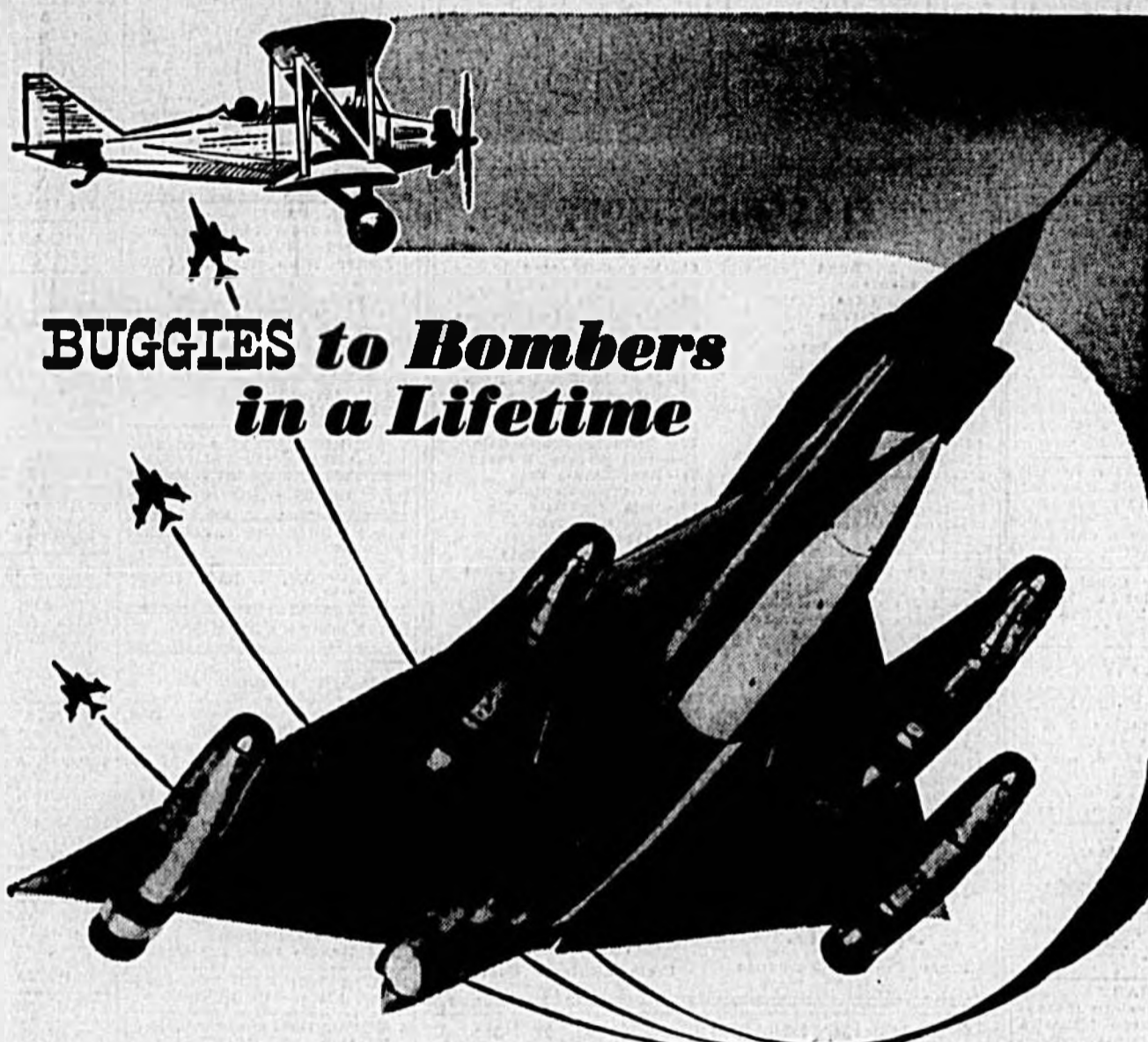

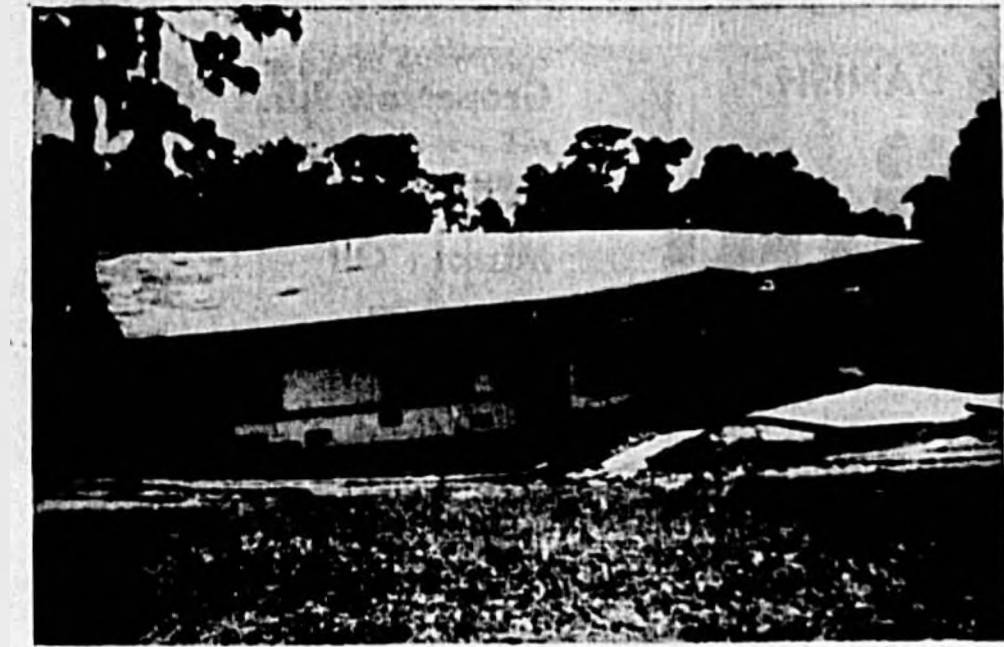

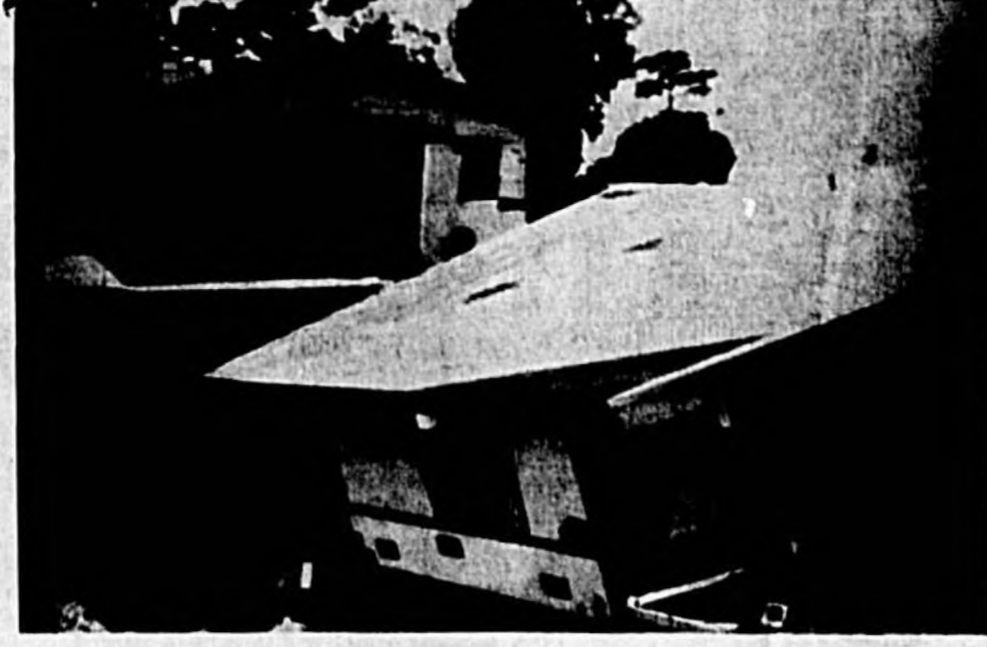

Earth Collapses, Homes Damaged

Gov. Haydon Burns today declared an "emergency" situation at Casselberry and in-

structed three top state aides to proceed to that city immediately with orders to "assist in every way" possible in that stricken city where the earth shell collapsed and damaged six houses Saturday.

