Injuries from lightning more likely in July

Over the past week, Seminole County has suffered significant damage due to thunderstorms and lightning.

Last week, at least five homes were damaged and many roadways closed due to lightning strikes and downbursts of winds. More people die from lightning strikes in Florida every year, than in any other state, and July is statistically the worst month for lightning deaths Florida.

With many outdoor activities taking place during the afternoon and evening, a prime time for summer thunderstorms, local residents should take precautions.

Being safe from lightning is all about being in the right place. The most likely place to be struck by lightning in Florida is near water. Group sporting events such as baseball, football and soccer are particularly hazardous. If you can see lightning or hear thunder, even in the distance, you are in danger. Go indoors or into a vehicle and remain there until 30 minutes after the last thunder is heard.

Actions you can take to remain safe include:

- Avoid open high ground and isolated large trees.
- Avoid water (swimming pools, lakes and rivers), beaches and boats.
- Seek shelter inside a building or an automobile.
- Stay away from doors, windows, and metal objects such as pipes or faucets.
- Stay off the telephone and away from electrical devices.
- Monitor NOAA Weather Radio.

New law does little to protect children

WINTER SPRINGS — A new law that takes effect Oct. 1 will severely limit where convicted sex offenders on conditional release can live in Seminole County, but it will do little to further protect children.

"To be honest it's really not going to make any difference," said Stephen Holmes, an associate professor of criminal justice at the University of Central Florida. "Unfortunately it will just force the county to move bus stops

around."

Holmes is co-author of "Sex Crimes: Pattern and Behavior" and several other books on the subject.

Current Florida law states that sex offenders under conditional release cannot live within 1,000 feet of a school, day care center, park, playground or any place where children congregate.

The new law will extend that provision to include public school bus stops.

"There are very few places that these people can live," said Glen Hammer, supervisor of routes and

scheduling for the Seminole County Public Schools Transportation Department.

Seminole County has about 12,000 school bus stops, he said.

In considering the law, Hammer created a map showing county roads in blue. On top of the roads he placed green circles representing a 2,000-foot diameter at each bus stop.

The result shows only a dozen or so areas that would fit the criteria for a conditional release sex offender to live. In many cases, the areas are rural and there are no apartments or homes in

which to live.

Conditional release simply refers to the terms under which the prisoner was released. The law defines which crimes will have the new law applied, said Debbie Buchanan, spokeswoman for the Florida Department of Corrections.

"We're all going to have to work together to enforce the law," Buchanan said.

Hammer said the statewide number resulting from the new law will be

Summer school often part of the plan

SANFORD — The Lake Mary High School student said her life last year headed in a direction she did not like. In fact she dropped out of school.

"I was hanging out with the wrong people, partying, just doing stupid things," recalled 18-year-old Kelly Shugart.

Summer school is part of her plan to get her academic life back where she wants it.

"I know what I need to do to reach senior status," she said during a break at Seminole High School. "I want to be in all the senior activities."

A half dozen young people talked about how summer school has helped their education. They are among more than 13,000 Seminole County students to spend part of their summer in the classroom.

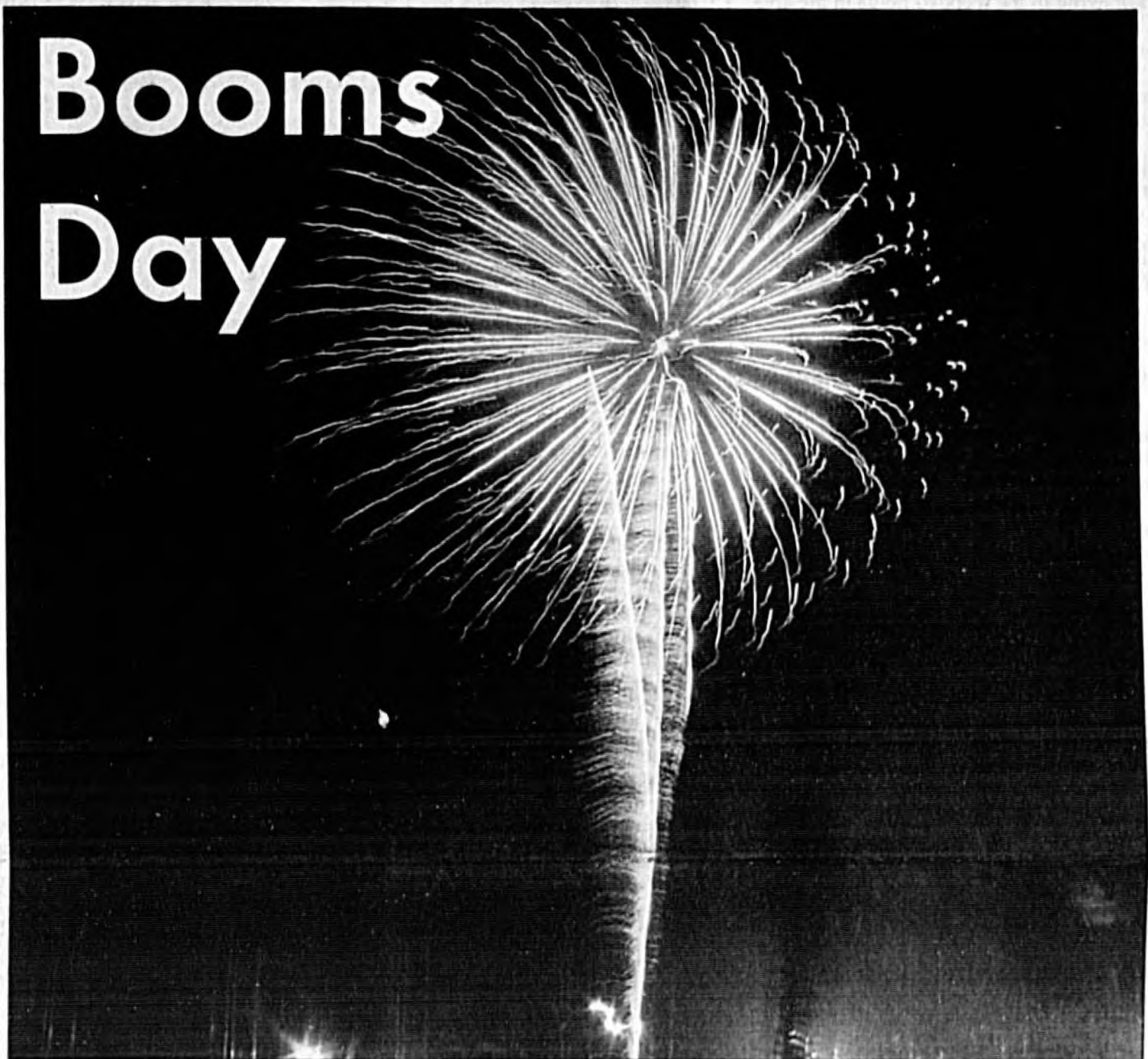
Assistant Principal Mike Gaudreux coordinates the nearly 1,800 students attending summer school at Seminole High School. Summer school gives young people a chance to try to improve, to get their credits or to replace a grade, Gaudreux said. Others use the time to advance in classes so they can participate in extracurricular activities during the regular school year.

"That's how kids get into these activities," he said, listing auto body, TV production, and dance team to name a few.

Alton Hicks, 18, a linebacker for the Lake Mary Rams, said he took geometry this summer even though he didn't have to because he

Weather, fireworks boom over Sanford

SANFORD — Mother Nature did her part to back up city officials' claims that Sanford is booming.

About four hours prior to man-made fireworks exploding over Lake Monroe, a massive thunderstorm drenched downtown and provided an impressive show of its own with bone-rattling bass thunderclaps

and hair-raising lightning strikes.

It wasn't enough to dampen the enthusiasm of nearly 100,000 people, though, who came to view Sanford's 26-minute fireworks show.

"The weather was brutal," said Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard, "but even with that, Sanford did a great job celebrating

Football star passes life lessons to youngsters

SANFORD — As a teenager growing up in Sanford, Britt Henderson learned first-hand about the dangers of following the crowd.

While hanging out with his friends one day, he found himself facing an accessory-to-murder charge. One of his friends decided to push a man off his bicycle. The man hit his head on the street's pavement and subsequently died.

Henderson said he had no idea of plans to harass the bicyclist. Because Henderson was with the boys, however, he and the other teenagers were arrested and charged in the man's death.

Henderson fought the case in court and won. He took advantage of his second chance.

He finished high school and earned a football scholarship at Savannah State University where he became a Division II All-American free safety. He led the nation in interceptions.

