**Old pipe could help solve water shortage**

**SANFORD** — In terms of high-technology, the pipe ranks somewhere near the wheel as cutting-edge science.

But a 36-inch diameter tube extending into Lake Monroe a few blocks west of downtown is a key component in a state-of-the-art facility that could provide a solution for Central Florida's water woes.

The pipe is part of the city of Sanford's reclamation water augmentation plant, a \$4.5 million facility that will pump water from Lake Monroe to be used to irrigate lawns, golf courses and parks.

Installed decades ago, the pipe's original

purpose was to pump water into Lake Monroe, not draw it out.

"It was cheap to pull water out of the aquifer," said Benjamin Fries, vice president of CPH Engineering. "You drilled a hole, pumped the water, shot it with some chlorine and piped it wherever you needed it."

When the water was discharged through the sewage system, standard practice at the time called for filtering the solids and bacteria and pumping the clean effluent into the lake.

"What else were they going to do with all that water?" Fries asked. "There was plenty of water in the ground and it was too costly to reuse it."

That was before millions of residents — all wanting clean water and lush lawns — moved into the region, quickly draining underground sources of water. Some experts predict Central Florida's aquifer could run dry in 20 years if alternative water sources are not utilized.

Part of the solution, Fries said, is using

reclaimed water to irrigate.

"Why use up all the water we drink to make the grass grow?" Fries said. "You might as well buy bottled water and pour it on the ground."

Fries and his colleagues at CPH worked with the city of Sanford to design and build the reclamation plant that sits on U.S. Highway 17/92 next to Central Florida Regional Hospital. The facility was funded by a 55 percent grant from the Environmental Protection Agency. The city of Sanford, along with the city of Lake Mary and Seminole County, provided the remaining funding.

**Sanford Plaza soon to boast I-Drive flair**

**SANFORD** — The owners of the Sanford Plaza, "Sanford Plaza, Inc." have announced plans to completely remodel and restore the old shipping center, originally built in the 1950's.

The entire building will be completely remodeled with an I-Drive flair. Individual storefronts will sport different international themes, including Traditional, Colonial, Mexican, Italian, Egyptian and Grecian themes as well as featuring a collapsing Roman coliseum, a medieval castle and a racecar track.

Other renovations include increased landscaping and lighting as well as the addition of canopies that will allow patrons to enter and exit their vehicles without being exposed to rain.


In order to encourage the users of the public transit system, Sanford Plaza is negotiating with Lynx for a covered bus stop. They hope to capitalize on their new look and greater visibility from their location at Highway 17-92 and the new GreeneWay extension by attracting local business and tourist dollars.

"We want to have an awesome local center that provides on a smaller scale the type of entertainment you would expect at the tourist traps at a much lower price," said Stan Smith, a representative of the owners. "We believe families are needing local entertainment that they can afford, without all the long distance traffic."

"There is also a tremendous demand for family wholesome entertainment. I mean, where you can go with a toddler, teens, mom, dad and grandpa to have fun for all ages that is safe and clean."

One new business that will be moving into the plaza is Metro Skate Park. Scheduled to open Dec. 1, the park will include a small arcade, retail and concession areas, as well as a pro shop for skate supplies.

Other businesses include a computer/video arcade, a computer store and various restaurants.


**Sloan donates 5,000 postcards to museum**

**R**udy Sloan is a collector of history. During his lifetime, he has accumulated thousands of items that reflect the past.

**Trick-or-treat event slated for Halloween**

**SANFORD** — The city of Sanford, along with Sanford Main Street, will provide a trick-or-treat event for school-aged kids on Thursday, Oct. 31.

Beginning at 6 p.m., costumed kids and their parents can receive plenty of treats from local merchants without the threat of tricks.

"The event provides kids with a safe venue to trick-or-treat," said Marlene Frith, executive director of Main Street.

Main Street volunteers will help hand out candy and the city will provide support services by blocking off 1st Street on the night of the event. The city is also providing 5,000 flyers to area schools to inform parents of the event.

Children participating in the event should bring home plenty of sugary loot.