Governor Burns acted during an early morning conference with Sen. Mack N. Cleveland Jr. and Rep. S. J. Davis Jr., of Seminole County, who apprised the Chief Executive of the damage following a personal on-the-spot inspection by them Sunday.

Governor Burns ordered to Casselberry William McGee, assistant state highway engineer in charge of construction, and C. W. Henry and Ernest Blahop, geologists with the State Board of Conservation.

The three state aides were being flown from Tallahassee this afternoon by James Carter, pilot for the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission.

They were given permission to land at Sanford Naval Air Station by Capt. C. W. Swanson, commanding officer, and were to be met there by Mayor Owen Anstey and Casselberry city and Seminole County commissioners.

Governor Burns' office informed The Sanford Herald that the Chief Executive had "instructed the State Road Department and all other state agencies to lend every assistance" to the stricken city.

Senator Cleveland told The Herald by telephone that "the Governor postponed two early appointments and delayed a Cabinet meeting to meet with Joe (Davis) and me to discuss the Casselberry disaster. Frankly, we were amazed at the way he took hold of the matter. He wasn't a bit mealy-mouthed when he instructed the state agencies to move."

The damage to six homes was done over the weekend by an underground shift in the earth, which caused a mammoth sink hole to form, devouring a \$14,000 concrete block house and a large section of paved street.

Senator Cleveland and Representative Davis were on the scene Sunday to inspect the damage and discuss aid with Mayor Anstey.

The 30-foot crater formed Saturday morning beneath the home of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Rosolky, of 178 Northmoor Rd. The couple was at work in Orlando when the trouble started.

The hole is approximately 100 feet across and the outer perimeter of cracks and depressions extends 225 feet.

When news of the natural phenomenon spread thousands of curious seekers streamed into town to view the havoc wreaked by nature.

Casselberry police, firemen and town officials were hurried to control the influx of people and cars, and called upon the Seminole County Sheriff Department auxiliary, Sanford, Longwood and Maitland Police Departments, Longwood Fire Department and the Civil Air Patrol for assistance.

HOUSE MOVES
The first hint of the impending disaster came to the quiet residential street with attractive homes between 8

and 9 a.m. Saturday when Mrs. Charles Miller, a new resident at 101 Northmoor, reported her house had moved several inches off its foundation and water from broken pipes was flooding the home.

Next door at 181 Northmoor, Mr. and Mrs. David Milne, were startled to see the large concrete slabs of their driveway buckle and rise several feet in the air.

Cracks were noted in the street and in several yards. Loud popping and cracking noises in the homes in the neighborhood begin to give a warning of the stress to which they were being submitted.

Suddenly before the eyes of horrified onlookers the yard of the Rosolky home began to sink and the house sag, and in a period of three hours it sank to the roof and was practically disintegrated.

Many household items slid down into the abyss, but when the growth of the hole seemed to have halted, at least temporarily, several valuable items of furniture were rescued out of the back of the house.

Residents and officials praised utility crews of Casselberry Utilities and Florida Power Corporation, who quickly went to action to restore power, water and sewer service. Sewer pipe was severed when the street caved in, and emergency equipment was installed for use until repairs can be made.

FLIES HOME
The opening in the earth continued to expand, taking the driveway, carport and corner of the utility room of the Albert Greene home next door.

After receiving word of the disaster Greene flew back from California, where he was vacationing with his wife, to try to salvage his house and move out furniture.

Furniture also was moved out of the two other adjacent houses.

A report filed in Sheriff J. L. Hobby's office indicated that the homeowners have been notified by insurance companies that insurance is null and void inasmuch as the losses resulted from "an act of God."

The collapse of underground limestone layers causing these sink holes to form is believed by geologists to be triggered by the dry weather which Central Florida is experiencing.

