## Police Want To Know

### Which Room Was Eric Slain In?

Seminole County Sheriff John Polk today predicted the investigation into the shooting death of 13-year-old Michael Eric Smith will take from seven to 10 days to complete.

The child was shot Feb. 15 reportedly by the 13-year-old son of the couple who was babysitting the child.

"We don't want to rush through it and do it slipshod," Polk said of the investigation. He also said the age of the youth who fired the shot was being taken into consideration. "He must still be in shock," Polk said of the 13-year-old.

Polk said the investigation is focusing on the circumstances surrounding the shooting which remain unclear.

For example, Polk said, there have been two stories on where the shooting occurred. The sheriff said the youth has indicated to investigators the shooting occurred in the master bedroom of the trailer home in Sanford.

However, the youth's father, Jesse Lee, reported finding the child in the bathroom after the shot was fired.

In addition, Polk said, there is some confusion as to whether the child was lying down or standing when he was shot. Seminole County Medical Examiner Dr. G.V. Garay

said autopsy results indicate the child was standing or bending over when he was struck in the neck with the bullet.

Polk also confirmed that who loaded the .30 caliber rifle and when it was loaded remains a major unclear point.

Lee told investigators his son was in the room with the child only seconds before the shot was fired. He said his son did not have time to load the rifle.

"Apparently, it had to have been loaded; he would not have time to load the gun," Lee said. "They were just playing around," he said of the shooting.

The shooting occurred at 11:30 p.m. at the Lee home at Pinescrest Trailer Park at Magnolia Avenue near Sanford.

Lee said the Smith child had excused himself during the noon meal to go to the bathroom. Polk said the 13-year-old was sent by his parents to bring the child back to the table.

On Friday, investigators subpoenaed the 13-year-old's school records after officials at the Liberty Christian School in Sanford refused to release them without a court order.

Lee said his son was home the day of the shooting because of classroom problems.

The Smith child, who was buried Friday, is the son of Mrs. Steven Sanford, 487 Crystal Lake Drive in Lake Mary.

## 3rd Appeal Loss For Longwood

For the third time in 29 months, the city of Longwood has lost its battle with the state of Florida to avoid payment of \$3,200 the state granted in unemployment compensation to the city's former public works director Ralph Fisher. The city has maintained Fisher was properly fired and not entitled to unemployment compensation.

An appeals referee, D. M. Foabe of the state unemployment compensation division in a decision issued Friday, said evidence submitted by the city was "insufficient" to overturn the decision of two previous referees granting the payment.

That doesn't necessarily mean the city of Longwood ever has to reimburse the state for the \$3,200, said Bill Miley, administrator of the contributions section of the state unemployment office, today.

"There is no teeth in the law by which we can force payment," Miley said, adding that bills granting authority to the state to attach state revenue sharing money of governmental bodies refusing reimbursement have been in committee since 1975. "We have strong lobbying efforts by the Florida League of Cities and other agencies representing cities."

Meanwhile, Mayor June Lorman declined comment on whether the city will continue efforts to avoid the payment or whether the issue will be discussed at the regular meeting of the city commission at 7:30 p.m. today.

"I have no comment," she said. "I will be discussing this with the city attorney." City Attorney Ned N. Julian Jr., who had represented the city

throughout the fight, told The Herald last week that the city would pay the claim to the state once the appeal process is over.

"There's not a whole lot we can do when it comes to public state employers," Miley said. "We will just keep on writing them and requesting payment. We could file a tax lien in the circuit in Seminole County, but that doesn't mean the city has to pay."

Fisher, on learning today the state has upheld his collection unemployment compensation by the city council in September, 1976 through July, 1977, said the appeals decision "restores my faith in the state."

"It appeared for awhile the state was going to permit Longwood to appeal as long as many times as necessary for it to win," he said.

Fisher did not appear at the last referee's hearing on Feb. 6. He appeared with legal counsel at two previous hearings.

