Vet Facing Job Loss Due To War Wounds

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Richard A. Pelkey may lose his city job because a wound received in Vietnam five years ago makes him a poor risk for an employee's pension fund, officials say.

Pelkey, a Marine sergeant in Vietnam, was removed from the pension fund Tuesday on the basis of a medical report. Membership in the pension fund is a requirement of city employment.

"I don't care about the pension, really," Pelkey said. "I just want to keep my job."

"Unless we can do something within the next several days, he's going to have to be out," Sharpless said. "The mayor has asked that several avenues be explored."

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Bizarre Death Chamber Probed For More Bodies

MIAMI (AP) — As curious neighbors watched, police dismantled the homemade torture chamber where they say Albert Brust killed and dismembered an Ohio youth and repeatedly raped and tortured a 15-year-old Kentucky girl.

But officers said they uncovered more bodies Wednesday after they finished chiseling through a thick concrete wall at one end of the chamber, splattered with abscesses painted in bright fluorescent colors.

Brust committed suicide last week, police said, several days after he shot and killed 16-year-old Mark Matson of Washington Court House, Ohio. The youth's body was then hauled up and reentered into a shower stall of a spare bathroom near the chamber.

Miami police speculated that Brust may have had willing visitors to his padded torture chamber, equipped with cat-nine-tails and sex devices, who were unwilling to admit to their participation.

Police also dug up the yard around the death house to see if any bodies had been buried there. They found none.

However, officers said they were still trying to interpret a diary, dating back for 13 years, and were checking other possible suspects for clues to other possible crimes Brust may have committed.

Police said they were also seeking clues to the identity of a serious-faced woman whose photo was discovered in the house Wednesday. And they said they were searching for a husky former seaman named Mike who neighbors said used to visit the 43-year-old Brust.

Police said that in one section of the diary Brust referred to himself as a "Jackyl and Hyde," considered exposing his dual personality to the public, but decided not to "because it would be too shocking."

Police in nearby Fort Lauderdale first learned of Brust's death when his 15-year-old girl friend went to them, saying that she had just been released by Brust.

She told a bizarre story of forced sex, torture and murder — a story that police said they did not believe at first.

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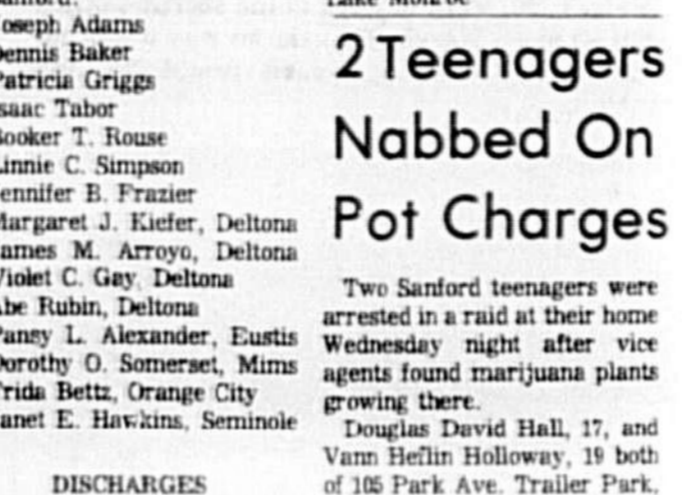

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'Meatless' Crisis Called

The board approved Harris' recommendation to award the contract for three beef items to Swift and Co.

Beef products will cost the board 25 to 30 percent more during the beginning of the 1973-74 school year than they did at the end of last school year, according to bid quotations.

Swift quoted 62.89 cents per pound for bulk beef, compared with the 73.90 cents per pound paid by the board last year.

Of the 14 suppliers invited to bid, only three responded — one a "no bid." Of the two remaining, one did not comply with specifications to submit a five percent bid increase.

Hardworking Businesswoman Fights Sickness With Work

NEW YORK (AP) — Betty-Ann Hilton fought her own illness as a reason to stay well.

She had been out of the hospital for one whole year out of the previous five, and thought it ought to continue.

A veteran of five cancer operations, a brain hemorrhage and serious kidney surgery, the attractive blonde president of Sanitized Sales Company of America says she may be a fatalist, but she believes she has been left on earth for some purpose.

"The pointed businesswoman who spends about half of her time on the road."

"No woman in my husband's family had ever worked. But I offered to make a deal with him. I had tried playing bridge and working in politics and it wasn't enough. I couldn't have children, so I said we could either adopt four, or I could go back to work."

"He wasn't interested in adoption at that time. So one day in a restaurant I was talking about how bored I was and how I wished I could find a job. A man sitting nearby came over and offered me one."

Mrs. Hilton said.

She went to work on a trial basis 16 years ago. Ten years ago she was president of the company and six months ago, she foretold her business.

"We have a strange marriage. If we weren't two individuals it wouldn't work. For much of our marriage we've been in a state of separate residences, in the city and the country, and been together weekends."

"Now we're involved in a new place at the shore. This business about two people becoming one is nonsense. Two people who marry share a common perimeter," she said.

Mrs. Hilton is not a women's liberation advocate. She calls the movement "malarkey" because it doesn't mention equal responsibility in the same breath with equal pay and equal jobs. She believes all three go together.