New State Ag-Labor Unit Okd



Citrus, Cane Work Deficit Relief Seen

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Haydon Burns said today a new department will be organized in the State Industrial Commission to decide how much offshore labor can be hired for Florida winter citrus and sugar cane harvests.

Industrial Commission Chairman J. D. Wright Jr., of Sanford, said the new department was expected to be okayed by the U. S. Department of Labor by the end of this week. He said it would be organized with 15 employees, all paid from federal funds, within 60 days.

Creation of the new department was expected to shift decisions about the numbers of offshore workers available for Florida's important citrus and cane harvests from Washington to the state capital.

The new department will decide on how many workers from offshore islands will be needed to supplement domestic workers in the citrus groves and the sugar cane fields. During the past winter season the state was at odds with the federal government over use of offshore labor.

The Department of Labor has insisted better use be made of domestic workers. But the state has claimed offshore workers do a better job and there aren't enough willing domestic workers available.

Wright called the move a "great break-through for Florida agriculture as a whole" and told an early morning news conference that the move was designed to bring decisions about offshore labor from Washington to Tallahassee. He said the Department of Labor would lay down broad guidelines for decisions concerning offshore laborers.

Wright said the program was sparked by the U. S. Labor Department after a visit to the state more than two weeks ago by Labor Secretary Willard Wirtz. "His visit was the beginning of assigning of this duty to the state level," Burns said.

Burns said the action was a victory for a practical approach of solving one of agriculture's most pressing problems.

Two Orlandoans Die In Viet Nam

SAIGON (UPI) — Two iron-nerved U. S. Army officers risked their lives today to destroy four deadly time bombs buried in the wreckage of Bien Hoa air base—scene of the worst American disaster of the Viet Nam war.

A military spokesman said as many as 27 Americans may have died Sunday in a flight line explosion that destroyed 22 bomb-laden planes and other American property worth at least \$20 million.

Masters said he understood some preliminary studies on remaining construction already have been made and actual work on the Plaza will get under way this week.

The attorney said periodic checks would be made to assure that work is going along on schedule.

"We want this work done as quickly as possible," Masters said.

R & S Services, Inc., of Clearwater, has been awarded the contract for work on the Plaza. The company was required to post the bond.

MIAMI (UPI)—Traffic accidents killed at least 16 persons in Florida during the weekend.

Reduction Would Go To Buyers

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson today asked Congress for an excise tax cut of nearly \$4 billion and called on business to translate the reductions promptly into lower consumer prices.

Specifically, the President recommended an excise tax cut of \$3.5 billion in two equal stages, effective July 1 and Jan. 1.

Another \$464 million would be cut in additional installments on Jan. 1 each year from 1967 through 1968.

In a special message to Congress, Johnson also proposed an increase of \$800 million in "user charges" — meaning higher taxes on fuel used by trucks, airplanes and boats on inland waterways.

A proposed cut of major impact on the nation's economy would be in the manufacturers' excise tax on new automobiles. Johnson recommended that this be reduced from the present 10 per cent to seven per cent beginning immediately and down to five percent in 1967.

Johnson recommended that the first part of a cut in excise on cars be made retroactive to Saturday, when he made the announcement that he would seek the reductions.

The President recommended complete repeal of the tax on air conditioners and, like the cut in the auto levy, to avoid a lag in the retail market, he asked that the cut on air conditioners be retroactive to purchases made after last Friday.

In the case of both car and air conditioner purchases, after enactment of the tax bill, the government would make refunds to the manufacturer when evidence is presented that the final customer had been reimbursed.

Four Vehicles Crash In Smog Along I-4

A thick bank of fog and smoke, piled up in a hollow on Interstate 4, just south of the SR 46 intersection, was blamed for two separate but related accidents on I-4 about 12:30 Saturday morning.

The first accident involved a large flat bed truck and a huge semi-tractor and trailer.

State Trooper J. L. Sikes reported the first accident occurred this way:

The flat-bed truck, driven by Lester Bobb, Rt. 2, Sanford, traveling north on I-4, slowed down to about 10 mph after topping a rise and entering the thick smog bank. Visibility was about 15 feet.

