

## Tom Connally, Although Retired, Is Blasting Fellow Democrats

WASHINGTON — Tom Connally is a gray-haired political warrior who has retired to the sidelines, but the fiery Texan is scolding his fellow Democrats over the conduct of some of his fellow Democrats.

Retirement has dulled neither the mind nor the tongue that kept him in Congress for almost 30 years and made him an international figure. He is observing his 70th birthday today and has this to say about his party.

"The Democrats can't afford to be afraid of the program about their support of President Eisenhower. That sort of thing may be no help in 10 years to come."

"Besides, they should make it clear they will vote for a program on its merits alone—not whether Eisenhower is for or against it. Most things the Democrats have supported were programs which were initiated by the Democrats in the first place. They've just been voting for what they believed in all the time."

Connally made the statement as he sat on the grassy lawn of the home in Fort Worth where he lives with his wife and his memories of the years when he was an actor in history-making events.

Speaking of Eisenhower, he said, "I think Ike's capital stock in his personal popularity as a war hero is still holding—maybe not as strong as it was, but it's still there. And there's no doubt the Democrats in Congress have helped him with their support on several measures."

"I think he's shown very clearly that he has an extremely conservative viewpoint. Many of his important appointments have gone

to men with no practical experience in government or politics—though they may have had experience in big business and monopolies."

"If this trend continues, it's going to hurt him. People don't want big business to dominate us."

During the years he was chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Connally was a strong advocate of a bipartisan foreign policy. But he said too often bipartisanism runs afloat of partisan interest.

He added, "Bipartisanship depends a great deal too on whether the majority party really wants a bipartisan policy."

Connally is spending part of each day deciding up old memories and putting them down for a book he is writing—a book that will span his 30 years in Congress. It is scheduled for publication next spring.

He is up at 8 a.m. daily and works on his book until noon. Then he takes things easy or visits with old friends to argue politics.

"I didn't have a real vacation for 30 years," he said. "So I'm taking my rest now."

"I get a little restlessness at times having nothing to do. But the book takes up a good deal of my time and I'm enjoying this vacation."

Although Connally was a commanding figure on the Senate floor for years, he hasn't been back since he stepped into retirement.

"I'm through with politics," he said. "I think 30 years in the House and Senate were enough for one man."

## Confusion Helps Communism Grow

WASHINGTON — The House Un-American Activities Committee says it believes 99 out of 100 Americans are emphatically against communism — but many know so little about it they are not sure what they are against.

This confusion, the committee said yesterday, makes it possible for "many self-styled 'anti-Commun-

ists' with Socialist or Communist front backgrounds" to get away with attacks on congressional investigators of communism, "attacks which are aiding and abetting the Communist conspiracy."

The observations were contained in an introduction to a history of organized "front" work in the United States being published by the group.

