Winning A Race

If any little boys or girls were listening in on the radio about 5:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon, they probably got a new idea of the harm of gubbling their food precipitately and the importance, even the necessity, if they are to win the long race of life, of chewing their food carefully and slowly.

For, if they were listening in on their radios, they heard William Woodson's famous colt Johnstown win the Kentucky Derby and they heard the radio announcer tell why it was this big make-up.

Johnstown as a two-year old was a flop. Though he came from a long line of winning thoroughbreds, though he had the best trainers, and the best jockeys, and an owner who twice before had won the Kentucky Derby, he simply could not win a race.

Then his trainer discovered what was the matter. He was a gubbler. He belted his food as if he were smacking a gun, and so he ran his race the way he should have enjoyed his food.

When this owner started they tried something new on him. They rigged up a sort of grid over his feed box. Johnstown had to stick his nose through narrow iron bars to get to his oats, and when he had taken about a mouthful, he had to raise his head, move over to the next opening in the bars and shove his nose through before he could take the next mouthful.

The announcer had scarcely finished telling us this story of how the great horse was broken of his habit of gubbling, when the race started. El Chico was out in front at first, but Johnstown took the lead at the first quarter. From then on it was Johnstown all the way. Two lengths in front! Three lengths in front! Five lengths in front! It was Johnstown's race, and all because he had learned to chew his food well and to eat slowly.

A Fireproof City

For the eleventh consecutive year, Lakewood, Ohio, won the first place award in its population class in the nation-wide fire-prevention contest conducted by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

Here is a part of the Lakewood "formula":

- 1. Fire-fighting equipment is always in perfect operating condition. Water supply is adequate.
2. Firemen are highly trained and organized.
3. Rigid fire inspection of all public buildings, schools, churches, and hospitals.
4. Unable, officially, to carry such fire-safety work inspections to private homes, the householder inspects himself.
5. Home fire drills are held. Families work out a plan of action in case fire does strike, and hold actual fire drills in the home.
6. Fire is hated in Lakewood with the choicest of hates.

For 29 years the schools have co-operated with the progressive fire department to fight the flaming monster. Citizens are alert to the problem. Women's clubs, service clubs, and civic organizations are constantly pushing fire prevention. Not in spotty, short campaigns, but all year round the danger is fought.

The results? Lakewood had 226 fires in 1935—only about ten of which progressed beyond the floor of origin in a city of 75,000. This compares with an average of 168 fires for 29 other cities of that size. If the average fire loss rate of the country had applied to Lakewood during the last eleven years, its losses would have been \$2,069,000 higher than they actually were in this period.

Historical Society Discusses Old Fort

The Fort Mellon Chapter of the Sons and Daughters of the Territory of Florida met Friday night at the home of the president, E. F. Whitner, with Mr. and Mrs. Whitner as hosts.
The meeting opened with prayer, and was presided over by Mr. Whitner. Following routine business Mrs. J. N. Whitner gave a talk on the location of the old Federal cemetery at Fort Mellon, and told of the efforts of the local chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution to place a marker there. The Fort Mellon Chapter went on record as participating in the operation in placing the marker.
Professor W. J. Wells, Jr. of Longwood gave a report on the state meeting of the Sons and Daughters of the Territory of Florida held in Tampa recently, to which he was a representative of the Fort Mellon Chapter. He also read an interesting paper on "Old St. Joseph, the Spite City," telling of the first settlement there by the French in 1718. He stated that the city was incorporated in 1836, and also told of the yellow fever epidemic and the disastrous hurricanes of the early 1840's.

Views Contrast Sharply On New Axis Alliance

"energetic and strange" Germany and Italy.
An announcement that Italy and Germany had decided to become allies in a formal military pact was interpreted in London as a blow against the British-French front.
This crushed lingering hopes in some quarters of driving a wedge between the Rome-Berlin axis partners by weaning Italy away from her friendship with Germany.
At the same time there were unofficial reports of a possible break-down in the prolonged negotiations between Britain and Soviet Russia designed to bring the Soviet union into the French-British lineup.
Britain sent a note yesterday to Moscow answering what was said to be Russia's demand that Britain and France join her in a triple alliance. Unofficial reports here said Britain had refused to go that far and had offered that the three powers guarantee central and southern Europe's small states against aggression.
Talk in diplomatic circles of the possibility that Nazi Germany and Communist Russia might end their traditional enmity raised the question of an entirely new alignment in European politics.
Democracy appeared to be replacing Communism as Germany's official back number one.
Diplomatic observers asserted that under subtle influence from high quarters an ideological transformation was taking place—that abuse of Bolshevism was being soft pedaled and that London, Paris and Washington soon were to be at the receiving end of the angry shafts previously hurled at Moscow.
They said there were two important reasons for a change of front:
1. Adjustment of the controversy with Poland to the satisfaction of the British and French.
2. The fact that the Soviet Union is now a member of the League of Nations.

SYDNEY, Australia, May 5.—(AP)—The scheme of shark meshing to rid New South Wales coast of sharks and make beaches safe for bathers is proving effective.
During the first 30 weeks of the operation 631 sharks of a dangerous species were caught, but only 219 were captured during the last 30 weeks. It is believed that the number of sharks has thus been depleted through the systematic netting.

ORLANDO, May 8.—A new two-punch developed in the Florida State League last week as Durland's famous lookouts trounced Leesburg's nine 10-2 Saturday night.

The "Little Lefty" Durland, who has been out of the lineup for 11 scattered weeks, was back in the lineup for the Lookouts' 10-2 victory Saturday night.

Yesterday's game was the 10th of the season for the Lookouts, who are now in the lead of the Florida State League with a record of 10-0.