The huge tractor and trailer, loaded with plants and flowers, following the Bobb truck, hit the flat-bed vehicle from the rear, knocking it across the median strip and into the southbound lane. The semi, driven by Roy Ronald

Reid, of Miami, then swerved off the road, through a fence and bogged down in mud along the road.

Riding with Bobb was Budell Douglas, Sanford, and with Reid was Dewey Wharham, Hialeah. All four were treated at Seminole Memorial Hospital for cuts and bruises.

There were no arrests. The Bobb truck received about \$1,500 damages and the Reid vehicle about \$4,500 damages.

Meantime, according to Trooper C. L. (Tommy) Tomlinson, traffic had piled up in the southbound lane of I-4 at the scene of the accident.

A vehicle occupied by Mr. and Mrs. France Koon, Eatonville, was the last car in the halted traffic line. A car driven by Clarence Moore, of Orlando, came over the rise and struck the rear of the Koon car. Moore's wife was with him.

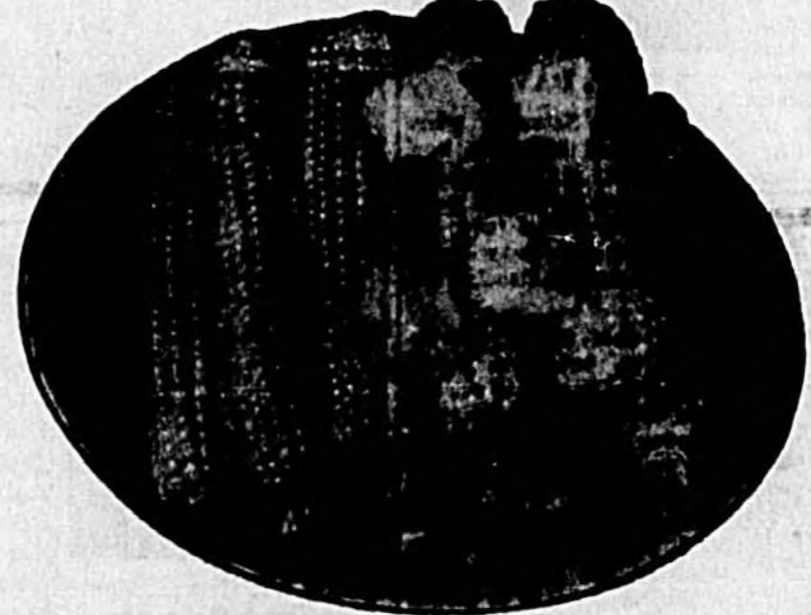

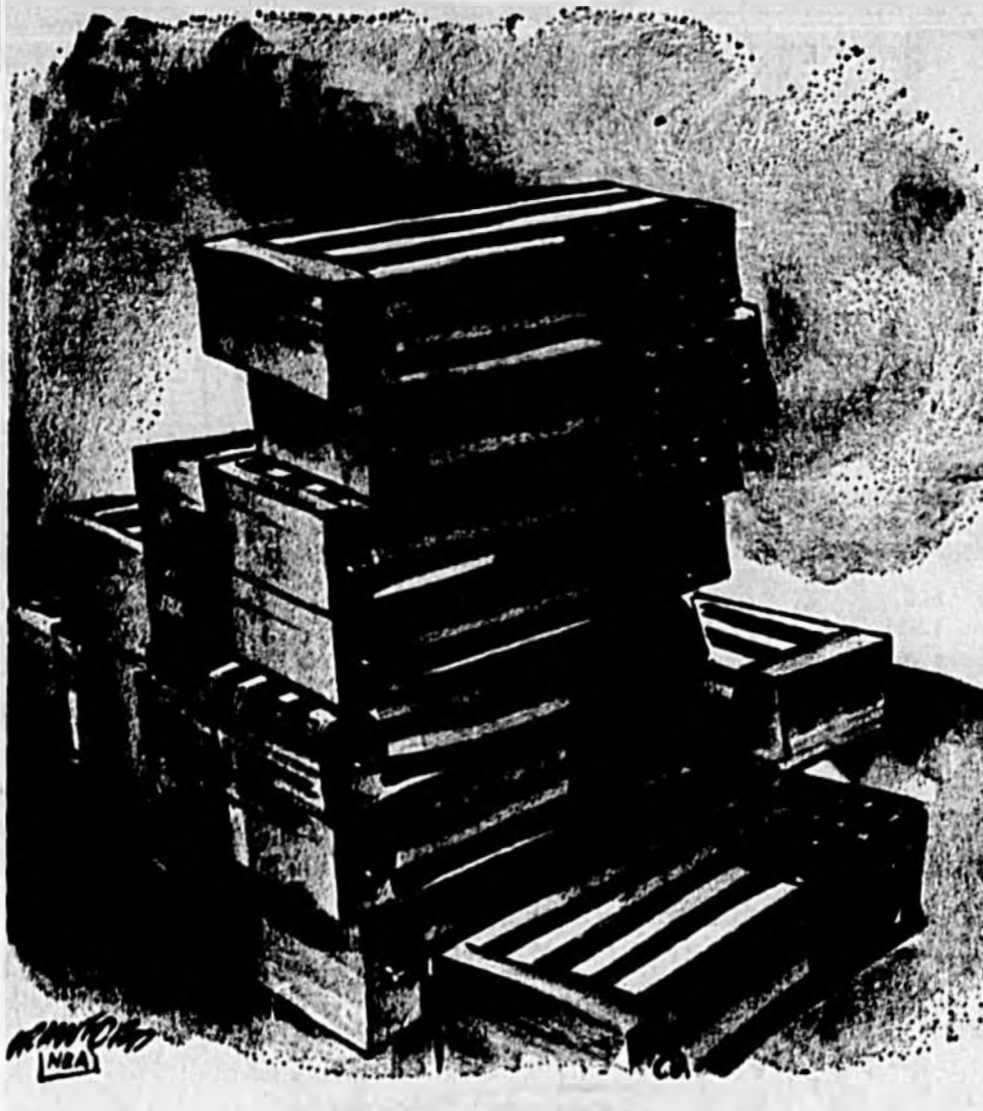

WASHINGTON (NEA) — The notion is growing in the United States that there is a curious nobility in breaking, ignoring or misinterpreting the law if it is done in a "good cause."

The cause, of course, can be racial desegregation, campus freedom of one sort or another, U.S. action in Vietnam, or whatever.

Favoring job integration, some lawyers in Washington have consciously and deliberately advocated a misreading of the Taft-Hartley labor law to give it a racial content its authors and supporters never intended.

Lawyers, politicians, scholars, teachers, artists and clergymen were among the countless persons who voiced unconditional sympathy for the nearly 800 lawbreaking demonstrators who rebelled last December on the University of California's Berkeley campus.

