Kennedy accused of assault

BOSTON - A teenage motorist filed a complaint Tuesday accusing Rep. Joseph Kennedy IL D-Mass, of assaulting him after their cars nearly collided, but said later that he intended to drop the complaint.

Victor Avila, 17, filed the complaint in Brighton District Court but said he decided to go back to court Wednesday to drop his complaint after Kennedy, 36, visited his house and 'apologized,'

The incident happened around 12.40 p.m. EST when Avila, who lives near Kennedy in the city's Brighton section, was driving up a hill and nearly coilided with Kennedy's station wagon as he came driving down the hill, a police report

Kennedy told the Boston Herald that Avila came up the street at a very high rate of speed I had to swerve to avoid a collision

Asked if he had any physical contact with the youth. Kennedy said. "I went over to him and reprimanded him strongly, and I told him to never drive that fast again down the street I think we both touched each other

Avila said both cars were speeding traveling at around 30 mph to the residential neighborhood, and that each swerved to the right to avoid a collision.



Fugitive financier due to return

MIAMI - Henry Gherman, the financial planner who fled in August after allegedly defrauding dozens of doctors out of asmuch as \$20 million, headed home to Miami Tuesday to face charges of mail fraud and embezzlement.

Gherman, arrested in Japan in October, was expected at Miami International Airport accompanied by U.S. Marshals aboard Northwest Airlines flight 999, according to Paul Miller of the Federal Bureau of Investigation

Gherman, 52, was charged in August on two counts of mailfraud and five counts of embezzlement. U.S. Attorney Dexter-Lehtinen said then that hundreds of nurses and secretaries, in addition to doctors, lost money when Gherman withdrew cash from their pension plans before skipping town in August

Federal officials believe Gherman may be responsible for the theft of more than \$20 million in personal investments and

Agents seize tons of cocaine

MIAMI — Customs agents said Tuesday they seized almost 3 15 tons of cocaine, arrested five people and seized three vehicles. and two freighters within the past week as part of a crackdown.

Customs spokesman Michael Sheehan said seven seizures have netted 10.982 pounds of cocaine durig the past four no aths as part of Operation Riverwatch, a multi-agency crackdown on illegal drug imports

Sheehan said the vessel "Cha Cha arrived in Mauni Dec. 13. after developing engine problems en route to the United States and drifting into Cuban waters. It was detained by Cuban. authorities for about a week and released

The vessel was then towed to Miami, and after federal drugagents kept a watch, they boarded the boat and found 1.941 pounds of cocaine concealed within its starboard fuel tanks Sheehan said.

Eduan Suaza, Ivor Martinez, Juan Vanegas and Karl Sjogreen, all Colombians, were arrested, Sheehan said-

In the second seizure, agents discovered 4.792 pounds of cocaine hidden in a freignter's ballast tanks, which Sheehan said may have been a record amount for seizures along the

The "Santo Domingo Express" a 300-foot freighter, arrived in Miami Dec. 16. It began its trip in Panama, traveled along the Colombian coast and stopped in Aruba before arriving in

Prison escapees captured in Tampa

TAMPA - Hillsborough County Sheriff's officers evacuated a Wendy's restaurant and an Economy Inn for three hours Tuesday during a standoff with two escaped prisoners.

Charles Thomas Boatwright, 32, and Wade Allen Dickinson. 21. had escaped from the Hillsborough County pre-trial detention center, a maximum security facility, earlier in the day, said police spokesman Jack Espinosa

The two broke through a chain-link fence, dug underneath a tence with razor sharp edges and scaled a 12-foot wall to reach an accomplice in a late model, blue and white pick-up truck. Espinosa said

They somehow unwoved a chain link fence in the recreation. yard," Espinosa said. "They went through one strand of razor. wire and used the chain link fence to scale the 12 foot wall.

He said the men broke through a second razor wire on top of the wall. 'Somehow they got though that and they jumped offthe top of the wall onto the street

SANFORD - Seminole County legislators defined a projected quarter of a billion dollar transportation revenue shortfall as their number one problem facing Central Florida.

Newly-elected Dist. 17 Sen. W.W. Bud" Gardner, Jr. D. Titusville, told Seminole County leaders the state is facing a \$265 million to \$270 million revenue shortfall that could delay two local road projects indefinitely

What we're going to see is a battle with South Florida tolks for whatever money we can get Gardner said. "They have their problems that's true but we have our needs here too.

