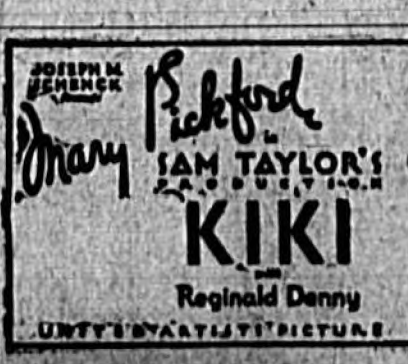

Atheists Jeer As Thousands Crowd Churches In Russia

MOSCOW, April 12.—(AP)—Thousands of persons crowded churches for observance of orthodox Easter Sunday, while young atheists sang anti-religious songs and held mock church services in the streets of the city.

These parading outside carried banners inscribed "Down with Jesus Christ" and "Long Live Leninism." Old trams were fitted out as altars and youthful atheists, wearing exaggerated priestly garments, carried on mock services as the cars moved through the principal streets.

The anti-religious message, formerly one of the oldest industries in the city, was the scene of another burlesque, with initiation priests marching around the building with crosses at midnight.

Meanwhile, many worshippers were invited in the town of Moscow to attend church services in the churches. For hours before midnight, the churches were filled. Services continued until 1 A. M., but the buildings remained open all night for prayers.

The government did not interfere with the services, other than to hold free performances at theatres as a counter-attraction. There also were union meetings and club festivities for workers who did not attend religious services.

Church observances were such the same as in past years except the ring of bells was prohibited on the grounds that this would interfere with the sleep of the workers. Atheist speakers also were forbidden to address meetings outside the churches this year.

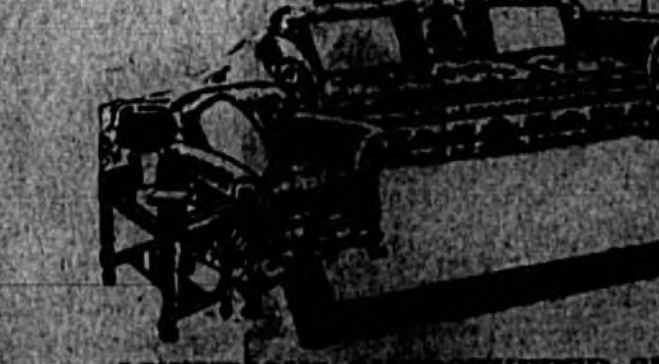

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EPISODE IN LIFE OF HARDING SEEN AS GOSSIP WORK

2 Letters Disclosed Yesterday Reveal War-Time Incident

MARION, Ohio, Apr. 14.—(AP)—Small town gossip was Mammoth last night for articles exposed by President Harding, while he was a Senator, were removed from the files of the State Department. Mrs. Carrie Phillips, Marion society woman, said she had seen the letters under the surveillance of government agents as a result of spy hysteria, fomented in her case by gossip.

The entire affair was so absurd that Mr. Harding's anxiety, although well intentioned, was unnecessary, Mrs. Phillips said. "I never made any pro-German remarks and the government agents soon discovered I had not."

Mr. Harding's letters were addressed to "Jim" but there was no other indication to his identity. They were signed "W. G. H." The only person in Marion whose name was the initials of her name "Carrie" was the wife of the late "Carrie" and when she said "there is no doubt that the 'Carrie' referred to."

The first letter said in part that "Carrie was under the surveillance of government agents and it is highly urgent that she exercise great caution and not allow any one to know of her activities. She is not deserving of surveillance, but feeling grows intense, and prejudices are more pronounced as the rivalry list grows. If she is loyal and prudent, the chief may spare. If she isn't, there is certain humiliation and distress and annoyance and embarrassment in store. I have written her even more urgently."

The other letter said in part: "I know she is no German informant. She couldn't be. Yet these things have been reported." It then suggested that "Jim" endeavor to find employment for Carrie in the Ohio State through Judge G. E. Mouser, who was head of the Red Cross in Marion at that time. Mr. Harding wrote that "Carrie" and "Isabelle," who Mrs. Phillips said was her daughter, should not go to Washington at New York at any time because it might draw suspicion. "The Washington trip last year led to suspicion about acting as informant (ridiculous as of course) and the suspicion was reinforced by the long stay at the naval base at Fort Jefferson."

Toward its close, the letter said, "I believe, I know Carrie is loyal and helpful. But prejudices and passions are not at my command." Mrs. Phillips said the gossip that started the "pro-German" report, was connected with her entertainment at her home here of some friends of her daughter, from France and Switzerland. The daughter, mentioned as "Isabelle" in the letter, is Mrs. William H. Mathes, wife of a former consul to Switzerland.