"In my life, I have learned to make substitutions. If you can't do that, you sit back and become a women's libber and complain about everything. Of course, I'd like to have a half dozen children and a couple of grandchildren."

Make A Smart Robe From Bath Towels

Give your next casual outfit a splash of bravado with a Sassy Zipper. This light, fold up robe is meant to show (makes it easy to install), and is a real "eye zoner" with its big, big plastic teeth and two-finger ring pull. Look for a Sassy Zip for your next just-for-fun outfit.

Take three bath towels, some thread, a little bias tape and a pair of scissors and you can create a very comfy robe.

Mark the lengthwise center line of one of the towels with long hand basting. This towel is your "sleeve section," and the basting marks your shoulder line and helps in centering the neck opening. Make a second row of hand basting through the crosswise center. Cut a neck opening at the center where the two rows of basting bisect, making sure it measures large enough to go over your head (about 8 inches lengthwise and 6 inches crosswise).

Center one end of each of the two remaining towels on each long edge of the sleeve section, making a back and front "panel." Overlap the edges about 1/4 inch and topstitch. Make a second row of stitching close to the first.

Fold the sleeve section in half along the lengthwise basting, bringing the two panels' sections right sides together. Stitch the side seams and the sleeve seams in a 1/4 inch seam. Press the seam allowances open then topstitch on each side of the seamline to hold the edges in place.

Bind the neck opening with preshrunk double-fold bias tape. For a change of style, split the robe up the center front and insert a large zipper.

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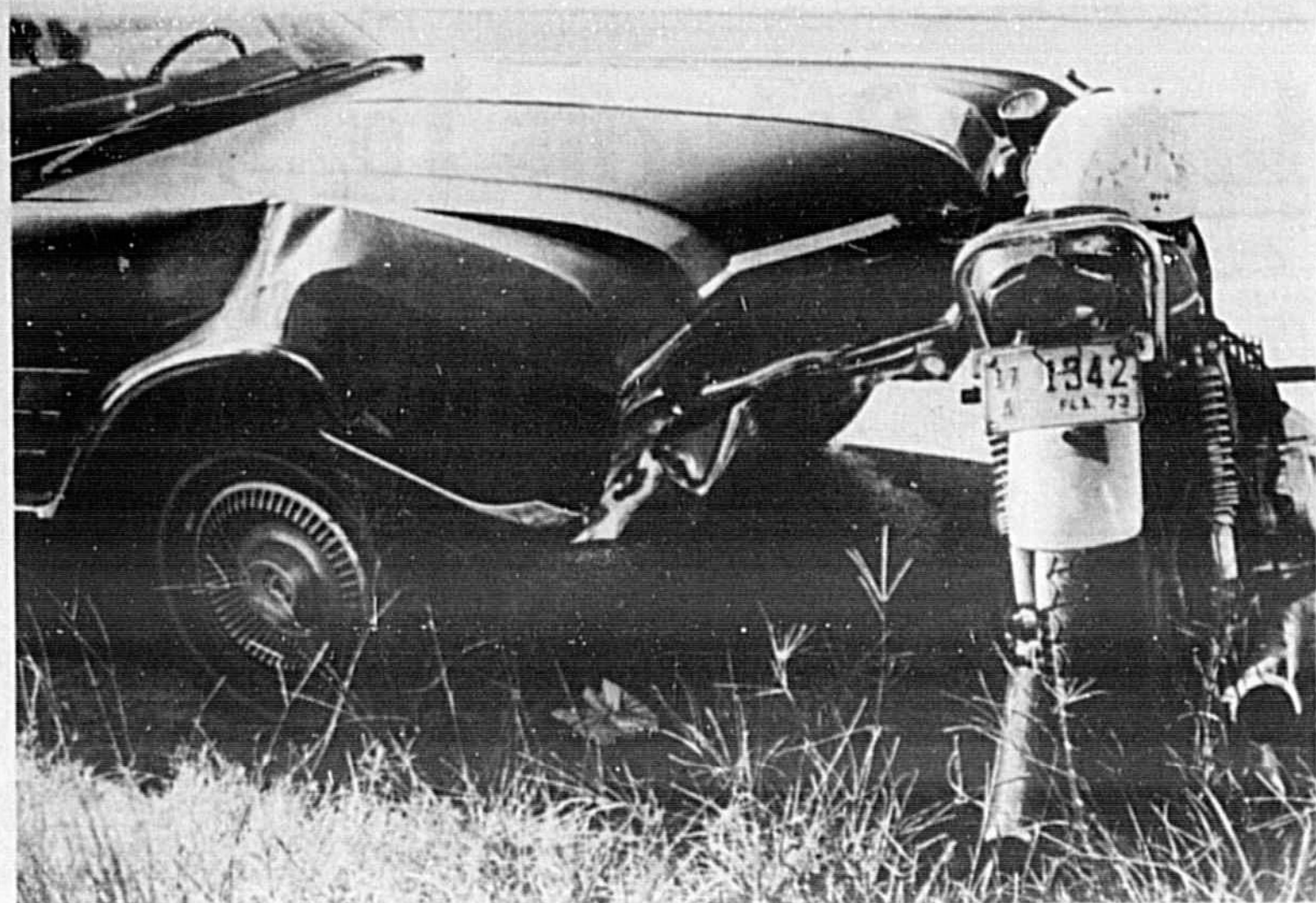

State Regents Shun Communist Professor

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — The state Board of Regents has refused to rehire self-styled Marxist professor Kenneth A. Megill who was fired by retiring University of Florida President Stephen C. O'Connell.

