






### Outlook Is Dim For School Span

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - It seems likely that for the present the

students of Altamonte Elementary School, will continue to cross State Road 436 as usual. In a Dec. 10, 1969, resolution the City Council of Altamonte Springs requested that the state Department of Transportation do a study on the

feasibility of constructing a pedestrian overpass at Altamonte Elementary and State Road 436. This construction would cost a purported C. A. Benedict, district engineer of the State De-

partment of Transportation has informed Rolfe Wagner, Altamonte Springs City clerk, that the study was conducted on Jan. 14, 1970, and the findings did not indicate the necessity of an overpass at this location. The results of the study showed 29 students crossing State Road 436 from 5:30 a.m. to 9 a.m. and 34 crossing between 3:15 p.m. and 4 p.m.

Benedict stated that these students were adequately protected by the presence of a deputy sheriff and a woman school guard. In addition there is an overhead flashing school sign indicating a speed of 15 mph. The City Council does not agree that these safe-

ruards are sufficient. It is in the process of drafting another resolution which also will be submitted to the Department of Transportation and to the Board of County Commissioners. Wagner stated there is some confusion arising

from the fact that the school is in the county as are many of the students while the highway, itself, has been annexed by the City of Altamonte Springs.

The Altamonte Springs sanitary sewer construction program is scheduled for completion in September of this year.

While there are many differ- to connect with the system within 90 days of the completion date. There will be an assessed fee for this initial connection which is described by one city official as "nominal." This fee together with federal loans and grants, and the regular use charge will enable the sewer treatment plant to be self-supporting from the start. The system is somewhat unique for a city the size of Altamonte Springs in that the plant is designed to return palatable water completely free from all wastes and the nutrients which are normally allowed to remain in treated water.







Florida has so voted programs with inbuilt increases that to fulfill the mandate of preparing a balanced

budget, new tax money must be found. The Askew attack was not however to indulge in high-sounding phrases with more heat than light

He had campaigned on tax reform and reform would be a main objective. But the need was not in the future. The need is now. This governor was ready with suggestions and bills to accomplish this

A first step would be to have the legislature send to the people for decision by ballot, a constitutional amendment enabling a tax on earnings of corporations "and other artificial entities as opposed to natural persons." In asking for this tax, the Governor stated:

"Aside from the question of need, there is here a very basic question of equity. Our research indicates that Florida now taxes its large corporations at practically the lowest level in the United States."

The challenges are great both for the executive and the legislative branches. There is no minimizing the stir which has started to take place and will become more and more apparent as this concept of responsible government takes shape in deeds.

The important and proper handling of the powerful insurance industry - already an issue shaking state governments from coast to coast - is such an issue. Again we believe the governor has looked at

this with clear eyes and responsible vision. In reminding the legislature that the 120 day moratorium, voted in October, which held automobile insurance rate increases in check would end on Feb. 6th. and that the legislators at that time (of whom he was one) had promised remedial laws, he asked such action as an act of good faith.

As for the insurance companies, Governor Askew pointed out: "I hope the industry will consider

this gravest of governmental chal- this governor is engaged in what he describes as these recommendations made in good faith and will unfairly restrict basiness."

The special session has now been extended through Feb. 3rd. Vigorous debate will take place. For these and other issues which must be faced deserve and should get from the legislators the same kind of responsible consideration as the governor has

The challenge is immediate and grave. To permit a legislative morass of involved processing which would make a quicksand into which the Askew proposals would sink and be lost would be a tragedy. All over the nation and at every level of government the pressure for reform which would allow government to reflect the public will and meet public

needs is mounting. Here in Florida, under the Askew leadership and with all of the capacity which is within our legislative bodies, could emerge an accomplishment which would deserve national recognition when this special session is concluded.

New Target

#### Doubtful Vols

Skepticism is mounting in Congress and the Pentagon toward the idea that the United States of America can abandon the draft by July I and shift to all-volunteer armed forces.

New studies of the motivation of military volunteers have been completed by the Defense Department. They indicate that the Gates Commission,

which offered a formula last year for achieving an all-volunteer army, was too optimistic in its estimate of how many young men would volunteer for military duty if the prospect of being drafted were removed. It could take much more than the \$3 billion

in pay increases and other benefits proposed by the Gates Commission to make military service attractive enough to produce volunteers in the numbers and the quality the armed forces need.