Pump cracked in Atlantis launch

CAPE CANAVERAL - NASA said Tues day a bearing assembly in a high pressure. main engine liquid oxygen pump cracked before or during the shuttle Atlantis's faunch Dec. 2, but said it was too early tosay what impact - if any - the problem might have

Data from the launch showed higher-than-normal vibration levels in the powerhouse "LOX" pump right at or shortly after, ignition. During a post flightinspection Saturday a tiny, 005 inch wide crack in a bearing race was discovered.

The race is the circular housing that contains ball bearings that are critical to pullip operation

This is the first time I think that we've had that problem - said Boyce Mix a NASA engineer at the Stennis Space Center in Mississippi. We replace the LOX pump for

each flight and the overhaul of those pumps. installs new bearings.

But it is a concern. First of all, we were trying to come up with a wheme and have enough data so we could extend the flightlife of the LOX pumps so we don't have such big maintenance problems. Now we've got the problem of a crack in a race, which is not a good deal

The crack was found in main engine No 3. serial No. 2029, during inspections. Saturday at the Kennedy Space Center Atlantis landed Dec. 6 at Edwards Air Force Base Calif. to close out the 27th shuttle mission, the second since the 1986-Challenger disaster



Gardner stakes out Seminole County

W.W. "Bud" Gardner, the newly-elected state senator for the 17th District, which includes portions of Seminole County, was in Sanford Tuesday and looking good practicing the art of politics - mixing with his

But there is much more to Mr. Gardner than apperance. He is a seasoned and effective veteran of the state's House of Representatives. His elevation to the state Senate gives him territory he is not so familiar with, his newly acquired Seminole County territory.

But in his remarks to the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce yesterday, he promised to visit his office in Sanford every week or two at the minimum. And, he told the gathering of some 40 business, education, banking and other community leaders, he intended to represent everone - those who would attend chamber functions and those who would be less likely to travel in that circle.

Those are good steps in the right direction. That kind of exposure, coupled with the kind of effective work in the Legislature he has a reputation for, should earn him the respect and support of voters in the Sanford area.

U.S. can help Mexico restruuture its debt

As Mexico's new president, Carlos Salinas de Gortari faces the daunting job of satisfying the requirements of foreign creditors even as popular demands mount for a unilateral moratorium on debt repayment.

Mr. Salinas's selection of a banker, Fernando Solana, as his foreign minister illustrates the singular priority he gives to debt relief as the essential first step toward Mexico's economic recovery and continued social stability.

Mr. Solana, president of the National Bank of Mexico, provides a marked contrast with his predecessor, Bernardo Sepulveda, As foreign minister under Miguel de la Madrid. Mr. Sepulveda often set teeth on edge in Washington with his enthusiastic support for the Marxist regime in Nicaragua and his warm relationship with Fidel Castro in Cuba.

Mr. Salinas pledged during his campaign to renegotiate Mexico's \$105 billion external debt, both as an economic and political necessity. At present, payments on the debt consume 40 percent of export earnings, and that figure may go higher if the price of oil does not stabilize on the world market.

With so much of its earnings being consumed by debt payments instead of investment. Mexico stands little chance of growing out of its economic plight.

Creditors and Secretary of State-designate James Baker would be wise to listen to the plea made by President Salinas and his new foreign minister. Devising a comprehensive plan now to ease the debt burden would be far smarter than waiting until the panie of default and social unrest are at hand.

The inauguration of Carlos Salinas de Gortari, followed next month by that of George Bush, ought to herald a new era of cooperation between the United States and Mexico. As the two countries become increasingly interdependent, they cannot afford anything less.

We need a way to measure wellness

WASHINGTON - If President-elect Bush is still seeking a Christmas present for the nation, let me suggest he give us a new yardstick. We could even wait a month, until inauguration Day, when it could go on sale.

Here's what I mean: From scores of voter interviews during the past campaign year, I learned that the American people are, for the most part, pretty content with the way things are. That's the big reason George Bush will be the next President.