The regents voted unanimously Wednesday to refuse tenure or promotion to Megill. Refusal of tenure amounts to job loss. The decision came despite a recommendation from Michael Schwartz of Tallahassee, a special hearing examiner appointed by the board, that Megill be retained.

O'Connell, who retires in August, denied tenure to Megill although the popular assistant professor of philosophy was recommended for it by his department head and faculty colleagues. In other action, the board named UF Executive Vice President E. T. York, 51, as interim president until a permanent successor to O'Connell can be found. A report of the regents' special committee, headed by James Gardener of Fort Lauderdale, said an investigation showed that Megill had been disruptive in and out of his classes. In other action, the regents approved tenure for 28 faculty members at the University of West Florida and 55 of the University of South Florida. —Ended required dormitory living for sophomores at the University of Florida but permitted the university to continue to require it for freshmen. —Required faculty members who do outside work as consultants to clear the jobs with their university president. —Removed authority for campus police to finger print and photograph persons accused of misdemeanors. —Amended existing policies to recognize that the state's age of majority has been lowered to 18.

Camp Close Backed By Commission

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A Florida legislative commission on migrant labor will ask Gov. Reubin Askew to keep closed a Dade County labor camp labeled a fire hazard and unsanitary. Milton Saslaw, Dade County public health director, told the commission Tuesday his agency had recommended the state close the Princeton Labor Camp in south Dade County in 1970 and 1972. But the state renewed the camp's license and it continued operating, Saslaw said. It finally was closed this year and is slated to be demolished, Saslaw said, but there is no guarantee that will be done. "All we can do is recommend them for licensing or not licensing to the state," he said. "It's up to the Division of Health to rule with us." Saslaw said that closing of camps because of enforcement of tough health laws and the conversion of camps to housing for permanent residents. Dade County is facing a shortage of housing for migrants.

Connally Aiming At GOP Campaign

WASHINGTON (AP) — John B. Connally is expected to hit the hustings to earn his credentials as a Republican this fall, his political popularity apparently undimmed by a short and frustrating stint as presidential adviser. He's been getting 10 to 60 requests to speak a week and he promises to start accepting at least some of them, a Texas GOP official said. Connally's friends are delighted he's out of what they considered an unwanted job as a public, rather than private, adviser to President Nixon. "He's got the best of two worlds now—loyalty to the President and distance from him," said one confidant. When Connally switched from the Democratic to the Republican party last spring, his plan was to keep out of the limelight until fall, when he would start making political appearances. He accepted a part-time, unpaid job as an adviser to Nixon. Connally reportedly blames White House Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler for fouling up this arrangement by making a public announcement of it. Ultimately, according to his friends, he was frozen out of intimate access to Nixon after he told the President bluntly he ought to speak out on Watergate and make more appearances around the country.

Frosh Demo Wins One From 'Vet' White House

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Elizabeth Holtzman has been in Washington less than seven months but already has taken on The White House and won the first round. The freshman Democrat from New York City brought suit against the Nixon administration's bombing in Cambodia. Wednesday a federal judge ruled in her favor, granting an injunction against further military operations there. "I'll probably buy at least one bottle of champagne" to celebrate the decision, said the 31-year-old Brooklynite in an interview. But, she remarked, "the decision is not surprising in that no court has found the president has the right to start a war without congressional approval." U.S. District Court Judge Orrin G. Judd ruled that without congressional approval, the bombing was illegal. The government has announced it intends to appeal the order, set to take effect on Friday. "The only way I see the court (2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals) can rule in the government's favor is that this is a political question on a part of the Indochina war," she said. Miss Holtzman won her congressional seat by defeating powerful incumbent Immanuel Celler twice—once in a primary and again when he ran as an independent in the election. When she came to Washington she set her sights on the Cambodian bombing. "I felt very strongly about this and it (the suit) was not a decision made lightly. I wanted to satisfy legal questions about it first before I brought it," she said. She was joined in the lawsuit by three Air Force men based in Guam. If she does buy a bottle of champagne to celebrate the ruling, it would be a considerable break in her normal routine, she said. "My day begins around 9 a.m. when I get to the office. I spend the morning in committee meetings and the afternoon either on the floor or here (in the office) and I usually don't leave until 9 p.m." "When I relax I like to go to the beach—I get 45 minutes in last weekend, the first time in six months." She likes to play tennis, go riding and to movies, but now she spends most of her weekends at home taking care of matters affecting her district.

