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Forest Lake Academy Graduates 85

Commencement weekend at Forest Lake Academy was climaxed Sunday morning with the commencement exercises held in the huge gymnasium-assembly hall of the school, before a big crowd of

admiring friends and proud parents. The speaker for the graduation exercises was K. R. Davis, former principal of the academy and who is now Dean of Men at Southern Missionary College, a Seventh

Day Adventist institution at Colledgeville, Tenn. Davis spoke on the problems facing the graduates as they go out into the world as adults. He pointed out that they are entering a far different world than their par-

ents and grandparents inherited, one in which tension and antagonism holds sway, and a world in which their only anchor is the religious training they have had during their youth.

He pointed out that Channing Pollock, the great playwright and historian, once declared, "The average life of a democracy is 200 years," and urged upon the young people that if our democratic way of life is to endure longer it is up to them to assure its longevity.

Davis highlighted the problems facing the world today, and declared that "American youth needs a purpose," and gave that as one of the reasons for the decline of religion, the multitude of teenage marriages, the increase in crime, and the moral decadence of mass media of communications.

He closed his remarks by saying that the world's great need was "men that can't be bought. Stand for something, lest you fall for everything."

A former Sanford man, Specialist 5, Edwin J. Lockett of the USA, left recently from Ft. Monmouth, N. J., for duty in Zweibrucken, Germany.

Lockett has just completed nine months specialized training at schools in Ft. Monmouth, N. J., where he learned to repair and service the Mobile Digital Computer, nicknamed "the Mobidic."

In a select class of seven students studying the 60,000 circuit electronic machine, Specialist Lockett was an honor student, with the highest average in the class. Of 100 students graduated from the course by the Signal Schools, he was one of five honor students.

There are presently only three "Mobidics" in existence, with two more now being completed. Prior to the schooling in Ft. Monmouth, Specialist Lockett spent most of three years as a radar operator at the Nike Ajax missile site near Seattle, Washington.

Seven Orbit Flight Next

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI)—The flight of Scott Carpenter, who found space travel "as easy as a bus ride," at most certainly set the stage for America's next Mercury launch to be a seven-orbit adventure with a landing in the Pacific instead of the Atlantic.

Space officials said today that on the strength of Carpenter's successful three orbits of earth last Thursday they expected the ambitious new space voyage to be scheduled for next fall. The trip would take more than 10 hours and the astronaut would be recovered near Midway Island.

Further triple orbits would be dispensed with, these sources believed, pointing out that the Carpenter and John H. Glenn Jr. flights had confirmed the basic soundness of the Mercury spacecraft and demonstrated that two men of relatively different makeup could take 4 1/2-hour periods of weightlessness in stride.

Disclosure of the prospective step-up in American space exploration came after Carpenter delivered what he called a "working astronaut" report to the people who paid for his trip, the taxpayers, and declared: "I'm ready for two weeks in orbit."

The Sanford Does Drove No. 160, has accepted the sponsorship of the Seminole campaign to raise funds to build and equip the Salk Institute for Biological Studies. The Institute will be directed by Dr. Jonas Salk.

The appointment was announced by John Sauls, chairman of the Seminole chapter of the National Foundation-March of Dimes which is sponsoring a nationwide appeal for the Institute from June 1-15. The Institute is being built at San Diego, Calif., on a site donated by vote of the city residents. It will provide facilities in which many of the world's most eminent scientists will study the elemental processes of life.

Coming from many different parts of the world, these scientists will be working in a laboratory of life from which can come knowledge and discoveries pointing the way to better health and fuller lives for men, women and children everywhere.

Mrs. Richard Mapes, president of the Does, stated: "In developing the polio vaccine we had a magnificent example of what could be done for health through teamwork between the American people and our scientists.

"This is another great opportunity for us to work shoulder-to-shoulder with Dr. Salk and his colleagues to achieve benefits for mankind that may be of even greater importance than the vaccine."

Christian Churches To Support College

The 71st convention of Christian Churches which met recently in Lakeland, took the second step toward the establishment of a Christian University in Florida.

A steering committee was appointed to work with officials of Brevard Engineering College and the Melbourne Chamber of Commerce. The B. E. C. was begun in 1958 by a group of scientists working at, or in cooperation with, the Missile Test Center at Cape Canaveral. They have used personal funds and spare time to establish a school. First classes were conducted in the old Naval Air Training Center at Melbourne Airport.

The college now includes a campus of 85 acres and an option is held on additional 40 acres. An administration-classroom building has been constructed and an extensive library of technical books has been established.

This year 480 students were enrolled and there is a faculty of 65 persons, most of them men and women who are directly associated with the space program.

The Christian Church convention assembly voted, without a dissent to give the state society a "green light" to proceed with plans for launching the college.

