

## Kidnaped Girl Found Safe; Suspect Arrested

SARASOTA (AP) — Charlotte Grosse, who was dragged screaming from a Girl Scout campground two days ago, was found safe today and a suspect was arrested, authorities said.

The 15-year-old called home about 10 a. m. EDT and told her anxious parents that she was free after more than 52 hours of captivity. She called from Siesta Key, a beach area of Sarasota and only about 10 miles from the state park where she had been camping with other Girl Scouts.

The call was monitored at the sheriff's office and within minutes Charlotte had been picked up and taken to Sarasota Memorial Hospital. Her condition was not immediately known.

The suspect was apprehended shortly afterward in the same area of the beach and brought to the sheriff's office, slouched in the back of a patrol car with his hands cuffed behind him.

He was identified as Wilfred Arthur Bannister, 33, of Siesta Key.

A six-footer with brown straggly hair, he was expressing a nervousness as he was hauled out of the car and hustled through a door of the jail.

Her parents, Richard E. and Carol Grosse, rushed to be with their daughter.

"They're ecstatic," a friend said by telephone from the Grosse home in Nokomis, just south of Sarasota.

The teen-ager was abducted at dawn Wednesday by a heavy, gruff-voiced man who ripped through the back of a three-man tent and pulled her out by her long brown hair.

On Wednesday night, her abductor allowed her to call her parents to say he promised to set her free and "just wanted to get rid of her," officers said.

The call was traced to a phone booth in Bradenton, about 30 miles north of Sarasota and near a major league baseball training complex, police said.

But as the hours passed with no further word, officials began expressing doubt that the girl would be found alive.

"Statistically, the longer the time goes, the less chances there are for the victim," Sheriff's Cpl. William Stookey said.

Then came this morning's dramatic call.

The FBI entered the case Thursday with 20 agents.

FBI agents went to the complex Thursday to interview players, but they wouldn't say why. The facility is used by rookies in the farm systems of the Pittsburgh Pirates and Chicago Cubs.

"Everybody uses these phones constantly," said Chicago rookie Terry Naeber. "It's odd. The man seemed to know there was a phone booth here."

Crime lab technicians dusted the booth for fingerprints. When McNiff was asked if prints were found, he replied: "What do prints mean unless you have a suspect?"

At a modest home in nearby

Nokomis, the Grosse waited quietly with their other children, Eleanor, 11, Jennifer, 11 and Richard, 8.

Their pastor, the Rev. William Eckels of Venice-Nokomis United Methodist Church, kept the family company. He said neighbors tried to ease the wait by bringing in home-cooked meals. Friends at the church continued a prayer vigil started Wednesday morning.

Some young acquaintances of Charlotte interrupted a pool-side party to pray for her return, the pastor said.

Charlotte, a slight built teen-ager with traces and long

brown hair, rarely missed church and planned to be an acolyte, the Rev. Mr. Eckels said. An acolyte is a lay person who assists in worship services.

Richard Grosse remained in the home, saying to reporters only that "I'll talk to you people when I get my daughter back."

Teresa Kelly, 13, was one of the Girl Scouts sleeping in a nearby tent when Charlotte was dragged away as screams of terrified girls pierced the darkness.

The screams, Miss Kelly recalled, "I'll never forget them."

## 'Something There' -- She Was Right

VENICE (AP) — The abduction of Charlotte Grosse by a hairy man from a Girl Scout tent here ended that had already been a night of fear for the slight, 15-year-old, according to a reconstruction of the event.

"That was a nervous jump all that night," testified Virginia Wallace said Thursday, a day after the incident and with Charlotte still missing. "She kept saying, 'something's out there.'"

Charlotte, her sister Eleanor and 15-year-old Virginia went to bed about 11:30 a. m. EDT Tuesday. Sleep did not come easily to Charlotte.

"I don't think we slept at all," Virginia said.

At about 1:30 a. m. Wednesday, Charlotte woke up the other two girls and told them she thought there was something

outside the tent. Virginia told her it probably was just a small animal.

