## Mosquito Warriors Set Date For \$ Bid Data

The Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce Mosquito Task Force Thursday set a goal of two weeks to gather statistics on the economic impact on the area from the blood-sucking pests.

The research is to be conducted under the Agricultural, Research and Education Center of the University of Florida at Gainesville.

Hallgrove said today that after the detailed impact statement is completed by the Sanford area, the other eight Central Florida counties affected by blood-sucking pests are to be requested to complete similar studies.

They also emphasized the security of the request for state funding being a joint effort with other counties. They said the economic impact statement should include all available information on the adverse impact to the community from the insect including the cost of the loss of work, automobile accidents which can be attributed to the insect and the loss of tourism money.

They said the report should also show the impact on real estate values, impact on local service industries and the overall effect of the pest on the community.

Russ Ryan, Vice President (D-Longwood) and Robert Hartley (D-Altamonte Springs) and Sam Vagg (D-Orlando) County) have pledged all possible support in getting the data compiled.

## State Aide's Stats Rapped

### Legislators Fighting Youth Home Closing

The Seminole County Legislative delegation agreed Thursday to oppose any measure closing the local detention center in favor of a larger facility to serve Seminole and Volusia counties.

Alan Eubanks, state legislative program director for Youth Services, explained the rationale for the proposed move. However, he came under fire from members of the delegation and local officials for the use of faulty statistics.

One of the primary reasons for consolidating the two facilities, according to Eubanks, is increasing costs. He noted that for a 30-month period from July, 1976 to December 1977, the local center averaged 15.8 children in the center. According to center officials the facility was designed to handle 13 youth.

Eubanks said that a 25-bed facility should be built. If the Seminole center is not moved, he added that the cost, per day to pay employees of such a facility would be \$1,200.

Combining the Seminole and Volusia centers to create a 75-bed facility would cost about \$400 per day, according to Eubanks.

"You are coming up with ideal staff patterns, which are not done and in all probability of practice will not be done," said State Rep. Vince Fichtel Jr., R-Longwood. "That makes these figures fallacious."

"You're faced with the reality of having as high as 30 children in the center," said Eubanks.

Don Strumrum, a member of the center's advisory board, drew an admission from Eubanks that his figures might be in error.

Strumrum told the delegation that he had figures from "local HRS personnel" that showed the present center could be expanded from 15 to 30 youth, with all services provided, for \$341,000. He also declared the center could be made to facilitate 20 children at a cost of \$115,000.

"It could be right on those budget figures," Eubanks asserted, following Strumrum's presentation.

"What might have happened is that the figures might have been changed from the district level."

Eubanks said other factors that contributed to the HRS recommendation to close the Seminole County center included the fact that five such centers are "clustered" in the east central portion of the state. Those centers are located in Seminole, Orange, Brevard, Lake and Volusia counties.

John Harrop, director of Youth Services, said Seminole is only one of three counties having their own detention center.

Under questioning from State Sen. Luc Wilson, Ind.-Brevard County, Eubanks revealed that the local center was built by the county, Sheriff John Polk, in later testimony, said the county had not had a chance to operate the center, "because the day it opened, the state took it away from us."

Polk said that if the center were merged in a new facility to be constructed near DeLand, he would refuse to transport youths to the center. He noted that such transportation is the responsibility of HRS.

"It's going to be a court order to tell me to transport or it's going to look as if the legislator," said Polk.



## Frozen 'Floridian' Moored In Indiana Town

If you're planning a railroad trip farther north than Nashville, Tenn. — don't get away from the train.

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## Questioned In Bribe Scandal

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Former Attorney General John Mitchell, now serving one to four years for Watergate cover-up crimes, is being investigated to learn how much he knew about Korean bribery plans while in office, according to Rep. Lou Pomoia, D-Calif.

Pomoia quoted acting Deputy Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti as saying he believes some Justice Department officials have asked the Korean operation as far back as 1972. He wants to know if Mitchell was informed of it.

"They are proceeding with investigations on how much knowledge former Attorney General Mitchell had when the initial information was presented to him in 1972," Pomoia said.

Mitchell currently is on a health furlough on a health furlough from the minimum security installation at Maxwell Air Force Base in Alabama, and is in Georgetown University Hospital recuperating from surgery to correct a ballooned artery.

Pomoia said Civiletti is "also looking at the executive branch information that evidently was made available sometime in 1975 to determine why no action took place as a result of that information."

Pomoia, briefing news reporters Thursday on information Civiletti gave a group of House members on the Korean investigation, indicated there is no evidence of a Nixon administration cover-up.

"I guess they just had the idea of it has to be investigated to determine whether in fact that information was deliberately set aside," Pomoia said.