He left college early to play professionally for the Calgary Stampede of the Canadian Football League. He later returned to Savannah State to complete his degree.

Today, he is back home in Sanford.

For the past eight months he has worked as director of the Boys and Girls Club, where he shares his life experiences with young people in hopes of directing them to the path of success.

Henderson also serves as assistant football coach at Seminole High School. He takes a group from the high school each year to visit Savannah State trying to inspire them to attend college.

No only does he inspire teenagers, Henderson also gives pre-teens a boost of confidence.

At the Boys and Girls Club Summer Camp, young people are learning life skills, such as self-control. Through

Sanford woman missing since June 30, help sought

A Sanford mother disappeared after her daughter dropped her off in front of the Smokey Bones restaurant on S.R. 436 in Casselberry, according to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

The Sheriff's Office issued a Be On the Look Out, or BOLO, for 54-year-old Mary Margeret Davidson. Her daughter reported the woman missing just before 2 p.m. July 1, according to the Sheriff's Office report.

The daughter dropped her mom off at 1 p.m. the day before. When she returned to pick her mom up, she never returned. The daughter has not seen or heard from her mother since. The missing woman suffers from mental health issues and is taking medication, according to the report. She is a resident at 5084 Wayside Drive, Sanford.

The report also said the woman may have a son living in the wooded fields in the area of Birchwood and Reflection apartments in Casselberry.

The missing woman is a white female, 5 feet, 7 inches tall. She weighs about 200 pounds and has blond hair and hazel eyes.

The missing woman was last seen wearing a red, long-sleeve, flowered blouse. She wore light color pants and white shoes. She is missing her front teeth.

County on cutting edge of technology organization says

Seminole County government has been named one of the top 10 technologically advanced county governments in the United States.

The award was presented by the Center for Digital Government and the National Association of Counties, known as NACo.

Seminole County placed third in the 2004 Digital Counties Survey, which examines how county governments use information technology to deliver services to citizens.

The survey grouped counties into four population categories. Seminole County is in the 250,000 - 499,999 population range.

The county moved up from fourth place last year.

"The Digital Counties Survey is one of a series of studies we conduct throughout the year that examines how governments are applying IT to effectively serve their constituents," said Cathilea Robinett, executive director of the Center for Digital Government.

Seminole County developed an government strategic plan three years ago, according to a county news release.

The recent introduction of credit card acceptance opens a new door for government enhancements in Seminole County, the release said. Currently, the county accepts payment for water and sewer bills online. Seminole County is working with several other departments to provide the same type of service.

Seminole County will be honored by the Center and NACo at an awards reception held in conjunction with NACo's Annual Conference and Exposition, July 16-20.

small, probably less than 60 people. That could be just three or four in Seminole County, he said.

"The best protection is the diligence of the parents," Holmes said. "This new law is just going to change some bus stops."

There are many different sexual crimes, he said, but what parents and society need to worry about are the truly dangerous people. Those who prey on or troll for children are the dangerous sex offenders, he said.

"There's no way to tell who the dangerous pedophiles are," he said. They come from all walks of life, he added.

Parents need to watch their children. Watch them get on the bus, he said. If they have to ride bikes or walk, make sure they are not alone. Take the students to school if possible, he suggested. Watch what young people are doing on the Internet, especially who they chat with online.

"Just because you're tired or you work is not an excuse," he warned. He said he has three kids of his own.

He called the new law a reactionary, legal approach.

"It's important that people who are let out of prison have their rights protected," he said. "Then again, the protection of the community and, of paramount importance, the protection of kids is essential."

A balance must be reached, he said. Right now the law leans toward the protection of children, but who knows when a court could turn that around, he said.

On Oct. 1, if there is a school bus stop located within 1,000 feet of one of these convicted sex offenders, the stop must be relocated by the school district. The district also cannot create or relocate a stop within 1,000 feet of a sex offender under conditional release.

Moving bus stops is not

new to the county, Hammer said.

The district's policy has been to move the stops at least a tenth of a mile from any offender if possible, Hammer said. Parents notify the district and transportation employees check the Florida Department of Law Enforcement Web site, which lists the state's offenders.

Hammer estimated that he receives about 5,000 calls from parents every year about moving bus stops.

He also said some federal laws could create conditions making it difficult to meet the new state law. If an offender is staying at a hotel, he said, homeless children could be housed temporarily at the same hotel. Under federal law, the school district must create a stop to pick up the student.

Other federal laws govern transporting visually, hearing or physically impaired stu-

dents. These could create challenges as well, Hammer said.

Seminole County has so many bus stops because of its school choice program. The smallest may have just one child in a magnet program. The largest has 112, Hammer said.

Safety is the main factor in determining bus stops, he said. The district checks each site for visibility, for space for students to stand, and for traffic flow to name a few.

He described the process as a safety balancing act.

Last year, a parent called about a sex offender living in Sanford. The district moved the bus stop, but not by the tenth of a mile that was standard. Moving that distance would have put the stop on busy State Road 46A.

The routes for the upcoming year will be mailed out Tuesday July 27 as normal, Hammer said. School starts Aug. 2.

the club's nationwide "Passport to Manhood" program, boys are learning to avoid some of the pitfalls Henderson fell into as a teenager.

"They are teaching us not to hang out with the wrong crowd, and it's OK to be scared, not to bend to peer

pressure and not to retaliate to a particular situation," said Dirk Kendrick, 14, who participates in the program.

Passport to Manhood teaches youths how to respect themselves and others, said Khayree Pinder, coordinator of the program.

"A passport is a legal docu-

ment to get you to a foreign place," Pinder said. "We're giving them information about a place they've never been before, which is manhood. I'm teaching self-respect, self-control and personal hygiene. We're giving them tools for manhood and coming of age."

New Sanford thrift stores extend service to community

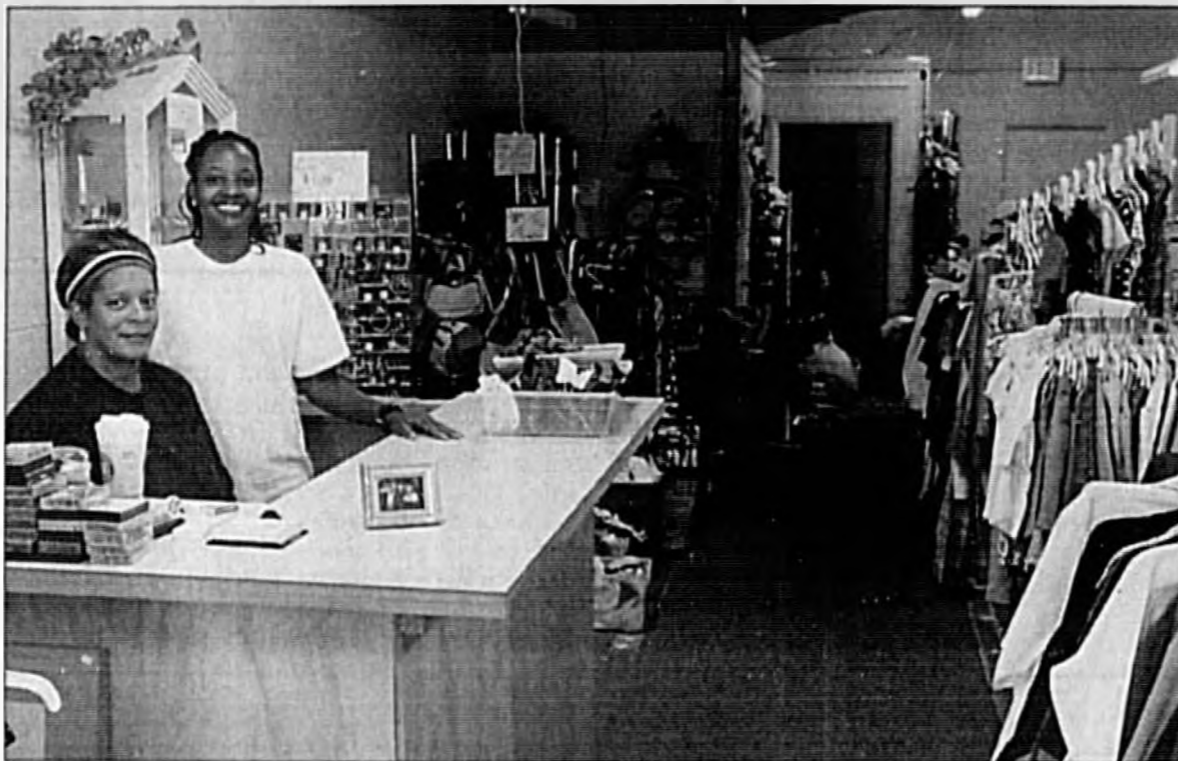

SANFORD — Colorful women's blouses and dresses catch the eye of passers-by. A children's section draws tots to the toys and games, and a reading room lures book lovers with countless used novels, best-sellers, religious and historical materials, and reference literature. There's an assortment of men's clothing, children's wear, appliances, bedding, office equipment and collectibles.

