

'Yankees (Tourists) Left Door Open... Let The Cold In'

LAKELAND (AP)—Frost that spread as far south as Arcadia and Bartow caused "considerable damage" to unprotected truck crops and ornamentals today but citrus apparently escaped with minor losses.

The Federal - State Frost Warning Service said a preliminary report showed temperatures in the northern districts were slightly lower than Sunday morning, ranging from 30 to 35 with some pockets to 28 and frost light to locally heavy.

In the central districts readings ranged from 22 to 36 with moderate frost but in southern Florida temperatures were slightly higher than the lows yesterday.

Some melons in the Arcadia area were reported lost. A grower at Myrtle City, between Arcadia and Sarasota, reported he lost four melons to keep the air stirring and 28 to 29 degrees, he estimated he saved half his crop.

"The cold seems to have hit us from the northwest, and moved on down the state toward Homestead," said Ed Russell, DeSoto County agent at Arcadia. "It looks like some of these Yankees (tourists) left the door open and let the cold in."

Russell said lowest there was 27 Sunday and 31 today, with heavy frosts and some lower readings in outlying districts. He said there was no damage to citrus and many vegetable crops were watered down against the cold.

The area has some 2,000 acres of watermelons which may have been hurt. There also was some damage to tomatoes and cucumbers. Eggplant and peppers were hit hard in a December-January cold snap and had been replanted, Russell reported.

Court Invites New Apportionment Ideas

MIAMI (AP)—A federal court in charge has indicated it will consider new Florida legislative reapportionment bills which can be delivered "instantly, if not sooner."

That was the dry invitation of one of the special three-judge panels for interested parties to file further briefs.

"The sooner we hear from you, the sooner we can act," added Judge Warren Jones when several attorneys said last week they'd like to file the briefs. An initial deadline had been set for last Monday.

Jones, Judge William McRae and David Dyer have insisted they will okay no plan for legislative reapportionment that does not stick to the one-man, one-vote formula laid down by the U. S. Supreme Court—which already has batted down three efforts to redistribute seats in the Florida Legislature.

Under consideration by the panel is the Legislature's latest plan to equalize representation, and several other formulas which sponsors say would do a better job.

Jones warned would-be reapportioners "this court is under orders of the U. S. Supreme Court to reconstitute the Legislature" on a one-man, one-vote basis. "We don't have time for this case to go up to the Supreme Court and back again."

The three-judge panel is empowered by the Supreme Court to reapportion Florida's Legislature by judicial decree if necessary.

Orlando Mayor Dies Sunday

ORLANDO (AP)—Robert S. Carr, mayor of Orlando since 1956, died Sunday a week after suffering a heart attack.

Carr, 67, was born in Toledo, Ohio, and was graduated from Scott High School there as well as from Williams College in Massachusetts.

He leaves his widow, a son, Robert Jr., and a daughter, Mrs. Louise Tuttle.

Funeral arrangements were not complete.

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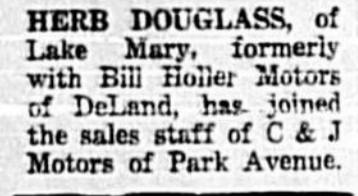

He commented: "This collective leadership of officials can then work with the party organization... and develop unity between the governmental process and the party organization."
Adams said his idea is not unique and that the entire Florida Democratic Congressional delegation, Cabinet officers and Democratic leadership of both Houses of the Legislature "have endorsed this approach."
"By seeking the elected leadership together with the party organization we can make our party reflect the consensus of the people," he declared. "We can develop a real democratic program."
Adams went on to say that in recent years "we have given up service to having a Democratic party in Florida."
If Democrats are to have a more active party, he said, three steps must be taken:

Questions and Answers
Q. My husband is retired from service and will draw his retirement for the rest of his life. If he lives to retirement age, will he also be eligible for social security?
A. There is no restriction against drawing both military retirement and social security. If your husband's military retirement was not based on the length of time he was in service, or if he had active service after December 31, 1956, he can receive credit under social security for portions of his military service, in addition to any civilian employment he had under social security.

