

Bulb Expert To Address Meeting At Seminole Court House On March 16

Seminole county seems admirably adapted to the growing of flowering bulbs on a commercial scale, and a number of small plantings have already been made, and one of considerable size. Many more are contemplating such action. This interest looks as if it ought to prove very profitable. Bulb growers of wide experience tell us that our soils are admirably adapted, and that our climate will permit the production of first class bulbs for less money than they can be produced in other climates. There is already a good market and that market is growing rapidly from year to year. The present supply comes from foreign countries, almost none being produced in this country, that is, of the bulbs that could be grown here.

On Jan. 1, 1926, there will be an embargo placed on bulbs which will prohibit any importation of bulbs, except for scientific purposes. This is done because of the fear of introducing certain insect pests and plant diseases, but at the same time it will make a very good opportunity for the bulb growers of our own country. We are told that there will be little danger of over-production for many years as there is little stock in the country.

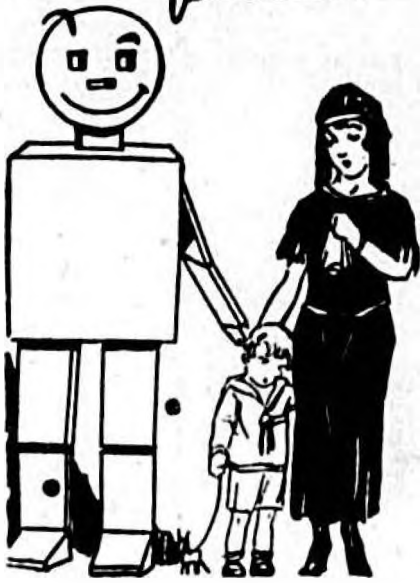
U. S. BUREAU PREDICTS MORE COLD WEATHER

THE TACNA-ARICA AWARD

THE ROOSEVELT TRADITION
NEW YORK WORLD
Discussing his coming scientific expedition into the wilds of Antarctica, Theodore Roosevelt made a modest request of the newspaper men. If they must say that he was following in the footsteps of his father, he urged that they should at least add a certain footnote. Now that was surely a modest request. But at the moment all that can be said is that Mr. Roosevelt intends to follow his father's footsteps. Whether he actually follows that big track is another question. For ourselves, if, as all the father's expeditions returned, and if, as and when it father's the bacon, as all the father's expeditions brought home the bacon, we agree to add the recomended footnote, which was: "It takes a tough man to do it."

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Democrats and Insurgents
Charles Beecher Warren, whom President Coolidge would have as attorney-general, may not have an opportunity to become a member of the cabinet if the will of Congress is further borne out. With a suddenness which astounded even the most alert political observers, the senate Tuesday by a vote of forty-one to thirty-nine, put its stamp of disapproval on the president's selection.

Warren's nomination was one of the matters which the sixty-eighth congress left undecided. When the present special session was called, foremost among the things awaiting the decision was the Warren nomination. President Coolidge was especially anxious for action on the subject, as the office of attorney-general, since Harlan F. Stone's elevation to the Supreme Court, has been vacant.

After Monday's session, during which Warren was alternately defended and assailed because of his former connections with the Havana sugar interests in Michigan, the senate adjourned to resume the controversy on Tuesday. The Tuesday morning session brought the senate no nearer a decision—at least indications at the noon recess hour pointed that way. Vice President Dawes had been assured prior to the recess hour that there would be no vote before adjournment that afternoon.

The senate reconvened after lunch, expecting a full afternoon of discussion. The wave of oratory was short-lived and a vote was soon called. Even this sudden turn of events failed to disturb the administration leaders who were quietly confident that they could match their opponents' strength if necessary even to summit Mr. Dawes, who was resting quietly at his hotel more than a mile away.