## Vietnam: 3,500 Chinese Killed

BANGKOK, Thailand (UPI) — Vietnam said today its forces killed huge numbers of Chinese invaders in battles on town streets and in jungles.

Radio Hanoi, in a broadcast monitored in Bangkok, said that in two days of fighting Vietnamese troops killed 3,500 Chinese soldiers, destroyed 50 tanks and routed 13 Chinese battalions. China's invasion force has stopped six miles deep in Vietnamese territory, but military analysts said they were unsure if Peking ordered its troops to halt or if the attack was thrown back by Vietnamese defenders.

In a related development, a Vietnamese official in Bangkok indicated his nation would not call for direct Soviet intervention but said Vietnam appreciates Russia's moral support, including a demand the Chinese withdraw "before it's too late."

Intelligence officers said the 3-day-old invasion had left Chinese forces in control of two district capitals and scores of small villages, as the Peking troops pushed six miles into Vietnam on highways and trails across the 400-mile frontier.

They said today's fighting included air strikes by both sides in the battle areas.

Radio Hanoi said 1,000 Chinese were killed in street fighting in the tiny province capital of Lao Cai, only a half mile inside Vietnam across the Red River from China and 184 miles northwest of Hanoi.

The radio said all reports covered Saturday and Sunday. Hanoi claimed to have halted the invasion, but it appeared the Chinese halted their own drive even before Moscow warned it would honor the terms of its military pact signed last November with Hanoi.

A two-paragraph statement from the Kremlin said, "Those who decide the policy in Peking should stop before it is too late." In Bangkok, Thailand, Western intelligence specialists said the possibility of Soviet intervention in the China-Vietnam war could not be ruled out.

The Soviet Union has a small fleet of warships in the South

China Sea near the Paracel Island held by China, but claimed by Vietnam. There also have been reports that Soviet troops on the Chinese border have increased their presence.

But the Soviet government statement Sunday stopped short of saying what it would do if China continued its military push into Vietnam, which has a mutual protection treaty with the U.S.S.R.

The treaty, signed Nov. 3, calls for "mutual consultations" if either party is menaced by outside aggression and for "appropriate effective measures" to ensure peace and security.

"The Soviet Union will honor its obligations under the treaty of friendship and cooperation between the Soviet Union and the Socialist Republic of Vietnam," the government said in an announcement.

"Those who decide the policy in Peking should stop before it is too late," the Soviet statement said as reported by the official Tass news agency.

"All the Chinese people, like other people, need peace and not war. All responsibility for the consequences of continuing the aggression by Peking against Vietnam will be borne by the present Chinese leadership."

The statement accused Peking of "a grossly irresponsible attitude to the destinies of peace," and noted "the criminal ease with which the Chinese leadership turns to arms."

An hour after Tass reported the government statement it said Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko was in consultation with Nguyen Binh Khien, the Vietnamese ambassador to Moscow.

One Soviet news commentator made an obvious reference to the scorching relations between the United States and China and the role it might have played in the attack on Vietnam.

"New the adventure has begun. It began very soon after the so-called normalization of Sino-American relations, after (Chinese Vice Premier) Teng Hsiao-ping's visit to the United States and Tokyo, where he said it would be necessary to teach Vietnam a lesson," the commentator said.

## Khomeini Warns 'Satanic' Reds

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — Iran, faced with rising left-wing opposition to Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, today warned that it would ruthlessly crush "satanic" anti-Islamic internal factions, apparently including the Communists. Khomeini issued a blunt warning to the nation that a "very sensitive" situation still prevailed and "satanic elements who are worse than the shah were still trying to create problems." In an apparent reference to left-wing radicals and Communists he said, "I won't tolerate anyone who is anti-Islamic. We will crush them."

## Blue Cross Policy Change Has Little Effect On SMH

A decision by Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Florida not to pay for a routine battery of tests many hospitals require when admitting patients will have little if any effect on Seminole Memorial Hospital, according to Charles Bentley, hospital administrator.

