

## Cone Appoints New Member To Citrus Board After Row

H. D. Ulmer Is Named In Place Of Clark Who Refused To Sign His Resignation

5 Nominees Expose Governor's Demands Refuse To Accept Appointments Under Such Circumstances

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Gov. Cone's office announced today the appointment of H. D. Ulmer to the State Citrus Commission in place of R. W. Clark of Tarpun Springs, who was not commissioned after his appointment was made on Nov. 4.

Ulmer's appointment was announced without any comment and his formal commission was done as a surprise when he filed in the Secretary of State's office. The Governor's office said the appointments may be made later to replace C. H. Burton and A. M. Walker of Winter Haven, who had to what was the writer's first local onslaught for most sections. 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### Committee Gives Valuable Aid To German Refugees

#### Workers Help Bewildered Arrivals Find Relatives And Jobs

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Some of the saddest people in the world are finding their way to the heart of the gray White Way at the end of a cross-Atlantic trek in search of security and happiness.

In the middle of the theater district is an undistinctive office building. In that building is the clearing house for German and Italian refugees.

There, 80 workers of the National Coordinating Council for Aid to Refugees and many other groups are busy every day with plans to help Italian refugees find jobs and German refugees find relatives and jobs.

#### Late Into The Night

Late into the night, the staff labors to help bewildered arrivals find relatives, jobs, places to live. And it advises American relatives how to help them in abroad.

Founded in the summer of 1931 by James G. McDonald, League of Nations refugee commissioner, the organization, composed of 20 cooperating units, cares for Jewish and Protestant refugees. The Catholic Committee for Refugees from Germany maintains a separate office, handling over 100,000 refugees.

At the office of the coordinating committee, at which Joseph P. Chamberlain, a Columbia university law professor, is acting chairman, there is a busy scene. Every elevator brings a group of German-speaking men and women up to the large waiting room. Newly arrived refugees sit along one side, seeking to help relatives abroad.

Phones ring constantly. The man at the information desk answers questions all day long, speaking with a heavy German accent. His patient, encouraging smile never wavers.

Money is a mystery. Most of the refugees have no money at all, and the committee must find it for them.

Miss Cecilia Kozak, executive director of the committee, explains how they get their money. They come in on the regular quota, but the American consuls in the various European cities have laid down the restriction that each German and Austrian applying for a visa, have an affidavit from an American citizen guaranteeing him support in case he cannot find work.

There are strict regulations in the fatherland on the amount of money the newcomers may bring with them, but some of the get around the rules in one way or another. How? They're not telling.

When the first refugees began to arrive, the immigration authorities allowed many who had converted their cash into valuable articles like cameras and microscopes to bring those things in duty-free. But as the pressure has become greater, they have enforced restrictions to the letter, though it may mean confiscating the refugees' only means of obtaining money.

#### Immigration Quota Increase

The American quota on immigrants from Germany, which had been 25,957 a year, was changed a few months ago to 27,770 because Germany took over Austria.

Until this last year, immigration was considerably under that figure (see chart). But in the 12 months ending June 30, 1938, 17,001 German immigrants were admitted. The Austrian immigration during the same period was 864, double that of the preceding year. And the Italian figure was 3,428, an increase of 50%.

The difficulty of meeting immigration requirements has retarded immigration to some extent. Difficulties with government regulations abroad also are believed to have retarded the total.

But the state department says immigration from Germany is expected to increase this fiscal year, and will probably continue to do so for some time. There is a large demand for visas in consular offices abroad.

By data, 16 to 18 percent of the Germans coming in are Jews, but since the Austrian annexation in March, a new group, consisting largely of Catholics and some Protestants, has begun to arrive.