Bobby Baker Will Appeal To High Court

WASHINGTON (AP) — Bobby Baker plans to fight his conviction for tax evasion, conspiracy and stealing campaign funds in the Supreme Court if the seven counts on which he was convicted could total 48 years in prison and \$47,000 in fines. His hands trembling and his cheeks whitening, the former secretary to Senate Democrats and behind-the-scenes power on Capitol Hill heard a federal court jury Sunday pronounce him guilty. But Baker, 36, a one-time Senate page who built a \$2-million fortune, stayed free on \$5,000 bail. Sentencing is expected in about two weeks. Penalties for the seven counts on which he was convicted could total 48 years in prison and \$47,000 in fines. "We, of course, are going to the (U. S.) Appeals Court and all the way to the Supreme Court if necessary," said Baker's attorney, Edward Bennett Williams. One Justice Department official speculated the appeal process could consume two years. The trial lasted three weeks and centered around \$92,000 in campaign funds contributed by California savings and loan executives. Lyndon B. Johnson was referred to in testimony by Baker though not by name — and names of other political figures dotted the proceedings. Seven senators and a representative appeared one day to testify. The consequences for Baker, if he does not win a reversal on appeal, would almost certainly be far more severe than the writ. Stan the Senate Rules Committee gave him after a probe into business dealings he conducted before resigning his Senate job under fire in October 1963. While the Senate investigation had brought out allegations of party girls and racy goings-on, Baker's attorney, Edward Bennett Williams, said Justice Department official speculated the trial in U.S. District Court was money-oriented.

Heroes' Honors Accorded Astronauts

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — With heroes' honors, the remains of America's three Apollo 1 astronauts went toward their burial sites today as the nation's military and civilian leaders gathered to honor them. The remains were placed in a casket in the World War II that took a direct hit.

Moonship Damage Extensive In, Out

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — An inspection of Apollo 1 has shown that damage to the moonship was extensive inside and out. The intense flash of fire that killed Astronauts Virgil I. Grissom, Edward H. White II and Roger B. Chaffee made the inside of the spacecraft "look like the cockpit of an aircraft in World War II that took a direct hit," said George Alexander, aerospace writer for Aviation Week magazine. The two Apollo 1 pilots will be buried Tuesday with their own honors. Grissom at 9 a.m. and Chaffee at 1 p.m. White's body will be taken to Highland Falls, N.Y., for a home to await burial at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point at 11 a.m. Tuesday. Paving tribute to a fallen comrade during memorial services for Chaffee Sunday at West Point, near the Manned Spacecraft Center, three astronauts flew gleaming jets out of a setting sun. They left a vacant slot in their formation to honor their fellow astronaut. Similar memorial services were planned today for Grissom and White. At Cape Kennedy the 12-man board of inquiry continued probing the tragedy, looking at photographs taken of the cockpit, interviewing witnesses and studying data. All that remains inside Apollo 1 is a gutted, charred mass of burnt-out wires and scattered debris, an eyewitness said. George Alexander, a writer for Aviation Week magazine who represented all news media, said the space agency permitted one reporter to inspect the moonship Sunday, said the side of Apollo 1 looked "like the cockpit of an aircraft in World War II that took a direct hit."

