Wednesday, funnyman Hope charged the network with censorship when executives sought to eliminate commercial plugs from a sketch in which the comedian portrays Herman Payola, a disreputable disc jockey on radio station KLPJ.

Network officials, who scissored plugs for the Edsel car, Blue Cross and Diners Club from other parts of the program but passed a free mention of Timex watches, called the settlement with Hope a compromise.

"I claim victory," Hope said. "The plugs in the sketch were an important part of the comedy. Payola is an old story to me. People have been sending me stuff for years. Usually not for a direct

plug, but at Christmas time, or out of the clear blue sky when I haven't even mentioned their products.

Hope was quick to add he never used a trade name unless there is a better than average laugh in it.

"I will have no part of accepting payola and I have always asked my crew never to get mixed up with the pluggers," said Hope, a multi-millionaire who needs the money like he needs a nose bob.

Eisenhower said a successful "food for peace" campaign would bring full and prosperous lives to families and replace the threat of war with friendship among nations, ending forever the fear and suspicion that breeds wars.

Cubans Arrest Newsman Charged In Aiding Escape

HAVANA (UPI) — Cuban authorities said today they are holding Miami Herald reporter James Buchanan on charges of "involvement" in Austin Young's escape from prison Wednesday, even though the reporter was in Miami at the time.

An army spokesman said Buchanan was arrested Thursday as he entered the room in Havana's St. John Hotel where Young had been recaptured earlier. He said the Miami newsman was carrying iodine and bandages, presumably to treat the minor injuries Young suffered in his dramatic prison break.

Young and Buchanan are being held at military intelligence headquarters here.

Two other U. S. newsmen, NBC cameraman Carlos Santos and Luis Rivas, were arrested and held briefly Thursday in the western town of Consuelo del Sur, where they were filming the army's house-to-house search for Young.

Santos and Rivas were released after being questioned by intelligence agents. It was not immediately certain whether they were allowed to keep their film.

Young, a former Houstonian who now lives in Miami, was unrepentant about the alleged anti-government activity that resulted in his being sentenced to prison for 30 years.

"I'd do it all over again if I were given the chance," he told newsmen.

The recaptured American seemed equally unconcerned about the possibility that an additional penalty might be imposed on him because of his escape from the prison in Pinar del Rio.

"What does another 20 years mean on top of the 30 I've already got?" he grinned.

When he was asked about the Miami reporter, Young replied, "Who's Buchanan?" To all questions about his escape, he gave the same answer: "I don't remember."

Guard Sent In To Halt Violence

ALBERT LEA, Minn. (UPI) — National Guardsmen in full battle dress rolled into strike town Albert Lea today to put the town under martial law and prevent further violence at the strike-bound Wilson & Co. meatpacking plant.

More than 100 citizens — some routed from their beds early this morning — began arriving shortly after 6 a. m. They wore green fatigue uniforms, steel helmets and had bayonets fixed on their M-1 rifles.

A jeering crowd of about 800, many of them striking meatpackers, watched from across the street as some of the troops took up positions around the plant, ordered closed by the National Guard.

The throng dispersed about a half-hour later when a guard officer, Lt. Col. Paul Meyers, spoke over a public address system and told the people that under military orders it was unlawful to congregate in large numbers.

Maj. George Roobe of Austin, Minn., stood guard outside a gate turning away non-union production employees reporting for work.

"This plant is closed," Roobe said in a monologue in each work area. "There is martial law. There will be no production. Go home."

Gov. Orville L. Freeman ordered Albert Lea and surrounding Warbonnet County placed under martial law to preserve order between strikers and non-union employees at the Wilson plant.

The Minnesota governor said he was acting in response to pleas from city officials.

Freeman signed the proclamation declaring martial law early this morning in his offices in St. Paul, Minn.

The governor also scheduled a meeting today with Wilson President James D. Cooney in an effort to head off further trouble.

Freeman, professing alarm at the "apparent breakdown" in negotiations, sent telegrams Thursday to Cooney and UFW President Ralph Helstein asking for the parley.

However, a Wilson spokesman said he had been informed that Helstein had been asked to meet with federal mediators in St. Paul, Minn., and emphasized that Cooney would only talk with Freeman.

More than 1,000 residents of this southern Minnesota town looked on Thursday while yelling pickets hurled stones and snowballs at non-striker's cars leaving the plant.

At least two persons were injured and more than 20 cars damaged in the outburst of violence at the strike-bound plant.

Police stood by and watched while stones rattled against the cars. Some officers were laughing and joking.

