

George II Dies

(Continued from Page One) a question which now is being debated in Washington. President Truman has declared that the unrest in Greece was the result of attempted communist expansion and he has urged that the United States help the Greeks out financially and with military aid. What brought on the question of American aid to Greece was the British announcement that Britain was withdrawing from her commitments in that country. Yesterday was the deadline for the British to pull out although they consented to stay on until the American loan was decided.

The death of the Greek King comes at a crucial time, but George himself had a career as full of ups and downs as any royal figure in European history. He was born at Tatoi near Athens. He had no Greek blood in his veins but is a scion of Danish-German-Russian royalty. His uncle was the German Kaiser Wilhelm II and his great grandmother was Britain's Queen Victoria. In June, 1917 George fled from Greece with his

father King Constantine who was accused of being pro German. In 1922 after his father abdicated George ascended the Greek throne for the first time, but three months later he was overthrown by the institution of a republic.

For the next 13 years George lived in exile in London. On Nov. 3, 1935, a plebiscite rigged by a dictatorship regime instituted by the army coup of War Minister Kostas voted George back to the throne.

When trouble flared between a secular liberal faction and the conservatives, George went for John Metaxas, a monarchist friend of his father.

When Metaxas formed a provisional government, the Metaxas dictatorship began. Even after the Italians invaded Greece, the Metaxas regime maintained relations with Germany, but the Italians could not handle the Greek army and the Nazis took over in 1941. King George, who had followed a pro-British foreign policy, fled the country once again and took up his exile in London. Then with liberation, came the plebiscite which brought George back and

seize control of the Greek government. Most representatives and senators seemed to think George's death would not have much effect on congressional action on the President's request for aid to Greece and Turkey.

Democratic Senator Walter George, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said that the King's death might help the American program in some ways. He based this statement on the assumption that a stable government could be formed in Athens. On the other hand, Republican Rep. Karl Mundt of South Dakota expressed the hope that the Greeks will proceed with great caution to prevent the communist elements from taking advantage of the situation.

resulted in the present tense world situation.

King George was described as an earnest, myopic individual. He himself called the kingship "a rotten job" and once affirmed that he would rather be an American cowboy. He was married to Princess Elizabeth of Romania who divorced him for desertion during his second exile.

The present heir to the Greek throne is Prince Paul, third son of the late King Constantine and a brother of George.

In London, Greek Leftists said the death of the King would mean no change for the time being in the situation in Greece.

The Greek Ambassador to the United States, commenting on the death of his King today, declared that all Greeks are depressed at the sad news. The envoy, Vassili Dendramis, asserted that George had been a good king, faithful to the Allies to the end. Dendramis, incidentally, also is the Greek delegate to the United Nations and was named ambassador on Mar. 24.

Group Okays Bill To Stop Phone Strike

Measure Empowers President To Re- quest Injunction Banning Walkout

WASHINGTON, Apr. 2.—The president of the National Federation of Telephone Workers, Joseph A. Belme, said today he expects the nationwide telephone strike will begin as scheduled next Monday. Belme said that as things look now, there is little chance that it can be averted.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 2.—The House Labor Committee today approved legislation aimed at giving the government power to head off or stop a telephonic strike scheduled for next Monday. The vote was 16 to 3.

The machine provides that when the President finds that a strike results in or threatens a substantial curtailment of such services as public utilities or communications, he shall direct the attorney general to obtain a court order to prevent a strike.

After the committee voted, Chairman Fred Hartley of New Jersey said that he would ask immediately clearance to get the bill on the floor of the House. However, he conceded that there is no chance of enactment before the strike deadline set by the National Federation of Telephone Workers. He explained that the bill was not merely designed to beat the deadline, but that it posed it could be used even after the strike takes place.

Meanwhile, the Southern Federation of Telephone Workers rejected an offer of the Southern Bell Telephone Company to arbitrate wage demands. The action was announced in Atlanta this morning.

The Southern Bell Company suggested setting up a panel of citizens and representatives of the company and the union to arbitrate the wage demands. The company's offer proposed that the group compare telephone work rates with the wages paid for work requiring similar skill in other industries.

Greek Politics Are Unchanged By Death Of King

ATHENS, Apr. 2.—The death of King George of Greece has brought no change in the internal picture of Greek politics as King Paul directed Premier Mavromis to carry on with his coalition cabinet.

The newly enthroned king requested that no funeral wreaths be placed on the bier of his brother, King Paul, asked that the money that would be spent for flowers be donated instead to a fund to aid war widows and orphans.

All banks and public buildings were closed in mourning today and schools will remain closed until Saturday, the day set for King George's funeral.

In addition to the oath which King Paul took last night, he also made a solemn declaration before the National Assembly when it reconvened on Apr. 2.

Every newspaper in Athens, except one, devoted their entire front page today to news and pictures concerning the death of King George. The communist newspaper, *Elas*, gave four lines to the story.

A source close to the Greek royal family said the wedding of Princess Catherine to British Maj. Richard Pandorf will not be postponed because of the death of the king. The wedding is scheduled to take place Apr. 31 and only intimate friends of the couple and members of the royal family will attend.