"They do not have that and he did not indicate that to be the case. He (Civiletti) just feels it has to be investigated," Pomoia said.

"They have evidently found some information was available to the Justice Department. Whether it is in Mitchell or not I don't know," he added.

Civiletti also made these points:

— The Justice Department expects to indict four more former congressmen on Korean bribery charges by March 1, and says 13 to 15 indictments might have been paid off because of interest to the House ethics committee.

— One former member of Congress — Richard Hanna, D-Calif. — has been indicted on charges of participating in the Korean influence-peddling scheme. Civiletti expects to bring Hanna to trial by March 20.

Neither Civiletti nor Pomoia mentioned any names of present or former congressmen.

## Satellite Crash Site

### Radioactive Spot 'Lost'

OTTAWA (UPI) — The defense department today said it has lost contact with a highly radioactive spot in northern Canada believed to mark the landing site of at least part of a nuclear-powered Soviet satellite that fell from orbit.

The satellite, launched by the Soviet Union in 1969, was reported to be a highly probable contact Thursday in virtually uninhabited tundra 200 miles west of remote Baker Lake in the Northwest Territories.

Dr. Richard Wagner, a scientist with the Lawrence Laboratory in Livermore, Calif., told reporters "the gamma ray radiation was much more intense than that from any natural source that we can imagine."

But a spokesman for the defense department said Friday that despite three separate survey missions subsequent flights had not spotted any trace of the gamma rays reported by the earlier survey.

He speculated the source of the radiation may be underground and therefore "emitting radiation in a narrow conical pattern" that is hard to spot.

Scientists and a nuclear accident team waited on standby 200 miles from the site, ready to approach the remote location, while experts in Edmonton analyzed the latest radiation measurements.

If the Hercules information remained inconclusive a Chinook helicopter loaded with sophisticated radiation monitoring equipment and cameras was prepared to make a believe flight over the area.

An American Conquest equipped with sophisticated infrared sensors was also expected to go into operation Friday.

Although experts held out the possibility the radiation might not be from the satellite, Canadian Foreign Minister Donald Jamieson said in Tokyo today. "The debris of the Soviet satellite has been located."

Twenty-five tons, including six U.S. radiation specialists and the 11-member Nuclear Accident Support Team, were hurried Thursday to Baker Lake, the nearest settlement to the site. McDonald said it would be unlikely an actual visit to the site would be attempted before Saturday.

McDonald said no one would operate on the danger, but he noted radiation "could be dangerous even at low levels."

The danger from radiation increases with the time of exposure and McDonald said low contamination might allow men to protective clothing enough time to place any radioactive material in containers.

## 'Innovative Taxing' Upheld By State Supreme Court

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Florida Supreme Court has affirmed the right of counties to levy special property taxes to provide public services to incorporated areas.

# Panel Tying Loose Ends

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) — The Constitution Revision Commission can expect little from above and little from below, Chairman Robert D'Almeida says, when it gives before the public next month with a plan to abolish the Cabinet.

Cabinet defenders prepared to reopen the fight and try resurrect an earlier plan under which the Cabinet would be retained, but exhibited some to three officials and the governor given most of its power when D'Almeida stepped in.

"We're not locked into anything, and we're certainly going to come back later," he said.

"I know what the public hearing will be like. We're going to draw a lot of people who will say a lot of mean things to us. But we ought to get through with the process. Some of the things that seem most of us may be true."

President Carter's commitment to human rights may have led last year to the softening of U.S. policy toward Communist parties in Western Europe...

The new political crisis in Italy — with the renewed prospect that Italian Communists will push their way into the government — has prompted Mr. Carter to think again...