But they are concerned about where the country is heading. They're aware of growing gaps between the rich and poor here at home The winter plight of the homeless makes it all too visible. And they also know we're in an increasingly competitive world economy and we're not winning

communities and wonder whether their children and grandchildren will have the opportunities they have enjoyed. No one need doubt the willingness of the

So they worry about the future of their

American people to tackle whatever challenges lie ahead. They rally round any worthy cause. from crime watches in their neighborhoods to relief drives for shattered villages in America.

But they need to know how we're doing as a nation and a people. President Reagan was re-elected in 1984 on the boast that "America is back and standing tall." The brag that "We're came across the deak the other day from the No. 1" comes easily to our lips. But daily, people



These should be challenges to the nation, not just the government - goals which require wise public policies and real effort on the part of people, not just spending by Washington. And each of them should be specific enough to permit measurement -- not something that can be fuzzed by thetoric or logged in partiaan debate.

The Energy secretary, for example, might suggest that the energy efficiency of the economy or the extent to which we free ourself from dependence on foreign oil is an important measure of our future strength.

Quiet but effective, NED celebrates fifth birthday

for Democracy, one of this decade's good deeds, last week celebrated its fifth birthday as quietly as it does its work and with the scant public acclaim that usually comes to institutions that are unobtrusively useful.

This private and bipartisan grant-making body, which is funded by Congress, was originally viewed with suspicion by people to fastidious to countenance any U.S. "interference," however delicate, in the "internal affairs," however promising, of an action, however situated. Today, NED's spending is the biggest bargain in government. It is one reason why the percentage of the world's population classified by Freedom House as living in "free" countries is 38.3 percent, an all-time high.

The people at NED know too much about the complexities of popular government to claim inordinate credit for the undeniable porgress of democracy in this decade. But they are teachers of the learned art of democracy. They know how to prepare the stony ground of authoritarian societies for the seeds of democratic skills - organization, mass persuasion.

NED's mission is to direct open support. financial and technical, to groups working to enrich the institutions of civil society beneath the brittle crust of oppressive regimes. NED contributed to the crumbline of that crust in

In the referendum against the Pinochet dictatorship, democracy won a narrow (54 percent) victory because of a huge turnout (92 percent of the electorate). The margin of victory can reasonably be credited to polling the other assistance from American political consultants organized by NED Funds from NED helped 200,000 poor voters acquire the small photographs required of voters. This cost just \$25,000...

NED is one reason why Poland today has a thousand independent cultural institutions publishers of books and periodicals, filmmakers, schools. Such small efforts can. cumulatively, crack political concrete.

Carl Gershman, NED's president, believes that for many centuries many factors - "the Crusades, which decimated the nobles; the printing press, which spread knowledge to all classes; the discovery of America, which gave opportunity to millions" - have had a tendency to help democracy. But he also knows that a tendency is not an inevitability. And he knows that this century, with its most important political innovation, totalitarianism. has posed the danger that new tendencies (bureaucratization, refinements of terror,

propaganda and other means of social control) might mean that democracy is an arrangement accessible only to a minority of privi-

The year 1975 was pivotal, Indochina fell to communism and Indira Gandhi's state of emergency turned the world's largest democ-

racy into the world's second largest dictatorship. But regimes in Portugal, Spain and Greece were democratized. For the first time in history. Western Europe was cleansed of dictatorship.

Larry Diamond of the Hoover Institution, writing in The Washington Quarterly, notes the since then there has emerged "a kind of global Zietgeist for democracy." Start-ing from various points, there have been varities of progress in the Philippines South Korea,

Tatwan, Thailand, The Dominican Republic, Grenada, Haiti, Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Peru, Uruguay, and Nigeria, among other nations.

In North Atlantic nations, democracy often came gradually and from above, with the slow widening of competition among elites. Today the task in the Third World is the transition from authoritarianism by means of gradualism from below. What Diamond calls the "efflorescence of associational life" requires "the reconstruction of the boundary between the state and civil society." Such reconstruction is NED's specialty.

Authoritarian regimes become porous as civil society becomes enriched with independent business, labor, religious, cultural and other mediating institutions serving as buffers between the individual and the state. As the autonomy of society grows, so do channels for articulating interests. Something else grows the most potent solvent of hegemonic regimes. the broad and rapid diffusion of ideas. aspirations, information, and awareness of

Iranian men treat women as chattle

WASHINGTON - The brains of women are smaller than the brains of men and that's why men are the rulers and women are the housekeepers. It's true. Just ask Hashemi Rassanjani, the speaker of the Iranian parliament. He is the man whom the Reagan adminstration considers to be the moderate hope of a dissolute Iran.

