The first fatality in the history of the Sanford Fire Department occurred early Sunday morning when a fire truck was swamped on Orange Ave.

Hubert R. Daffron, 37-year-old fireman, was crushed to death when he apparently leaped from the fire truck to assist in the rescue of a fire victim at the corner of Orange Ave. and 10th St.

Daffron was dead on arrival at Semole Memorial Hospital, where he was pronounced dead at 8:30 a.m.

According to Fire Chief Mack Cleveland Sr., "We have always stressed staying on the truck until orders are given to connect hose."

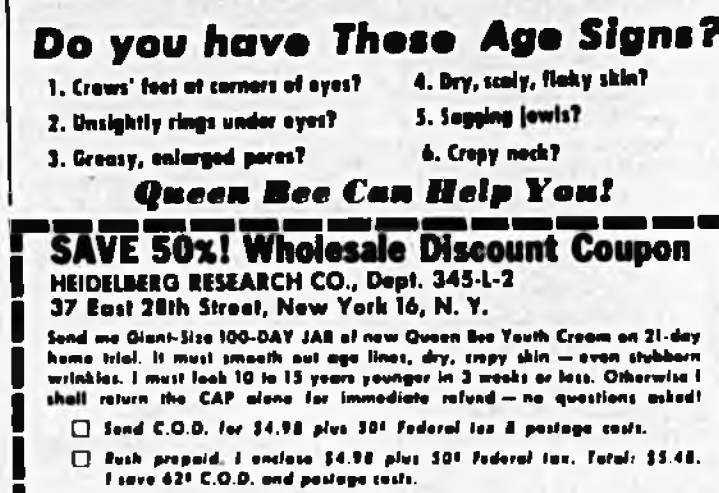

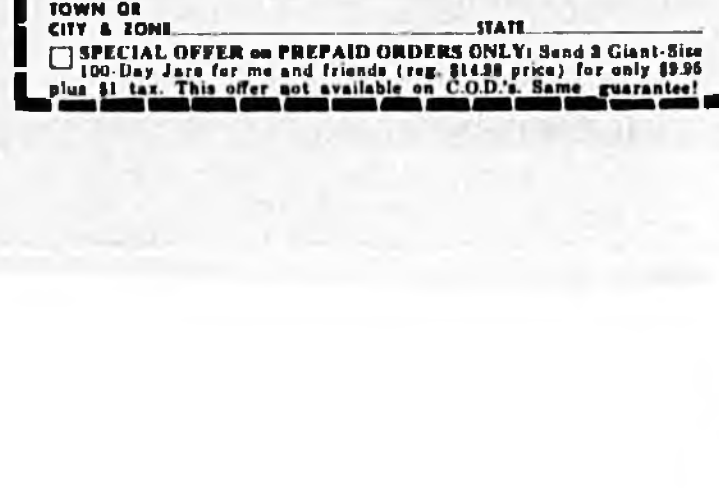

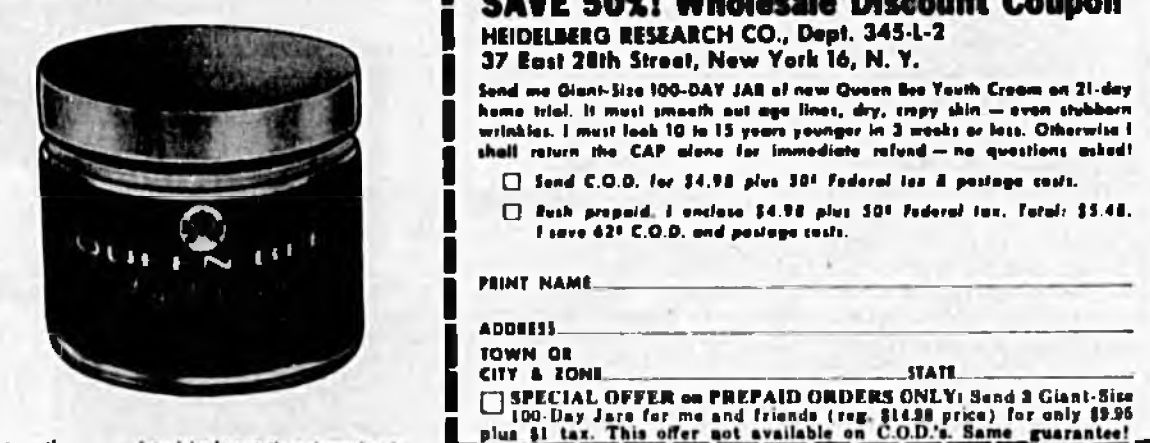

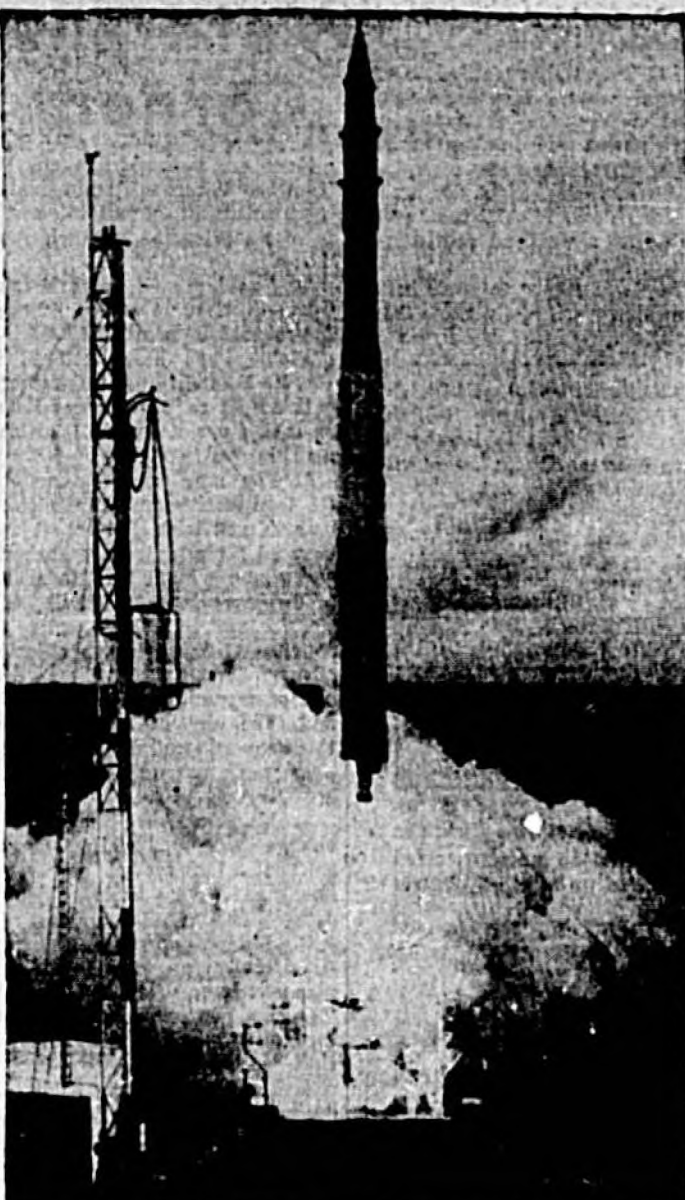

A PEACEFUL home life is a healthy one. It's time to help you keep your home both peaceful and healthy.

When you are emotionally upset, your health is bound to suffer. Ulcers, heart trouble, in fact, most ailments, are aggravated by emotional outbursts.

Don't Quarrel

The easiest way to avoid such outbreaks of course, is to keep your home life as serene as possible. In other words, don't quarrel with your spouse and try to keep him from quarreling with you.

Sound Impossible? Well, it can be done. And here's one way to do it:

The main thing is to keep your temper and remain quiet when your spouse sounds off at you about something which displeases him, or her (wires start arguments, too—sometimes).

Resist the Temptation

Be a doormat, if you have to, but resist the temptation to defend yourself. The next, remember, shall inherit the earth. And there's no better time to be meek than when it will help avoid a domestic argument.

Perhaps you don't deserve the wrath of your spouse, but take it anyway. On the other hand, maybe you should be asked, if that's

the case, a tongue-lashing may do you some good.

If both husband and wife follow my advice, however, there can't be any arguments. Of course, this is just dreaming and I realize it.