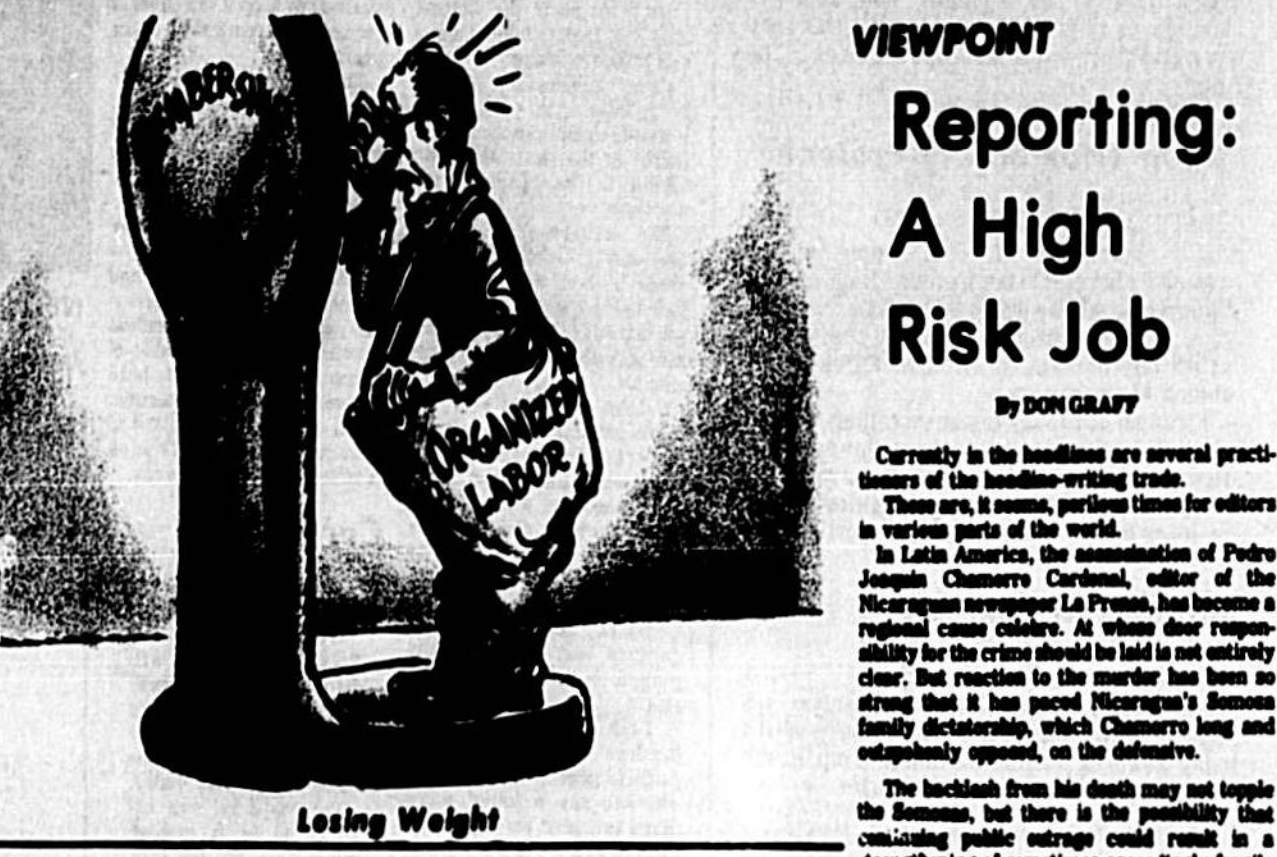

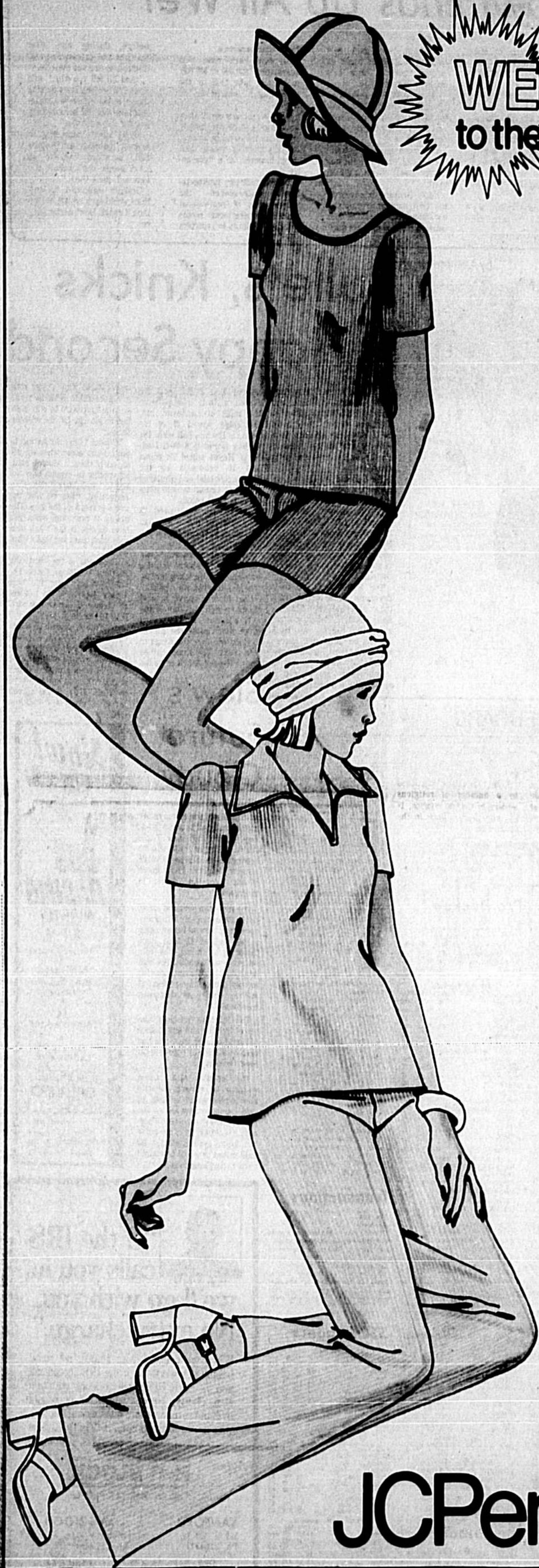

**You Could Save Someone's Life**

"A lot of people would still be alive if more people took CPR courses. It would feel good to know that I saved someone's life!" said Kim Wells, a sixth grader at Milwee Middle School.

"I have my CPR card and am very happy with it. I'm proud to show it to my friends and family. It really feels great to save a life. You can take the course for free, and feel great about it!" said Laura Glen.

"If you can't find a CPR teacher, we have one at Milwee Middle School. So come on, people, help prevent people from dying every year. You have, you could save someone's life," said Mickey Green.

Mark Visser said, "We practice on a mannequin called Annie. She is a dummy like a real person. We give CPR to her to get the feel of it. If we ever had to give it to a real person."

"The big question is: 'How do you know what to do?'" asked Ben Ritter.

Well, by the end of the year, every sixth grader at Milwee Middle School will have the answer to Ben's question. Betty Martin is now a qualified CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation) instructor, after taking the instructor's course, sponsored by the American Heart Association, at Orange Memorial Hospital, this past summer.

"We are the only school in the county with our own Annie. Students receive the CPR training during a 15-week health class," said Martin.

Larry Miller, in charge of physical education at the school, is also a certified instructor. Schools are being visited by Martin Shell, Health Coordinator of Seminole County Schools, to have at least one CPR trained teacher on the staff. An in-service teacher training program is being launched. Milwee teachers have seven certified teachers in CPR.

During the last four years, Milwee School has studied and practiced CPR under local Fire Department personnel.

Ahane Serron and Ted Hamilton summed up the course by saying, "We took CPR because we wanted to know what to do in case someone is choking, not breathing or having a heart attack. A person at any age can learn CPR. Thanks to Mrs. Martin, students at Milwee Middle School know CPR. So think about it!"