"Last year I believe a total of 100,000 pieces of candy were handed out," Frith said.

There is no admission charge for the event.

On the eve of Halloween, Wednesday, Oct. 30, the city is sponsoring its annual Halloween Spookella.

"It's open to all kids 12 and under," said Lisa Jones, recreation supervisor. "The event will be more of a carnival atmosphere with a costume contest and plenty of games."

The event begins at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall and continues until 8 p.m. Admission is free, but Jones said organizers are encouraging families to bring a canned good for charity.

For those who plan to participate in traditional door-to-door Halloween activities, AAA Auto Club South has issued a number of safety tips to remind parents of the need for extra caution during the trick-or-treat event.

"The risk of a child being injured or killed as a pedestrian increases on Halloween," said Yoli Buss, director of traffic safety for AAA. "Increasing trick-or-treaters' mobility and visibility at this time of year can help prevent what is really one of the leading causes of injuries to children on Halloween — falling down."

A study conducted by the Center for Disease Control shows that among pedestrians, ages 5 through 14, an average of four deaths occurred on Halloween

**Department offers tips to reduce automobile theft**

Motor vehicle theft continues to be a problem nationwide. In 1999, Sanford reported the highest number of motor vehicle thefts in Seminole County with a total of 558 reported cases.

In 2000, the number of thefts was reduced by 31.54 percent, which reflected a total of 382 vehicles reported as stolen.

However, in 2001, the thefts again increased from the previous year with 446 vehicles reported stolen. That's a total of 1,386 vehicles stolen in just a three year period, in the city of Sanford alone.

Sanford police spokeswoman Cleo Cohen said the department is constantly striving to prevent and stop theft of motor vehicles. While there are a number of things law enforcement can do to help prevent these crimes, officers suggest vehicle owners take the proactive steps to reduce the chances their automobile will be stolen.

- Park in a lighted spot when ever possible.
- Make sure all windows are closed and doors are locked.
- Always take your keys with you, even when refueling.
- Never leave your vehicle running and unattended.

- Keep all valuable items locked up and out of sight, especially high-tech items such as cell phones, television sets, and laptops.
- Park with front wheels sharply turned to the right or left, and apply the emergency brake. This will make it more difficult to tow your vehicle.
- Never hide a spare key in the vehicle.
- Activate any anti-theft devices.
- At home, lock your car and your garage.
- Police suggest vehicle owners

## Historic Trust announces plans for Holiday Home Tour

Sanford Historic Trust will host its 14th Annual Holiday Tour of Homes, with the theme, "Celebrating 125 years of history." Scheduled for Friday, Dec. 6, through Sunday, Dec. 8, the event is one of the city's premier cultural activities. This year's tour is part of the celebration surrounding the city of Sanford's 125th anniversary. Proceeds from the tour go toward street lighting in the Historic Residential District.

The event kicks-off Friday, Dec. 3 with the Candlelight Tour of Homes. Tour Headquarters will be at the Seminole Public Schools' Student Museum at 301 W. Seventh St. (corner Myrtle Avenue and 7th Street).

The Candlelight Tour of Homes is a luminary walking tour of six structures starting at the SCPS Student Museum, which dates from 1902 and has been in continuous use. Homes are along Myrtle Avenue between 5th and 8th streets. Architectural styles include Queen Anne, bungalows, and frame vernacular. The event, scheduled from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m., includes a reception, entertainment, carolers, holiday decorations and Sanford historian Charlie Carlson.

Saturday and Sunday features the Holiday Tour of Homes, from noon to 5 p.m. Tour Headquarters is Park-on-Park at the corner of Park Avenue and 8th Street.

The Holiday Tour of Homes is a walking tour of 14 structures centered on Magnolia and Park Aves. The earliest home dates from 1890 and the tour offers architectural styles Spanish colonial, colonial revival, prairie school, bungalows, and frame vernacular.

The tour starts at Park-on-Park and also includes Holy Cross Episcopal Church, the fourth oldest Episcopal Parish in the state.