They appear to have the grossly mistaken view that if an uprising is basically passive and is styled as "civil disobedience," it somehow falls outside normal concepts of law violation.

In a little-noticed decision convicting three juvenile Berkeley students of unlawful assembly in the December rebellion, Alameda County Superior Court Judge Robert H. Kroninger (in the Berkeley-Oakland area) went right to the heart of that issue. He cited Section 145 of

California's penal code which bars any intentional resistance, delay or obstruction of a police officer in the performance of his duty. Arresting persons unlawfully assembled in a school building was, he said, proper discharge of an official duty.

Then Kroninger declared: "It is clear that the response of lying down and relaxing the muscles of the extremities was intentional. And it is equally clear that the purpose and effect were to delay and obstruct the police officers."

"It matters not that the participants describe such resistance as 'passive,' or seek exculpation under the mantle of 'civil disobedience.' Such terms merely obscure the question, as the purpose and effect of such conduct differ only in degree from the responses of flight or violence."

"Resistance to the rule of law, whether active or passive, is intolerable. . . ."

Unforgivably, the 378 University of California faculty members who sent Gov. Edmund G. (Pat) Brown a telegram of sympathy for the lawbreakers showed not the faintest awareness of this point. In ignoring it, they

and all other sympathizers were dangerously close to arguing that the end (the demonstrators' objectives) justified the means (violating the law).

