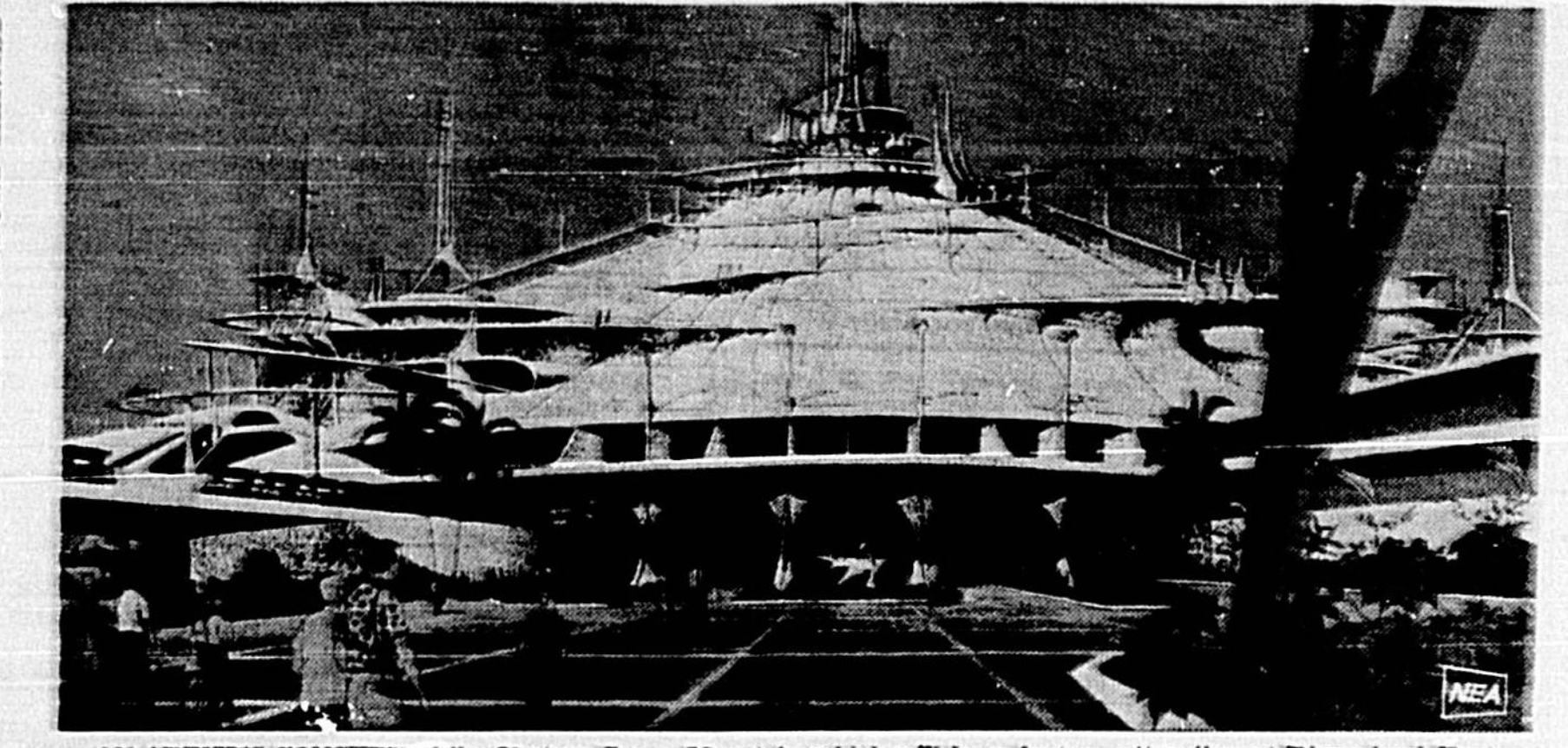

Farmers Market Is 'Big Business'

The spirit that led to the establishment of the Sanford Farmers Market on Dec. 18, 1964, exists today but the system has been sophisticated. No longer are farmers concerned only about non-delivery, delay in delivery and not getting paid.