Rafsanjani opined on the shortcomings of the female anatomy in a prayer sermon: "A man's brain is larger. Women mature too fast. The breathing power of men's lungs is greater and women's heartbeats are faster. Men heed reasoning and logic, whereas most women tend to be emotional. ... Courage and daring are stronger in men.

When Rafsanjani speaks, others follow-Hadi Khameini, the brother of Iranian president Mohammad Khameini and a parliamentary deputy, likes the small-brain

theory too. The average size of a man's brain is larger than a woman's." he was quoted as saying in a Persian language newspaper. man's nervous system is more resistant. He is less afraid and deals with danger more easily. A woman's feelings are less stable than a man's. A woman is

more cautious. fearful, talkative and ceremonious than a Women man cannot compete with men in the rational sciences and problems of pure logic Abstaining from Thousands of women have fled from the clutches of the Ayatollah Khomeini

Dreadful torture for women - now there's a subject on which Iranians are the authorities. Thousands of women have fled the clutches of the Ayatoliah Khomeini. We have reported on the torture, beatings, rape and imprisonment women have suffered when their only offense was to appear in public without being fully covered by the chador, a black veil. We have spoken with women who have escaped from Khomeini's repression and they paint a picture of Islam that relegates women to the

The Iranian constitution bars women from being judges or rulers. Mohammad Yazdi. deputy speaker of Khomeini's parliament says that "no matter at what stage of knowledge, virtue, perfection and prudence a woman is, she does not have the right to rule. A women does not have the right to leave her home without her husband's permission. She does not have the right even to attend her father's funeral procession without her husband's permission. ... That is, a woman is completely in the service of her husband."

Of course, because of the exigencies of war, women are needed as office workers, too. But restrictions have been imposed on them. They cannot look a male co-worker in the eye, even when talking. A woman who does is fined \$125.

Khomeini has carried this segregation of the sexes to deadly extremes. We know of the case of one 13-year-old girl who drowned while awimming in the Caspian Sea. Khomeini's fanatical Revolutionary Guards prevented male bystanders from rescuing her because contact with her body would be immodest.

Having a small brain and a husband to wait on does not exempt women from service in Khomeint's army. He sent women to the front in his war against Iraq. Khomeini's rationale was that the presence of women would slow the advance of the Iraqis. If that didn't work. at least Khomeini could count on the presence of the women to stir the superior macho juices of his male soldiers.

"If a group of women join in somewhere where fighting is going on." Khomeini reasoned, "not only do they fight themselves, but they double the strength of the men."

NEW YORK - Police arrested five suspected jewel thieves Tuesday as they sat sipping champagne and counting more than \$700,000 worth of diamonds stolen from a Fifth Avenue gem brokerage earlier in the day.

"That's exactly what they were having - a party," said police Capt. Charles Alifano, whose squad headed the investigation.

The loot was spread across a coffee table and stashed in plastic shopping bags when police burst into the seventh floor apartment in Manhattan at about 4 p.m. and arrested the suspects, he said.

All were charged with burglary and criminal possession of stolen property, police said.

The suspects were "sitting around the table, counting their loot," sipping champagne and Chivas Regal scotch and munching on fruit when police spoiled their celebration, Alifano said.

Police declined to say what led them to the suspects.

Plans call for a small boat to be used Wednesday to catch the attention of the 300-to-400 pound, five-foot-long dolphin. Divers will then encircle the mammal, snare it in a net and move it to a Coast Guard helicopter.

Once "Rascal" is moved aboard the helicopter, marine officials plan to release the dolphin off the North Carolina coast. It is hoped the dolphin will then meet up with other dolphins migrating south toward warmer water.

"It does have some danger, because it is a big animal, but we have very experienced, well-trained divers," said Michael Hillier, a local dive shop owner who took a boat out Tuesday to visit the dolphin.

Other dolphins left the area at the end of the summer to migrate to warmer Atlantic Ocean waters further south, but Rascal stayed behind.

Accused child killer's trial testimony continues

NEW YORK - Two police officers testified Tuesday at the murder trial of accused child killer Joel Steinberg that they saw his ex-lover sitting in a car drinking beer as the 6-year-old girl raised by the couple lay dying at home.