Judge Kroninger sensibly took note of that danger in his opinion when he asserted that "to excuse lawlessness by diverting attention to its avowed purpose would be to reject the rule of law and to invite chaos."

Kroninger also said that those who consciously act unlawfully must accept responsibility as law violators and not plead, as did many demonstrators and sympathizers, for "amnesty" the moment they are arrested.

Civil rights demonstrators, by contrast, usually have been eager to accept penalties for violations, to dramatize their cause.

In the present national mood, however, all too many well-meaning but grossly misguided Americans appear to condone breaking or misreading the law "if the end is good"—and to argue that no penalties should apply.

They evidently were not listening when Massachusetts Attorney General Edward W. Brooke said recently: "The law applies to all, or it applies to none."

The Lighter Side

United Press International WASHINGTON (UPI) — It was a long time coming, but finally it's here. Somebody has invented an anti-gobbledygook machine.

I saw this marvelous instrument with my very own eyes down at the Interstate Commerce Commission. Other wise, I wouldn't have believed it possible.

Ordinarily, I don't become emotionally involved where electronics are concerned, but in this case I don't mind admitting that I cried a little.

Anyone who has spent as much time as I have drift on the turgid prose of govern-

mental reports probably would have had the same reaction.

The anti-gobbledygooker, technically known as an auto-tutor, was installed at the ICC about two months ago on a trial basis to determine if it would have any measurable impact on bureaucratic obscurity.

They couldn't have picked a better place for such an experiment. The ICC has long been noted as a wellspring of linguistic smog.

Let us say, for example, that an ICC employe has been dangling his modifiers, which is a fairly common affliction

in his civil service. His supervisor may recommend that he spend some time at the machine. In a few hours, as a general rule, he will be completely cured.

By means of a tape, which incidentally is transparent rather than red, the machine teaches him how to undangle a modifier by amputating and then transplanting it.

He can, of course, go beyond that if he chooses, for the machine also is equipped to treat split infinitives and a host of other language deformities.

To date, more than 60 persons at the ICC have been de-gobbledygooked by the machine, with some rather encouraging results.

Tests given before and after exposure show that in some cases their recognition of what constitutes clearness and brevity improved 18 percentage points.

Although de-gobbledygooking is not required, there have been only four dropouts. To encourage participation, the ICC hands four certificates to those who go through the entire process.

An ICC spokesman said it was still too early to evaluate the program. Let us hope that when the results are finalized, it will not be phased out.

Pole Position For '500' Race Goes To Foyt

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI)—Defending champion A. J. Foyt has grabbed the pole position in what shapes up as the fastest starting field ever put on the bricks for the 500-mile Memorial Day auto race.

Foyt earned the choice starting spot by leading 19 first-day qualifiers Saturday in a successful assault on the 100-miles-an-hour barrier. Only two other drivers managed to make the field at the wind-whipped Speedway Sunday.

That left even dozen spots to be filled next weekend when the trials end, to round out a field of 33 starters battling for a May 31 jackpot of more than \$500,000.

The 21 weekend qualifiers have an average speed of 156.645 mph, more than 4 mph faster than the 1964 field. For the second straight year the rear-engine machines powered by Ford V-8 engines will occupy the front rows on the flying start come race day.

BALTIMORE, Md. (UPI)—Tom Rolfe, the last horse on the scene but the first at the wire, and Ron Turcotte, his daring young jockey, were the toast of the racing world today following their victory in the \$100,000 Preakness Stakes.

But Lucky Debonair, the Kentucky Derby winner who finished seventh in the second of the Triple Crown Classics, was a hospital case and out of racing for about two months. He "bucked his shins" and only time will heal them.

Tom Rolfe was the last horse shipped to Pimlico, the last horse entered in Saturday's Preakness, and so late in getting to the paddock before the race that trainer Frank Whiteley could be fined \$50 for his tardiness.

But after game little Tom Rolfe, the smallest horse in the field, charged to a neck victory even though he lost a shoe somewhere on the track, Whiteley couldn't care less. His colt won \$128,100.