From its inception, the grower-broker and wholesaler-broker market system was efficient and is still efficient today. One advantage of selling through Sanford comes from the fact that brokers call their customers every day.

Among those who thrive on the heartless is a segment of society for whom, today, there is much concern—the young people. How can you keep them busy? Youngsters in Sanford should never lack time or hobby money.

Pioneer spirit to establish Sanford as the first market in Florida's State Farmers Markets, now directed by W. O. Whittle and under the Department of Agriculture's marketing division, was developed by hard knocks suffered by "Dutchman" farmers.

The word of mouth supply and demand communication of the 1950s has been refined and expanded. Weekly forecasts are sent to many in the produce industry and are placed at the inspection stations at the Florida state line.

Quality testing, proper packing, timely harvesting and marketing, and ultimate delivery to the consumer in as soon as two to five days after shipment from the market are refined standards which have skyrocketed sales records from the day the market opened.

From 1964 to June 1965, the market handled 20,719,491 units of Florida produce for \$49,512,972.51 and 680,806 out-of-state units valued at \$1,714,280.32. In four years from 1964 to July 1968, in-state units totaled 8,556,241 for a \$22,065,198.13 gross. Out-of-state produce numbered 440,818 and was sold for \$81,294,711. Cereals

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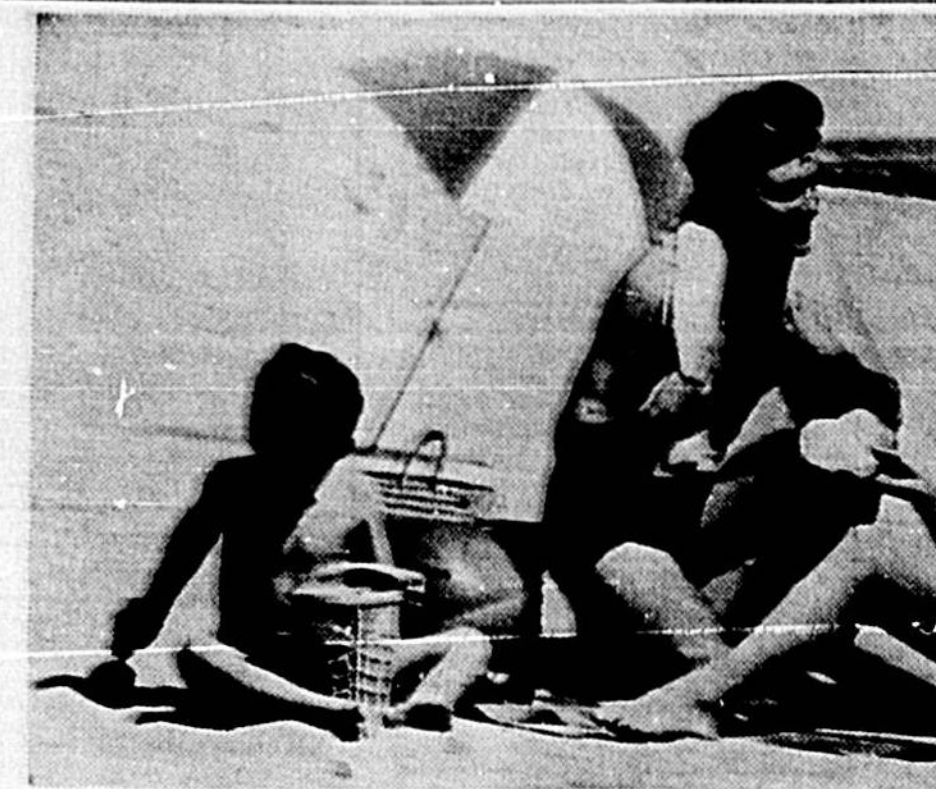