At 1 a. m. Charlotte again awoke the others. Virginia comforted her. "Nobody in their right mind would be out there," she said of the hot, humid, mosquito-ridden night at Oscar Silver State Park.

They turned on the radio to help Charlotte fall asleep.

At 3:30 a. m., Charlotte sat up and said, "Virginia, it's back."

"Oh my God, it's got her," Eleanor screamed.

"Please, don't take me," Charlotte screamed as she was dragged out of the tent by her long brown hair. She was clad in pajamas and a Mickey Mouse T-shirt.

By 8 a. m., deputies had sealed off the entire 66-acre Goswami State Park. They were apparently too late

## Sunday Booze Debate Continues As Hearing Approaches

Changing Seminole County's liquor ordinance to allow the Sunday sale of alcoholic beverages in unincorporated areas of the county is favored by many restaurant owners and opposed by the Sanford Area Ministerial Association.

A telephone survey of Seminole County residents by The Herald indicated six in favor of Sunday liquor sales, two against and two undecided.

The county commissioners will hold a public hearing in the courthouse Tuesday night at 7 p. m. to consider changing the ordinance, which prohibits Sunday liquor sales in the unincorporated area. The proposed change would allow the sale of liquor on the 46 of rest.

Commissioner Bob French proposed the change. "I'm not in favor of people drinking because the bodies aren't designed for it," said French, "but if people in the county want a drink on

Sunday, they're going to drive to get it. This country tried to ban liquor once — in the 1920s. Let's accept the fact that people are going to drink."

The sale of liquor on Sunday is allowed in five of Seminole's seven cities: Altamonte Springs, Casselberry, Sanford, Lake Mary, Lake Nona and Winter Springs.

Sunday liquor sales are also permitted in neighboring Volusia and Orange Counties.

I checked with the county sheriff, and he said there would be no adverse effects to his department if the ordinance were changed except that there would probably be less people on the road because now they drive to Volusia County or one of the cities that allow Sunday liquor sales," French said.

Loaise and Tony Costantino, who own the Lake Monroe Inn, on U.S. 17-92 favor changing the ordinance. In Costantino's opinion, the current county liquor ordinance "is discriminatory. I close my place of business on Sunday now because people want a drink with their dinner. It's impossible to tell people they can't enjoy a

highball with their meal when we have three bars in the restaurant."

Costantino added, "We need a chain. We give jobs to 22 people, and they're trying to make a living. This change would give them more work. Liquor is a big tax resource, and some of that money should remain in the county. I started this whole thing to change the ordinance, and I'm glad."

The Sanford Ministerial Association takes a different view. In a prepared statement, the association said Thursday.

"With some exceptions, the churches of Sanford are generally against the sale of alcoholic beverages and more especially so on Sunday. Therefore, the association sees this move to allow the sale on Sunday to be another gentle but gradual means to break down standards and corrupt morals in our community. We do not see any good to be gained by such a move.

If people want something to drink on Sunday, they can pick it up on Saturdays," said Mrs. Evelyn Koon of 614 Mims Road, Geneva.

Rabbi Marcia of 6th Street, Chuluota, disagreed. "On Sunday I

occasionally feel like a beer. Now I drive to Orange County. Why should the county lose the revenue?" he said.

"Most people who want to drink get it anyway," said Mrs. Carol Carter of Lemon Bluff Road, Osteen, who favored changing the ordinance.

"I can't see having to drive to Casselberry on Sunday, when I can go to the store when I want a six-pack," said Jack Howe of Longwood Markham Road. "People are going to drink on Sunday anyway. Changing the ordinance would make it easier for people who didn't stock up on Saturday to drink on Sunday."

## But Carter Expected To Prevail Battle On B1 Brewing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress is expected to go along with President Carter's decision to halt production of the B1 bomber, but not without a fight from supporters of the costly plane.

Democratic leaders in the House and Senate quickly expressed support for Carter's surprise decision to scrap the B1, and the President predicted his verdict would be endorsed on Capitol Hill.