Gentleness coupled with kindness will beat any argument.

To Get Their Way

A full-fledged tantrum, however, might be something else again. Adults, like children, sometimes throw a tantrum in order to get what they want.

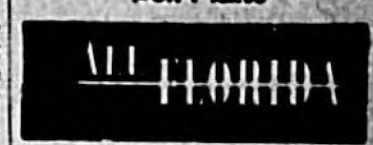

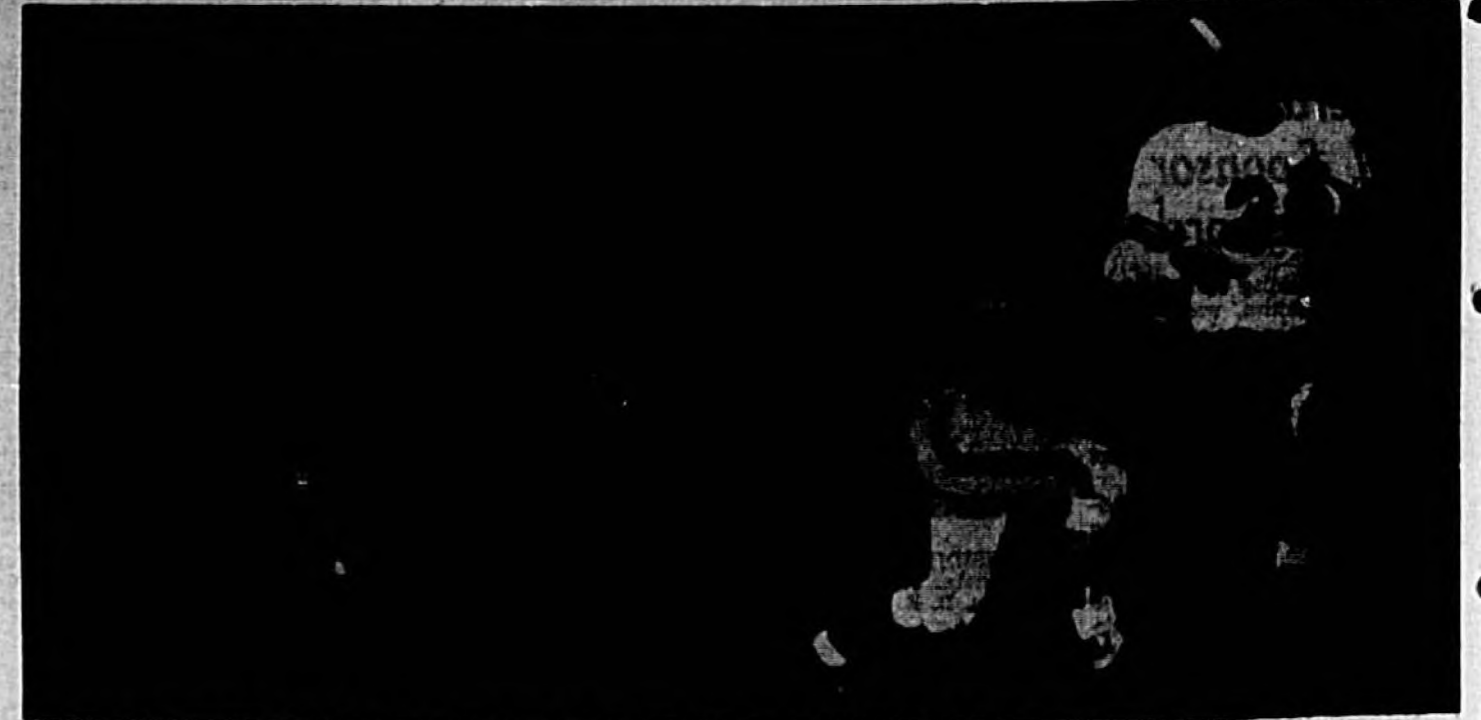

Law, his wife and three children have lived in Sarasota since 1954. They own a home in Sarasota Springs subdivision.