Youngsters' Petitions Bear Fruit City Will Open Swim Pools

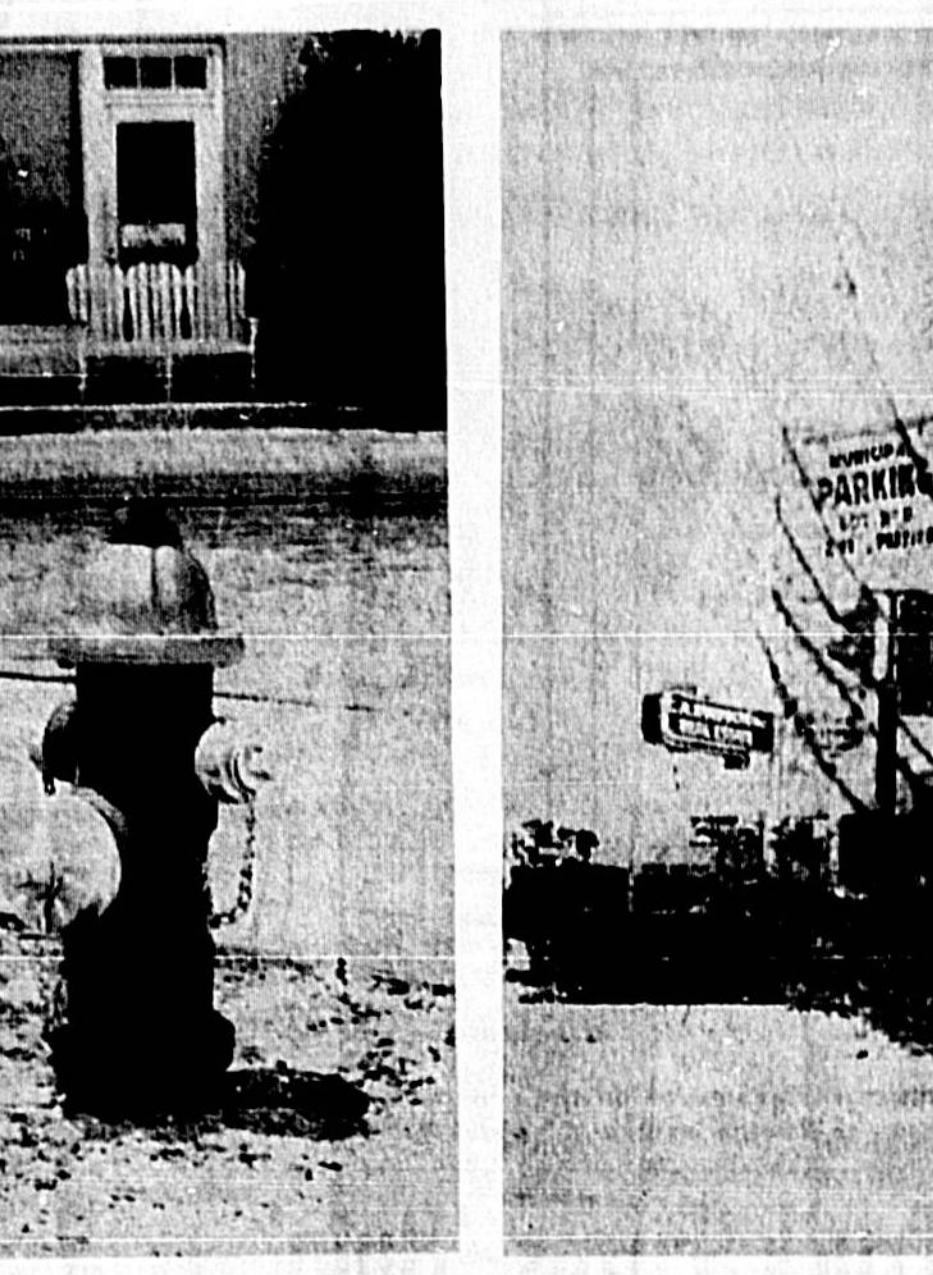

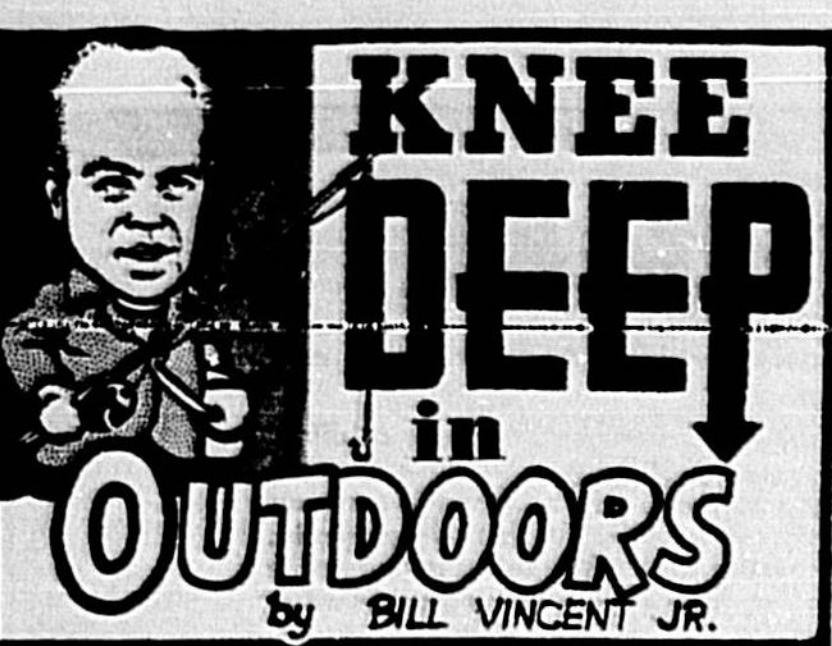

New fishing and hunting licenses are required in July 1; however, licenses are honored from date of purchase and are available from the middle of June.

Florida has five species of bass. The largemouth bass, the Florida largemouth bass, the Sawannee bass, the spotted bass and the redeye bass.

