A Field For The South

The development of new industries in the United States in the last few years has been on a phenomenal scale as witness only lately the strides of radio and airplane concerns. More recently there has focused on the horizon a process of making imitation silk which bids well to play an important part in the industrial realm's one of the South. Along this line the Tampa Times has set this to say:

"One of the half dozen wonders of the world in modern business is the development of imitation silk. Millions, tens of millions and billions of dollars have been poured into the manufacture of this product to manufacture rayon and the market is rapidly expanding. It grows and grows to yet greater proportions. One of the companies with capital resources from time to time to invest dollars are already operating in the South. A number of new concerns utilizing 6,000,000,000 dollars in capital of formation.

"This industry is now confined to America and Canada or any other country. 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MILLION DOLLAR GANG CHIEFTAINS REFUND MADE TO SOME TAXPAYERS SEEK NEW PLACE

American Tobacco Co. Is Returned 4 Million On Income Tax

WASHINGTON Dec. 25.—(INT') Golden stream totaling nearly \$15,000,000 flowed back out of Treasury Department during the last fiscal year into the pockets of taxpayers upon whom unjustly high levies had been imposed, as analysis of a huge mass of figures submitted to Congress by Secretary of the Treasury revealed to-day.

In all, 16,501 separate tax refunds were made, ranging all the way from one cent to the \$6,215,000 claim honored in the name of R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company of Winston-Salem, N. C.

Refunds were sent over the nation-wide map of America, totaling 167 thousand dollars. In addition to the Reynolds claim, they were:

Million Dollar Refunds American Tobacco Company and subsidiaries of New York, \$1,172,242; Federal Shipbuilding Company of Kearny, N. J., \$3,664,230; Estate of John W. Oliver, Sioux City, Iowa, \$1,618,929; Swift and Company of Chicago, \$1,498,835.

Estate of Peter G. Brooks, Boston, \$1,254,007; The Texas Company, Houston, \$1,035,427.

United Fuel Gas Co., Inc., Corporation of Vermont, Zelma B. Davis, Denver, \$1,232,283.

Estate of John J. Emery, of Philadelphia, \$927,766.

Other tax refunds ran from in excess of \$25,000 to three-quarters of a million, and many names familiar from one end of the country to the other were on the gigantic list. Otto Kahn, of New York, for instance, received \$65,000 back from the Government, while Col. George Washington Venner, of New York, got back a sum of \$44,364. The trustee for William Waldorf Astor, the estate of Mrs. W. W. Wrightson, \$16,637; Frederick W. Vanderbilt, \$15,637; and Mrs. Virginia Vanderbilt of New York, received \$10,408 and \$10,000 respectively.

The estate of Henry Clay Frick, of Pittsburgh, was awarded \$1,250, and the Aluminum Company of Pittsburgh, controlled by the Fricks, by Secretary Mellon, got back \$6,500.

In Other Districts

In the Chicago district, the estate of Charles E. Cushing, who died in 1912, got \$27,592. Nelson Swift Morris got \$25,015.

In Boston, the John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Company has \$1,250,000.

Golf and country clubs all over the country benefited from a change in the law on club dues and received hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The automobile industry received a harvest with H. H. Clegg, Chairman of the Board, of the Pittsburgh Steel Pierce-Arrow, Jordan and Peebles all receiving in excess of \$25,000.

The year-end Treasury Department only refunds in excess of \$25,000 by name, yet the list completely covered a long committee table in the House Office building, showing that many more may have been digging out figures of interest to various localities.

It was estimated that interest alone on the refunds amounted to \$1,250,000.