All and more — new and used — are among intriguing items displayed at two of Historic Downtown Sanford's newest thrift stores — Spirit of Truth Thrift and Gift Shop at Sanford Avenue and First Street and Ye Olde Recovery Shoppe at 214 Oak Ave., between Second and Third streets. Both stores opened in March and April and are operated by local non-profit corporations that serve the community through their extensive outreach programs.

While many retailers continue to weather sluggish sales, thrift stores, second-hand shops and consignment shops are faring well on a national scale, according to research. Residents are to these stores to stretch their dollars in a tight economy, but they are also finding quality merchandise.

"Those stores are holding steady because of their price level, and, secondly, [because] the consumer has become a smarter shopper," said Annan Amegbe, an economist at Morgan State University, a historically black college, in Baltimore, Md. "They want to stretch their dollars by going to retail outlets and second-hand stores."

In Sanford, five thrift stores have opened in the past year — with one of the largest (Thrift Depot) occupying the former Heilig-Meyers Furniture and JC Penney building in the Sanford Plaza on U.S. Highway 17-92. The stores serve a growing population. Three thrift stores operate within four blocks of each other — Goodwill, Spirit of Truth and Ye Olde Recovery House — in downtown Sanford. Meanwhile, the Salvation Army closed its downtown operation when its lease expired.

Goodwill is the oldest of the stores, and has maintained its current location on Third Street and Sanford Avenue for almost 30 years. Goodwill, a national operation that employs handicapped and able-bodied workers, has also established a Job

Sufficiency Center, located on Sanford Avenue at First Street. The center provides job referral services and assists residents with completing job applications, writing resumes' and gaining training for specialized employment.

The town's newest thrift stores also provide valuable services.

Spirit of Truth Thrift and Gift Shop is operated by Spirit of Truth Ministries, which owns a recovery house for men, distributes food and other items to the needy, provides free counseling and referral services, supports jail/prison ministries and as well as local and foreign mission work.

"The desire for the thrift store was birthed out of ministry," said Pastor Rico Sharp of Spirit of Truth Worship Ministry, which owns the store.

"This business allows us the opportunity to build a relationship with the people of the community, while the profits from the business go back into ministry and programs to serve the community."

Ye Olde Recovery Shoppe is an extension of The Recovery House of Central Florida, which includes Breaking Bread Christian Center. For more than 20 years, The Recovery House has offered residential drug treatment and counseling. The store is billed as "a unique store of unclaimed treasures," which features themed rooms, reading and play areas.

"We're trying to create a niche in downtown Sanford," said Bennie Ferrier, in-charge coordinator for the Recovery House. "We're just the typical thrift store on a smaller scale."

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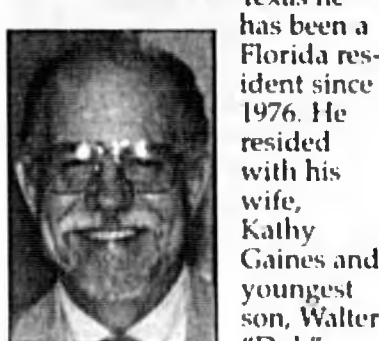

America's birthday." Despite the wet weather, city officials said the celebration went smoothly.

"Everybody seemed to be in a good mood, even with the rain," said Lisa Jones of the Sanford Recreation Department which coordinated the event. "We had some normal last-minute things we had to account for like vendors being in the wrong spot, but everything went very, very smooth."

That was good news for police chief Brian Tooley. With inclement weather and thousands of people, Tooley said there was the potential for problems to occur as tempers flare. That didn't happen.

"As the rains came, our officers were encouraging people to go to the cars to stay dry and safe," Tooley said. "We also opened up the Civic Center so people could get out of the weather."

About 90 officers patrolled the crowd throughout the day and night, Tooley said. There was one arrest.

"We had some people come up and inform us of a man urinating in public," Tooley said. "We were able to locate him and arrest him quickly. Other than that one incident, the crowd was very well behaved."

Just how many people attended the pyrotechnics

show is unclear. Tooley puts the number at about 100,000.

"The numbers are tough because of the ebb and flow caused by the weather," Tooley said. "I'm sure some people came and left when the weather got bad, but many stayed. We also had a lot of people come as the weather calmed a bit."

Tooley said it is also tough to determine crowd estimates because the show is visible from many different areas. The main activities, and most of the crowd, were located in Fort Mellon Park and the RiverWalk. However, people lined U.S. Highway 17/92 along Lake Monroe, as well as packed downtown and neighborhood sites such as the seawall just north of the Mayfair subdivision. Then there were thousands of spectators who watched the fireworks from their boats on Lake Monroe.

"In years past, it seemed like most of the people showed up right before the fireworks went off," Tooley said. "This year, the people started streaming in beginning about 3 or 4 p.m. We even noticed that many people had already staked out their seats even earlier."

"It was a good event," Tooley added. "It's unfortunate that the weather didn't cooperate better, but I think everyone had a good time."

wants to enroll in on the job training in his senior year.

He works at Checkers and plans to transfer to a Checkers near the college he attends.

"I already know I'll get accepted," he stated. He wants to go to Florida State or Virginia Tech.

Many students, like Shugart, want to catch up with their class after falling behind.

Shaquita Bennett, an 18-year-old Seminole High student, said she wants to replace her American government grades.

"We are more focused during the summer," said Bennett who also dropped out of school for a while. Hicks said he prefers the summer classes because they are not drawn out.

"I think I get better grades in a short time," he said. "For me, I like the experience of rushing."

Gaudreux said Shugart and Bennett are unique for returning to school after dropping out. Guidance helps students like them develop a plan to succeed.

Some students like them score low grades during the year because they didn't attend class enough, Gaudreux said. Four of the young people admitted they would probably sleep the summer away if they weren't in school.

Shugart yawned and admits it is hard to wake up and her grades suffered for that reason. She also confessed she arrived late that morning. Still she is doing better in class because she has to be there.

"Summer school is a privilege, not a right," Gaudreux said. "We kind of set the tone. You're going to behave or you're out. If you get sent up here for a referral, you are not getting you're credit."

All six young people said they were doing well during the summer and the main reason was focus.

Jovan Fisher, 18, of Lake Mary said he was trying to replace a low geometry grade. "I chose to come here," he said. "It's the summer time and I didn't want to spend it sleeping in."

He said one class and one teacher make it easier to concentrate. Rosa Hernandez already leads a busy life. The 18-year-old Seminole High student has a job.

She said it is not just the students who are more focused. The teachers concentrate on the students more during summer school. "We have to do 18 chapters (in American government)," she said. "It's way better because you don't take forever to cover the material. You just take notes and then take the test."

Lana Corry, 18, said she received a D in math, but she wants to work with computers. "I'm good with computers, but not with math," she said as the reason she attended summer school. She plans to

graduate from ITT Technical Institute.

"I know this is something I've got to do, so I do it," said Corry, a Seminole High School student.

From kindergarten through high school, students are attending summer school across the county.

Nearly 1,400 students of disability receive special education, according to statistics presented to the Seminole County School Board June 22.

Kinder Kamp allowed about 100 low-income students to experience school life in a two-week course. Nine elementaries took part.

More than 2,600 elementary students attended Summer Reading Camp, according to Geraldine Wright, executive director of Elementary Education.

The district is only required to host the reading camp for the lowest scoring third graders on the FCAT. Funding was set aside, however, to expand the program to any elementary student who was recommended by his or her teacher, Wright said.

"It's not required for them, but it is highly recommended," she said. The 230 Level 1 third graders, or the lowest scoring students, also had a 10 to 1 teacher to student ratio, she added, as well as an option for two additional hours. Other students had a 15 to 1 ratio.

Nearly 2,000 middle school students went to summer school for three-week courses.

That number includes students who struggled with grades, others with English as a second language and those attending a sixth-grade transition program for students starting middle school in August.

More than 7,200 high school students took summer school with about 60 percent choosing to take classes to advance.

"Some have to remediate, but the majority are creating room in their schedule," said Boyd Karns, Lake Mary High School principal.

Many are making room for advanced placement courses. Lake Howell High School offers more than 20 AP courses, which include a college level exam and college credit, said Principal Shaune Storch.