Plane Crash Kills Two French Officers

PARIS, Apr. 2.—Dispatches today from Hanoi stated that the chief of the French forces in northern Indochina have been killed in a plane crash in Tonkin province. The officers are identified as Col. Gifflet and Col. Dubois.

They are said to have been killed while making an inspection trip in a military plane. The crash apparently happened last Sunday.

Democrat Wins Chicago Election By Big Majority

Landslide Is Party's Largest Municipal Victory In 12 Years

CHICAGO, Apr. 2.—Republican hopes of capturing control of the Chicago municipal government were ended today under an avalanche of Democratic votes that put Martin Kennedy in the mayor's chair. The Chicago election yesterday was the nation's first test of political trends since last November, when the Democrats suffered heavy setbacks in congressional and county elections. However, yesterday's balloting gave the Democrats their biggest municipal victory in Chicago in 12 years.

Both sides waged all-out campaigns to win control of the city hall. Control in Chicago will have an important bearing on how the electoral vote goes in Illinois in the 1948 presidential election.

The Republican national chairman, Carol Reece, had described the Chicago city election as an important preliminary engagement to next year's presidential contest. Complete returns show Kennedy's majority over his Republican opponent, Russell Root, to be 273,354 votes. Kennedy's Democratic running mate, Ludwig Scheber for city clerk, and Joseph Baran for city treasurer, also scored easy victories. The total vote was 1,586,941, the largest in the history of a mayoral ballot in Chicago.

Returns from the city's 4,054 precincts gave Kennedy 919,593 votes to 646,239 for Root. Kennedy will take office as Chicago's mayor on Apr. 15, succeeding Mayor Edward Kelly, who has held office for 14 years.

In two weeks, Mr. Freeman will start a new schedule to take care of local interests, and will be at the Court House Fridays at 10:00 to 12:00 A. M.

Five counties will continue to be served by the association: Lake, Orange, Seminole, Volusia and Brevard.

MEAT TO STAY HIGH

WASHINGTON, Apr. 2.—The Agriculture department announced today that meat prices generally are expected to continue high during the spring and early summer, with moderate declines written in for lamb and better quality beef. Elsewhere on the price front, the department predicts some increases in the price of turkeys and chickens during the next few months, with eggs continuing near their recent levels. Vegetable prices are expected to decline as the marketing season develops.

Union Orders Coal Strike In Germany

300,000 Miners Are Scheduled To Quit In Protest Against Shortage Of Food

ESSEN, Germany, Apr. 2.—German trade union leaders today ordered a one-day strike of nearly 300,000 men in 171 Ruhr coal mines as a protest against food shortages. The walkout, scheduled for tomorrow, will mean a loss of nearly 238,000 tons of badly needed coal.

The decision to call the strike was taken by an overwhelming vote of 50 mine union leaders after a three-hour session in the coal-mining town of Bochum. Earlier today, 4,000 miners struck at Bochum.

The output of coal has been declining steadily in the Ruhr mines since Mar. 21 because of sporadic strikes and general unrest. The trouble is blamed on the failure of British and German administrators to fulfill food ration quota promises.

The leader of the Ruhr mine union, August Schmidt, argued against the walkout, but the delegates were in no mood to compromise. The decision was announced through the British-operated North German Coal Control Office.

There was no immediate comment from British authorities. However, British officials said earlier that a halt in Ruhr production would be catastrophic. The British said yesterday that even a one-day strike would subject the miners to loss of extra rations for the entire month in which the stoppage occurred.

Proposed Shipping Rate Increase Is Suspended By ICC

Pending Sales Promotion Act Unfamiliar To Most Growers

The Interstate Commerce Commission has suspended proposed increases in vegetable shipping rates which it is estimated would have increased shipping costs to the Florida vegetable industry by \$1,000,000 a year, according to word received Tuesday by M. L. Cullum, president of the Seminole County Farm Bureau. This group had asked the American Farm Bureau to protest the increase.

The ICC will set a date for a hearing on the subject. Mr. Cullum predicted, and shippers will present arguments against, and railway's arguments for such proposed increases.

Local reaction to the plan of the Florida Vegetable Committee's controls over building material, proposed "Florida Vegetable Sales Promotion Act" which will be presented in the 1947 session of the Florida Legislature for adoption, has not yet become apparent here, probably due to the fact that growers have not yet become fully acquainted with its provisions.

The act which will be somewhat to vegetable merchandising what the Florida Citrus Commission is a fruit is designed to enable the producers of each commodity to set up a sales promotion and research program, and to select the men to run it. A Florida Vegetable Commission would be created and its nine members appointed by the Governor.

Building Halted By Construction Strike

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Apr. 2.—All construction work in Chattanooga was scheduled to come to a halt this afternoon as the result of a vote by representatives of the city's construction industry to call the work stoppage.

President Mark K. Wilson, Jr. of the Chattanooga chapter of the Associated General Contractors said the decision was reached after members of the electrical union did not report to work. The electricals stopped work after their wage contract expired Monday night and a new contract has yet to be signed.