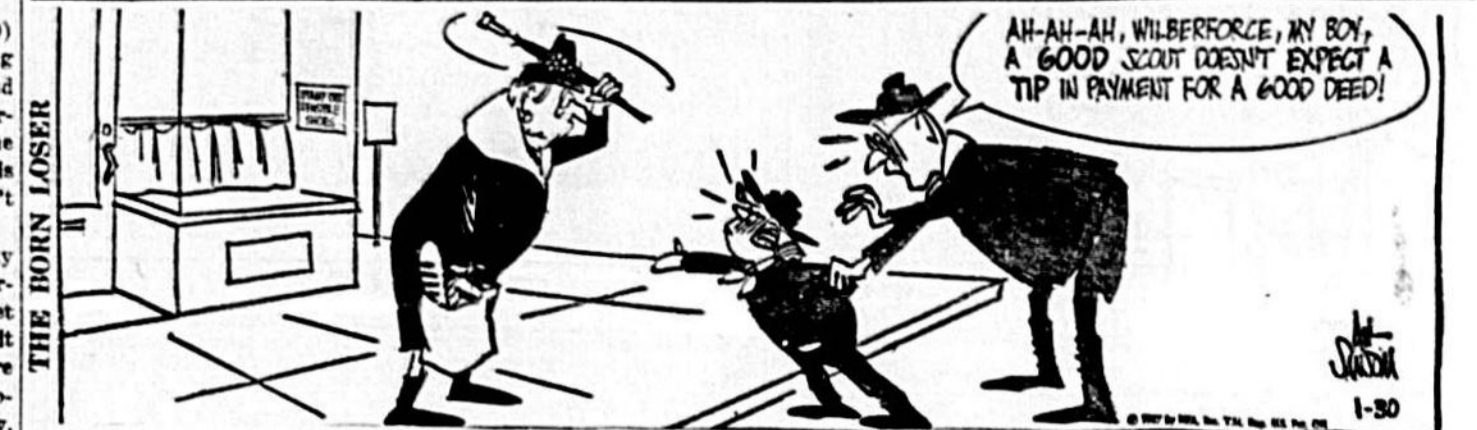
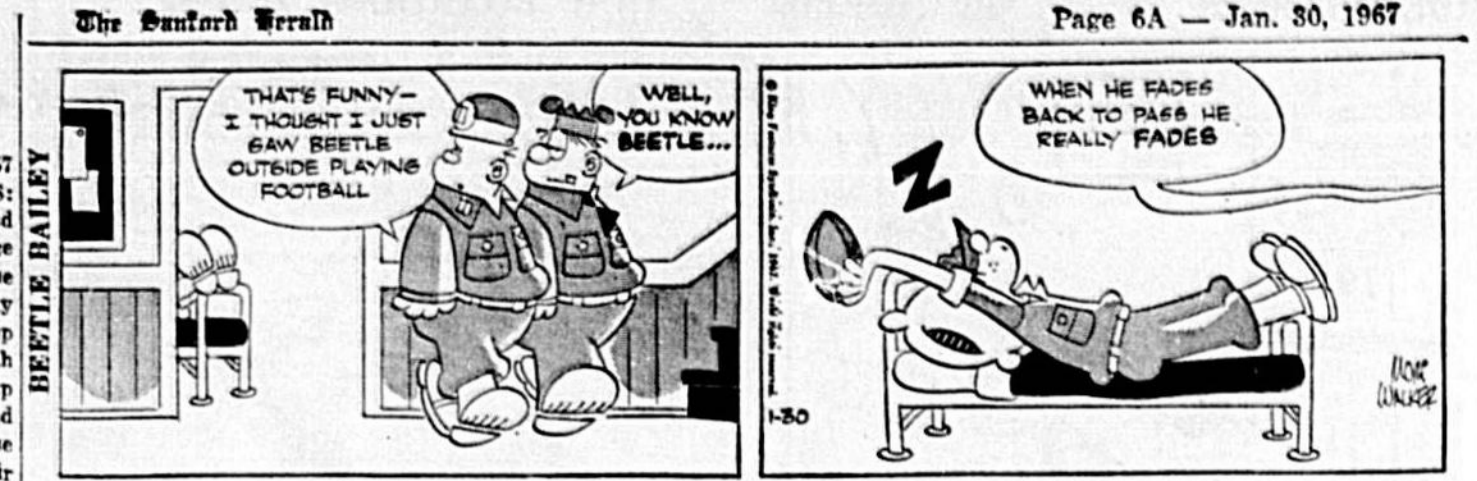

County Sets Work Session On Legislation

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Stronger Home Rule Sought

Home Rule for Seminole County will be the major topic of discussion in workshop meetings to take place among the County Commissioners during the next few weeks.

The board will be holding the meetings to decide which local bills it will recommend to the legislative delegation for adoption at the next session of the Legislature.

The county currently operates as a political subdivision of the state under the Constitution which was adopted in 1885. A limited form of home-rule would give the county the power to adopt ordinances or laws on a local level.

Home-rule could contain, however, controversial features such as change in organization and administrative officials and positions of fee offices.