"In many cases, that's what actually gets them into college," she said. Other students sacrifice their summers to get physical education out of the way, she explained, so they can take band, chorus or drama all four years of high school.

"Many are extremely motivated individuals," she said. Hicks hinted that there may be other considerations.

"My friends are here from football," he said, adding, "There are also different girls from different schools."

Shugart said she really didn't know what she would do after high school. "I'm just focusing on graduating from high school," she said. "I'm catching up on past failures."

Tim Jr. helps Orioles sweep Tampa Bay

The up and down season for Tim Raines Jr. took a giant leap up on Monday.

The Baltimore Orioles sent the Seminole High School graduate down to AAA Ottawa late in Spring Training so he could play every day despite hitting over .370.

But because of a rash of injuries, he has bounced back-and-forth between the Big Leagues and Ottawa three times this season.

The yo-yo effect has hampered the swift outfielder's play at times as he has struggled to find consistency at the plate as he was only hitting .259 with 18 runs scored, seven doubles, a triple and

a home run, 15 RBI and 17 stolen bases in 20 attempts in 42 games at Ottawa.

On his first trip up he complained to mentor Rick Eckstein that he was frustrated because they (the Orioles) called him up and then wouldn't let him play.

After his most recent call-up, in which he was used primarily as a pinch-runner and late-inning defensive replacement, Manager Lee Mazzilli sat down with Raines and told him they wanted him to go back to AAA and concentrate on using his speed more.

That trip to Canada lasted less than a week as another Oriole injury had Raines scurrying to get back to Baltimore during the same time he was to be in Montreal seeing his father, future Hall-of-Famer Tim Raines Sr., having his No. 30 retired by the Expos.

He started in his first game back up and went 1-for-3 against Kansas City to get his average to .300, but then it was back to spot starting and being used as a runner and a defensive replacement, getting into nine games, and failing in eight trips to the plate to get a hit, seeing his average fall to .188.

Then two more Orioles were injured

early last week.

He got a single as a pinch-hitter against Philadelphia Sunday and then exploded on Monday against the Tampa Bay Devil Rays.

In the first game he made two excellent diving catches in right field and just missed a third as he leaped into the stands on a foul ball, earning him a spot on the 'Web Gems' segment of ESPN's *Baseball Tonight*.

Then late in the game he drove in an insurance run, his first RBI of the season, with his first double of the season as the Orioles won 4-2. He went 2-for-3 with the double and the RBI and also stole a base in the game.

He then capped off the amazing day with his first three-hit game of his career in the nightcap, going 3-for-4 with a run scored and an RBI as the Orioles completed the sweep, 8-2.

Little Rock, as he was known growing up and even when he made his Major League debut with the Orioles back in 2001, is now 6-for-8 (.750) this week with a double, a run scored, a stolen base and two RBI, raising his season's average to .346.

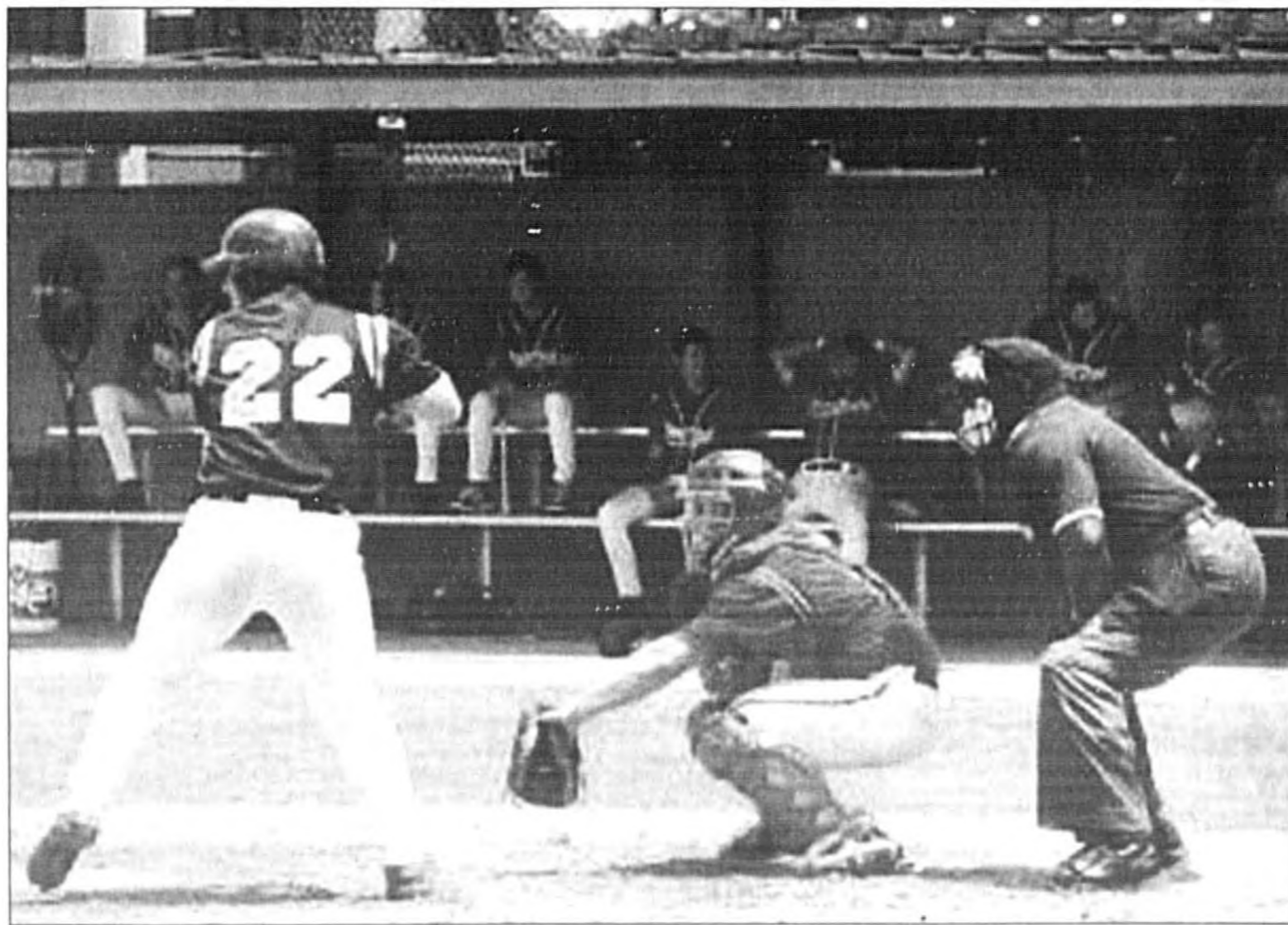
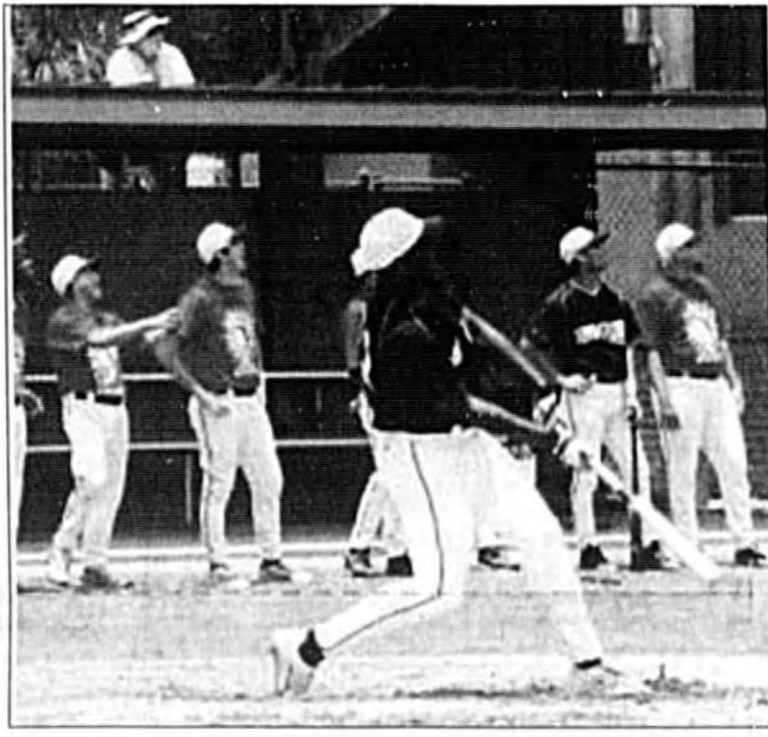
The day's events began with the Home Run Derby, which was dominated by the Southern Division's Ronald Baptiste.