As the roll call proceeded slowly, it became apparent that those opposing Mr. Warren's nomination were present in full strength while the administration leaders, taken unawares, had failed to marshal their forces. A hurried call was sent out to bring in absent members. The Vice President was called and urged to rush post-haste to the capitol building. In the meantime the Democrats, sensing victory within their grasp, vigorously demanded that the roll call be closed. Republican leaders resorted to strategy. Senator Reed of Pennsylvania changed his vote from living to dead and then presented a motion which would bring the question up for reconsideration. This changed the vote from forty and forty to forty-one to thirty-nine. The Democrats retained a majority with a motion to lay the question on the table and demand a final roll call. This resulted in a forty-four vote and Senator Owen of Oregon, the only Democrat who had been voting for the confirmation, changed his vote to yes just as Mr. Dawes entered the chamber, making the final count forty-one to thirty-nine. Under senate rules it was a final and irrevocable action.

On the final vote the Democrats were solid against the appointment. They were aided by Shipstead, the Farm-Labor senator and those from Michigan, Borah and Johnson, and eight other Republicans, including Senator Reed, who voted for strategic reasons, and the group of insurgent senators. It was a decided triumph for the Democrats and sweet revenge for that little group of insurgents, who but a short time ago were banished from party councils and forced to relinquish seniority on committees. Repudiation of the Warren nomination demonstrated two things—that the Democrats, with the aid of the insurgents and several independent thinkers, with the aid of Borah of Idaho and Johnson of California, may prove a serious menace to the legislation of the administration during the next two years and that even though the insurgents have been read out of their party, they will have the satisfaction of knowing that the balance of power lies within their grasp and because of that fact may yet see the time when overtures will be made to them by those who cast them out.

BENJAMIN FRANKLIN wrote this letter to a man whom he was loaning money: "I send you here with ten dollars. Do not pretend to give such a sum. I only need it to you. You can't fail of getting into some kind of business that will in time enable you to pay all your debts. In that case when you meet with another man in similar distress, you must pay by loaning this sum to him, enjoining him to discharge the debt by a like operation with, enjoining him to discharge with another opportunity. I hope it may be of some use to you. This is a trick of mine for doing a great deal of good with little money."

The Air Fleet Question.

WEDNESDAY the big steamer President Arthur of the American Palestine line will face the Holy Land. Passengers, 600 of them, on the first trip, will land at Jerusalem as Milwaukee is to Chicago, and much nearer.

THAT PERHAPS is the first distinctly Jewish steamship that ever crossed the ocean. It will be strictly "kosher," which means that all food will be selected and prepared in accordance with the laws of Moses.

IT WOULD interest that ancient law giver, if he could see the New York to Palestine steamer traveling without sails, crossing the Atlantic Ocean, of which probably, he never heard, and talking by wireless to Jerusalem and New York at the same time.

PERHAPS the old lawgiver, if he could see the refuelinging plant on the kosher ship, would say, "You need not be quite so strict about lobsters, and some other things. We had no lobster when I wrote those laws."

THE OLD Phoenicians, daring Semitic race living at the Eastern end of the Mediterranean, brave sailors and cousins of the Jews, would like to see that ship of a day in the hand of 1925. They sailed out just Gibraltar, riding the Atlantic as far as England, and still have several tons of the sight of land without a compass.

How they would stare at this ship coming eastward over the ocean, smoke pouring from its funnels, sailing almost to the doors of Phoenicia's Temple, for which the Phoenicians supplied so much fire.

THE PRESIDENT Arthur will make the round trip to Palestine every sixty days. The line was established to facilitate and encourage travel to Jerusalem and will doubtless be highly successful.

R. McGINNIS, of Panama, now in Los Angeles, says the Panama Canal is quite safe from attack by planes of the battleships. But says he "an enemy fleet with airplane carriers, anchoring somewhere out of our knowledge, might be able to obstruct it in such a way as to make it useless."

THE OFFICERS report that the ship theoretically attacking the coast were theoretically destroyed by submarines. Also army officers give an interesting report of tests made in San Francisco night before last in connection with the fight of the city against aircraft.