With the current restraints on the defense budget, an early end to the draft becomes all the more unrealistic.

Roger T. Kelly, assistant secretary of defense for manpower, touches the heart of the matter when he points out that "theoretical advocates" of an ali-volunteer army tend to overlook what is perhaps the most important factor to be considered - the military needs of the

The international commitments of the United States and the practical and continuing threats to our national security are really what should determine the size and composition our armed forces.

We are indeed in trouble if budget restraints and the politically popular notion of doing away Domestic Commentary with the draft are allowed to override that basic consideration.

Blanchard S., Boyce, La., writes: "I'd like to oe a barber. How do I train for the job, and once I do, will there be many jobs open?"

Dear Blanchard: Turnover of barbers is expected to result in several thousand job openings per year in the next decade. Openings also will occur as a growing population demands more barbering services.

Almost all states require a license obtained after graduation from a state-approved barber school. In addition, baroer applicants must meet certain health requirements and have completed at least the eighth

After working one or two years as a licensed apprentice. a candidate takes an exam to qualify as a registered barber. Earnings usually depend upon

commissions or combined wages and tips. Weekly earnings in 1968 ranged from \$85 to \$125 for apprentices and from \$125 to \$160 for experienced barbers.

ests or in ity parks or hed gerows, make valuable contributions of many kinds. In addition to pro iding shade and besuty and cutting down on noise and pollution, they also improve the quality of the air by removing carbon dioxide and giving off oxygen.

Mulch formed by leaves and twigs helps to conserve water for drinking, dome tic and agricultural purposes as well as for recreation and water power. Forests are essential for good fishing. Trees also add to the quantity and quality of wild game.

Tree buds and fruit, and even young trees themselves, serve as food for many birds and animals. Many types of game use older trees for cover and concealment. Forests also provide a beautiful and often esdoor recreation activities.

It will pay us in many ways to manage our wooded areas wisely, both rural forests and city shade trees. Without our trees, we would have less air and water, a less enjoyable environment and fewer outdoor

Stop being a pack rat, Keep enly what you really need or want. The trash can or givesway box is a great storage de-

Store articles, don't hide them. Articles that you use frequently should get more accessible storage than those you seldom use. The inexpensive cardboard storage boxes make a marvelous way to get or well-labeled boxes are also

a smart idea. Take care of the things you store. Some articles need special consideration - observe their storage requirements. Most storage needs indicate that the area be dry and cool.

Find new storage space. Look for unused nooks and corners. For example, try placing a lower row for blouses in your closets. Put pegboard with special hangers on your garage walls for extra space. Narrow shelves on an unused wall area, or storage under stairs, are other ways to stretch storage space. Score more intelligently. Think before you buy something you don't really need

Keep clothes uncrumpled, shoes unscrambled, and whatever is in drawers will be uncrushed. Think before you throw things in the backs of closets, under beds of stairways, or in the bottom cup-

The blaze, spreading rapidly due to the prolonged drought conditions and a brisk wind, threatened 15 area homes, Damage, however, was limited to one structure, an unoccupied building. Estimates of forest and pasture land destroyed ranged as high as 640 acres. The fire was contained in an area bordered on

the west by Oakland Hills subdivision and Green Acres trailer park and on the east by Spring Valley. At one point flames came within 100 feet of the homes in this area. No injuries were reported.

## Luna Landing In Doubt

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) - The Apollo 14 crew, using a flashlight and radioed do it-yourself instruction, tried unsuccessfully today to pinpoint the cause of a malfunction that threatens to wipe out their long-sought landing on the forbidding moonscape of

Alan B. Shepard Jr., the patriarch of American spacemen, and rookies Edgar D. Mitchell and Stuart A. Roosa deliberately tried for more than an hour to make

a linking mechanism fail to work—as it had when they attempted to dock their command ship with the lunar

"It works," Roosa said finally, "Just real fine," The apparatus must be able to work for its next use, when Shepard and Mitchell would return from the lunar surface to link again with the command ship piloted by Roosa.

"We will have to convince ourselves . . . that the thing is indeed satisfactory for docking," said Sigurd