NASCAR winners have a Seminole County flavor

Seminole County is full of NASCAR fans, but hands-on involvement is very limited.

But based on results from this past weekend, Seminole County can be proud as locals had a big hand in two of the three winners in NASCAR's top divisions.

Saturday afternoon, Carl Edwards made the comeback of the year as he drove the Sanford-based Superchips sponsored, Roush-prepared Ford F-150 into victory lane at

Kansas Speedway.

And Saturday night at Daytona International Speedway, Altamonte Springs' Robbie Loomis called the shots in the pits as Jeff Gordon raced to victory in the Pepsi 400. Loomis, a Lake Brantley graduate, is the Crew Chief for Gordon's Hendrick-prepared Chevrolet Monte Carlo.

After starting second, hitting the outside wall on the first lap and falling back to 33rd place, nobody would have ever guessed that Edwards would come back to win the race - but

he did.

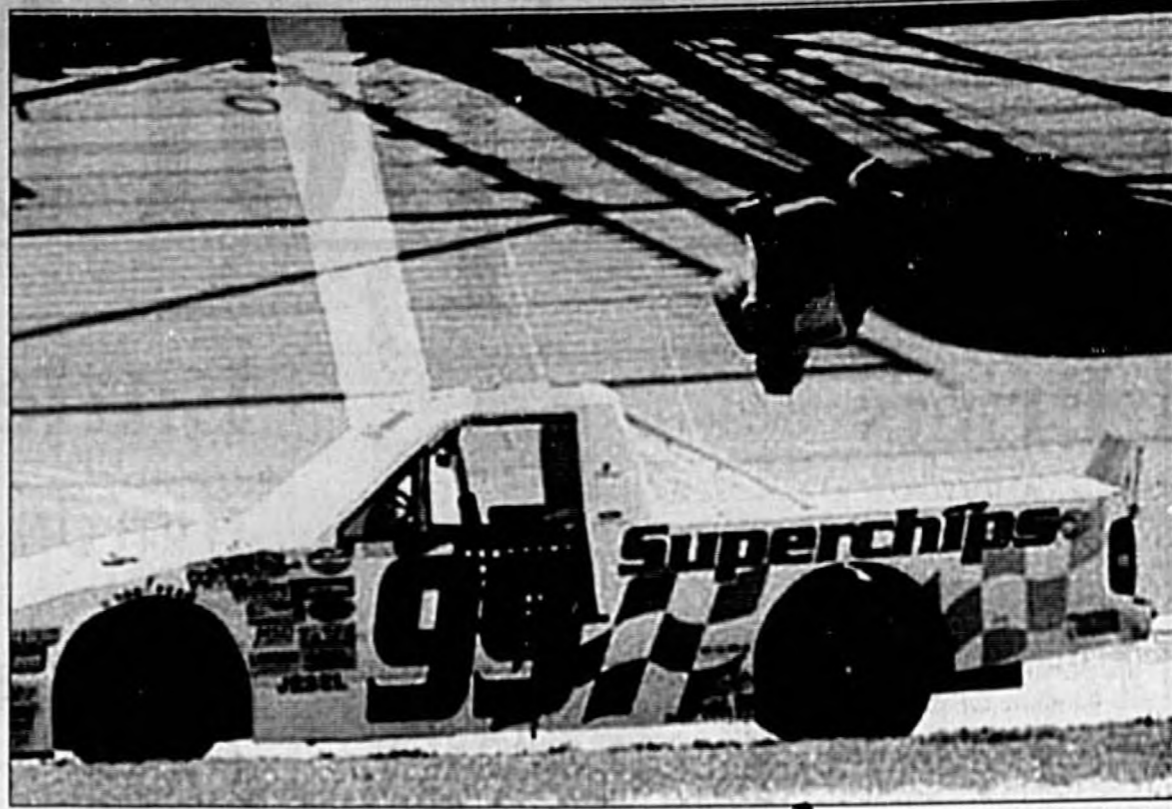
Edwards started second based on points since rain washed out all practice and qualifying on Friday. The teams received 30 minutes of practice Saturday morning before the race, which was helpful to the No. 99 Superchips team since they had a brand new truck that had never hit the track.

On the first lap, Edwards ran side-by-side with point-leader Dennis Setzer. Coming off turn two Setzer's truck became loose and forced Edwards into the outside wall. The hit

knocked out the toe-in and hurt the right-side tires. As Edwards dropped back to 33rd place by the end of the first lap, the caution came out one lap later which allowed Edwards to pit several times under caution to change right-side tires, repair body damage and fix the toe-in. When the race resumed on lap eight Edwards was still on the lead lap, but still in 33rd place.

The Superchips team was not about to give up so easily, especially since Setzer was behind the wall which would give

them an excellent opportunity to regain some of the points they lost last week in Milwaukee. Another caution on lap 16 allowed them to pit a few more times to do more work on the truck and Edwards restarted in 28th place. The team did a fantastic job repairing the truck and within eight laps of the restart, Edwards was up to 15th place. The third caution of the race came out on lap 29, so Edwards pitted again to top-off the fuel and make a few more repairs. See NASCAR, Page 8A

Since many teams pitted for tires, Edwards' fuel-only stop moved him up to fourth place on the restart on lap 33.

By lap 39 Edwards was as high as second place. He began to drop back a few positions as he told the team the truck was aero tight, but loose off the corners. He had fallen back to 11th

position by the next caution on lap 81. The team pitted on lap 81 for four tires, fuel, adjustments to air pressure and to raise the track bar. The team had a good stop, but the truck stalled leaving the pits which cost them one position. Edwards was 12th when the race resumed on lap 85.

The truck ran much better with the adjustments and

Edwards began to work his way up to the leaders. He was up to eighth by lap 100, and the sixth caution of the day on lap 103 gave the team another opportunity to pit for adjustments and fuel. The team raised the track bar and sent Edwards back out in eighth.

Despite all the cautions, Edwards continued to pick off positions. After the seventh

caution on lap 112, Edwards was fourth. The team began to debate whether to pit one more time since they still had a new set of left-side tires that could benefit Edwards toward the end of the race. When the eighth caution came out on lap 116, Edwards brought the Superchips Ford F-150 into the pits on lap 120 for four tires and to raise the track bar again.