The accounts of the two officers opened the defense case by disputing some of the testimony of Hedda Nussbaum, Steinberg's former live-in girlfriend and a key witness against him.

Steinberg, 47, is charged in state Supreme Court of murdering Lina Steinberg, 6, the child he took in as his own instead without adopting the girl. He had promised the girl's natural mother to arrange an adoption for a fee, but never did

He is accused of beating Lisa into a coma the evening of Nov. 1, 1987, then leaving the unconscious child with Nusshaum in their Greenwich Village apart. Lisa ment to go out for dinner.

The child was brought to the hospital the next day and died Nov. 5. The couple was arrested Nov. 2

Police officer Thomas Andry testified Tuesday that at 8.40 p.m. on Nov. 1, 1987, he reconded to a radio report. possible stolen car and instead found Nussbaum sitting inside the vehicle a few feet from the apartment drinking a beer.

Nussbaum, who offered some of the most damaging testimony against Steinberg, told the jury under oath she never left their apartment after Steinberg handed her the child's battered body before 7 p.m. on Nov. 1.

The officer testified that after he ordered the woman out of the car, he spoke to her from a distance of 3 feet.

Defense lawyer Ira London asked the officer if there was "any question in your mind that the woman that you saw in the car ... was Hedda Nussbaum."

There is no question about it," said the young officer, who joined the police force in 1985.

London, who strongly indicated he will try to blame Nussbaum for Lisa's death. asked Andry how he came to learn the identity of the woman in the car.

Andry replied that he recognized her from television reports about the couple's arrest the following day



Hostage's family appeals to kidnappers

BEIRUT, Lebanon - The family of Irish hostage Brian Keenan, who has been held in Lebanon by pro-Iranian extremists for more than two years, made a Christmas appeal Wednesday for his release.

The plea was made in a letter published in the independent An-Nahar newspaper. It was signed by Keenan's mother, Maria, and his two sisters, Brenda and Helen.

'We call on your abductors to free you so that (you can) join us on Christmas," the letter said. "We always remember you, particularly during this period of each year.

We are doing our best with all concerned parties to free you. We love you and miss you," the letter said.

Keenan, 33, an English teacher at the American University of Betrut, disappeared April 11, 1986 while on his way to work. No group has claimed responsibility for his abduction.

The Irish national is among 15 foreigners, including nine Americans, believed held in Lebanon by militants loyal to fran-

Argentine army chief resigns

BUENOS AIRES. Argentina - Argentina's three highestranking generals met a key demand of rebel officers by offering their resignations, but President Raul Alfonsin insisted his government has not caved in to the mulineers.

The army's high command said in a statement Tuesday evening that Chief of Staff Gen. Jose Dante Caridi, Deputy. Chief of Staff Gen Miguel Abbate, and Inspector General Enrique Jorge Bianch! had "reiterated their request to go intoretirement.

The generals, the three highest-ranking men in the army, are believed to have privately asked President Raul Alfonsin to relieve them after several days of military revolts, beginning Dec. 2, in which rebel officers seized two bases.

The army announced the resignations shortly after Caridi met with Alfonsin in the downtown presidential palace.

Alfonsin, facing widespread criticism from opposition leaders who have accused him of making a secret deal with military. rebels to end the uprisings, called a special session of Congress for 10 a.m. (8 a.m. EST) Wednesday to explain his handling of

With presidential elections only at a months away, Alfonsin has repeatedly insisted he did not make any concessions to rebel army officers who seized the infantry school at the Campo de Mayo base, 20 miles northwest of Buenos Aires, on Dec. 2 and then captured the 101st Infantry Batallion headquarters in Villa Martelli on the northern rim of the

Security not linked to coup attempt

KHARTOUM, Sudan - The Sudanese government vested itself with sweeping powers to arrest and detain suspects under a new state-of-emergency declaration, but officials denied the move was linked to reports of a weekend coup attempt.

He said authorities directed police and soldiers to "take necessary measures" to maintain public safety and political stability. The order gives security forces the right to arrest suspects without judicial warrants and to detain them without charges

PORT VILA, Vanuatu - Police arrested President George Ati Sokomanu and searched his official residence Wednesday, five days after he tried to dissolve the legislature of the South Pacific island nation, family members said.