James McKinney, assistant to the president of Lynchburg College, who sounded the basic precepts of a fledgling college, concluded by saying:

"The effective Christian college of tomorrow will be first of all a center of quality education; it will be free of sectarian motivation, not an agency for evangelizing young people for the church, but rather, a center of scholarship at which the deepest claims of the Christian faith will confront and be confronted by, the ceaseless yearning of the human mind to find truth."

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Bing Crosby's four-year-old son, Harry, was reported in "good condition" today in Children's Hospital where he is recovering from injuries suffered when he fell out of a car while on a fishing trip in Mexico.

Larry Crosby, the crooner's brother and spokesman for the family, said Harry was flown back from Baja California Saturday after spending a night in a hospital in Mexico.

Hospital attendants here said the injuries were not serious and the youngster should be released in a couple of days.

The boy's mother, Cathy, flew back with her son and spent the night in the hospital with him. The Crosbys had gone to the Mexican village of Emilia on a fishing expedition.

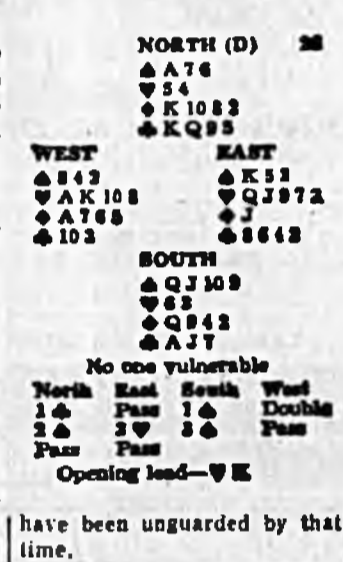

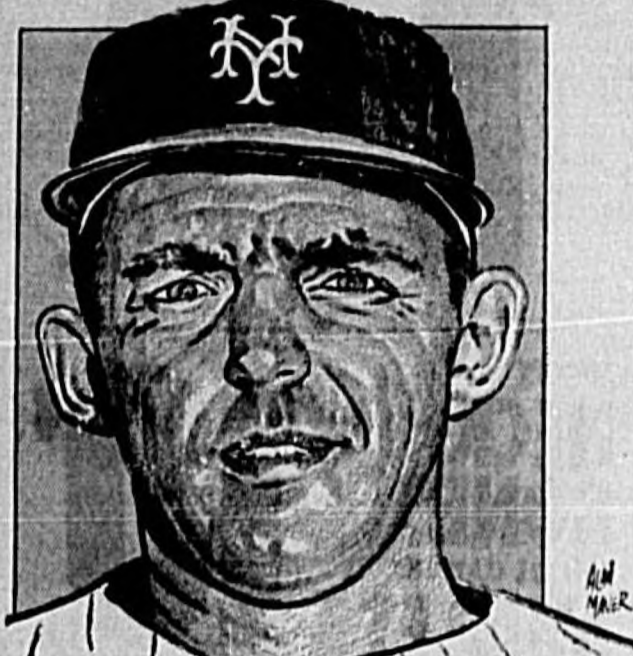

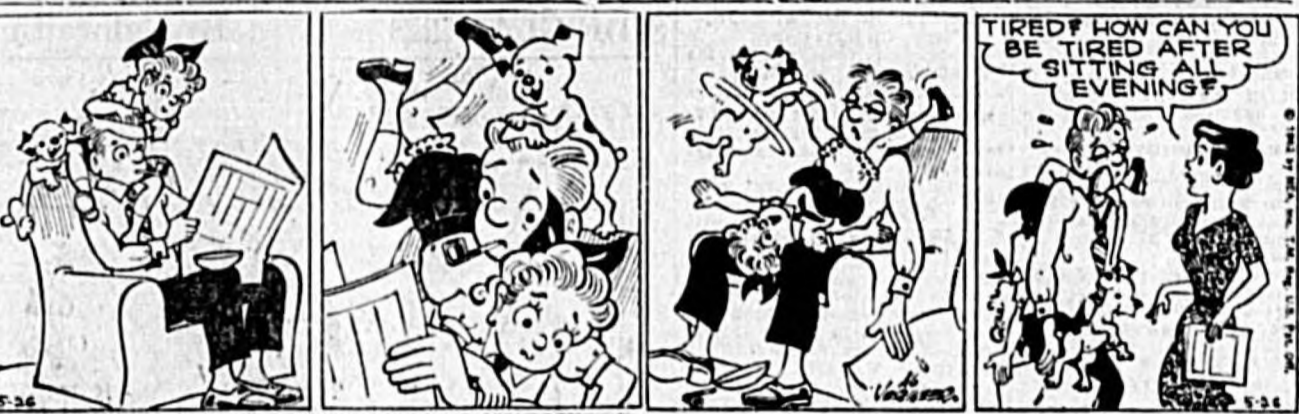