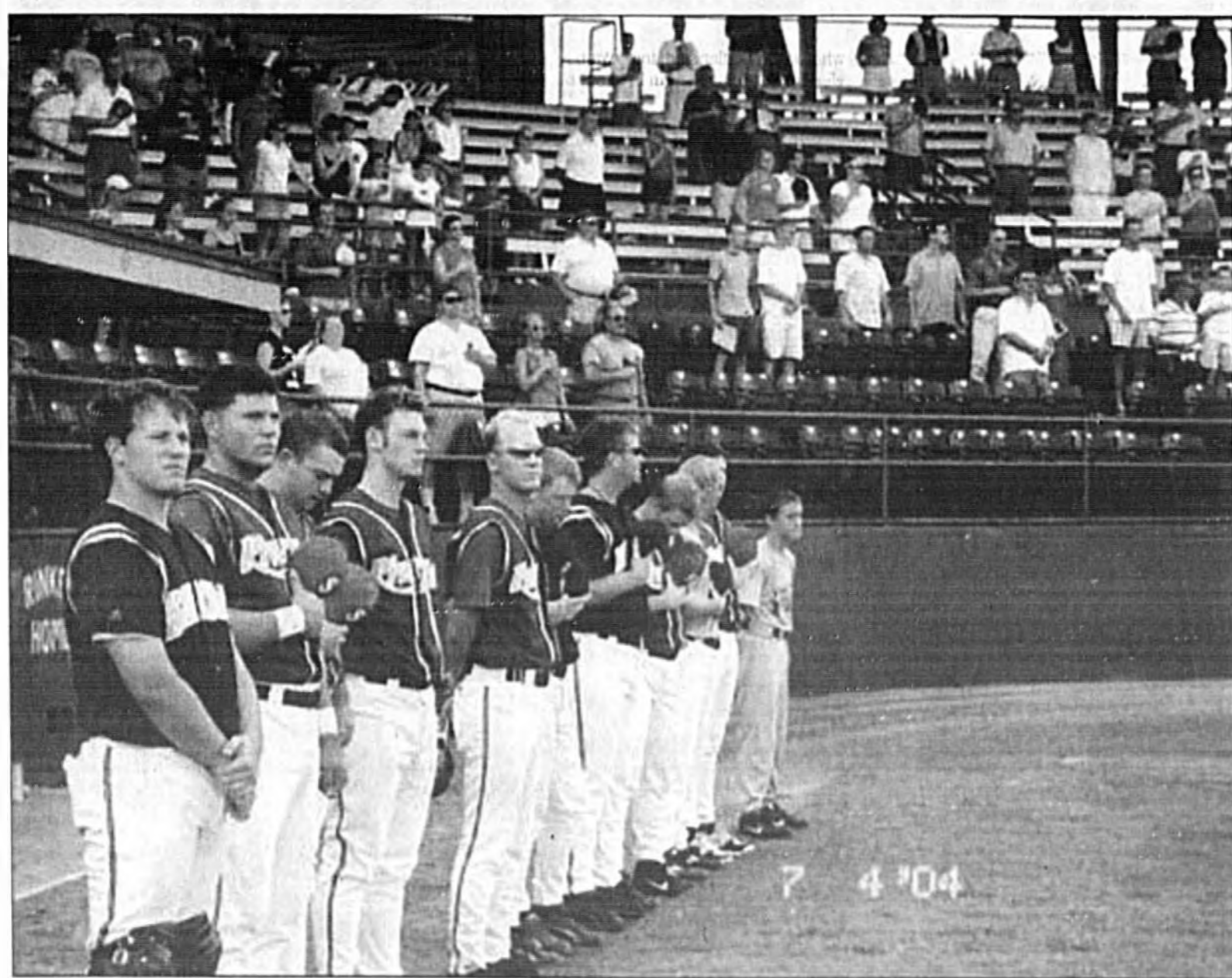
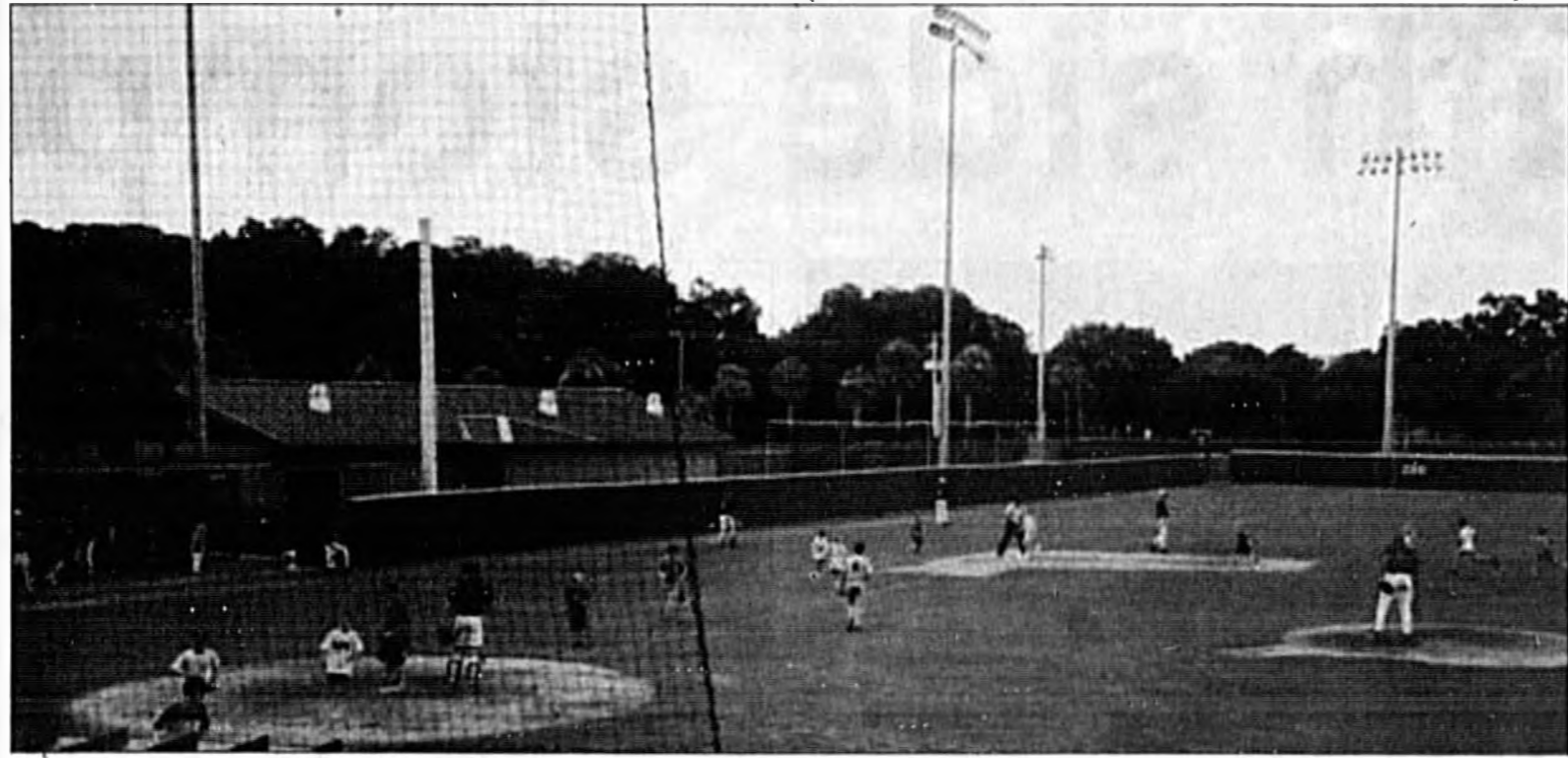
The team had a great 16-second stop, but since several teams did not pit, he was 10th when the race resumed on lap 123.

The pit stop turned out to be a good idea since Edwards quickly got by the trucks with older tires. He was fourth by lap 125 and continued to hunt down the leaders. Edwards took the lead from Matt Crafton on lap 146 and never looked back. He led the final 22 laps of the race to become the fourth consecutive different Craftsman Truck Series winner at Kansas.

I still can't believe we won this race, we got lucky today."

Edwards remains second in the NASCAR Craftsman Truck Series point standings, but now trails Setzer by only 34 points. The next race will be on Saturday night, July 10 at Kentucky Speedway. It will be televised live on Speed Channel.

Gordon won the Pepsi 400 for his second straight victory and in the process accomplished something at "The World Center of Racing" that hasn't been done in 23 years.

Gordon won the race from the pole, marking the first time a driver won from the top spot in the Pepsi 400 since Cale Yarborough did it in 1981.

But perhaps the bigger story was the dominance of one of NASCAR's powerhouse teams at a restrictor plate track - and it wasn't Dale Earnhardt Inc.

Led by Gordon's victory, all four Hendrick Motorsports cars finished in the top nine, including a second by Jimmie Johnson, an eighth by Terry Labonte and a ninth from Raybestos Rookie of the Year candidate Brian Vickers.

Spencer believes suspensions unnecessary

Hendrick teammates draft winning plan

Daytona Beach, Fla. — Jeff Gordon and teammate Jimmie Johnson leave Daytona International Speedway, the numbers they've run up look like a season's worth for most teams.

Gordon has four Nextel Cup wins, including his latest in Saturday's Pepsi 400 at Daytona International Speedway, six top-fives and 12 top-10 finishes, four poles — the Pepsi 400 included — and is third in the points standings.

Johnson has three wins, 12 top-fives, 13 top-10s, a pole and leads the points standings by 27 over Dale Earnhardt Jr., who was third in the 400.

They drive cars prepared under the same roof at Hendrick Motorsports. Gordon is a co-owner, along with Rick Hendrick, of Johnson's car, but on most tracks they cut each other little slack.

It was different at Daytona, where a drafting mate is a must. Using the same strategy as that successfully employed by Earnhardt and his teammate Michael Waltrip in recent restrictor-plate races, Gordon and

Johnson used the quirks of the draft to push each other to the front and to victory.

Gordon said there are no team orders to work together in the draft, but past results can't be ignored.

"If we can get together and get up there and get the lead, maybe we can battle each other for the win."

Gordon wins again

Teammate Johnson lends hand as No. 24 makes it two in a row

Daytona Beach, Fla. — Jeff Gordon, with drafting help from his Hendrick Motorsports teammate Jimmie Johnson, beat Dale Earnhardt Jr. to the line to win the rain-delayed Pepsi 400 at Daytona International Speedway Saturday night.

It was Gordon's fifth victory at Daytona in Cup competition. He now has more Daytona wins than any other active driver.

Gordon, a winner June 27 on the road course at Sonoma, Calif., started the 400 from the pole after the two-hour rain delay, but didn't take over the race until the midpoint.

After a round of green-flag pit stops around Lap 110, he led a five-car breakaway pack that included his Hendrick teammates Johnson, Brian Vickers and Terry Labonte. Only the Ford of Kurt Busch was crashing the Hendrick party.