Tickets for the Candlelight Tour are \$20 in advance, \$25 day of the event. Holiday Tour tickets are \$12 in advance, \$15 during the event. Children 11 and under free.


### Fight With Officer

## State Attorneys Office wants people to make a difference

The Seminole County State Attorneys Office has the answer to a pressing question — what can we do for the nationwide "Make a Difference Day" coming up Oct. 26?

What people can do is join the State Attorneys Office staff, lead by its Neighborhood State Attorney Initiative group, as it heads up a beautification project in front of Midway Elementary School, located at 2251 Jitway, in Sanford.

Volunteers are needed and will be appreciated. All people have to do is show up at the school from 8 a.m. until noon.

The project focuses on landscaping, so volunteers may want to bring work gloves and dress appropriately. All volunteers are encouraged to bring any tools they might have, such as rakes, shovels and trimmers. Lowe's Home Improvement Warehouse Store in Altamonte Springs is partnering with the Neighborhood State Attorney's Initiative, as they have for the past three years, to provide the necessary materials and supplies for the project.

This will be the 12th nationwide observation of Make a Difference Day. The project began as a way to encourage volunteer activities in individual communities by helping others.

In 2000, more than 2.2 million people participated in the event. Last year, the Seminole State Attorney's Office painted the 13th Street Rescue Mission.



The show horses — Derek Jeter and the Yankees — will watch the Series from home while the work horses — Eckstein and the Angels — battle for the world title. There are many things wrong with baseball. David Eckstein proves there is still some things right with the sport.

Good luck, David. Win or lose, you've always made us "Sanford Proud."

## Motorcycles roaring into town for annual event

Traffic on our streets and highways is out of control. Anyone disagree with that statement? But for the next few days, we have even more to worry about and be conscious of — motorcycles.

Daytona Beach is observing Biketoberfest, which officially got under way Thursday. City officials there expect possibly as many as 100,000 motorcycles will be on hand.

Here at the *Seminole Herald* on French Avenue, just looking out the front window, one can see not just a few, but possibly hundreds of bikers passing by. In many cases, there are two persons on the bike, and by just watching them, over half are not wearing helmets.

Florida changed its helmet law to allow bikers to ride without them, providing they have a certain amount of insurance. Wanna bet?

Daytona Beach has made some restrictions on certain highways and intersections in an effort to help reduce problems, but even so, when Biketoberfest is over, we will be hearing of the number of accidents and deaths recorded during this event.

For local folks possibly heading for the beach, beware of the intersection of SR-415 at Pioneer Trail, at the "Cabbage Patch" corner. They allow bikers to stay on their property during these events, and dozens are either coming or going at all times.

Therefore, with thousands of bikers in our city and on our highways, vehicular motorists must exercise more caution than ever. Most people look into sideview mirrors before changing lanes, but often, the bike could be out of view, and turning around to physically look back certainly isn't the way to drive. Don't make fast lane changes. Don't follow a motorcycle too close. Don't pull up within inches of one waiting for a stop light ahead of you. And use those directionals when planning to turn or change lanes.

Naturally, the over-use of alcohol by not only bikers but motorists as well, is going to cause an even bigger problem — and we all know that is going to happen. Drinking and driving is illegal, but this event is considered "party time" and try as we might, there is no way to prevent it.

Be aware of the thousands of motorcycles on the highways, and exercise caution. In a vehicle versus motorcycle collision, it's easy to know who will end up getting the worst of it. We don't want that to happen to anyone.

One motorcycle rider from Pennsylvania has already been killed in a crash and there have been several dozen non-fatal collisions in and around Daytona Beach. Last year there were six deaths. Let's not have that repeated.

### One church helps poor, other keeps neighbors awake

To the editor:  
I want to tell you a story of two churches.

One church has lovely bells, a large grass lot, and feeds the poor once a week. This stately old church keeps its grounds neat, trim and clean. The parishioners on Sunday come, make peace with their God, and leave.