"Apparently over-patriotic residents of Marion resented the fact that Europeans were guests at my home during war-time," Mrs. Phillips said. "The whole thing was silly."

Mrs. Phillips said the then Senator Harding's letters were written out of "neighborly interest." Mr. and Mrs. Harding and Mr. and Mrs. Phillips had been life-long friends and once made a trip around the world together. Mathes, the former consul to Switzerland, was appointed to that post while Harding was President.

Mrs. Phillips said she had not known of the letters until they were read to her yesterday but she recalled a telephone conversation with Mr. Harding while he was senator, in which he made virtually the same remarks as contained in the letters. She said the letters probably were written in 1917.

Popping Of Corks Is Clue To Champagne

NEW YORK GIRLS ME FOR HONORS IN FLYING WORLD

Ruth Nichols Establishes New Speed Record For Women

NEW YORK, Apr. 14.—(AP)—Through breath-taking adventures, two daring New York girls—one tall and slender and in her twenties, the other petite blond of 18—have risen to a position of prominence among all the women flyers in the world.

They are now fighting it out for supremacy—Ruth Nichols in her red Lockheed, Elinor Smith in her blue Bellanca.

Yesterday at Detroit Miss Nichols soared through the sky in her big monoplane with its streamlined body, special propeller and trick landing gear at a speed of 210 miles an hour, faster than any woman ever had flown before.

Last Thursday Miss Smith dropped down out of a spring twilight to Roosevelt field with an altitude record of 22,000 feet—apparently a new altitude record for a woman and possibly for men, too, in a commercial ship.

Only a few days before she had painted five or six miles away off up there in the blue, and had fallen 25,000 feet before she awakened just in time to bring her monoplane down into a small field so skillfully that she was not hurt at all and her ship only slightly damaged.

And not very many days before that, Miss Nichols had taken the red monoplane which now holds three speed records 28,743 feet up over Jersey City, thereby breaking an altitude record that had been previously held by Miss Smith.

As she landed today, Miss Nichols said her next adventure would be an attempt to recapture that altitude record, should the official reading at Washington show that Miss Smith wrested it away from her last Thursday.

So far—net counting her last altitude record until official word comes from Washington—Miss Nichols has hung up four world records, two for altitude and two for endurance. Miss Nichols has held three and for altitude and two for endurance. Last year she set a world's record for speed for women flyers on both east-west and west-east (transcontinental) flights and in actual flying time on her flight from Los Angeles to New York broke all records save that held by Capt. Frank Hawks.

Miss Nichols, early in her flying career, which goes back about four years, made the first non-stop flight ever made from New York to Miami.

Miss Smith has not gone out after any speed records so far. Two years ago this summer she planned a solo trans-Atlantic flight. Her parents finally consented but her backer pulled out. There's rivalry between these two, but it's a friendly rivalry. Last Thursday night Miss Nichols

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Apr. 14.—(AP)—United States marine headquarters yesterday said they had received no official report which would confirm dispatches to Panama City that Lieutenant Derrah and Sergeant Taylor, United States marine corps, had been killed in a bandit attack at Logtown, in Northwestern Nicaragua.

Reports that Capt. Harlin Peley had been killed in ambush near Logtown on Saturday were officially confirmed.

Lieutenant Derrah, headquarters said, left Puerto Cabezas, 70 miles from Logtown, with 12 national guardsmen Saturday evening and engaged the bandit force at two points. There were about 125 men in the attacking band, all armed with rifles and machine guns.

In a skirmish on Sunday one of Derrah's men was wounded. Two marine airplanes out of Managua dropped food and ammunition to Derrah at about noon Sunday. The pilots reported when they returned that Derrah was patrolling the Logtown sector and was in telephone communication with Puerto Cabezas.

Unconfirmed reports from the east coast last evening said six civilians were missing and unaccounted for and it was feared they had been ambushed.

Marine headquarters issued a flat denial of another report that 25 marines had been killed. Officers here said there were not that many marines on the east coast.

NEW ORLEANS, Apr. 14.—(AP)—C. A. Davis, a Reserve marine officer, attached to the national guard with his headquarters in New Orleans, said he had night talk with the battle of the marines with bandits in Nicaragua reported that Lieut. Clyde Roy Derrah, for whom apprehension was felt, emerged safely from his encounter with the cut-throats.

EDMONTON, Alta., Apr. 14.—(AP)—Canadian passengers and railway employees were injured when a Canadian National railway train was derailed yesterday near Hilda. 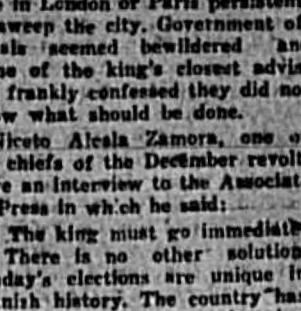
