



> In the course of the speech in which he referred to the oston Tea Party, Mr. Helm outlined for the Rotary Club f Miami four steps which he thinks are necessars to the rogress of the reclamation work. The suggestions are briefly put and could very justly find prominence in every Florida newspaper. Mr. Helm would have:

First. Place squarely back of the project the so. called state lands in the Everglades of a potential value of at least \$50,000,000, granted by congress for drainage purposes exclusively

Second. Employ an engineeering commission to outline a comprehensive plan of reclamation, based on the unit or zone plan, whereby independent sections of the Glades may be reclaimed independently of the remainder and made ready for settlement quickly.

Third. Change the administration of the enter prise, establishing headquarters in or adjacent to the project and appointing a competent chief engineer of national reputation who would be located on the job. Retain the governor as ex-officio chairman of the drainage board, the other four members to be selected by the land owners of the district and the state treasurer to continue as treasurer of the

Fourth. Change the basic laws by legislative act. not only providing for a change of management, but also giving plenary power to the new board to issue. and sell bonds when needed, instead of depending upon the whim of each legislature as is now the

The Everglades belong to all Florida. Some day when politicians have been eliminated from the great project and actual reclamation of the land is attained. Florida will have a domain of the world's richest soil, yielding crops that will bring untold wealth to the state.

And the Everglades could be paying for its own reclamation under a plan such as Mr. Helm has outlined. Let the beople of Florida know the truth and there will be an end | o the gross mismanagement that has characterized most if the Everglades reclamation work so far,