I know that I was a bit worried, when I first moved into the area, because this church encouraged the poor, the displaced, the unwanted to come through its doors, and receive help and at times, food. I don't know what I thought was going to happen when these people came to the church, but what ever it was, it didn't happen. I can always tell when it is a night that the church is feeding the poor, because you see more people than cars, and the clothes these people are wearing aren't stylish, and the children aren't quite as clean as you see on Sunday morning. I am very proud of this church, and feel fortunate that they are still here, though the area has seen an exodus of people from the neighborhood over the years.

The other church is probably one of the reasons for the exodus from our neighborhood. This church has gone commercial and runs a for-pay day care. This church's main activities seem only to be getting paid for watching the children of working parents, and housing the local boy scouts. And you might ask, why is this so bad? The first week, I thought, well, how sweet. And then, the nightmare began.

Early one morning, around 8, my family was rudely awakened by the sound a large gas leaf blower, seemingly directly under our window. If you have ever heard one, you know. We ran over and directly complained. The man said, "Yes, the last people who used to live in your house complained, too. But the church wants this area swept, and I can only

come this time of morning." Well, then sweep the area, it's not very large, and it's a residential area. People, including children might be sleeping. Use a broom, not a commercial grade gas leaf blower. And don't do it six days a week! Our pleadings went unheeded.

The other families that live on the street have complained also, going as far as taking up a petition and sitting on the steps on Sunday morning in their pajamas as a protest. But the church doesn't care. They are not there to serve the neighborhood. They are there to collect the tithes, collect the payment on the childcare and then to leave.

We mustn't forget the Boy Scouts at the church. Who would have thought that the Boy Scouts would have the police called on them? Not I, until I called the police. I had asked them before not to run up and down the street yelling. When are the parents telling these children, please don't yell, people live here? Where is the church, reminding the Boy Scouts, that the church was built to worship God and serve the neighborhood, not disrupt the neighborhood.

The one church has the poor, the unwanted, and many unemployed people coming to its doors. Yet, still, the churchyards are clean, no one disturbs the neighbors and no one leaves trash.

However, the other church, takes it for-pay children out, and allows them to buy ice-cream, and throw their wrappers down on the ground, where neighbors have to pick them up. This church brings water out to the children playing and screaming and leaves the cups for the neighbors to constantly pickup. You can always tell when this church has some sort of function, because the neighbors are out, afterwards, cleaning up the trash.

Is there nothing to protect the neighborhood from this church? No laws that prohibit commercial grade leaf blowers? No law that says, honor thy neighbors and treat them as you wish to be treated? Just because this is a church, and doesn't have to pay taxes, do they have a right to destroy our

pursuit of happiness? Or at least our right to sleep in the mornings, or our right to have to not clean up after children who aren't even ours?

Two churches, two divergent ways to serve God. One helps the poor. The other drives the neighbors to prayer. Yes, we are praying that the church will pack up and leave.

To the editor:



# The Way We Were: Wonders of the day highlighted at World's Fair

The following items were found in a box of memorabilia given me by Lorraine Yarborough Whiting of Geneva, SHS Class of 1934. We see from the first article that Central Florida was interested in the 1933 Chicago World's Fair at which Florida was well represented.

visit first were Admiral Byrd's ship which went to the South Pole, the Sinclair exhibit with prehistoric animals, the singing color fountain in front of the Firestone Building and a visit to the Belgian Village.

As soon as they were planted in Chicago, the weather turned cool, immediately followed by an extreme hot spell. This caused the trees to blossom out of their normal season, four or five months earlier.

**World's Fair High Spots**  
In this article, Karl Lehman, secretary of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce had just returned from the 1933 Chicago

Other things not to be missed were the organ recital every 20 minutes in the Dairy Industry Building, federal and state exhibits including the great display of various departments of government. He claimed that the Florida exhibit was the finest state exhibit which included an exotic garden in back of Florida Hall.

The sponsors of the exhibit were able to show the World's Fair visitors how an orange grove looks when it is in bloom, when the oranges are ripening, and during harvest.

World's Fair. He was responding to an inquiry from the Orlando Morning Sentinel.