Blue Cross has announced it was abandoning its longstanding policy of paying for routine admission tests as part of an effort to cut down on costs and possible abuse.

"It's like anything else; it's a cost containment program," said George Dyer, assistant communications director for Blue Cross-Blue Shield of Florida.

Dyer explained Blue Cross launched a program to try and reduce unnecessary medical expenses in 1977 called the Medical Necessity Program. That program reviewed medical tests and procedures nationwide trying to eliminate outmoded procedures, according to Dyer.

"This is just an extension of that program begun in 1977,"

said Dyer.

Bentley agrees with the Blue Cross move. He noted a large number of tests are not required for every hospital admission.

"I don't think this will affect our hospital, because we haven't required a large battery of admission tests to begin with," said Bentley.

Seminole Memorial Hospital requires two basic admission tests, according to Bentley. Those tests are the complete blood cell count (CBC) and an urinalysis.

"I think admission tests ought to be held to a minimum and when you're down to a CBC and a urinalysis, you're down to the minimum," he said.

Seminole also requires an EKG examination for patients over 40 entering surgery, according to Bentley. However, that test will still be covered by Blue Cross, because it is not a standard test for all patients being admitted to the hospital, according to Bentley, and it has bearing on the condition of the individual patient.

"If I understand the Blue

## Airport, Road Travel Stopped

### Surprise Snow Paralyzes D.C., N.Y.

A heavy snowstorm whipped the East today, paralyzing Washington and New York with heavy snow, closing major airports and halting land travel. Another band of heavy snow hit the South from Louisiana to the Carolinas.

Snowfall was piled in hundreds of miles from the Atlantic to the Gulf and closed hundreds of schools and businesses.

The storm all but shut down the Washington area, closing roads and airports and disrupting plans of merchants for special Washington's Birthday sales. Up to 14 inches of snow was forecast for the capital city.

Washington's Metro bus and subway systems, operating on a heavy schedule in observation of the holiday, were shut down. Many stores closed for business at 11 a.m. A Metro spokesman said 10 buses had broken down and all the rest were stalled.

Both Washington National and Dulles International airports were closed. A spokesman for the Federal Aviation Administration said other world airports might close.

Baltimore-Washington International Airport also was closed. Police in several Washington area jurisdictions reported they had no many patrol cars stuck in the snow as they had patrolling the streets.

Most schools across Maryland cancelled classes — which had been scheduled for the Washington's Birthday holiday to make up for previous days missed due to bad weather.

The heavy snow took New York transportation down by surprise. The Port Authority said it had to cancel only the 4:15 a.m. train from New York to Philadelphia. Other trains 10 to 15 inches of snow could fall before the storm comes out to sea.

All 121 airlines, 8 buses of New York State and Canada Post. Port authorities were in New York's state — which, under state and federal orders, are closed to observation of Washington's Birthday — all people who did not return and had to spend the night in hotels. The total snow today was 10 inches in New York City. The snow was piled in less than a day, and the white cloud drifting in from the north.

Newark International Airport in New Jersey shut down while crews cleared the runways. Kennedy and LaGuardia airports in New York City remained open.

### Several Flights North Canceled

MIAMI (UPI) — The winter storm that swept through the northeast has backed up airline passengers in Florida, forcing Eastern Airlines to cancel several northbound flights today.

Eastern spokesman Jim Christian said "We've wiped out all Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia and three New York airports for the rest of the day. Providence, Hartford and Boston are going to keep operating if we can start 6 a.m.," a spokesman said.

## Israel, Egypt On Way For Talks In Washington

Israel and Egypt sent high-level delegations to Washington today for a second round of Camp David meetings in an effort to pump new life into the dormant Middle East Peace talks. Egyptian Prime Minister Mustafa Khalil, Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan and Secretary of State Cyrus Vance were scheduled to meet Wednesday in negotiations scheduled to last four to seven days.