No special license or permit is required to fish in Florida Fish Management Areas, but a regular license is required of all fishermen except residents 65 and over and children under 16.

Special regulations and bag limits may apply to some fish management areas. Copies of regulations for fish management areas are available at the offices of all County Judges.

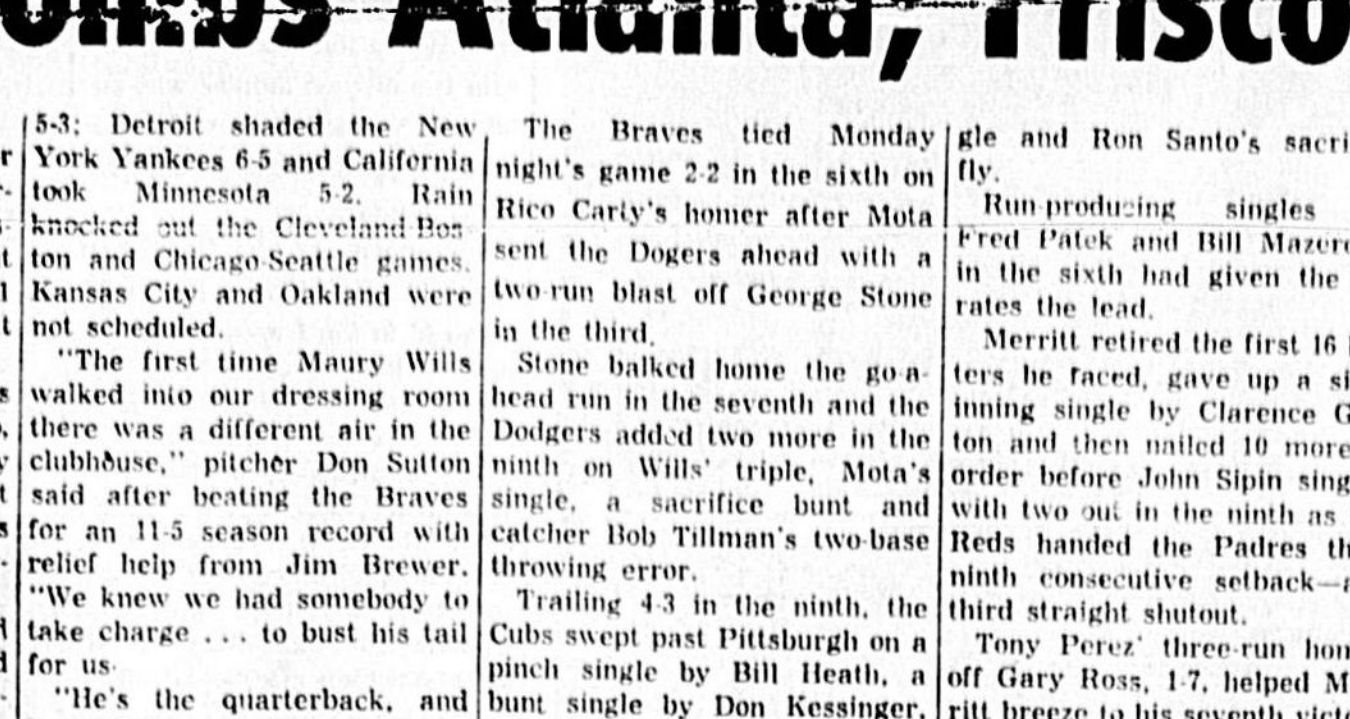
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Sanford Police Squad Shown Left to Right