Then there was the television demonstration in the Hudson-Essex Theater in the electrical building, the Egypt exhibit, Ripley's Odditorium, Darkest Africa, Mt. Vernon reproduced in pearls in the Japanese exhibit and the exhibit of famous trains.

Many other exhibits and buildings were mentioned by Mr. Lehman. It must have been a fabulous fair. My parents attended this fair and I wonder how many of these things they visited. I was not born yet and don't recall much of what they said about it. I guess when I would have been old enough to hear about it, their enthusiasm for it had dimmed. I know that we had some playing cards from the fair which I played with, but they are long gone. There is a souvenir brass penny that I come across occasionally and there are pictures and postcards somewhere here.

Mr. Lehman was asked what things at the Fair were not to be missed if one had only three or four days there. His response was in three long columns. I'll condense so you will get the favor of the Fair.

The model houses and homes should interest one, especially the Florida tropical home, the most unique of all. He also suggested you ride the Goodyear Zeppelin on the lagoon and then view the marvelous pageant "Wings of the Century." The Adler Planetarium was praised highly - there was none like it in America.

I attended the New York World's Fair in 1965 with a friend for only one day I believe, as there were sights to see in New York City, and we had already been to Cape Cod and Boston. Therefore my memory of that fair is very hazy. One thing that has stayed in my mind is the Vatican Pavilion which featured the "Pieta" statue by Michelangelo, displayed all by itself with a beautiful blue background. I saw it again later in St. Peter's Cathedral in the Vatican and was not nearly as impressed as there was so much surrounding it.

First of all, he suggested that you make your first appearance at night because of the wonderful lighting effects. And the first place to go would be the court of the Hall of Science where the light of the star Arcturus, 40 light years away, was captured by powerful telescopes, then transmitted into energy, lighting the great search light on top of the hall. The light was then cast on one building and another until each burst into a myriad of lights and wonderful color. These lighting effects had never been used before.





Water reclamation is not new. Sanford already reclaims wastewater that is used for irrigation in some areas of the city and in Lake Mary.

"The problem is, there is only a finite amount of wastewater," Fries said. "Particularly in the dry times, when a lot of people are using water to irrigate, we get less wastewater."

The new plant — with capacity to provide 7.3 million gallons per day — will augment current reclamation efforts.

Using a coagulation-and-sand-filtration process, water pumped from Lake Monroe is injected with alum, an aluminum-based

sulfate, and a coagulant to harden microscopic solids. It is then filtered through 10 feet of sand.

In addition to providing an alternative source of water, reclamation has two other advantages, Fries said. First, reclaimed water is cheaper than potable water. Sanford charges 50 cents per 1,000 gallons versus \$1.40 to \$1.80 per 1,000 gallons for potable water. Second, reclaimed water can help replenish the aquifer.

"Think about it. When you irrigate your lawn with reclaimed water," Fries said, "that water filters down to the aquifer. The more reclaimed water you use, the more water is added to our

underground sources."

Sanford is one of the first communities in Florida to use lake water, also referred to as surface water, as part of its reclamation efforts.

"This is not a common practice in Florida, but it should be used more often," Fries said. "Sanford is sitting on a fantastic resource. It could become the source of water for this Central Florida subregion."

Fries said Volusia County is

exploring a similar process on the north side of Lake Monroe. Sanford's advantage is its proximity to the lake, and, believe it or not, that low-tech pipe installed long before water was a concern.

"If we had to install a pipe to pump the water out of Lake Monroe, it would have cost us three or four years and thousands of dollars just to get a permit from St. Johns River Water Management," Fries said.

So much for obsolescence.

people could enjoy the postcards if I sold them," he said. "The only person who would see them is the person who bought them."

"What I want is for people to see what was yesterday."

The postcards are a result of 40 years worth of collecting. Since Sloan is a retired railroad engineer, many of the images he collected portray Florida's railroad history.

"At one time, I would only get postcards of the railroad," Sloan said.

Along with the postcards, Sloan donated numerous railroad timetables, including the last schedule issued by the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad before its merger with Seaboard Air Line in 1967. The former engineer also gave the museum numerous letters and other documentation from former railroad officials.