The trainer already was planning for the Belmont Stakes at Aqueduct on June 3. Before the sun set at Pimlico he had shipped Tom Rolfe back to the quiet of his barn at Laurel race course—far removed from the commotion stirred up by his victory over Ogden Phipps' Dapper Dan which resulted in a charge of intimidation by Ismael Valenzuela, who rode Dapper Dan.

Turcotte, a 24-year-old rider from Grand Falls, N. B., getting his first crack at the classics, engineered the move that had Valenzuela afraid for his life.

When Turcotte saw Dapper Dan streaking down the rail he moved Tom Rolfe from the middle of the race track to straighten out Tom Rolfe before doing any damage and the foul claim against him was planned but managed to not allowed.

Jacoby On Bridge

Edgar Kaplan of New York whose team finished second to ours in this year's Vanderbilt has been a top player, teacher and writer for many years. His newest book "Competitive Bidding in Modern Bridge" is a fine exposition of many of the current expert theories.

It is primarily for serious students of the game, because it deals entirely with a portion of bidding that is so complicated that other writers have barely touched on it.

Edgar is a strong advocate of the weak jump overcall. The main purpose of this overcall is to crowd the bidding so that the opener and his partner will be unable to find their best contract.

Today's hand shows this bid

pass, bid three no-trump or four clubs. In either of the latter cases North is almost sure to pass. Three clubs makes easily; three no-trump goes down three tricks; four clubs probably makes, although if West opens a heart and East ducks the first lead four clubs will go down.

On the other hand, if West merely overcalls with one spade North might try two hearts but would probably bid two clubs. East would stick in a two diamond bid and South would rebid to three clubs or two no-trump. In either of these cases North would find a three heart bid and South would raise him to four.

Four hearts makes easily to give North and South game and rubber.

Rescue Workers Probe Snow For Avalanche Dead

GARMISCH - PARTEN-KIRCHEN, Germany (UPI) — "It was a horror... it happened like a flash. Just boom, whoosh, white stuff splattering the window... then I grabbed the phone."
Rick Baldwin, 22, of Dalton, Pa., a member of the U.S. Army alpine ski patrol, today described the terror of Saturday's avalanche which roared down the slopes of Mt. Zugspitze, Germany's highest peak.

At least 25 persons, all Germans or Bavarians, were known dead in the slide, worst ever to hit the German Alps. Others possibly were believed buried under tons of snow and ice which covered this ski resort at the base of the mountain.

More than 600 rescue workers, including U. S. Army troops, today were probing through tons of snow and rock.

Demolition experts were trying to blast away gigantic snow ridges threatening the area with new slides.

Changes Seen To Delay Fast Final Approval

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A House committee sent the governor's \$300 million road bond program to the calendar today after removing a controversial Senate amendment that added a \$6 million west Florida four-laning project without upping the amount of bonds to finance it.

The House committee removed the so-called Tapper amendment, but tacked on three changes of its own.

The swift action is bound to slow down the passage of the ambitious road bill through the Legislature since both houses must adopt the identical bill in order to send it to the people for a vote this fall.

One of the changes added by the House constitutional amendments committee would limit interest rate on the bonds to finance the 1,200-mile four-laning program to a flat 4.5 per cent instead of the "average" 4.5 per cent allowed in the Senate-passed version.

Rep. Emerson Allsworth of Broward said he'll try to get the measure on the special order calendar for action by the full House this week, if possible.

There was little discussion and no attempt to defend the amendment pushed by Sen. George Tapper, of Port St. Joe, that added four-laning of U. S. Highway 98 from Medart to Apalachicola, a project the Governor said could not be justified by traffic need.

A motion to lay the amendment on the table—a House way of killing proposals—was adopted by a close margin.

There were reports that all of this was planned, part of a deal to let Tapper get his pet project into the Senate with the understanding it would be removed in the House. But Tapper denied any deal.

State Acts To Aid Casselberry

A three-man survey team of engineers, led by state highway engineer, today surveyed the sinkhole area on Northmoor Road damaged Saturday by the formation of a large sink hole.

The group flew in from Tallahassee in response to an appeal directly to the Governor by Sen. Mack Cleveland and Rep. S. J. Davis Jr. asking for assistance to the stricken area.