Commission Chairman John Alexander, in public meetings, has termed the present system under which the county operates as "obsolete and hazy government. Home-rule would allow the county to conduct the government here in a more efficient and businesslike manner.

The system must change in order to be modern," he said. Creation of a jury commission will also be discussed. The jury commission would analyze and select names for jury duty. It is believed by several of the commissioners a jury commission could do a better job of selecting and distributing jurors throughout the county.

Air and water pollution controls including measures to strengthen controls on pumping and dredging operations in the event the state does not pass such controls will be considered.

Authority to regulate small utility companies by the board will be requested in the event all utility companies cannot be placed under the Public Service Commission.

The possibility of seeking legislation to permit microfinancing of county records and permanent destruction of certain old records will be mulled over as will setting up of a county-wide water control bill (drainage and conservation).

Permissive legislation to allow the county to provide ambulance service if the need arises and private firms in the county cease to do business will be considered.

Other possibilities for discussion include separation of the juvenile judge from the county judge position, creation of a medical examiner position in the county, strengthening of central purchasing procedures and a welfare recovery law for the county.

The board also is expected to urge the legislative delegation to support other state-wide legislation.

City Readies The Ax To Aid Industry Board

The City Commission, at an informal meeting, last night, instructed City Manager W. E. Knowles to top off some \$150,000 from this year's budget to pave the way for an industrial commission for Sanford.

Expected to get the ax will be a portion of the zoo relocation project budgeted at \$14,000 and a portion of the street lighting program (\$5,000) from Mellonville to the city limits.

The commission could also use some \$20,000 in surplus funds if they desire.

However, indications are the zoo and lighting projects will be sliced.

The commission agreed to earmark some \$15,000 in funds for an administrator and his staff for a six-month period. However, commissioners made it plain they were not setting his salary at this figure. Indications are that once an administrator is selected he will make from \$25,000 to \$30,000 per year.

The commission, during an "off-the-cuff" session, went on to discuss the possibility of a board of prospective members of the industrial board.

(The commission agreed on six names which The Herald will print once they have been notified.)

Board members, however, Baker a request from Mayor Joe Baker that the mayor serve as an ex-officio member of the industrial board. "We want to keep any kind of politics out of it," Earl Higginbotham said.

The city fathers authorized Attorney W. C. Hitchcock to draw up an ordinance establishing the board and at the same time to set up permissive legislation for its creation.

However, most board members favored an ordinance. The purpose of the industrial board will be to promote industry for Sanford and its environs. The ordinance will spell out that once the industrial board is formed, its budget will have to be submitted through the city manager's office and the seven members of the board will have to be appointed by the city commission.

The industrial board, once it is established, will be subject to a complete audit and a constant liaison with the city commission.

The formation of the industrial board was proposed by the Chamber of Commerce earlier in the year. At last night's meeting, Chamber President DeWitt Mathews thanked commissioners "for carrying the ball" to aid future development of the Sanford area.

Hassle Erupts Over Budget

Controlled disagreement among the Casselberry City Council over certain allocations in the \$124,700 budget presented by Mayor Arthur Wheatley came to light at the council meeting Monday evening.

Particularly cited by Councilman Don Willson as being objectionable were allocation of \$900 to the Humane Society and the inclusion of salaries for the mayor and councilmen totaling \$5,800.

He reported budgeted out an amount for the school children. "These are the very items we discussed until midnight one night. Yet the budget remains as it originally was presented," Willson said.

The board agreed to instruct the city attorney to draw up a resolution, for consideration of council, adopting the tentative budget.

It also was pointed out, however, council may not adopt the budget in its present form, but may, instead, amend or change it following public hearing.

Largest items of anticipated revenue in the budget are cigarettes, tax, insurance, utility tax, \$13,000, and fines and forfeitures, \$29,000.

Approximately 33 per cent of the budget of expenditures was allocated to the police department. Police department budget totaled \$42,200.

Largest of the remaining allocations were professional and community service, \$25,300; road board, \$17,850, and mayor's budget, \$13,850.

In other business, the board: Adopted an ordinance annexing 11 parcels of property into the city;

Referred to the attorney an agreement from Herman Joyce