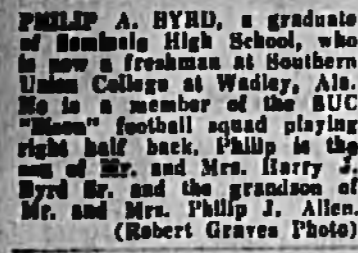

Management Areas To Be Open This Year To Hunting

WEST PALM BEACH—This season the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission will have open permits to hunt nearly 3 1/2 million acres of land within Wildlife Management Areas. Of this total, 1 1/2 million acres lie within the 17 county area of the Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District.

In addition to a regular hunting license, a public hunt area permit is required for those desiring to hunt on most management areas, according to the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission.

The \$5 public hunt permit, available from the office of the County Judges, is not required in the Everglades Area in the Flood Control District.

Five of the wildlife management areas within the Flood Control District are in private ownership, these are Tomoka and Farmington in Volusia County, Holonaw in Ocala County, Okechobee in the county of the same name, and by The Avon Park Wildlife Management Area in Glades County.

Management Area in U. S. Air Force property, the J. W. Corbett area in Palm Beach County is owned by the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, and the Everglades Management Area is on land controlled by the Flood Control District.

Egypt Accuses United States Of Plotting Against Syria

By UNITED PRESS
Egypt observed the first anniversary of the Israeli invasion today by accusing the United States of plotting against Syria.

Cairo newspapers hailed the day as "Hero's Day" and reported that President Gamal Abdel Nasser would speak on the occasion. The English language Egyptian Gazette recalled that the United States was one of the first nations to speak out against the Israeli-British-French invasion and said it was repeating their mistakes.

"Exactly one year after the Suez aggression it seems as if a similar venture is being prepared. Again there is the threat of a third world war," it said.

Other newspapers failed to recall U.S. intervention on Egypt's side and Al Shaab said "America is preparing to take some specific action in the Middle East." It warned that the Arab states would act together. The government newspaper Al Gomhouria also attacked the United States.

The Egyptian press comment was in contrast to belief in the United Nations that blunt statements by the American, British and Turkish delegates had taken the crisis edge off the assembly debate on Syria.

However Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko was speaking this morning and his speech should show for sure.

Syria gave indications Monday night it thought the crisis far from over. It warned seven NATO powers that Turkey might seize the opportunity of forthcoming NATO maneuvers in southern Turkey to "commit aggressive action against Syria."

Syria sent identical notes to the United States, Italy, Greece, West Germany, Belgium, Holland and Denmark calling their attention to "the fact that Turkey might seize the opportunity" of the NATO maneuvers to "commit aggressive action against Syria."

Warm Turkey May Act
It said Turkey might act in belief the presence of NATO forces in the Turkish coastal areas near Syria "is to protect Turkish forces during their possible aggressive operations." The maneuvers run Oct. 21-Nov. 2.

In Cairo the Middle East News Agency reported one Turkish plane and two unidentified aircraft flew over north Syria on Monday and that a British made Canberra bomber flew toward Iraq.

Mollet's Attempt To Form Government Rejected

PARIS (UP)—The National Assembly early today rejected Socialist Guy Mollet's attempt to form a new government. President Rene Coty promptly tapped young financial wizard Felix Gaillard, Radical Party leader, to make the next try.

The assembly turned down Mollet by a 290-277 vote, thus prolonging the four-week political crisis conceded to be the worst since World War II. The Conservatives lined up with the Communists and extreme Right Wing Poujadists to defeat him.

At 4:40 a.m. Coty summoned Gaillard to the palace. He is 37 and finance minister in the government of caretaker Premier Maurice Bourges-Maunoury. A half hour later Gaillard emerged and announced he would decide later in the day whether he would make the effort to become France's 14th postwar premier.

Standing on the chilly steps of Elysee Palace before sunrise, Gaillard told reporters his task was a formidable one, indicating he did not hold too much hope of success. Observers gave him a 50-50 chance.

The Conservative votes actually were what killed Mollet's chances since he had counted on Communist and Poujadist opposition. The Conservatives refused to accept his insistence that pensions and health benefits be increased even at the cost of higher taxes.

In third place for cause of death was influenza and pneumonia with 18 for the 8 months. Other deaths and causes were: diabetes 7, chronic nephritis 6, other CVR diseases 5, tuberculosis 2, dysentery 1, and acute poliomyelitis 1.