One officer who saw a man hurl a stone at a passing car, walked up, tapped the striker on the shoulder and said gently, "watch it." No arrests were reported.

Temperatures rose 10 to 20 degrees over the mid and upper Mississippi Valley and the weather bureau predicted warmer weather for New England today.

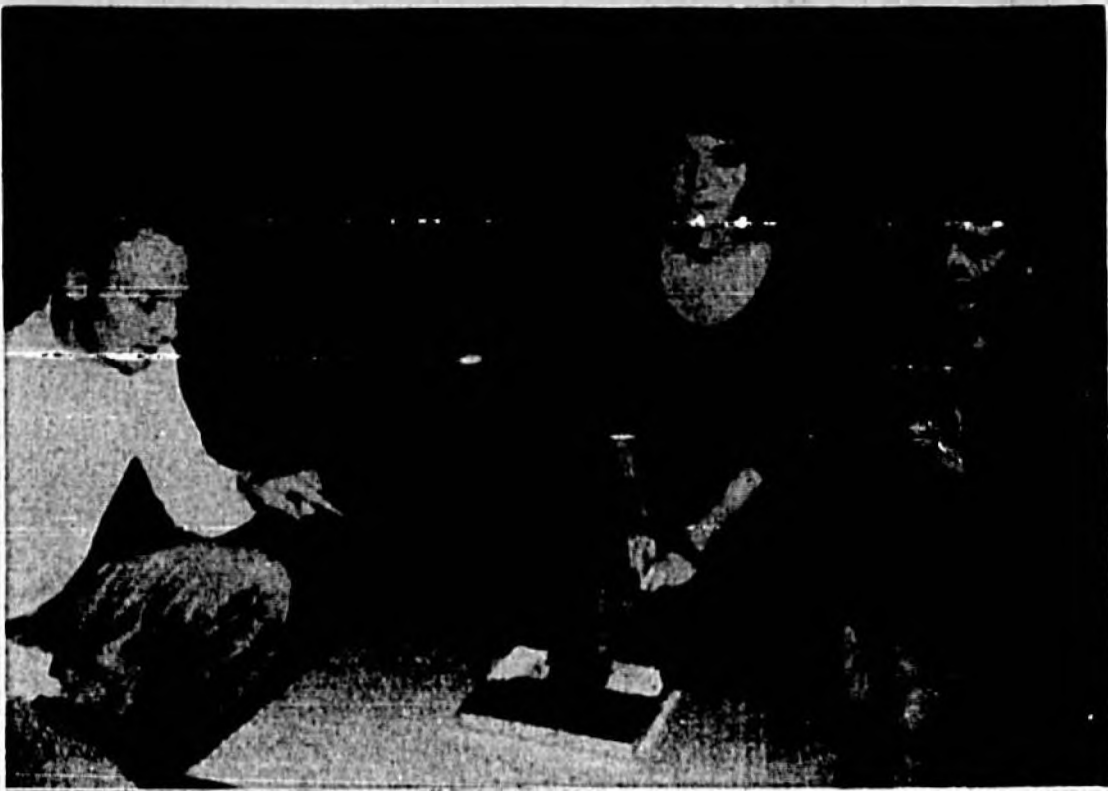
Light rain or drizzle was forecast for the Pacific Northwest, with snow spreading into Montana and Wyoming.

Housewives Assured It's Safe To Buy Chickens

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Food stores and wholesalers moved today to halt the sale of chickens treated with a sex hormone which has produced cancer in experimental animals.

The action followed an announcement by the government Thursday that the poultry industry had agreed voluntarily to withdraw the chickens from the market.

Arthur S. Flemming, secretary

of health, education and welfare said scientists had found the chemical, a synthetic hormone called stilbestrol, to be a potential danger to humans.

However, he stressed the treated birds constituted less than 1 percent of the chickens sent to market. The chemical is used only in caponettes.

Flemming said housewives could buy chicken with complete confidence because the poultry industry and retailers had pledged to halt immediately the sale of the treated birds.

He announced also that manufacturers of the chemical had agreed to stop the sale of the hormone to poultry producers, who had used it to encourage growth of bigger chickens with more white meat.

But behind the scenes, it was known the Agriculture Department was very unhappy with Flemming's action.

Agriculture Undersecretary True D. Morse promptly issued a statement saying that Flemming had acted "within his responsibilities" but American food was "the best and safest in the world."

Morse said the Agriculture Department inspects all poultry and meat that moves across state lines and confiscates any diseased or unwholesome products.