A late race round of green flag pit stops scrambled the running order, with Tony Stewart stealing the top spot by taking just two tires while his competitors, Gordon and Johnson included, took four. But four turned out to be better than two and Gordon regained the lead for good with seven laps to go.

"The four tires made a difference," Gordon said. "I could make some maneuvers and get runs on people."

Johnson took second over Earnhardt, Busch and Stewart.

Earnhardt, bidding for his second straight Daytona victory, blamed his pit crew for most of his problems.

"We had trouble all night in the pits," he said. "The crew really wasn't on their game."

Earnhardt dodged disaster during a pit stop on Lap 72. As he and Vickers exited their pits, Gordon pulled out of his stall, leaving Vickers nowhere to go but to the outside of pit road. He then forced Earnhardt onto the rain-soaked grassy area

between the track and pit road. Earnhardt, who had been leading, managed to get back on the asphalt without getting stuck. He dropped to 15th.

Although Earnhardt and Michael Waltrip ran 1-2 for most of the first half of the race, there were moments of friction between the DEI duo. Earnhardt took the lead for the first time on Lap 55 after pushing Waltrip's No. 15 all the way down the backstretch and into Turn 3. With Earnhardt showing him into the corner, Waltrip drifted high and lost the lead to his teammate, who immediately sent word by radio that he was sorry for getting him loose.

Waltrip seemed to question the sincerity of Earnhardt's relayed apology.

"That's what Jason Leffler said, too," Waltrip told his crew, referring to an incident in Friday's Busch race in which Leffler knocked Waltrip out of the lead on the last lap.

Matt Kenseth, who entered the race third in the points standings, spent 40 laps in the garage while his crew patched up his No. 17 Ford after a Lap 19 crash. He wound up 39th.

Bill Elliott qualified poorly 34th, and languished in the rear throughout the first green flag run. But on the second go, he powered his way to 22nd. The next run saw him move up to the lead draft and run as high as 15th. He wound up 18th.

Others defend Leffler after Busch incidents

Daytona Beach, Fla. — The finish of Friday's Winn-Dixie 250 Busch Series race at Daytona International Speedway raised more questions about NASCAR's decision-making during events.

Although there were two separate incidents in the final lap — Michael Waltrip's spin on the backstretch and Dale Earnhardt Jr. smacking the wall in Turn 4 — there was no caution flag thrown.

Then Jason Leffler, who was involved in both incidents, was penalized after the race for rough driving.

Several drivers, including race winner Mike Wallace, said Leffler didn't drive any wilder than other drivers routinely do in similar situations.

Greg Biffle, who inherited second place after Leffler was dropped to 13th, said Leffler wasn't entirely to blame for the Waltrip incident. Wallace said the incident with Earnhardt was, well, vintage Earnhardt.

"As far as what [Leffler] did, going up the race track, going up in front of [Earnhardt], that's a classic Dale Earnhardt Jr. move right there," Wallace said. "I've watched Dale Jr. the last three or four years. He moves around like a snake. Leffler just tried to block the move and slow his momentum down."

Labonte contemplates future

Terry Labonte appears to be seriously pondering a ride in Bill Elliott's tire tracks — to retirement.

Labonte, a two-time series champion now in his 27th season, said last week that he's under a year-to-year contract with car owner Rick Hendrick and that he may run another year in Hendrick's No. 5, go to another Chevrolet team, or retire.

"I told Rick last year that this year would probably be my last," Labonte, 47, said last week. "You have to sort of decide those things in advance in order to make plans and move ahead."

Renshaw hoping to compete

Deborah Renshaw will attempt to make her Craftsman Truck Series debut this weekend at Kentucky Speedway.

Renshaw, 28, was the first female driver to lead the points race of a NASCAR-sanctioned series while competing in the Late Model Stock division at the Fairgrounds Speedway in Nashville, Tenn., but was the subject of protests by her male competitors.

She has raced on superspeedways, including Kentucky in ARCA cars, but hasn't been in competition this season. She will drive the No. 29 Ford owned by Bob and Kay Keselowski.

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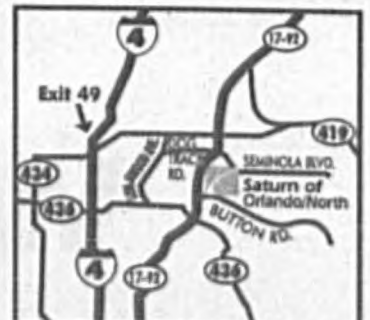
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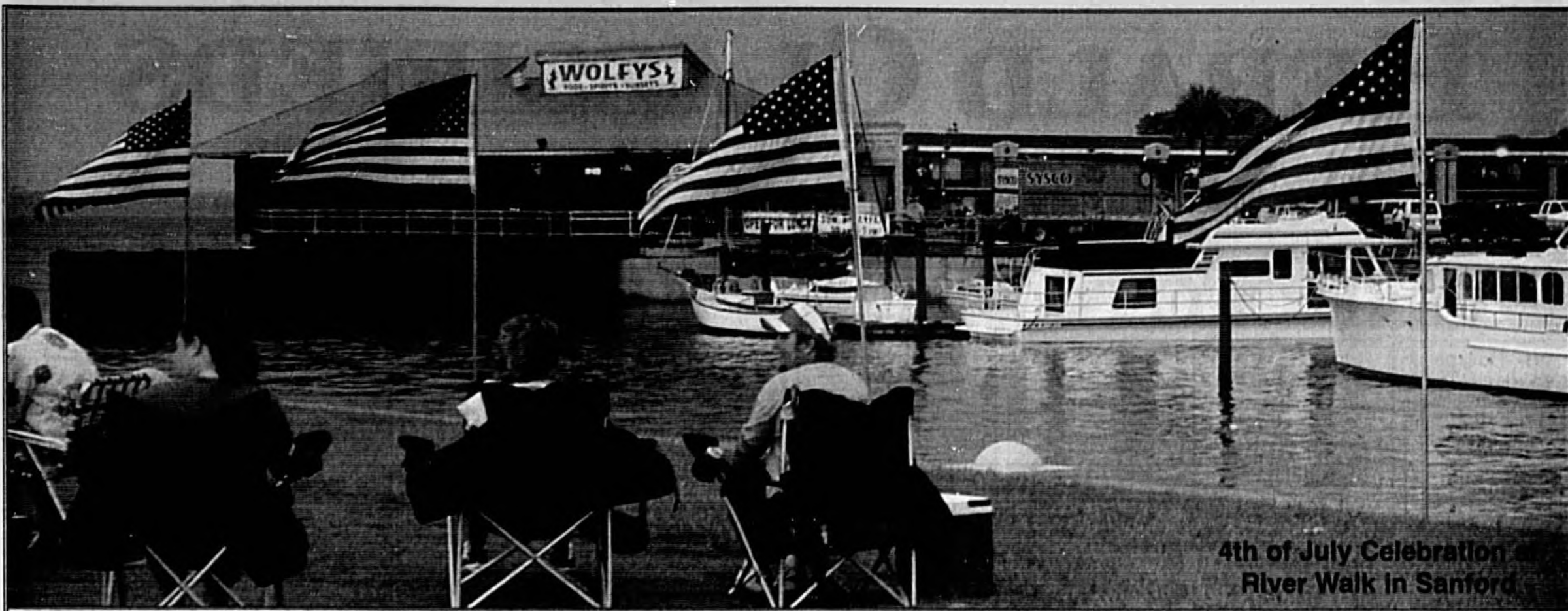

stormwater permit to the city until city officials responded to his concerns, some of which he admits had nothing to do with stormwater issues.

Paperwork to withdraw that petition were sent to the water management district on Thursday, Farrell said.

"I approved a draft of the final paper. It was yesterday," Farrell said.

The genesis for the withdrawal came last week when Farrell met with Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard, Downtown Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA)

chairman Bob Parsell, and downtown property owner George Saunders.

"It was through George's efforts that we got this worked out," Farrell said. "He listened to what we had to say and helped broker this meeting." Farrell's concerns centered

on protecting artesian wells under 1st Street and reinforcing a large drainage pipe located in the breezeway between one of Farrell's antique shops and the Blue Dahlia Restaurant.

Farrell said he also was concerned with the plans to change parking on 1st Street from diagonal to parallel and to widen sidewalks in front of businesses. Renovations planned for 1st Street include

Court fees up as burden switches to state

SANFORD — No complaints were registered last week at the Seminole County Clerk of Courts Office, but it may not be long until residents begin sounding off with many court fees doubling in cost.