Government Will Fight Bomb Ruling

NEW YORK (AP) — The federal government has filed a notice of appeal to overturn a court decision that calls the U.S. bombing of Cambodia unconstitutional and orders it halted. Hours after the ruling was announced Wednesday, U.S. Atty. Robert A. Morse said appeal papers were being prepared and that he would seek a stay of the order that takes effect Friday. He said the case would be carried to the Supreme Court if necessary. In Washington, the White House had no immediate comment. The permanent injunction against bombing and other military activities in Cambodia was issued by U.S. Dist. Court Judge Orrin G. Judd in a suit brought by Rep. Elizabeth Holtzman, D-N.Y., and three Air Force fliers. Judd said that because Congress had never voted its approval, the government lacked the necessary authority "to order military forces into combat in Cambodia or to release bombs over Cambodia." Rep. Holtzman, a freshman Congresswoman, said in Washington that she was "extraordinarily pleased" by the decision. "It reasserts the constitutional requirement that no American lives can be risked and that no American taxpayer's dollars can go to a military effort that has not been approved or authorized by Congress," she said.

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Stormy Adams Expected To 'Bounce Back'

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. AP — Gov. Tom Adams returns to his office today nursing a sore nose and a political future battered by an unending string of controversies.

But political observers are laying odds that Adams' political recovery will be just as fast as his recovery from the nose surgery which required a week's hospitalization at the University of Cincinnati.

While Adams has not tipped his hand, a good bet is that he

will attempt to return to the state Senate next year by seeking the seat now held by Sen. Malley Horne.

Horne, D-Tallahassee, has said he will not seek re-election when his two-year term as Senate President expires in 1974.

"If Tom Adams would announce for that office, no one in north Florida politics would dare run against him," said one knowledgeable source.

Observers making book on that bet reason that Adams will stay away from a statewide race because his chances would be impaired by investigations into his use of state employees.

Adams, who served in the state Senate from 1958 until 1960, was asked to resign as Commerce Secretary and senator by the House following disclosure that he used Commerce Department employees to run personal errands.

But the same observers say publicity surrounding the investigation would not hurt Adams in Horne's north Florida district. "In Leon County, we're kind of callous. We don't get upset about that kind of thing," said one source.

Normally House members jump at a Senate seat vacate by an incumbent in their district, but Horne's seat seems to be an exception. Rep. Don Tucker is in line for House

Speaker in 1975-76 and Carroll Webb, Leon County's other Democratic representative, was a freshman last year and unlikely to try to move up so quickly.

And the job would appeal to Adams, the observers conclude, because it would give him a base to remain visible for future ventures and allow him to live on his Gadsden County farm with bride-to-be Frances Sue Brewer.

Miss Brewer, 23, was herself in the limelight weeks before her scheduled Sept. 8 marriage to Adams.

Lynone Lavere, consul of Colombia in Tampa, complained last week that Miss Brewer's comments about poverty in Bogota were "a fragment of her imagination."

Miss Brewer, a Peace Corps volunteer, made the comments in an article by a state-paid feature writer. Adams authorized the expenditure of \$500 to send the writer to Bogota after meeting Miss Brewer there on a trade mission.

The Tampa Tribune printed the article recently under the headline: "Is This Story Worth \$500?"

The Commerce Department featured writer, Susie Millbourne, said this week she believed the story was worth her expense money. "The press has over-exaggerated the whole thing and put the important things the Peace Corps is doing in Columbia in a very questionable light," Miss Millbourne said.

What disturbs me about all this is not the thought of men purchasing more and brighter-colored clothing or dressing with more imagination than their fathers, but the thought of men becoming the vassals of the fashion overlords, as poor women have been for years. Men, until lately, have been capable of choosing the shirts they put on their backs out of common sense and decent good taste, and not be dictated to by fop-fish fashion designers. The so-called Peacock Revolution changed the American man and made him as susceptible as a woman to the whims of the whimsical fashion people.

Nevertheless, I am for unknown reasons attracted to the big bow tie. Men who wear bow ties have always interested me, making me wonder if there is any psychological reason attached to it. But until now, the bow tie itself never interested me because it was usually too small and accomplished nothing except getting the

wearer off as an oddity on the streets.

The new styles in bow ties, big and splashy, are rather attractive, if of course one has to bother with a tie at all.

Men wearing bow ties have always seemed to be a breed apart from other men. "It is questionably a matter of honor," says Mr. Englebright. "A man of culture and perspicuity would never wear a clip-on bow tie." Harry