"This is a wonderful donation to the museum," Curator Alicia Clarke said. "Sanford was such an important railroad town, but we didn't have much of a railroad collection. Now, we will be able to put up an exhibit, which will include some of the postcards and timetables."

Sanford is named after a man who played an important part in creating Florida's railroad

system. Between 1883 and 1928 "The Henrys," which included Henry Sanford, Henry Flagler and Henry Plant, built, bought and used their railroads to open previously inaccessible parts of the state.

A series of postcards in Sloan's collection captures the evolution of one of Florida's greatest railroad feats — the construction of the overseas railway linking the Florida keys to the mainland. The line was completed in 1912 when the first train rolled into Key West. The Florida East Coast Railway served the island until 1935, when it was destroyed by a hurricane and replaced by the Overseas Highway.

"That's why the postcards are so important," Clarke said. "They capture images of places in Florida's history that may no longer exist."

Sloan's donation to the museum also includes a 1908 Sanford promotional guide printed by the chamber of commerce. The pamphlet contains information ranging from the cost of living in Sanford during the early 1900s to the location of sewer lines in the city's downtown.

"It was a guide to encourage people to come here," Clarke said. "Today, this type of promotional publication is an important tool for researchers."

between the hours of 4 p.m. and 10 p.m. This is compared with an average of one death during these hours, during the rest of the year.

AAA has issued the following reminders for Halloween costumes.

• Most Halloween costumes are flame-retardant, but always check to be sure.

• Steer away from face masks. Instead of using a mask, create a look that's just as dramatic using nontoxic face paint.

• Light up costumes and treat buckets with reflective tape and glow items. Chaperones and parents should wear them as well.

• Watch the length of billowy costumes. Add a belt if necessary to raise the level and avoid tripping.

• If carry-along props are used,

be sure they're flexible and blunt-tipped to avoid injury.

• Remind your children not to shine their flashlights in the eyes of oncoming drivers.

For parents there are also a few simple guidelines suggested by AAA:

• Be sure children under age 12 are accompanied by an adult.

• Children over 12, not accompanied by an adult, should travel in groups.

• Plan the trick-or-treat route in advance and have children only visit homes with an illuminated outside light.

• Children should not enter houses or garages.

• Children should walk facing traffic and cross streets only at corners — never between parked cars.

• Children should be reminded to be extra careful and cautious.

be observant of suspicious people as you drive or enter and exit the vehicle. Being aware may help prevent a car jacking situation. Owners should also make a photo copy of their vehicle registration and insurance information and keep it in a wallet or purse.

The department also suggests using vehicle alarms, and never ignoring an audible alarm when you hear one, especially in your own vehicle. Other suggested devices

include steering wheel locking devices, like The Club, and gas line cutoff switches or starter disablers. Vehicle identification numbers should be engraved on the vehicle's glass.

Cars are stolen because it's high profit and low risk for chop shops, parts resellers, both domestic and foreign trade, and just for joy riding.



## Seen or smelled a skunk lately?

**OCALA** — If you've seen or just smelled a skunk in the last five years, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) wants to know. They've even established a Web page to make reporting easy.

A lot of people who spend time in the woods believe that Florida's skunks aren't as plentiful compared to 10 or more years ago. But FWC wildlife managers need more than just anecdotal evidence before coming to any conclusions. They need numbers.

"We just don't know much about skunk population distribution and population densities in the state," said Ricardo Zambrano, FWC's South region wildlife diversity biologist based in West Palm Beach.

To acquire the needed information, the FWC is sending out brief questionnaires by conventional and electronic mail to around a thousand people who work and sometimes live in wilderness or rural areas.

These include park employees, park rangers, wildlife and fishery biologists, university biologists, fur trappers, hunters, campers, anglers, fish and wildlife officers, road maintenance crews and wildlife rehabilitators.

Those not included in the targeted mailing can still participate by visiting the Internet Skunk Reporting Site:

"At this stage we don't need a lot of detail, just the approximate date of the sighting, number of animals seen, species and general location," Zambrano said. "The baseline data gathered the first year will be a point of reference to compare with future surveys and suggest general population trends."