ONE LONG airplane used in the test flew across the city. Theoretically dropping enough bombs to destroy half the city. Four big, the sharp-eyed crews of a battery of 75 centimeter anti-aircraft guns never caught a glimpse of the attacking plane which flew over the city at its own sweet will.

MAJOR J. S. PRATT commanded the test. He has already made the report, showing that San Francisco is in the mercy of attacking airplanes. The Secretary of War must take action there, and reduce Major Pratt to a corporal or a sergeant, otherwise the antiaircraft industry will not be safe.

CHARLES CHAPLIN, who has supplied millions of Americans with excellent amusement and spends his money here, millions that his pictures earn in other countries, also brought in his mother-in-law, the last seventy years of age. Now the land of the free tells her gruffly to get out, and go to some other country. There is no danger of her becoming "a public character." Her son makes more than a million a year.

It would harm no one if that old lady were allowed to end her days here, enjoying her son's success in her old age.

England Imports Many Freaks From Every Known Part Of The Universe

LONDON, Mar. 9.—Many queer cargoes arrive in ports of Great Britain during the course of a year, but perhaps the queerest was one from Mexico during December. This consisted of 13 tons of dried flies for use in manufacture of paint. Dried flies also come from Brazil, but these are utilized in the mixing of food for poultry and pheasants.

Manifests of cargoes carried in steamers often make strange reading to anyone but the initiated, and the average man, seeing that a case of waiurus whiskers was carried in a steamer would hardly imagine they were to be utilized for toothpicks at fashionable hotels.

Snails and frogs come into London for use at Soho restaurants, and twice each year a vessel from China brings Chinese dried foods for the Chinese population of England. Sea slug, sharks fin, the nest of the sea swallow, and other strange luxuries, are also imported in fairly large quantities.

Tobacco Campaign Begun 300 Years Ago

LONDON, Mar. 14.—Some of the first books ever published on tobacco, for and against its use, are to be sold in March when the Brillwell Court Library will be offered to the highest bidders.

The defense of tobacco is represented by a copy of a book which came to light in 1602 entitled "Dr. Bellamy's New and Short Defense of Tobacco." Attacks on the use of the newly discovered weed for smoking purposes were frequent in those days and simultaneously with Dr. Bellamy's defense, there appeared another book, "Work for Chimney Sweepers," designed as a warning to tobacco users. In this work consumers were informed that it was "better to choke with English hemp than poisoned with Indian tobacco."

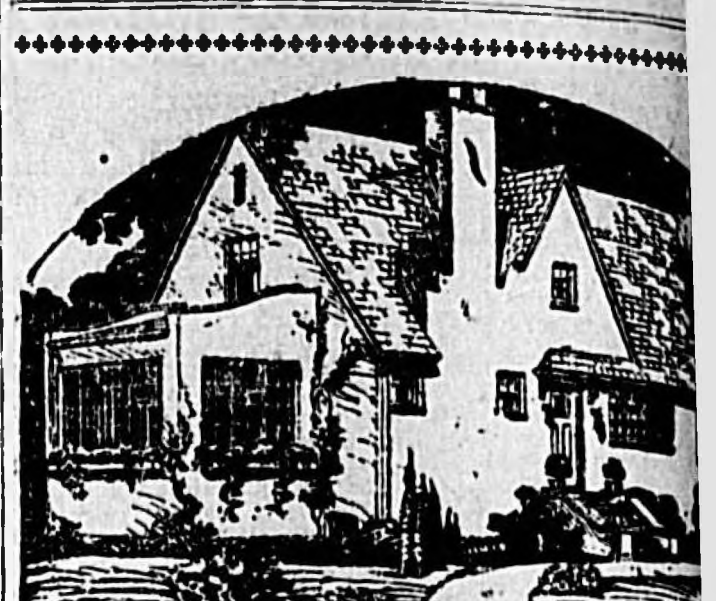