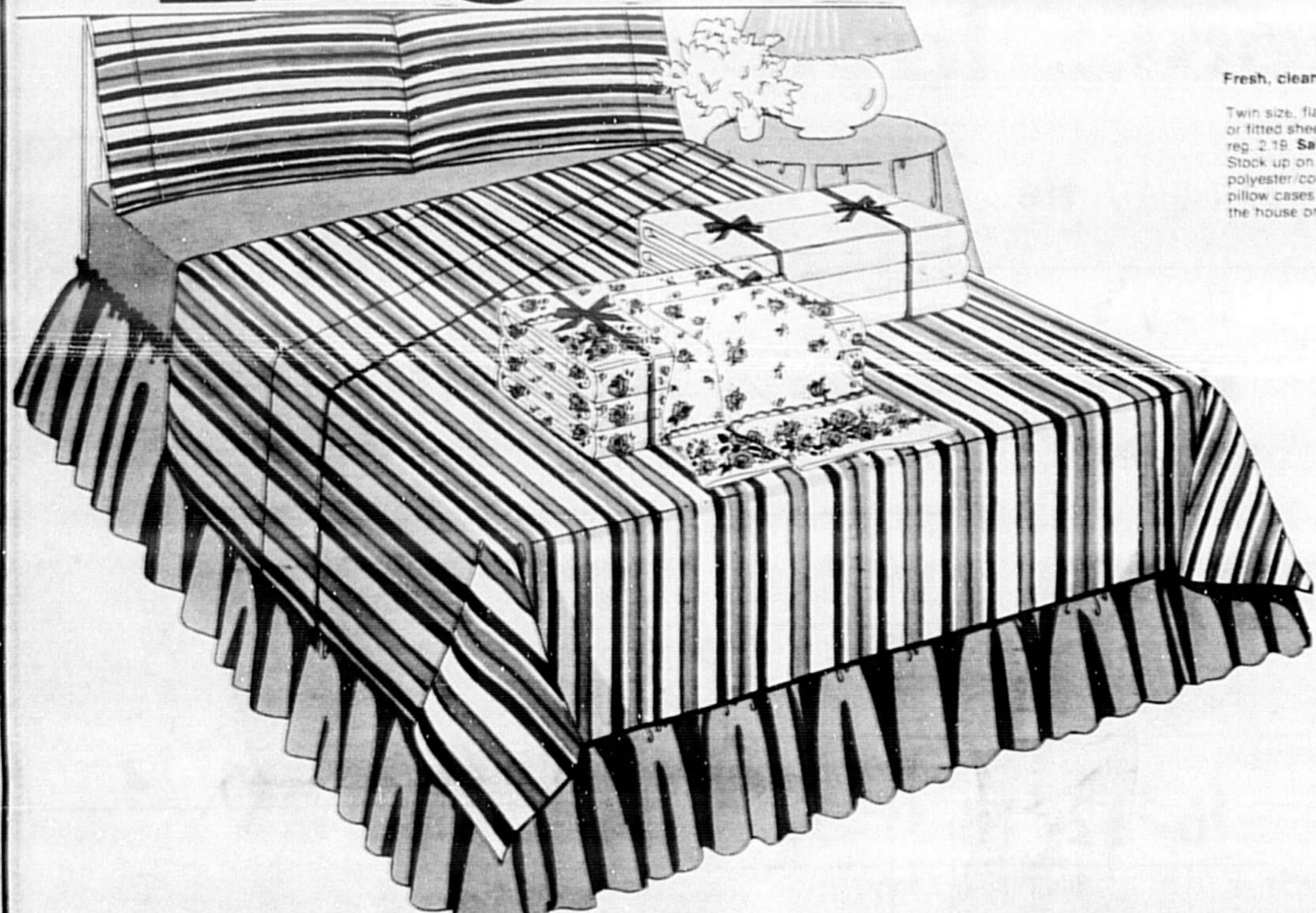
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Harry has since become a master at what he considers a matter of personal honor.

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

Q Do you have any suggestions for selecting a laundry detergent that does a good job and can save me a few pennies at the same time?

A It is difficult to compare values in detergents because you have to figure the cost per wash load. Detergents vary in their composition; some may appear to be inexpensive, but require a larger amount than a more expensive brand would require. The instruction booklet that comes with your washing machine usually recommends several brands that will give you good results. Too many homemakers make the mistake of using more detergent than is actually needed because they think a high suds level will make the clothes cleaner. However, too many suds will slow down the washing of the machine and cause problems. You can learn by experimenting with which product works best for you in your own set of conditions. A variety of factors such as brands of washing machine, water temperature and hardness, usage habits, type of clothing washed and what type of results you expect effect the homemaker's decision.

Junk May Lead To Good Fishing

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) —The ocean bottom off Florida beaches is being littered with old car wrecks, spare tires and abandoned kitchen appliances—all in the name of good fishing.

More than 100 of the man-made reefs have been approved by state officials along 1,500 miles of coastline.

"Proponents of highway beautification confirm that old cars, bodies, refrigerators, stoves and washing machines are everywhere," said Ken Woodburn, Gov. Reubin Askew's environmental advisor. "A popular way to get them out of sight is to dump them in the ocean for artificial reefs."

In the last two weeks, Askew

and the Cabinet have approved permits for two artificial reefs—car bodies off Apalachicola and concrete pipe in Tampa Bay.

To be approved, the reefs must meet environmental requirements prescribed by the Internal Improvement Fund staff, Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission and departments of Natural Resources and Pollution Control.

For the Apalachicola project, the Cabinet stipulated that the auto bodies be tied together to prevent drifting and drained of oil to prevent fouling the water.

Harry Falk, president of the Apalachicola Chamber of Commerce, said the chamber sponsored the project with the support of the local seafood industry to attract more sports fishermen into the area.

Falk said plans call for the auto bodies to be hoisted to their burial ground five miles offshore by an Army helicopter. Artificial reefs have proven to be popular havens for many species of fish in areas which are barren either by nature or acts of man, Woodburn said. "They are one way we can compensate for the degradation of natural bay habitats due to dredging and filling or pollution," he said. "With proper planning, they can be a boon to fishermen and good fishing is quite important to Florida's economy."

The State Natural Resources Department has approved a \$48,000 grant to construct an artificial reef off Clearwater and measure its effectiveness.