From Sales To Salvation Former Skeptic Shepherds His Flock

Clint Raymes leads a group of Christians who wear high-collared military uniforms and are frequently thought of as strict militarists with a strong opinion on "bringing in the Gipper."

Raymes is commander of the Alexandria, La. unit of the Salvation Army. His wife, Mary, is also a Salvation Army officer, as required by the organization's regulations.

After a one-year stay in Washington, the couple was convinced they wanted to rise in the army's ranks. They chose to attend officer training school in Atlanta — an expensive proposition.

Tuition is low and housing is provided at the two-year school, Raymes said. But costs must be paid for living expenses and aren't allowed to hold down outside jobs.

Raymes and his wife were paid a total of \$4 per month, he said. He was assigned to a furnished apartment, for the rest of his stay.

He almost changed his mind about the job, but decided to join the Army's local headquarters. Raymes was inspired by the rehabilitation center for alcoholics and became an assistant to the Washington commander. Part of his job was counseling alcoholics.

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thought the uniforms were silly, but he now believes they are useful in attracting attention. After catching someone's eye, Raymes uses the opportunity to deliver his religious message. Once, Raymes recalls, he was waiting in a Washington bus terminal when he noticed a woman in a military uniform. The theory-eyed man questioned her and asked him a question in staccato speech: "Steady, what kind of uniform is that?"

"It's the Salvation Army's," Raymes replied. "That's what I should have said," the wayward soldier replied.

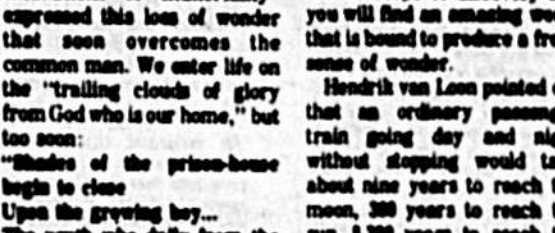
The Salvation Army is a strict master, especially for officers. Two thick regulation books list the do's and don'ts of service. Officers' personal lives — from whom to marry to what car to buy — but Raymes doesn't mind.

"We have to be very careful not to bring reproach on the army," he said.

All Salvation Army officers are ordained ministers, Raymes said. The army has recognized women's right to spread God's word since the organization was founded in London in 1865, he noted.