The action was the second taken by Flemming in connection with chemicals said to produce cancer in animals. He caused a furor two weeks before Thanksgiving when he advised housewives not to buy cranberries because part of the crop was contaminated with a weed-killer that caused cancer in rats.

Untainted cranberries were put back on sale after a safety inspection by the government and industry.

Flemming said poultry treated with stilbestrol and withdrawn from sale would be purchased by the Agriculture Department. He said the birds could be made safe because residues are confined to the skins, livers, and kidneys of treated birds.

Caterpillar Tractor, a dominant producer of earthmoving equipment, and with a strong world-wide dealer organization.

Clevite Corp., a leading maker of sleeve-type bearings and bushing for autos and farm equipment.

Ford Motor has notably improved its competitive position in recent years under aggressive management and even more important, profit margins have been brought up nicely.

International Tel. & Tel. Jones & Laughlin Steel.

Standard Packaging, an important container producer for the food industry.

United Fruit, by far the largest banana enterprise, with lesser activities including shipping, sugar, minor tropical crops, and oil exploration.

The choice of the above is made with this fundamental in mind: "They represent well-established companies, and should fare better than the general run of stocks in the year ahead."

Standard & Poor's "The Outlook" has named ten stocks for Action expected to outperform the market in 1960. They are Clevite Corp., Columbia Broadcasting, Ford Motor Co., Jones & Laughlin, Lockheed Aircraft, Motorola, Inc., Olin Mathieson, Standard Packaging, U. S. Borax & Chemical, and White Motor.

Do you notice the similarity of recommendations between both services?

Among S & P's list of 41 stocks that should be sold because they are believed to offer less-than-average market appeal, either because of price or relatively unpromising

prospects were found: Benguet Consolidated Inc., Graham-Paige, Technicolor, Greer Hydraulics, and United Stores.

In the list of 30 of the best low-priced stocks, which do not necessarily imply low quality, but are all "well-situated companies with promising prospects" were found American Airlines, Avco Corporation, Celanese Corporation, Smith-Douglas, Florida Power Corp., Beneficial Finance, and Marine Midland, Corp.

According to Standard & Poor, "low-priced stocks are ideally suited for the small investor, enabling him to obtain a degree of diversification not possible in the higher price brackets."

Ring Immortal Found Dead In Hotel

NEW YORK (UPI) — Official identification must be made on a morgue slab today of the body of Tony Canzoneri, the ring immortal whose face was known to millions but who was found dead and alone in his hotel room at dusk Thursday.

In the Bellevue Morgue the exact cause of death also must be determined, although comedian Joey Adams, former vaudeville partner of the three-time champion, declared with a half-sob: "Tony had been dead 'about two days' before he was found."

Attendees at the hotel said Tony had been dead "about two days" before he was found. A friend, and bellboy Frank Medici found him sprawled on his bed. "A 'don't disturb' sign on the door had prevented the hotel

maids from going into the room. Ironically, it was "heart" that made the muffed-faced, black-haired battler the scourge of four divisions during his 15-year career of 178 professional bouts. He had remarkable skill and punch and ruggedness, but as was

heart — blazing courage — that sent him swarming into every opponent he ever faced. And he faced the best bantamweights, featherweights, lightweights and welterweights of his era, from 1925 through 1937, inclusive.

"He's got the heart," said Pete Herman of New Orleans — then world bantamweight champion who later became blind. "He's got the greatest heart I ever saw," said Herman, and he sent the 16-year-old shoe shine boy to New York. Tony carried a note to Sammy Goldman, who became his manager and remained his pilot throughout Tony's career.

Davis, a senior, leads Syracuse into a Cotton Bowl game against

He was the No. 1 choice of the Chicago Bears in the National Football League player draft and also was picked by Denver in the draft of the new American Football League. So far he's given no hint of which way he'll turn.

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Assignment Washington

WASHINGTON — The nine tax experts, attired quietly, sat before the House taxing committee, and what they were doing in effect was putting their hands in the pockets of about 90 million U. S. taxpayers.

What I couldn't quite figure out was: Were they trying to put money in the taxpayers' pockets—or take some out? The way things went, I don't think even they knew.

The subject was "Personal income tax deductions." One tax man mentioned that to just plan "loop holes."

The nine gentlemen were paraded before Rep. Wilbur Mills (D., Ark.) and his Ways and Means Committee, a group that, loosely defined, means: a committee to find ways to tax a taxpayer and the means to collect it from him.

The experts and the dour-faced Congressmen all agreed they were here for one purpose: to find methods of reducing income taxes.

Samuel Hellenbrand, tax counselor for the New York Central Railroad, said maybe that could be accomplished by — of all things — eliminating personal deductions.