Raymond Mathews, a St. Petersburg Junior College oceanography professor in charge of the project, said millions of tiny bait fish, grouper, bass and Spanish mackerel have swarmed around the reef since it was started last November. "We're getting more than 100 boats every weekend," he said. "Our reef is for the bread and butter fisherman, the guy with the 17 horsepower boat who doesn't want to spend all day looking for fish."

Mathews has a six-man crew on a barge making two trips a day dumping old tires into the Gulf three miles off Clearwater Beach. The state grant calls for 60,000 tires. Mathews' crews have sent about 20,000 to a way-side grave so far.

Mathews, who did his master's thesis on artificial reefs at Florida State University, said random piles produce more crevices and tunnels "so the fish have a little bit better chance against the spear fishermen."

Greg Smith, a diver and marine biologist for the Natural Resources Department, said he's found some artificial reefs off St. Petersburg to be more productive fishing grounds than natural reefs.

He plans a series of environmental impact studies later this year on sites selected for future artificial reefs made of sunken Liberty ships.

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Citrus Juice Sales Ahead Of Last Year

LAKELAND — Weekly and total year-to-date purchases of Florida orange juice continue to run far ahead of the record pace of last year, according to latest figures received at the Department of Citrus.

For the week ending July 14, total accumulated purchases of frozen concentrated orange juice were marked at \$9,305,000 gallons, nine per cent more than the \$8,457,000 gallons scored during the corresponding week one year ago. Weekly purchases were 2,299,000 gallons, a figure 25 per cent greater than the 1,837,000 gallons reported for the corresponding week of 1972.

The 69,263,000 gallons of concentrate is the equivalent of the 27,532,000 gallons of single strength juice.

Reports from Market Research Corp. of America showed chilled orange juice purchases for the season, 27 per cent ahead of the 34,191,000 gallons registered at a similar date in 1972. For the week ending July 14, shoppers reported purchases of 1,798,000 gallons of chilled product, 34 per cent ahead of the 1,340,000 gallons reported during the corresponding week one year ago.

Average retail prices during the latest reported week were 18.7 cents for a six-ounce container of concentrate and 38.6 cents for a quart of chilled juice. The FCJQ price shows a decline of 0.4 cent while the chilled price represents a drop of 0.1 cent.

When a child stops breathing

By David Hendin

Don't let a child die of drowning or suffocation if you are nearby. The mouth-to-mouth breathing technique and external heart massage are easy to learn and should be known by every person capable of understanding and applying them.

When a person stops breathing and is suffocated, it is called asphyxiation. This may occur because of choking, electric shock, poisoning, drowning or other mistakes and cause delays.

Start artificial respiration immediately. Do not delay even to phone for help. Loosen clothing, remove wet clothes, or take the child to another location. These things can all be done later, or by another person. The most important thing for the moment is to get air into the child's lungs.

Here's how to apply mouth-to-mouth breathing.

(Third in a series)

1. Turn the child on his back.
2. Quickly remove any foreign matter from the mouth. Turn his head to the side and use your fingers to remove all obstructions. (Figure 1.)
3. Put one of your hands under the child's neck and the other under his chin. Pull the chin upward until the head is tilted back as far as possible. This assures keeping the air passages to the lungs open during four revival efforts. (Figure 2.)
4. Place your mouth tightly over the child's mouth and nose. In the case of an older child or adult, put your mouth tightly over the victim's mouth and pinch his nostrils to prevent leakage of air. (Figure 3.)
5. Breathe into the child's mouth as far as possible until you see his chest rise.
6. Remove your mouth and listen for the sound of returning air. If you don't hear this, recheck the victim's chin and head position. Again clear mouth and throat of any obstructions. (Figure 4.)
7. Repeat breathing. Remove your mouth from the

Our Living Standards Exceed Other Nations

NEW YORK (AP) — Statistically speaking, the living standard in the United States surpasses that in other countries.

Americans have more cars, telephones, television, appliances and such per person. Per capita income is the highest, although Sweden isn't far behind.

But other industrial nations not only are catching up but also can show statistical superiority in some areas.

Figures compiled by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development show that the German jobless rate is less than one per cent, compared with a five per cent U.S. average.

In fact, the group's midyear economic outlook shows that Canada and the United States more likely would be happy to exchange their jobless rates with many of the 22 other member nations.

The rates for other countries—based on three-month averages ending, because of differences in compilation time, between February and May—are: Canada 5.4, Japan 1.4, Australia 1.6, France 2.1, Italy 3.5, United Kingdom 2.5, Belgium 2.2, Netherlands 3.1, Finland 2.5 and Sweden 1.7.

Also the people of many other countries are catching up to Americans.

The rise in Japanese consumer prices for the three months that ended last April was 16.4 per cent, which was the highest for the organization's countries. Ireland's rate, measured through February, was 18.2 per cent.

In the United States, the three-month rate through April was 7.9 per cent, although that figure has risen since. For the six months through June, it was about 8.3 per cent, still lower than the 10.9 per cent of Switzerland, the 12.7 of Italy and the 9.4 per cent of Denmark.

The best score, 4 per cent, was attained by France, followed by Sweden at 5, the Netherlands at 5.1, and Germany at 5.8.