The report by relatives of Sokomanu's detention, which could not be independently confirmed, came as political opponents took steps to have him removed from office on charges of treason.

About 20 uniformed and plainclothes officers searched Sokomanu's official residence and took him to police headquarters for questioning, his relatives said.

Earlier in the day, 20 of 46 members of Parliament loyal to Prime Minister the Rev. Walter Lini signed a motion to convene a meeting of the Electoral College seeking to remove Sokomanu from office.

Japanese, Soviets agree to continue territory talks

TOKYO - The Soviet Union and Japan failed to make headway on a territorial dispute dating back to the closing days of World War II, but agreed Wednesday to establish a permanent forum to study the problem.

The agreement to establish a forum came at the conclusion of a four-day visit by Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze. who had engaged in sometimes-heated discussions with his Japanese counterpart Sosuke Uno over the territorial

Officials said no progress was made toward resolving the dispute, which involves four islands off Japan's northern coast that were seized by the Soviet Union at the end of World War IL

Japan also balked at Soviet requests for economic agreements to increase trade and foreign investment.

But in a joint statement relessed three hours after Shevardnadze's departure for the Philippines, the two sides agreed to set up a permanent working committee to resolve the territorial issue and clear the way for the signing of a peace treaty to formally end World War II hostilities. The Soviet Union and Japan never signed an accord to end the war.

"This agreement is one of the most important outcomes of my visit to Japan this time, Shevradnadze told a news conference at the Japan National Press Club Just before his de-

"The proposed peace treaty will comprise all pending problems - political, economic and geographical." he said.

"I believe that our talks helped elevate the level of mutual understanding and opened a new chapter in Soviet-Japanese relations," he said.

During his visit. Shevradnadze told Prime Minster Noboru Takeshita that Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev was planning to travel to Japan in what would be the first visit by a Soviet leader.

Uno said at least four more meetings at the foreign ministry level would be needed before such a summit, indicating that Gorbachev's visit would not take place for at least another year.

The Soviet Union in the past has refused to recognize that a territorial dispute exists between the two countries, and Uno said there was no clear evidence of a shift in Soviet policy

There is no change in the Soviet understanding of the islands issue and the severity of that issue has not changed," Uno told a news conference three hours after Shevradnadze's departure.

Uno said Japan would not consider signing a peace treaty until the Soviet Union returns the disputed islands to Japanese.

A Japanese Foreign Ministry spokesman said Japan also refused Soviet proposals for new agreements on investment and trade.

The overall situation is not suitable for further promotion of investment," the spokesman said. "We don't see a need of adding to existing treaties."

Although the two countries" current trade level is double the exchange between the Soviet Union and either the United States or Britain, Japan has been reluctant to supply its high technology to Moscow or enter into major investment projects.

Shevardnadze arrives in Manila

MANILA, Philippines - Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze arrived in Manila Wednesday for high-level talks that are expected to touch on the future of U.S. military bases in the Philippines.

We have a great deal to say to each other on the prospects of our bilateral relations, on the altuation in the Asia-Pacific region and on the current state of international affairs. Shevardnadze said in a state-

Shevardnadze noted he is the highest Soviet official to visit the Philippines since diplomatic relations were established in 1976. and he said the 24-hour visit would further advance "new trends" in the ties between the two countries.

The Soviet official, who arrived in Manila from a four-day visit to Japan, said he was looking forward to his meetings Thursday with Foreign Secretary Raul Manglapus and President Corazon Aquino before he leaves for North Korea in the final leg of his three nation Asian tour.

Manglapus, who welcomed airport, said he expected talks with the Soviet official would touch on the future of the U.S. Clark Air Base and Subic Bay Naval Base, Washington's largest overseas installations.

Manglapus has said the future of the bases was strictly a matter for the Philippines and the United States to decide. The 41-year-old treaty covering the bases expires in 1991.

Before leaving Tokyo. Shevardnadze told reporters his talks with Japanese leaders produced "the most substantial and fruitful results" in recent relations between the two countries.

Master wastewater pump may be replaced

By BRAD CHURCH Herald staff writer

SANFORD - Sanford commissioners have received some good news and some bad news about the next phase of the wastewater plant improvement project replacement of the master pump

Bill Simmons, director of engineering and planning, told the commissioners at a Monday workshop that the state has discontinued grants for which the project would be eligible.