Skunk-sighting information may also be sent by conventional mail to the project's principal investigator, Kristen Nelson, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation, 8535 Northlake Blvd., West Palm Beach, FL 33412.

Why care about smelly skunks? Zambrano explained that all fish and wildlife species are interdependent and linked in complex ecosystems only partially understood by biologists. A single species may be an important piece in the intricate puzzle, and its demise may negatively affect other species or even an entire ecosystem.

"We have a significant database with a relatively long history on high-profile endangered species such as the bald eagle, Florida panther and manatee," Zambrano said. "And, we have similar databases on game species sportsmen hunt such as waterfowl and deer. But there are very little data on the remaining 90 percent of wildlife species, from bats and skunks to black snakes and butterflies."

The survey is the first step to confirming if there is a population decline in Florida skunks and its severity. If

## Lions keep it simple, close in on playoff berth

**OVIDEO** — While the Oviedo Lions took last week off from school like the rest of the Seminole County schools, the Oviedo defense didn't as the Lions shut out the visiting Lake Brantley Patriots, 14-0, Friday night at John Courier Field.

It was the fifth shutout of the regular season for the Lions (sixth including their Preseason Classic blanking of Lake Mary) and second in a row of a 6A-District 1 opponent. A week ago, Oviedo whitewashed Deland, 23-0.

Oviedo (6-1) improves to 4-1 in 6A-District 1 and has all but clinched a berth in the Class 6A state playoffs. Lake Brantley, which needed a win to keep its slim playoff hopes alive, fell to 4-3 over-

all and 1-3 in the district.

"We just wanted to keep it simple and come out and play hard-nosed football tonight," said Oviedo coach Greg Register. "We knew Lake Brantley is big and strong and that they were coming in here fighting for their lives."

"It's tough playing during a week off from school. We had a couple of kids missing here and there during the week, but we're blessed not to have just one star player that we depend on. We just stuck to the basics and everybody stepped up and did what they had to

do."

While Oviedo's "Black Plague" defense turned a performance that has been more or less its standard for the season, limiting Lake Brantley to 139 yards of offense and seven first downs while letting the Patriots cross midfield just three times and forcing three turnovers.

"Any time you shut out a team like Lake Brantley, you've done a great job defensively," said Register. "They run the wishbone as well as anybody. It's hard to prepare for in just one week."

By comparison, the Oviedo offense was

decidedly muted. Friday night's game was just the second time this season that Oviedo has been held under 20 points (the other was in the Lions, 24-14 loss to Jacksonville-Ed White).

The Lions managed only 200 yards of offense and just 50 through the air while managing just three offensive series that lasted more than six plays (none of which netted any points). Lake Brantley fumbled the ball away three times in its own end of the field (twice inside the 20-yard line) but only one turnover led directly to points.

After being inside the Patriot 10-yard line twice in the first 14 minutes of the game but having nothing to show for it, Oviedo finally got on the scoreboard when Charlie Parker hauled in a 39-yard

In fact, Toledo enters the game with the leading two tacklers in the MAC in senior linebackers Tom Ward and David Gardner, who enter the game with 169 tackles and five sacks between them.

"It is definitely going to be a challenge," added Huff. "We have played against this type of defense before and had success, it just comes down to execution."

After playing the last three seasons at UCF as an Independent, for Huff, the reality of having a conference home opener is something that has been long anticipated.

"Firstly, this is a big game, and the fact that it is now a conference game for us is unbelievable," Huff stated. "This program has been trying to become a member of a conference for a while and now that it has happened it is great. We love to play at home and this should fire everyone up even more."

Huff and the rest of his offensive teammates match up well with Toledo as the Rockets rank 42nd in the country in scoring defense yielding 22.5 points a game. Conversely the Knights offense is putting up 27.4 points a game.

UCF needs to take advantage of the Rockets run defense, which allows 163 yards a contest. The offensive line will

The final week of the regular season for the volleyball teams begins on Monday, with the District Tournaments kicking off the post-season the week of October 28th.