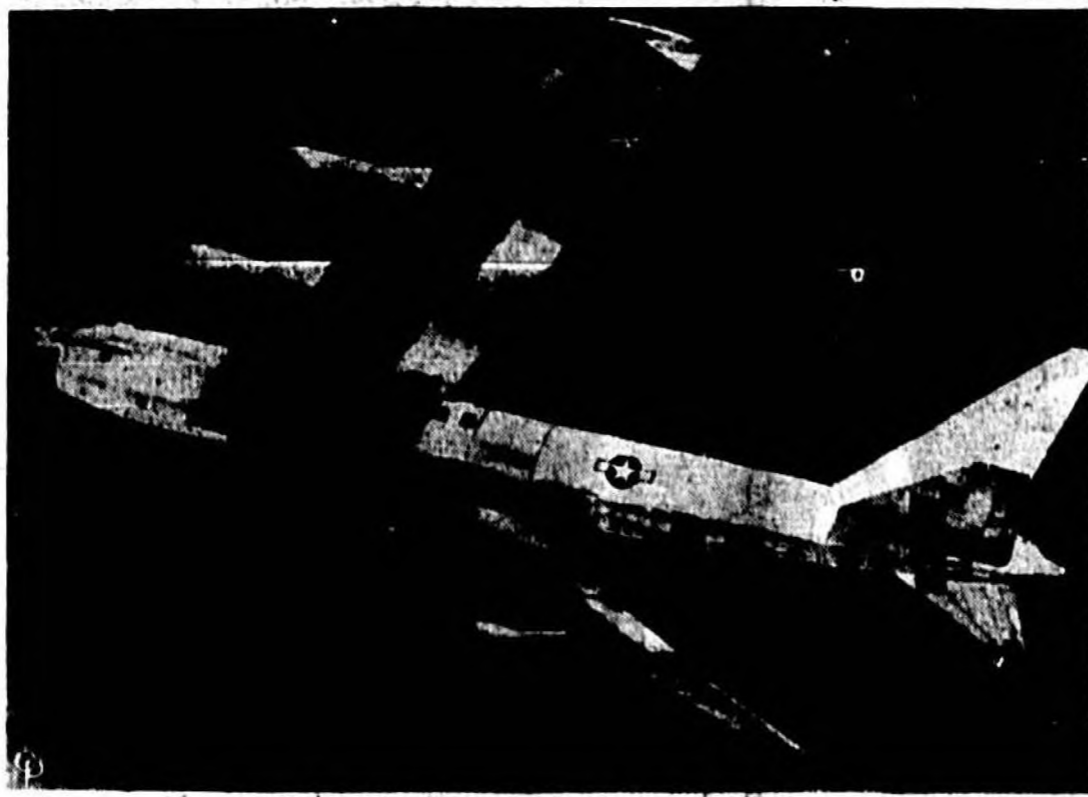

# Tommy "Wahoo" Leonard Vaults Into The FSL Batting Lead With .379 Mark

Tommy "Wahoo" Leonard, who has a chance to become the first Sanford player to win the Florida State League batting championship since the league was re-organized in 1936, catapulted into the FSL lead with a .379 mark last week. The one-fourth Cherokee Indian outfielder from North Carolina held an eight-point bulge over his nearest rival, Manager Ted Trendway.

Leonard, who began his baseball career in Palembang, Sumatra in the Dutch East Indies at the age of seven, also leads the FSL batsmen with 141 hits. He is among the 10 loop players to score 100 or more runs and ranks among the four hitters to crash 100 or more runners across the plate this year.

The 5-foot-10 southpaw swinger is also among the seven top leaders in stolen bases with 32. Built like a rock at 170 pounds, Leonard holds a .377 lifetime average in his first two years of Organized Baseball.

Having won the batting title of the Coastal Plains League while playing with Goldsboro, N. C., last year, with a lustrous .375 mark, the aggressive little musclemán is well on his way to his second straight batting crown in his first two years of playing in O. B. Meanwhile, Manager J. C. Dunn maintained his No. 4 position of the week before in the loop batting race. Dunn is the home run leader of the FSL with 17 and the greatest single producer of runs, having scored 122 to tie for second place with George Hughes and having driven in 132 to rank third to leader Bama Rowell (121) and second to Buck Pardue (117).

Dunn is well up in the total hit department with 171 to curtail Leonard's 379 mark is only four points short of the all-time FSL batting high of 383 set by Al Piette in 1949 while playing for Gainesville.

While the Sanford Cardinals appear to be out of the second half pennant race, local fans are watching the box scores diligently every day to see if "Wahoo" can become the first Sanford player to rack a batting crown in Florida State League.

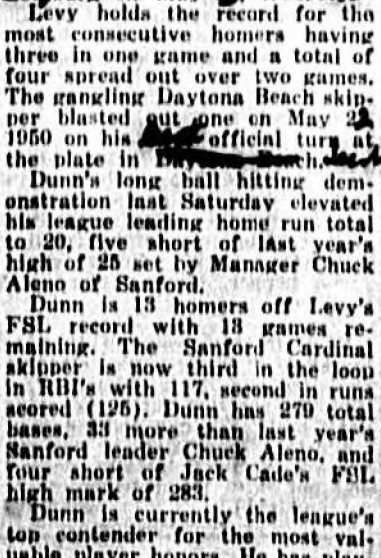

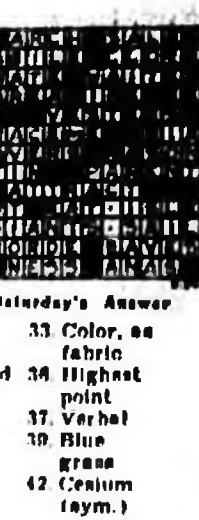

## City Will Adopt New Assessment Plan

### \$60,000 For French Ave. Rights-Williams

#### City's Agent Sees Favorable SRD Action

Total cost of acquisition of all right-of-way property for the widening of French Ave. will not exceed \$60,000, Volie Williams Jr., who has been the city's agent in the procurement of the right-of-way, told the City Commission last night.

Mr. Williams also expressed the opinion that French Ave. would be given top priority by J. Stanton Lloyd, Duval County district board member of the State Road Department, for new primary road construction in the County.

He said he had nothing definite upon which to base his surmise. But Mr. Williams said, he thought French Ave. fit Mr. Lloyd's statement that the highways most traveled and most in need of improvement will be first to be considered. The agent pointed out that French Ave., which was the champion of the committee's selection for initial improvement, has five times as much traffic as Highway 16, Duval County Ave., which was the county Board of Commissioners' first choice.

Agreement was reached with all property owners along French Ave. Mr. Williams said on all but about 14 properties. Condemnation suits were filed on all the remaining parcels of property except one. The agent said he doubted if 10 cases would be tried in Circuit Court. He predicted the suits would come up in the November term of court.

#### Driver Killed On Osteen Bridge Curve

A 30-year-old Negro tavern owner was crashing to his death on the dangerous Osteen Bridge curve early today. Jack Morgan Jr., owner of the De-Lux bar in Gibbstown, was killed at about 12:30 o'clock this morning when the car in which he was driving tumbled off the sharp curve at the Osteen Bridge, rolled over twice and plunged into the St. Johns River in three feet of water.

Joe Anderson, Negro companion riding with Morgan, was found injured, but hospital authorities stated his condition was not serious.