However, the good news is that the project is at the top of a list of projects eligible for a Revolving Fund.

Utility customers have a mixed message from this news too - their utility rates will increase to pay off the loan, but not as much as they would if the city nold bonds for the project at a higher interest rate.

Simmons told commissioners the 25-year-old master pump innk" in the revamped wastewater treatment and distribution system if it is not replaced

He said the series of pumps lifts raw sewage from where it flows out of gravity sewers about 12 feet below the ground, to the sewage treatment plant about 20 feet above ground level.

Simmons and consultant Paul Porter of Conklin, Porter and Holmes, said the city would be charged a maximum of 4.66 percent on a 30-year loan from the revolving fund, which would be much cheaper than selling bonds to pay for the pump

Total interest costs are estimated by Porter to be \$2.9 million on a 4.5 percent loan. compared with \$4.8 million for low interest loan from the State. the present "going rate" of 7.5.

> Plans for the new pumping station are complete and Porter said the station should be constructed before those plan are outdated.

The commission is expected to authorize at its next meeting a utility rate study to determine how much of an increase will be station will become the "weak needed to pay off the loan, and Simmons will formally apply for the state loan.

Sanford community development office running out of funds

SANFORD - Partially as a result of Seminole County's discounting of the eligibility for relmbursement of administrative funds for Sanford's rental rehabilitation program and emergency shelter program. the city's community development office is running out of money to keep it operating

Sanford's federal Community Development Block Grant (CBDG) programs are funded through the county, which receives the funds, then allocates them from among applications from unicorporated areas, and from cities in the county

The city commission will decide next Tuesday night whether to allocate \$16,194.81 from community development contingency funds to keep the department operating through the rest of the Itscal year. (The countration's regular meeting will be Tuesday Dec. 27, since Dec. 26 is a holiday for city

employees I engineering and planning, told contractor city commissioners at a Monday work session that the money is county's CBDG staff determination that \$19.928.45 in administrative costs for Sanford's two year CDHG program have been declared ineligible for funding, and have been reimbursed. to the county, Richard Woods, city community development director was unable to attend the meeting

The ineligible expenses are the county-funded rental rehabilitation program \$3.718.65 for administration of the county funded emergency shelter program, and \$6,293.99 for staff support of the WINS (Westside Investment Neighborhood Strat egyl program.

Simmons said officials of the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). which allocated CDBG money. say administration of the rental rehab and emergency shelter programs are eligible for CBDG money However, the interlocalagreement between Sanford and Seminole County outlining use of the grant, disallows using the funds for those purposes. Simmons told commissioners the county CDBG office was being "overly strict" in climinating the use of block grant funds for administration of those two pro-

When the city budget for the the community development department was approved for this fiscal year, a request for \$63,000 in administrative lunds. was cut to \$15,000, but another \$48,000 was placed in a reserve. account to be used to case other. eligible projects came up for which the city was required to put up matching funds. It is from this fund that Simmons is requesting the \$16,000 plus to keep a staff intact for the rest of the fiscal year.

Simmons said the request for aren't eligible an additional city appropriation takes into account staff reductions within the department. A rehabilitation specialist was dismissed and a full-time secretarial position was reduced to half-time to reduce administrative expenses, he said.

Simmons said the present full-time community development officer and inspector posttions are needed to carry out the present programs and to develop applications for next year's fun-

The city has announced it will

not be part of the county CDBG program next fiscal year, but will apply for federal funds directly under HUD's small cities. program

Simmons also responded to commissioners questions concerning other county staff critictems of Sanford's block grant programs, including failure to spend rental rehabilitation program money for actual rehabilitation the first year of the program although most of the administrative funds were spent. and the \$17,000 paid for an incompleted housing rehabilitation project, which the county CDBG office says it will not reimburse the city for

In the first year of the rental rehabilitation program the staff had to promulgate rules and regulations for the program before it could even begin to take applications for use of the money. Simmons said. The city could not draw down funds trom the county until the applications were processed and approved, bids were advertised. for and a bid accepted, and a Bill Simmons, city director of - partial payment was made to the

As a result. Summons said it was almost a year before reneeded as a result of the habilitation funds were able to be requested from the county although administrative work on several individual projects had been completed.





Pioneers gun down Wildcats

KISSIMMEE - Orlando Oak Ridge not only steamrolled past its second consecutive opponent and into today's consolation bracket final against Brandon at the Great Florida Shoot-Out but is fast creating defensive havoc for foes all over the court.

