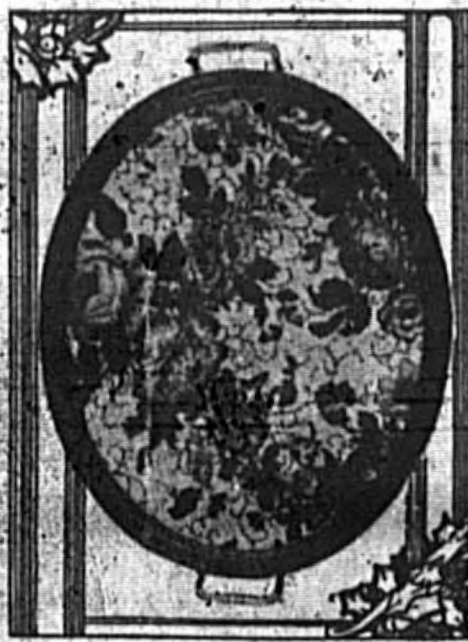

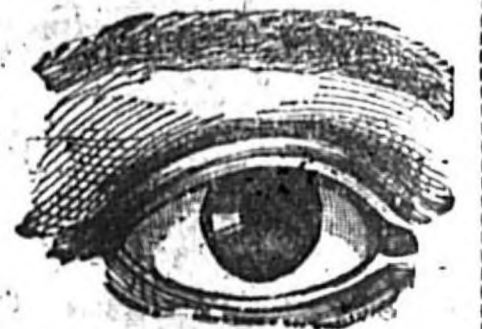

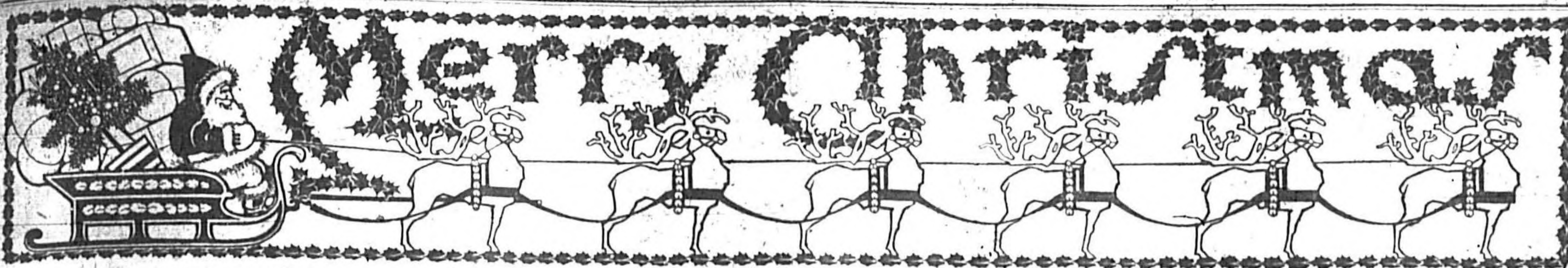

ALL MUST REGISTER

New Primary Law Makes Every One Register After Jan. 1st.

Even though your name may have been on the registration books for the past twenty years you must again register between the first Monday in January and the first Monday in March every two years else you will not be permitted to vote in the primary.

This means that you must register between the first Monday of next month and the first Monday in March if you would vote in the primary election to be held on the first Monday after the first Tuesday in next June.

This law was enacted by the last legislature and citizens generally should become familiar with its provisions. It is known as Chapter 6469 of the Laws of Florida.

The provision in reference to registration is as follows: That the county registration books for each election district shall be open on each week day from 9 a. m. to 12 m. and from 2 p. m. to 5 p. m. and one night until 10 p. m. at some convenient place in each election district in each county in this state, from the first Monday in January, 1914, to the first Monday in March, 1914, biennially thereafter.

In registering you must state on oath your full name, your political party affiliation, your business or occupation, age in years, your color, and the state or country of your nativity; your post-office address, and the fact whether or not you are able to read and write.

Supervisor of Registration H. C. DuBois will appoint deputy registration officers for each precinct and he behoves every citizen to register and see that every one else qualified registers.

ALL MUST REGISTER

New Primary Law Makes Every One Register After Jan. 1st.

Even though your name may have been on the registration books for the past twenty years you must again register between the first Monday in January and the first Monday in March every two years else you will not be permitted to vote in the primary.

This means that you must register between the first Monday of next month and the first Monday in March if you would vote in the primary election to be held on the first Monday after the first Tuesday in next June.

This law was enacted by the last legislature and citizens generally should become familiar with its provisions. It is known as Chapter 6469 of the Laws of Florida.

The provision in reference to registration is as follows: That the county registration books for each election district shall be open on each week day from 9 a. m. to 12 m. and from 2 p. m. to 5 p. m., and one night until 10 p. m., at some convenient place in each election district in each county in this state, from the first Monday in January, 1914, to the first Monday in March, 1914, biennially thereafter.

In registering you must state on oath your full name, your political party affiliation, your business or occupation, age in years, your color, and the state or country of your activity; your post-office address, and the fact whether or not you are able to read and write.