Carter said he had the support of Defense Secretary Harold Brown, who scheduled a news conference today to discuss the decision.

But congressional supporters of the B1 pledged to resist efforts to defund the plane.

"The President has the right to make recommendations, but under the Constitution, Congress has the responsibility for the defense of the country," said Rep. George Mahon, D-Texas, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee. He vowed to fight for B1 money.

The congressional battle over the plane will focus on a \$10.6 billion defense appropriations bill containing \$1.5 billion for production of five B1s.

The measure was approved Thursday on a 333 to 24 vote in the House just hours after Carter said the United States does not need the B1 and its production should be halted while testing and research continue.

Rep. Joseph Addabbo, D-N.Y., claimed there were enough House members willing to change their stand and reverse a vote Tuesday that kept the B1 money in the bill. But Addabbo, who sponsored the unsuccessful effort earlier in the week, said

he decided to let Senate Democrats chip out the funds rather than ask House members to change their votes.

Carter said he thought many congressmen who voted for the B1 funds on Tuesday believed he was going to urge production of the bomber. Prior to his decision there had been wide spread speculation that the President would authorize a limited production of the B1.

Instead, Carter recommended deployment of cruise missiles, which represent a weapons technology in which the United States is believed to lead the Soviet Union by about five years.

A defense spokesman said the Pentagon envisions arming about 500 of its existing B52 bombers with cruise missiles, which have a range of up to 1,000 miles.

Sanford Gas Leak Hurts 5; Apartments Evacuated

By BOB LLOYD Herald Staff Writer Three firemen and two policemen were reported injured Saturday when a leaking valve assembly spread toxic chlorine gas from Sanford's number two water plant on U.S. 17-92 south of Airport Boulevard. All five officers were treated and released at area hospitals, after coming into contact with the gas, according to fire department officials. Police and sheriff's deputies evacuated occupants of two nearby all-night restaurants and an apartment complex as a safety precaution and traffic was blocked for nearly an hour on U.S. 17-92 between Airport Blvd. and Lake Mary Blvd. The 5:15 p.m. apartment fire was called from a citizen near the Hanch House Restaurant about 3 a.m. reporting a "strong gas smell," according to Assistant Chief William Gailey. The Seminole County Fire Department also received a call about the gas odor and units from both departments responded. Gailey said firemen wearing air-park headlamps units located the chlorine leak inside the water plant coming from a rust hole in a pipe. The leaking chlorine was stopped by cutting off a valve, he said. Meanwhile, officers had evacuated the Hanch House and Jack-In-The-Box restaurants on U.S. 17-92 and most of the residents of Marner's Village Apartments as a safety precaution, Gailey said. He said the apartment residents were allowed to return to their homes a short time later. Asst. Chief Gailey said the policemen were Sanford patrolman Mike Tindel and an unidentified auxiliary officer. Sanford firefighter Pete Tucker was treated at Seminole Memorial Hospital and county fire department reports indicated duty chief Lou Poole and firefighter William Brady were treated at Florida Hospital North at Altamonte Springs. Officials said at 8 a.m. Saturday that repairs had been made at the water plant and it was back in normal service. In other reports Saturday, the Florida Highway Patrol was searching for the unidentified driver of a pickup truck that crashed into a tree, a utility pole and fence before bursting into flames on Markham Woods Road just south of Lake Mary Boulevard. The truck was being pursued by a state trooper. Officers said the man driving the truck jumped a nearby gate and fled on foot into a wooded area on the west side of Markham Woods Road after the 12:30 a.m. incident. Seminole County sheriff's deputies and Lake Mary police used a tracking dog in unsuccessful efforts to locate the driver in the wooded area. Seminole County firemen extinguished the burning vehicle and Florida Power Corporation crews repaired damaged power lines as the manhunt progressed. Troopers said trooper T.H. McIntyre attempted to stop the pickup truck at 4 near the Lake Mary exit for a traffic violation but the vehicle sped south on the interstate. The trooper pursued the truck onto SR-434 and then north on Markham Woods Road before the truck veered across the two-lane roadway just south of Lake Mary Boulevard and crashed into the tree, pole and fence and caught fire. Also, two Illinois men were in county jail at Sanford in lieu of \$3,000 bond each Saturday after allegedly selling Orlando Police and Seminole Sheriff's undercover agents a stolen car at Fern Park. Booked on charges of receiving stolen property were Jessie Lee Brown, 18, of Dalton, Ill., and Anthony Martin D'Amore, 23, of Beechblum, Pa. (C-1)