As a result of a 1998 voter-approved referendum, the burden of funding the state court system was shifted from counties to the state. The Article V revision went into effect July 1, and fees for court services were hiked to help the system become self-funded.

tight. A lot tighter in fact." Some of the larger increases in Seminole County included divorce filings, which climbed from \$168 to \$363, and fees for circuit court and county civil lawsuits were increased from \$100.50 to \$255.

The higher prices for court services are not limited to Seminole County as court fees have increased across the state. The fee hikes may be hard for local citizens to stomach because Seminole County voters turned down the measure in 1998, though it passed statewide with 57 percent of the vote.

"Seminole County voted against it, but we're only one county out of 67," Morse said.

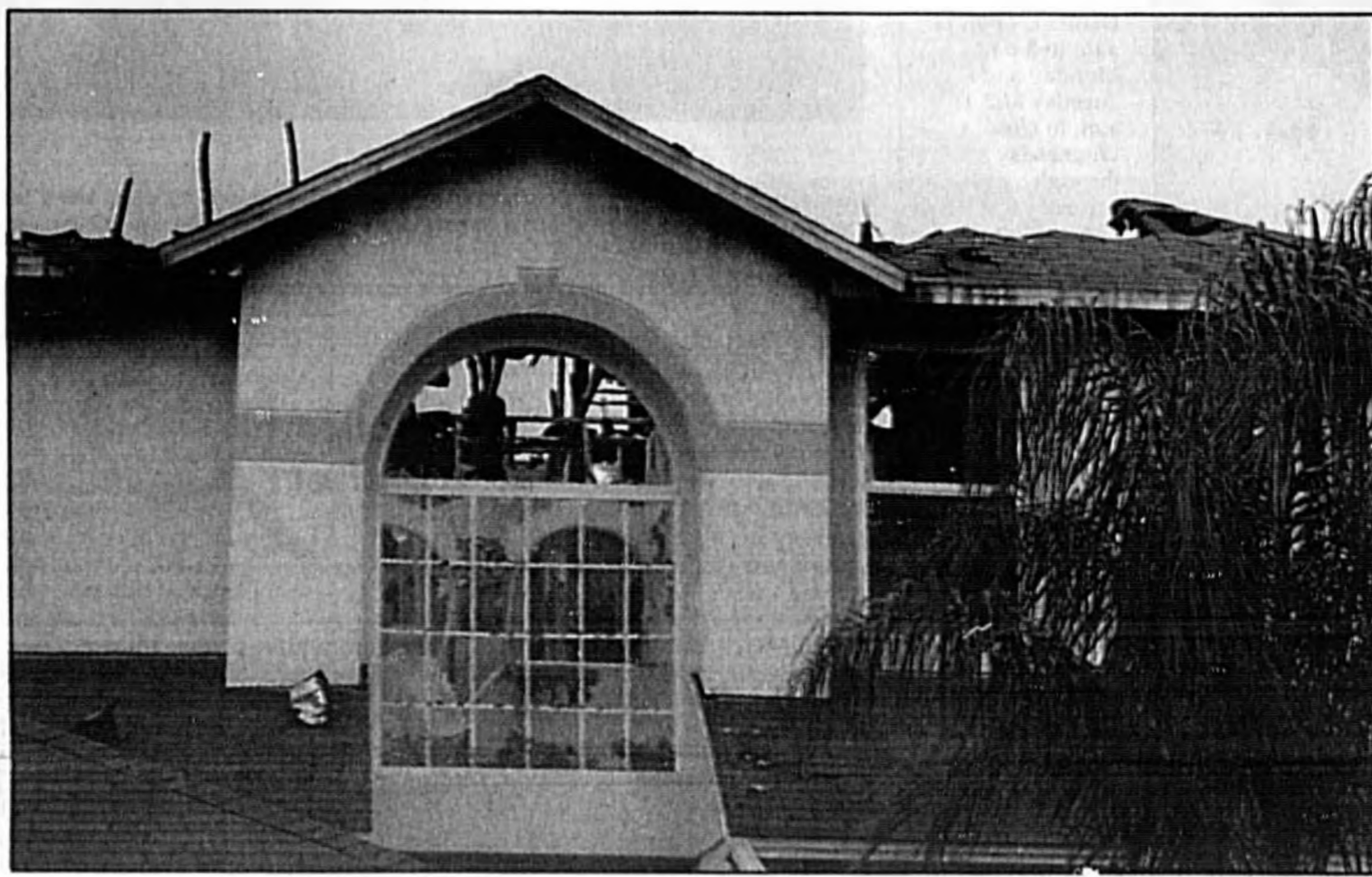
In addition to overhauling the fee schedule, the Seminole Clerk of Courts Office is also experiencing dramatic changes in how it conducts day-to-day business. The governor signed a final "glitch" bill that implemented the Article V revisions on May 2.

"In 60 days we've revamped our whole way of doing business," Morse said.

Instead of an eight-page annual budget, Morse is now tasked with preparing

Storm safety takes cool common sense

SANFORD — Common sense can protect individuals from frequent lightning that arrives with summer storms, and patience can help people deal with the aftermath of a strike.

More than 16,000 ground strikes have occurred on at least two days in the past week.

That number is even more amazing when one considers only 20 percent of lightning strikes hit the ground, said Dennis Decker, a National Weather Service meteorologist in Melbourne.

"Certainly we have been very active for the last week or so, the reason is because the steering current is pushing the storms to the east side of the state," he said.

He added that he expects no real change in the weather pattern for Seminole County, where lightning has caused hundreds of thousands of dollars damage recently.

The worst happened on Token Trail west of Oviedo July 1, said Alan Harris, spokesman for the Seminole County Fire Department. A home under construction was destroyed causing about \$400,000 damage, he said. Firefighter Tim Hickman was injured fighting the blaze.

In Sanford, a home sustained an estimated \$300,000 damage on Carmel Bay Drive July 6. The home was struck as the family visited Walt Disney World, according to Tim Robles, a county fire investigator.

More than 800 homes lost power July 2 in Longwood. Two other fires broke out on July 1 in Oviedo, the same day an Oviedo man died after being struck by lightning on a construction site in Kissimmee. Robles said lightning had struck near the Orlando-Sanford Regional Airport as well and some phones were knocked out.

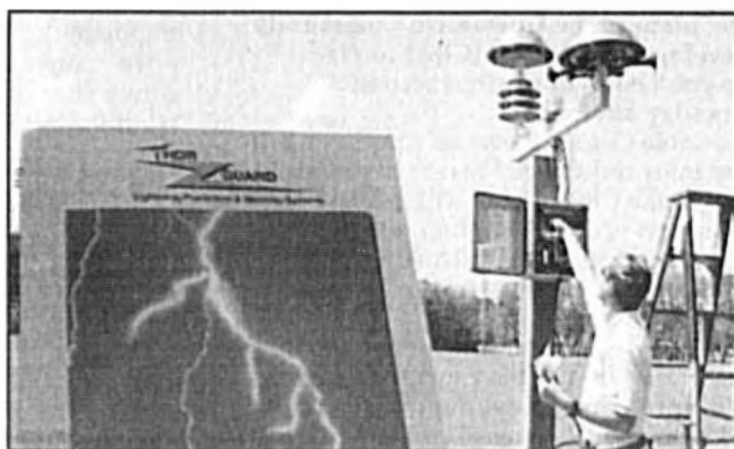
Three other people have been struck by lightning in Seminole County in the last three weeks. None were killed, Harris said.

"This has been an unusually busy time for us," he said. "In my 10 years here, I have never seen lightning cause such a rash of house fires every single day. It's almost like clockwork."

Decker said the weather pattern, however, is not unusual. Each morning the weather service tries to determine which areas are going to be active with storms.

They are experimenting with a computer program that may in the near future

Detectors will call lightning strikes

Referees and umpires at five Seminole County parks will no longer have to double as meteorologists.

As of next week, park and recreation department officials hope to have a \$30,000 lightning detection system installed at Sylvan Lake, Soldier's Creek, Red Bug, Seminole County Softball Complex and Sanlando parks.

The system measures electrostatic charges in the atmosphere and predicts when lightning will strike in the area about 12 to 20 minutes before the bolt occurs. In the past, recreational and park officials have used the "30-30 rule" to determine when to stop a game.

"We would see lightning and then wait for the thunder clap," said Steve Waring, recreation program manager and systems administrator for the county's parks and recreation department. "If it was less than 30 seconds in between the two, play would stop."

A game would begin again 30 minutes after the last flash of lightning would be seen in the sky. The rule is sometimes inaccurate costing longer delays in activities and in some cases, although not at Seminole County parks, play has resumed too soon and has led to an unfortunate lightning-related accident.

Instead of park officials making the determination of when to stop play, the light-