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Woman Charges Policemen Beat Husband Fatally

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The widow of a college professor claims her husband died because he was beaten by two Oakland policemen in a rooming house last Wednesday in Lake Merritt, where he had gone to take his six-year-old daughter, Melissa, for a walk.

He was charged with lewd and lascivious conduct, disorderly conduct and resisting arrest.

He made bail that night, but collapsed the next day after a hearing in Municipal Court, was taken to Alameda hospital, and died there Saturday morning.

Mrs. Caplan said, "My husband was so shocked, so brutalized that he hardly was able to tell me anything. I was not aware of all the bruises about his body until the nurse at the hospital remarked about it."

She said before he collapsed he told her he had been beaten by the two arresting officers.

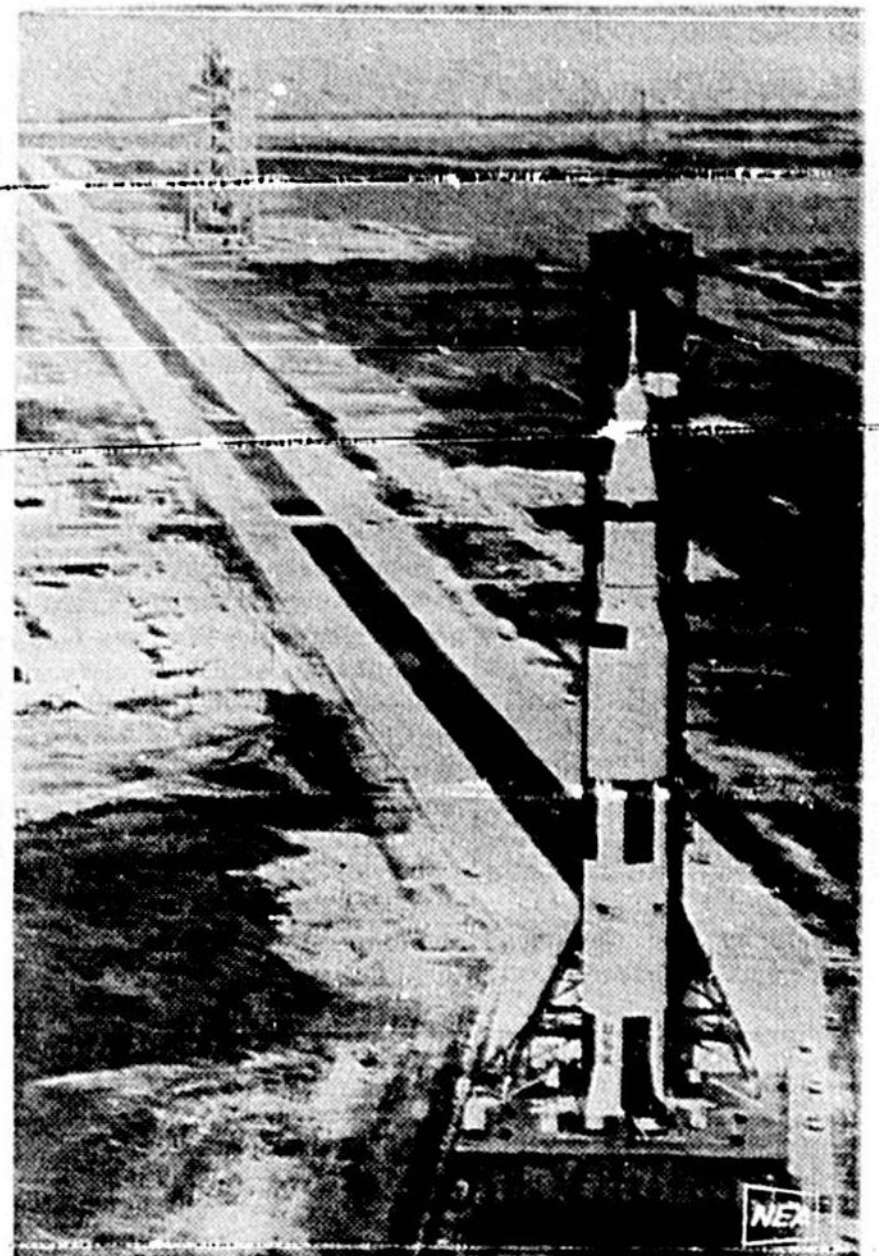

Bears (And Men) Tough At Pole

DORSET, N.H. (AP) — The first four men ever to walk across the polar ice cap returned to solid land today and said the biggest danger was polar bears so tough they ate rubber boots and sniffed at high-velocity bullets.

Sustained as if they had spent 16 months on a beach instead of in the frozen north, the four British explorers docked here aboard the Royal Navy ice patrol ship Endurance.

The team, led by bearded survivor Sir Vivian Fuchs, found the world's coldest place in Antarctica in February 1968, trekked 5,626 miles over the frozen waters, landed on small islands, and then got picked up by a helicopter after 47 days on the treacherous ice floes.