Food Stamp Benefits increased

By JANE CASSELLBERY Herald Staff Writer Some 100 Seminole County households are now eligible for additional stamps, according to John C. Spencer, head of the local office. Food stamps are now being purchased by an average of 2,300 families each month from the county food stamp office at 218 S. Oak Ave., Sanford. Food stamp benefits went up for millions of Americans Friday and another increase is likely next January, says a spokesman for the Agriculture Department. Spencer said a proposed change in the law now before Congress that would allow dispensing of free food stamps without the recipient having to pay, would make the administrative job of his office much simpler if passed. The local food stamp office is open from 9 a.m. to noon, Monday through Friday with the exception of the last working day of the month. A typical family of four now gets \$10 a month in food stamps, a 44 jump over what was in effect since Jan. 1, 1976. The 2 1/2 per cent increase is the first in 18 months. Stephen J. Hiemstra of the Agriculture Department's Food and Nutrition Service says it is "very likely" that another food stamp increase will follow Jan. 1 to help families cope with rising grocery bills. But he would not speculate how much it might be. The program is expected to cost \$4 billion this fiscal year, which ends Sept. 30. (See TRUCK, Page 2A)



Property Tax Hike For Seminole? Figures Point To It

By DONNA ESTES Herald Staff Writer Property taxes throughout Seminole County may be going up, according to the certified tax rate figures compiled by Property Appraiser Terry Gombel's office and forwarded to Tallahassee for approval Friday. The proposed increases range from a low of one cent per \$1,000 value of property in Lake Mary to a high of 22 cents for all the county's taxpayers for the school board. State law requires the county property appraiser's office to increase the certified millage unless at least a five per cent increase in property value is seen, exclusive of new construction. The law does not require the governing bodies to levy taxes at the certified level, however. The property appraisal roll has been forwarded to Harry Cox, executive director of the Florida Department of Revenue, and is expected to be approved within three weeks. The roll will be considered "estimates" until after the property appraisal adjustment board composed of three county commissioners and two school board members holds hearings later this month or early in August. The "estimates" are being sent as well to taxing units in Seminole County: the school board, county commission and the cities for use in preparation of budgets for the new 1977-78 fiscal year to begin Oct. 1. Gombel's office in recent months was declared one of only a handful in the State of Florida that was fully complying with state law by appraising at "full market value." This week, the Florida Supreme Court declared unconstitutional a law in effect for the past 10 years or so, which gave property owners the right to have their land appraisals reduced by offering the appraiser a reduced price for the property for sale. If the high bid was less than the value set by the property appraiser's office, the property appraiser was required by law to reduce the appraisal to that figure. The striking down of that law will have no effect on Seminole County. Assessor Bill Sobel said initially that during the 10 years or more of the law's existence only two property owners availed themselves of that right. But, in both cases high bids were less than the property's appraised value and the appraisal value had to be reduced. The certified tax millage would have the school board raise its taxes, if wished. That possibility of gaining an additional \$1 million in additional revenue from local sources will place the school board in the queue for considering whether the gain is worth a resulting partial loss of state funding. The total value of Seminole County property was listed by Gombel's office at \$2,051,892,332. Subtracted from that total to arrive at the taxable property value was \$1,000,000,000. Agricultural assessments and inventory properties owned by state, federal and local governments totaling \$90,488,888 in \$2,370,888. The appraisal process includes the adding on of just value of agricultural and classified use value, minus personal property and inventory at 100 per cent, minus exemptions of \$17,264,898, exemption widow's \$902,193.