Hole Blown In Ship Carrying Refugees

NEW YORK, Apr. 2.—An official announcement by the British Radio heard in New York said this morning that a hole had been blown in the bottom of the British transport, *Ocean Vigor*. An official statement in Palestine said the transport had been immobilized.

The *Ocean Vigor* left Haifa for Cyprus on Monday with 800 of the 1,000 Jewish refugees rescued by the British Navy last week. The refugees were taken off an overcrowded ship in which they were trying to reach Palestine. British authorities said the refugee ship was in danger of sinking when the passengers were taken off.

Russia, China, France Approve Of Calling Special Session

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Apr. 2.—The way was cleared today for Britain to put the Palestine problem up to a special session of the United Nations General Assembly when Russia, France, and China added their approval to that of the United States. The British government will now send the UN official notification. British sources think the document will reach the UN before nightfall.

The British source said earlier that the document will make up two points. It will ask for a special session of the assembly as soon as possible to set up machinery to handle the problem and it will ask that the whole case be taken up at the regular meeting of the assembly in September.

Acting Secretary General Victor G. Hall and as soon as the British paper is received, the member nations will be polled for approval of a special session. No heavy opposition is expected, since the big powers have already approved. The member states will have 30 days to reply but once 28 states have given their okay, a meeting will be scheduled within 15 days.

It is expected the delegates may be called together within a month.

Secretary Marshall was said to be still hopeful of settling the differences which are preventing a foreign ministers' agreement on a German peace settlement. However, the French and British diplomats in Moscow did not share his optimism. Just before the Big Four met today there were strong indications that Marshall might try to break the deadlock over reparations by asking for an interview with Prime Minister Stalin.

3 Men Involved In Football Fix Get Prison Terms

NEW YORK, Apr. 2.—Three of the men involved in the attempt to fix the Dec. 15 football game between the Chicago Bears and the New York Giants were sentenced to prison today by Judge Saul Street. The general sessions judge gave Harvey Stemmer and David K. Zorowitz terms of five to ten years. He gave Jerome Zarowitz an indefinite penitentiary term which could run a maximum of three years.

Stemmer received two consecutive terms of two and one half years to five years on two bribery convictions. He received a suspended sentence on a conspiracy conviction.

Krakauer got a five to ten year sentence on one bribery count and sentence was suspended on a conspiracy count. He is a second offender. Zorowitz was sentenced on a conspiracy conviction. The three men were found guilty of fixing the brains behind Alvin J. Paris in the fix attempt. Paris has already been convicted of attempting to bribe Merle Hapes and Frank Filchock, New York Giants stars, to throw the game.

U. S. Warships Leave For Mediterranean

QUONSET POINT, R. I.—The big Essex Class aircraft carrier *Leyte* is scheduled to leave the United States Naval Air Station Base at Quonset Point tomorrow en route to the Mediterranean. The *Leyte* will lead a flotilla of American warships, including the cruiser *Providence*, which will visit the eastern Mediterranean during April and May.

The Mediterranean cruise will include stops at Crete and possibly also at ports in Greece and Turkey. Naval authorities said the *Leyte* will sail directly from Quonset to Gibraltar, but they have not disclosed whether a stop will be made at that port.

Donna Jean Dunn Is Still Unconscious

The condition of Donna Jean Dunn, 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Dunn, was today termed satisfactory, and she is still doing well in spite of the fact that she has not regained consciousness since her injury in the automobile wreck at Mellonville and Celery Avenue Sunday afternoon. It was announced this morning by Dr. C. L. Park, attending physician. Miss Dunn is under treatment at Fernald Loughton Memorial Hospital.

Group Takes Steps To End Dairy Strike

BATON ROUGE, Apr. 2.—A legislative arbitration committee today asked Governor Jimmie Davis to call a special session to deal with the strike of dairy farmers. The committee made its recommendation after blaming both producers and distributors for the continuation of the strike.

Both sides are deadlocked in the strike which began a week ago yesterday after New Orleans distributors made a reduction in the wholesale price of raw milk.

Molotov Told Three Million Japs Have Been Repatriated By United States

MOSCOW, Apr. 2.—Secretary of State Marshall today gave Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov the facts and figures on American troops in China. Marshall said when the present withdrawals of U. S. troops over there are completed, only a little over 6,000 will be left. Those, Marshall said, will be there at the request of the Chinese government.

Marshall told Molotov the United States has repatriated 3,000,000 Japanese to their homeland from China. But he added, "as for the disposition of the estimated 700,000 Japanese taken at Manchuria by the Soviets, I have no information."

Marshall sent a letter to Molotov on Mar. 31 in answer to Molotov's request for an exchange of information on China. It was a formal letter and for the most part suggested that Molotov read President Truman's statements of Dec. 15, 1946 and Dec. 18, 1946.

WHITE PLAINS, N. J., Apr. 2.—Almost seven years ago a wealthy Florida sportsman, Victor Byerov, set out in a 55-foot yawl for a solo trip around the Atlantic coast. His yacht crew, the Cynos, vanished somewhere in the broad expanse of the ocean. The news was not reported until after a yacht had pulled ashore after a 20-day voyage.