Oh yes, 6-foot-7 center Willie Fisher and 6-6 forward Alonzo Harris are still scoring at a consistently alarming pace. Just ask the third-ranked Pioneers' latest victim and District 4A-10 rival, the Winter Park Wildcats.

Yet, it was Oak Ridge's outside shooting inside the Osceola High School gym that left its most lasting impression on Winter Park point guard Willy Daunic and Coach Kerry Patrick.

"We figured we'd let them take the outside shot, but we didn't believe they'd hit that wellfrom out there." said Daunic, whose 22 points and dogged determination couldn't prevent an 86-62 defeat. "We experimented with a lot of defenses so that's when they got the most open shots."

The Pioneers' dynamic duo of Greg Hall and Brian Dixon did the most damage from long range.

Hall connected on 10-of-13 field goals and finished with a season-high 23 points, while Dixon hit on 7-of-12 from the floor on his way to 13 points. Fisher, who rejected four shots. and Harris complemented that tantem, totaling 29 points.

Last year opposing defenses just packed zone defenses around the paint and dared the Pioneers to consistently hit the outside jumper This season Hall, Dixon or Patrick Gordon force foes to abandon those tactics or watch Oak Ridge accumulate mass quantities of

"Yeh, we tried 12 defenses. Wegave them our dirty dozen." Patrick said. "But I've never seem them shoot that well from

the outside."








Dentures or allergies may be their problem

DEAR DR. GOTT: We are an old couple, 89 and 90. For some time now we both seem to have problems with water constantly dripping from our noses and an abundance of saliva. Is this yet

another consequence of old age?

DEAR READER: Watery nasal discharge is usually a sign of nose and sinus irritation When air, containing particles of smoke or dust or pollen, is drawn into the nose, the irritating substances cause the nasal membranes to react. The most common reaction, as we've all experienced, is a flood of watery problems. Remember when mucus. I suppose this is nature's way of trying to wash away the order by title. offending pollutant

Therefore, coptour nasal discharge is often a consequence of inhalational allergies, such as hay fever, or exposure to environmental pollution, such as amoke and amog An allergist could help you identify the cause of your nasal problem.

Excessive saliva, on the other hand, frequently results from foreign material in the mouth. The most common source of time material is dentures and bridgework that stimulate the salivary glands to over-produce. If you have dentures ask your dentist about this.



Candied-fruit desserts, Christmas go hand in hand

Studded with glistening bits of candled orange peel and glaceed cherries, desserts like fruitcake and stollen are traditional Yuletide treats. Colorful and intensely flavored, their disfinctive sweet, yet slightly bitter aroma and taste-a result of the candied fruits and peels that are added—are as much a part of the holiday season as the Christmas

Often storebought, desserts made with candied fruits are ideal for the home baker, particularly around the hectic holiday season. Many of them can be prepared in advance, and actually improve—their flavors mellowing and blending neatly together-as they age.

The recipes below range from classic candied fruit recipes to ones that are more unusual. The simple, elegant Fruitcake. Hedelmakakku, is a Scandinavian variation, the recipe for which is reproduced from The Great Scandinavian Baking Book by Beatrice Ojakangas.

Cover baking sheets with parchment paper or lightly grease them. Preheat oven to 350°F

In a large bowl, cream the butter and sugar. Add eggs and vanilla and beat well. Combine the flour, salt, baking soda, cinnamon, nutmeg, and cloves. Add to the creamed mixture to make a smooth dough. Mix in the fruits and nuts. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto the prepared baking sheets about 2 inches apart. Bake 8 to 10 minutes until lightly browned. Remove from baking sheets and cool on racks. Store in an airtight tin. These cookies keep well. Makes about 8 dozen cooktes.

dough; sprinkle the nuts and fruits to within I inch of the long edge. Roll up the dough lengthwise.

Place the roll, seam down, on a greased 12-by-18-inch cookie sheet, setting it diagonally (to accomodate its length) and tucking the ends under Make incisions with sharp scissors, about I inch apart, going almost-but not completelythrough to the bottom. Pull the slices alternately left and right, then pinch the top outside of each slice to a point. Let the roll stand in a warm place for about 30 minutes to rise. Brush the top