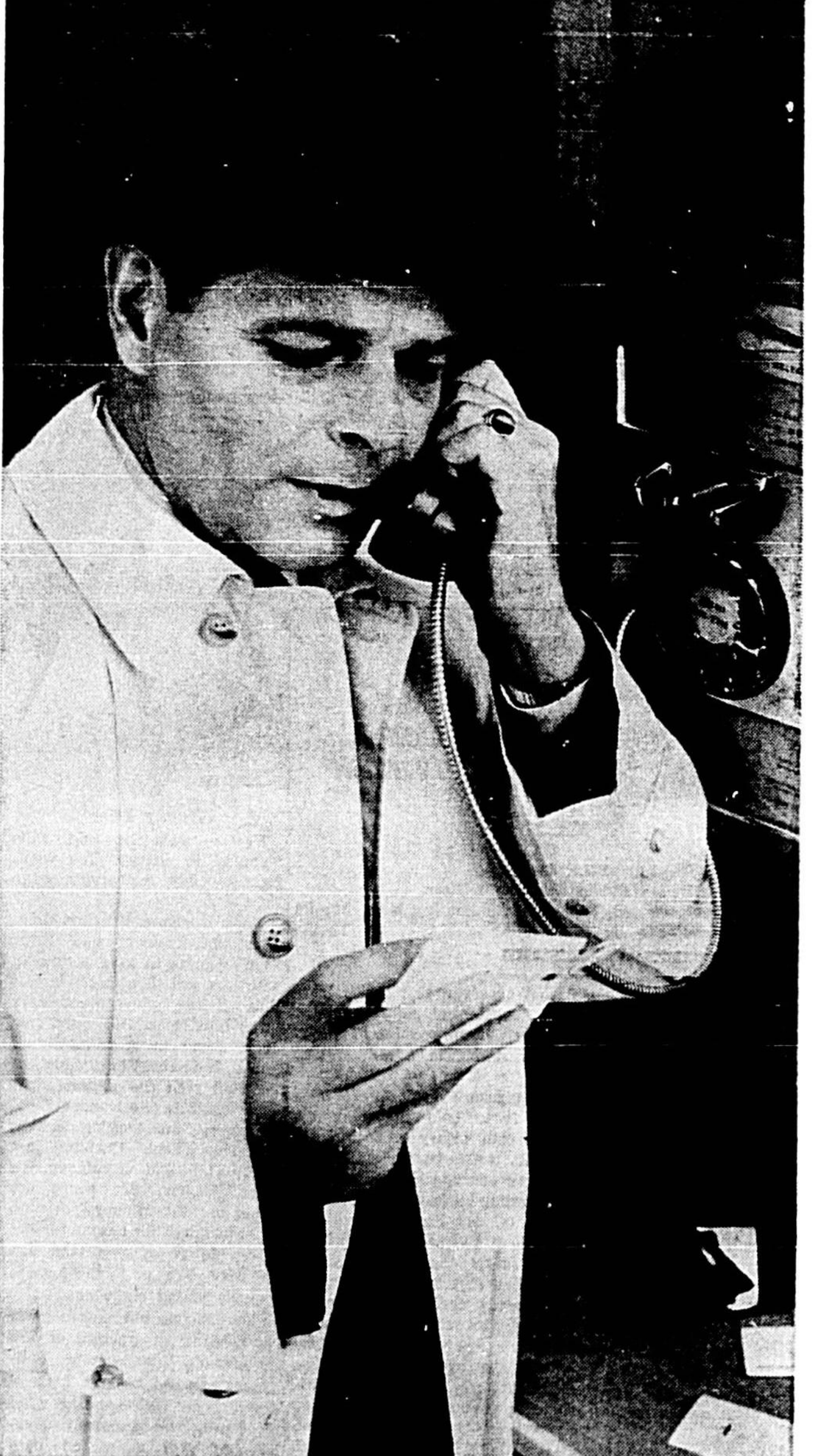

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Seminole Is Worth \$408,745,050

Total real and personal property in Seminole County is now worth \$408,745,050, S. O. Dorminey, tax assessor, reports.

Dorminey told The Herald the total taxable value of both real and personal properties in the county has risen by \$17,189,138 to the all-time high of \$270,071,065.

With the increases in land value, the county will have some \$108,807 in additional revenues at the same millage as last year. Of this amount, some \$103,267 can be budgeted. Meanwhile, with the increase the School Board, if it used the same millage as last year, would receive an additional \$222,943 of which it could budget \$211,796.

Ellsworth W. Bassett, a Maitland civil engineer, was elevated from vice chairman to chairman of the Seminole County Port Authority last night.

Bassett was elected with no opposition by the seven-member port board of directors and succeeded Lee P. Moore, whose term expires this month.

Moore is retiring after a three-year appointment and disclosed last night in a meeting that he had dispatched a letter to Gov. Claude Kirk asking that his name not be considered for reappointment at the press of business would prevent him from serving.

Kirk's name was submitted to the Seminole County Commission for reappointment to the port board.

After Moore announced his decision, Harold Kastner nominated Bassett for reappointment to the port board. This was seconded by James Ryan, an Bassett was elected without opposition.

Other officers elected include Kastner as vice chairman-treasurer and James Wagner, secretary.

A 40,000-square-foot, half million-dollar shopping center will be constructed on U.S. Highway 17-92 between DeSoto and Florida Streets.

Among the firms already announced to locate in the center are Fairway Markets, Ben Franklin Department Stores and G.O. Kelly's Drug Store.

Local leasing is being handled by Nat. Ribburg Realty, United States Bank of Seminole is the construction financier.

Ribburg said the center will be constructed in a Colonial motif along the same line as the Fairway Center in Maitland.