How would that save anybody any money? Well, explained the tax man, if nobody gets deductions, then it would mean \$30 million more in a year's time for Uncle Sam. And if Uncle S. had that

much more owed him in a year, he could cut everybody's taxes to total that amount. Follow?

This was a taxpayer's only choice would be the "short form," with greater exemptions built in for everybody.

If a "new look" would come to income taxes, Representative Mills figures the highest bracket would be reduced from the present 91 percent to about 65 percent of income.

This then would mean that a wealthy philanthropist donated a slug of money to a school, church or charity, he'd have more dough at hand, but the contributions would come out of his pocket directly.

Panelist Frank Sparks, New York tax attorney, who was interrupted in the interests of higher learning, hissed. He said colleges which depend on contributions

from the wealthy wouldn't like that too well. This would reduce their cash gifts if such contributions weren't income-tax deductible.

Congressman Mills' voice ruffled from the cellar and he retorted: "I thought philanthropists made ed in his chair, cleared his throat contributions from their hearts."

Rep. Noah Mason (R., Ill.) jiggled and took Mills' expression of idealism to task.

"I'm a decent sort of chap," said Mason, a church man and Sunday School teacher for more than 50 years. "And I have a big heart. When I give \$1,000 to a church I have it in the back of my mind that Uncle Sam is giving \$400 of it and I am giving only \$600."

Mason figured he was getting a bargain that way.

This business of so-called loop holes got Rep. Howard Baker (R., Tenn.) thinking. He asked expert Hellenbrand: "Just what is a loop hole?"

Deadpan, the tax man replied: "A loop hole is a deduction that I can't make use of."

When I left the big money talkers in their gold draped committee room, I concluded that what we needed to make us all happy was more loop holes, including an equal number for Uncle Sam.

That way, like Congressman Mason, we'd all think we were getting away with something.

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Space Project Saturn Almost Ready

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. (UPI) — Sometime around Jan. 20, 1960, doors on a big shed will swing open and out will roll the behemoth of American space efforts, the super-boosted first stage of the Saturn vehicle.

Project Saturn—the main U. S. hope of putting up "heavy" satellites—has been caught in a cross-fire of politics, rivalries, economy cuts and many-sided personalities.

It is coming along much too slowly to suit the eager Von Braun scientific team that wants more than anything to catch and pass Russia in the exploration of the heavens.

A visit to a couple of buildings here dispels the thought, however, that people are simply sitting on their hands while the high level reorganization of the U. S. space program, including Saturn's role in it, spins between Huntsville and Washington.

A team of 137 production men and 12 supervisors are into the final phase of building the great fuel tanks that will feed the take-off engines of the Saturn. The thing is so big it may have to go to Cape Canaveral by river barge.

The project is progressing under what remains of a 70 million dollar appropriation for the Saturn project. This is about half of what was wanted by Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris, who retires Jan. 31 from the Army as head of the Ordnance Missile Command, and Dr. Werner von Braun.

Von Braun, the former German scientist, gets the job next year of producing big boosters like Saturn and the still-newer Nova single engine, million-plus pound thrust for the National Aeronautics and Space Agency. Von Braun blamed Medaris' resignation and this country's lagging space achievements on too-little backing from Congress. He now appears happy over reorganization that will put the space venture under NASA.

Compared to other U. S. space vehicles, Saturn will be a giant. The first stage alone, the part being put together now, is 24 feet wide and 80 feet high. This stage is actually eight Jupiter-type missiles tied together.

The second and third stages have not been finally decided upon. But part of a Titan for the second and a now-being-developed Centaur for the third are being discussed.

The finished product is expected to be 200 feet high and weigh 800 tons loaded.

Development of these upper stages will keep Saturn out of space until at least 1963, even if Congress appropriates hurry-up funds for the project. The vital first stage will be ready to test in a few months.

Even of the booster's eight 70-inch tanks are almost finished. Now in fabrication is the giant 105-inch center section. The engine, that will be hooked to the rear of this cluster of fuel tanks are ready in a nearby building.

At the present rate of construction, the booster will be completed by Jan. 20, according to officials here. It will then be hoisted to a modified Jupiter test tower a few miles away and put through rigid static tests before being shipped to Cape Canaveral, where a launching pad is being built to launch it with dummy upper stages.

Current thinking centers on a special barge that would pick up the Saturn at Huntsville on the Tennessee Valley Authority lake system. It would move down in the Tennessee River, up the Tennessee to the Ohio at Paducah, Ky., over to the Mississippi at Cairo, Ill., and thence to the Gulf for a voyage around the horn of Florida. The trip would take about 17 days.