## Picasso 'Smash And Grab'

TORONTO (UPC) — A \$500,000 Picasso original was stolen during a weekend "smash and grab" raid at a Yorkville gallery but a gallery spokesman says the work is so well known the thieves will find it difficult to get rid of. "It is now in effect branded a stolen painting, so no reputable dealer would touch it," Elizabeth Levitt, administrator for Mira Godard Gallery, said.

## Dubs Honored At Arlington

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation honored slain ambassador Adolph Dubs today at Arlington National Cemetery, where President Carter saluted him and comforted his tearful wife with a kiss. Dubs, 58, a career diplomat, was kidnapped in Afghanistan last week and killed in a shootout between Afghan police and the four terrorists who abducted him. He had been named ambassador to the country only seven months ago. He will be buried Tuesday.

## Oil Price Measure Forecast

NICOSIA, Cyprus (UPI) — The political upheaval in Iran has created pressure on the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries pricing system to a point where it cannot be contained, the Middle East Economic Survey reported today. The weekly review of news on Middle East oil published in Nicosia said Abu Dhabi and Qatar have already slipped on market premiums of \$1 a barrel, "a relatively modest increment considering that the spot market premium has soared to around seven or eight dollars."

## Bangladesh Nationalists Lead

DACCA, Bangladesh (UPI) — President Ziaur Rahman's party was building a solid majority in national elections that marked the end of three years of martial law in this impoverished South Asian nation. With winners declared in 214 of the 300 parliamentary districts at stake, the Bangladesh Nationalist Party of Zia had 148 seats. In second place, with only 27 seats, was a faction of the leftist Awami League. Other parties and independents shared the rest.

# PLO Takes Over Israeli Iran Office

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — The new Islamic government today officially turned over the abandoned Israeli diplomatic mission to PLO chief Yasser Arafat now that all of Israel's representatives have been expelled.

The national radio meanwhile reported that Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini had been taken ill Sunday night and had canceled all official appointments today.

The radio gave no further details, but since his return from exile in Paris, Khomeini has been ill with "extreme fatigue" that required periods of rest.

Prime Minister Mehdi Bazargan today appealed to workers to get the nation's oil wells pumping again and said Iran would soon resume oil exports to most of its former customers, including the United States.

Bazargan told oil industry workers the country needs to begin exports as soon as possible "to help pay for the revolution" and said the revolt that drove the shah from power would grind to a halt if oil sales are not revived.

The third day of the major evacuation of foreigners from Iran got off to a smooth start this morning with hundreds more Americans and Britons being based to Tehran's international airport under the guard of government marauders. No major incidents were reported.

Arafat, accompanied by Deputy Prime Minister Ibrahim Yazdi, made a brief

tour of the Israeli mission, which had been ransacked by mob last week, and then raised the red, black, white and green Palestine Liberation Organization flag over a front balcony. A crowd of some 200

onlookers cheered as the flag appeared.

"We are celebrating the raising of our flag here on our first embassy, the Bureau of Palestine," Arafat said.

Yazdi said, "This is the moment all Iranian people have been looking forward to. It is a very joyous time for all of us and I'm here in my official capacity as Deputy Prime Minister to officiate at the opening of the PLO bureau."

Yazdi dodged the question of whether the new Iranian government will provide weapons to the Palestinians and said that and the question of oil would be discussed at a later time.

Arafat arrived Saturday and on Sunday, Iran's new revolutionary government severed diplomatic relations with Israel and was reported ready to hand over the Israeli embassy, pillaged during the revolution, to the PLO.

The revolutionary radio quoted Bazargan as saying the action was "fully in keeping with the policy announced before we came to power of cutting all ties with Israel."

The government said the last 22 Israeli diplomats had left Iran and that Iranian diplomats in Israel had been summoned home.

Evacuation flights of the 8,000 American remaining in Iran when the revolution ended, compared to 41,000 a year ago, were scheduled to continue today for the third straight day. A total of 1,884 people has left on five flights since Saturday.