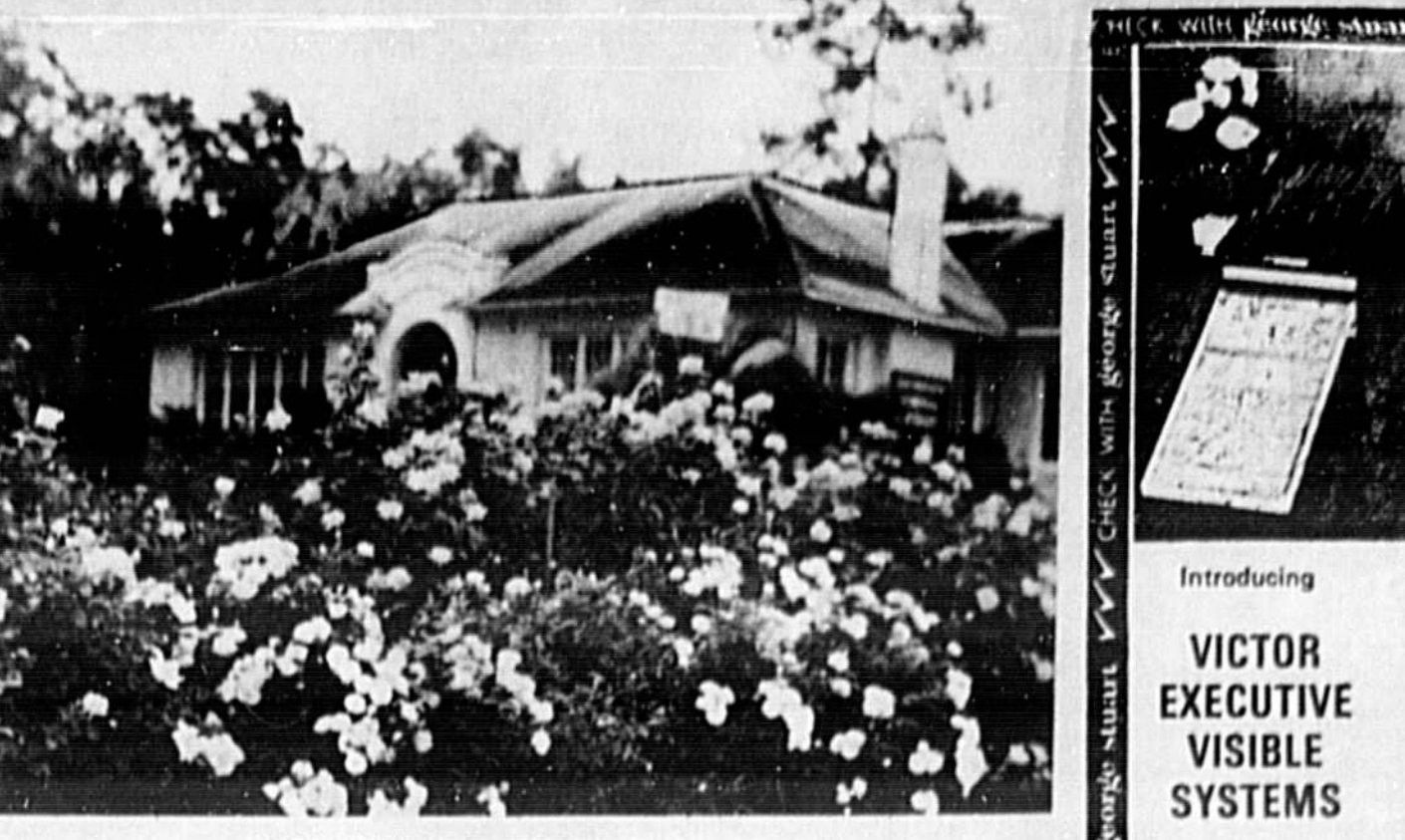
Buying Car Traumatic

Economics Sans Gospel

By JOHN CUNIFF AP Business Analyst NEW YORK (AP)—You are aware, of course, that in matters economic there is no gospel. The lamentable experiences of the past few years have taught the vainest of theorists that they might be wrong and that they must question. Here are some of the questions being asked today:

—Now that limits on savings account interest have been raised, will customers be drawn away from the U.S. Savings Bond program?

The bond program has been thriving in the past few years because it offered not only a competitive 5.5 per cent interest rate but the convenience of payroll deduction, some tax benefits and the highest degree of security.

But now some banks will be offering a much higher return. Four-year certificates of deposit may pay 7.5 per cent or more if held to maturity.

In contrast, a savings bond yields 5.5 per cent only if held to maturity in 5 years, 10 months.

Reserve Board Will Keep Market 'Tight'

Whether the Federal Reserve Board will choose to stiffen monetary policy still further is not clear, but Spear & Staff's market report states it is "clear that the Fed won't ease the market's burden yet." It is believed monetary authorities may have signaled a toughening policy by two moves: (1) an increase in the percentage of deposits banks must set aside as reserves by one-half percentage point to 10.5 percent, reducing by some \$800 million banks' lendable funds, and (2) a hike in the discount rate to 7 percent from 6.5 per cent, putting this fee charged on loans to member commercial banks at the peak level of 1921.

In his trading letter, financial analyst A. C. R. Reuter calls attention to technical strength in Driver-Harris and Bomar Instruments.