There also is a plan under consideration to secure the great package beneath a blimp for a faster trip to Florida.

New Cyprus President Takes Office Sunday

A black-bearded priest of the Greek Orthodox Church becomes the newly-elected president of a newly-born state on Sunday (Dec. 13).

He is Archbishop Makarios II. The new state is Cyprus, an island about the size of New Jersey containing approximately a half million people of whom four-fifths are of Greek origin.

The new vice president will be Fazil Katchuk, a man of Turkish origin.

The constitution of the new republic provides that the president be Greek, the vice president Turkish. Both Makarios and Katchuk are assured of election.

The elections Sunday are a prelude to the actual date when Cyprus is supposed to take over its own destiny, which is Feb. 19.

It will be a state with a bloody past and an uncertain future.

Cyprus' strategic location, 10 miles off Turkey in the eastern Mediterranean, has made it a favorite target of conquerors for more than 2,000 years, beginning with Alexander the Great.

Its most recent history of violence began with demands of the Greek majority for "enosis" (union with Greece), a proposal violently opposed by the Turkish minority, as well as by Turkey.

In the resulting dispute, involving Britain, Greece and Turkey in addition to Cyprus itself, Makarios became the political firebrand and a man named Col. George Grivas, the leader of the fighting underground.

Washington See-Saw

If you are unhappy about Uncle Sam's way of figuring your income tax and if you have what you think is a better plan—Congressman Syd Herlong is your man. The big difference between you and Herlong is this: he is in a position (maybe) to do something about it. He is not only in the Congress of the United States, he is a member of the tax-law-writing Ways and Means Committee. We put the "maybe" in there because he is only one of 26 members of the Committee and all he can do is fight for what he thinks is right.

And he's doing that. He has written the "Herlong Tax Reform Bill" and even though the Congress is in recess, he is still in Washington, attending hearings before the Committee aimed at working out a better income tax program.

"My bill," Herlong says, "provides for a reduction in tax rates for the purpose of aiding people who want to invest their money in business expansion. I like to use the illustration of the retail merchant who finds that his sales have dropped off and that his earnings are down. He doesn't immediately increase his prices in order to make up for his losses. That would be foolish.

"But, that is the principle that the Government has followed for a long time. When Congress finds that the Government is running at a loss, they have in the past merely raised our taxes.
"Under my plan, we are trying to do as the merchant does. He puts on a sale, or puts in a new line of merchandise. In short, he

creates an incentive for people to buy. One of the big problems in the Country today is a shortage of investment capital."

Herlong explained that he feels that our tax structure should be changed to give businessmen a real incentive to reinvest and expand their businesses. He pointed out that in 1970 there will be 20 million new workers looking for jobs. "I think," he said, "it is up to the Congress to make it possible to release enough capital to make jobs for these workers. The increased income, taxed at a lower rate than now, would return to the Government more than we are now receiving."

The hearings that are now going on before the Ways and Means Committee are aimed primarily at fact gathering. Every phase of the tax picture is being discussed: expense accounts, depreciation and replacement, depletion allowances, capital gains, taxation of the co-operatives, pension plans, reduction and the possible taxation of municipal bonds. Those appearing before the Committee include some of the nation's top economists and businessmen.

"I think," Herlong said, "that there are too many college professors coming before the Committee rather than practical thinking businessmen. Up to now in the hearings we have had a surplus of theoretical suggestions." One thing for sure—the Herlong Bill will be a top subject in the upcoming session of Congress.

Movies Popular In Red Warsaw

WARSAW (UPI) — Movie theaters provide Warsaw with its most popular form of entertainment, according to a recent survey by the Polish Ministry of Culture.

Of 1,417 persons queried, 67 per cent said they went to the movies at least once a month, compared with 18 per cent who said they attended sports events regularly, 14 per cent who go to the theater and 4 to 6 per cent who visit museums.

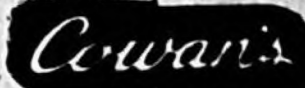
Only 6 per cent said they never went to see a film, while 24 per cent never ventured into a theater, 28 per cent skipped museums and 50 per cent stayed away from all special artistic and cultural exhibitions.

The survey also sought to determine why people do not attend cultural events. It found that 33 per cent blame the high price of tickets, 48 per cent the lack of leisure time, 30 per cent after-

work fatigue, 28 per cent the difficulty of obtaining tickets, 15 per cent the difficulty of finding transportation, 13 per cent the lack of suitable clothes and 9 per cent the lack of companionship.