Quoting Anthony W. Tabell, writing for Janney Montgomery Scott: "The stock market is a difficult and changing beast, and while certain sea-sawable tendencies are apparent, they constitute only one factor in what is invariably a highly complex situation."

E. F. Hutton & Co. sees Arvin Industries profiting from government mandates for complex pollution control equipment beginning with 1973 model automobiles.

Will the small investor miss the boat when the next bull market begins? Yale Hirsch, publisher of Smart Money and other newsletters for investors, poses the question. He says that if history is any guide, the decline dating from January will turn around one or two days and climb approximately 38 to 39 per cent within a year.

Hirsch feels the turnaround for real could occur sometime this fall. "Unfortunately," he says "with investor confidence at its lowest ebb in a generation, most small investors will miss the boat when the next bull market begins. They will be sitting on the sidelines and won't participate until the advance is well under way."

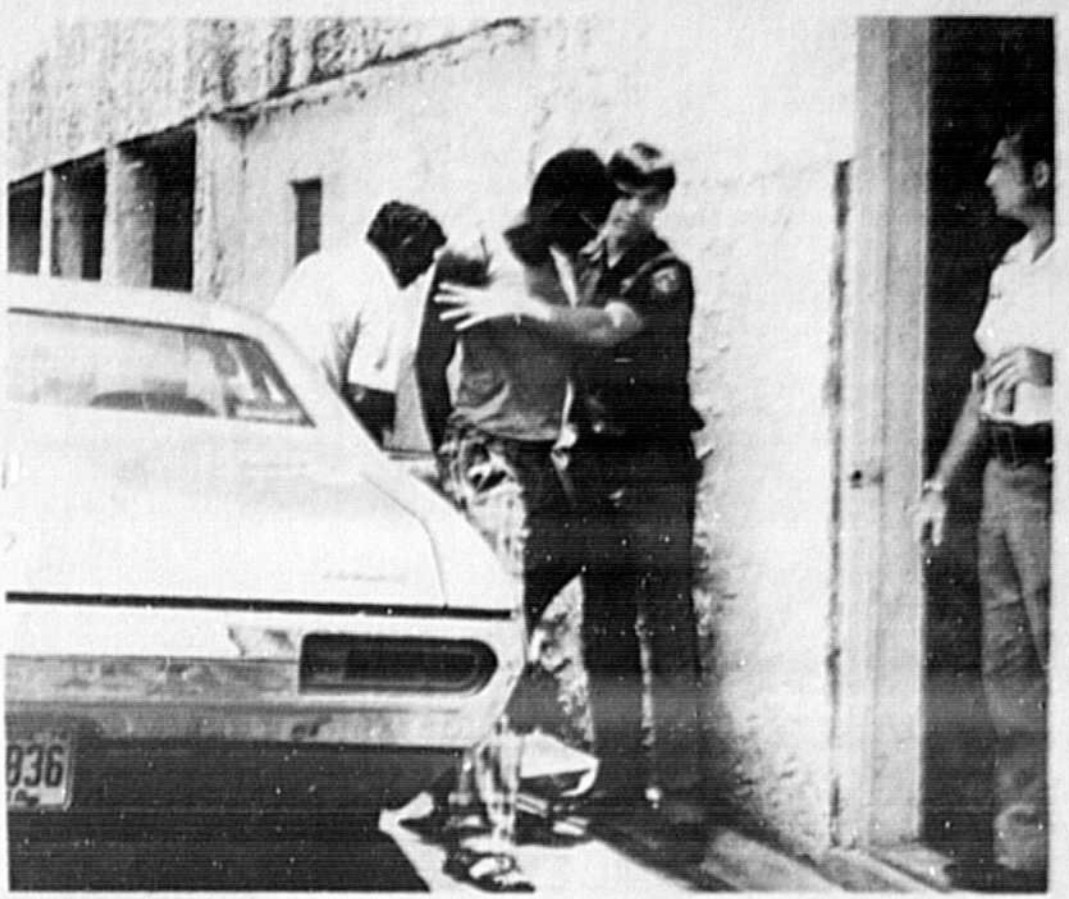

Thanks to the speedy communications system, Dismuke, now lodged in county jail on \$5,500 bond, allegedly grabbed a bundle of bills totalling \$1,180 from the open safe of the Winn Dixie, then fled, dragging head cashier Ada Williams with him out the door. Mrs. Williams, according to witnesses, held onto the suspect, causing him to drop \$500 in the parking lot. He was apparently unarmed, police said.

He has also been hit with a lottery ticket charge, after two books of tickets were discovered in his car. In a similar incident to Thursday's robbery, a 17-year-old Sanford youth was charged with robbery this morning after he allegedly walked into a downtown Sanford drugstore, scooped money from an unattended cash register, and fled out the front door.

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—They'll retire early tonight and awaken at 2 a.m. EDT for a final physical exam and to suit up for the trip into orbit aboard Saturday's Skylab 3 rocket. The countdown continued on schedule with no problems reported.

They're all anxious to get up there and put out 100 per cent, said Bean, an Apollo 12 moon walk veteran who will command the second mission to America's first space station.

The astronauts flew here Thursday after concluding their training at the Johnson Space Center near Houston, Tex.