State Trooper B. D. Harrison and Sheriff J. L. Hobby investigated the accident rushing Anderson to the Fernald-Laughton Hospital.

A six-man coroner's jury was impaneled by Justice of the Peace Hugh Duncan this morning and they viewed the scene and body. According to Mr. Duncan, coroner's inquest into the death of Morgan will be held when Anderson is sufficiently recovered to testify.

Members of the coroner's jury are Marion Harman, foreman; Frank W. Jones, Ed Williamson, Thomas Hallif Jr., J. T. McDonald, and H. D. Muse.

Duncan stated Morgan was traveling west on State Route 415 and went off the road after crossing the Osteen Bridge when the accident occurred. He could not say whether Morgan died because of injuries suffered crashing the car or whether Morgan was drowned in his car.

"We will have to wait for the coroner's report first," he stated. The death of Morgan was the second in the past two months on Route 415 near the Osteen bridge.

A Puerto Rican laborer was killed there last June in an automobile accident. The County Commissioners requested funds from the State Road Department for a new bridge, wider road and less dangerous curve on Route 415 at the Osteen Bridge only last week.

#### Stadium Charges Are Approved

A schedule of charges for use of Memorial Stadium by the County Board of Public Instruction was approved last night by the City Commission.

The City will charge \$1,200 per year to convert the field from use for baseball to football and visa versa and \$70 for each game night, exclusive of taxes, and including \$10 per game for insurance. The City submitted a proposal to buy some bleachers.

#### Taxpayers Air Views During Session Of City Commission

The City Commission last night elected to go through with the proposed plan of financing an extensive sewer and water improvement program through the introduction of sewer service charges and cutting bond issues through adjustment of local real estate assessment valuations.

The tentative fiscal plan had been under fire for an hour and a half before a crowd which filled the City Commission room and overflowed into the hall.

The commission had not upon the program of financing at their meeting Aug. 3, but had decided to take the feelings of taxpayers in the matter last night.

Members of the Sanford Merchants' Assn. went to the meeting expecting to protest against the increased valuation as they were of the belief that the millage rate would be increased accordingly.

However, after Mayor Randall Chase explained the millage would be lowered in direct reverse of the increase in valuation, Al Wilson, president of the association, stated: "Personally I have nothing to say for or against it, I think it's all right."

Mayor Chase spiked the gun of most objectors through his explanation of the proposition at the first of the meeting, during which he referred to a chart at the head of the room. The chart appears at the bottom of this page.

The chart showed 1,000 acres which are assessed from present assessment valuations of property, and what the taxes would be should the Commission raise the valuation by 20 per cent. The chart also showed the millage for paying off bonded indebtedness and for operation of the City under both systems.

The Commission did not stipulate the rate of increase in valuation would be 30 per cent of that the millage shown would be the exact ones selected, but pledged they would come as close to the stated figures as possible.

New assessment valuations will be figured from the valuation as of Jan. 1, 1953.

Mayor Chase bowed that the inverse proportion between assessment valuations and millage would be a decrease in taxes, or vice versa. Taking two hypothetical valuations on First St., he said one property with a valuation of \$50,000 would pay a tax of \$1,000.00 and that with the new valuation, \$112,000 the tax bill would be \$2,240.00.

The other property with a valuation of \$20,000 now has a tax bill of \$400.00, while with the new valuation \$112,000 the tax bill would be \$2,240.00. The net increase in tax levied is pointed out, were \$1,840.00.

The Commission decided upon the increase in valuation Aug. 3, but the millage shown would be determined by the City's fiscal agent in the matter of the sewer and water program Sullivan Nelson said.

The fiscal agent had pointed out that an increase in the assessed valuations of real estate in the city would mean a decrease in the rate in procuring buyers for the revenue bonds which will finance the project. Buyers would get a more attractive picture of the city's financial status if the assessed valuation were set at 65 per cent of market value, rather than the approximately 50 per cent now, the Commission was told.

However, the definite increase in assessed valuation cannot be determined until the commission has decided how much money they are going to spend in the project.

Last night the Commission was using the figure of \$1 million as the cost of the project in explaining the finance picture to the audience. Previously, the City had used the figure of \$1,200,000 as the proposed cost and had left the matter open to the effect the cost will be anywhere between \$1 million and \$2 million.

Also, the City has not decided if the program is to include a \$200,000 sewer treatment plant.

After the Commission decides upon the cost of the project, it is the duty of the fiscal agent to find buyers for the revenue bonds.

The bonds which are being proposed for the program would be financed through a proposed sewer service charge, which would be figured as a percentage of an individual water bill.

Last night, the Commission treated the new sewer service charge, which they decided to include.

#### Razing Of Old Church, Construction Of New Planned By Congregationalists

Plans for the razing of the Christian Congregational Church, Third St. and Park Ave., and the construction of a new church in Sanford will be discussed at tomorrow's regular monthly meeting of the church's board of directors. It was announced today by John Root, sketches of the proposed new church will be shown. According to Mr. Root, the new church will be one of the finest in the City. Plans for the new church are being drawn by Elton J. Moughton.

The Christian Congregational Church property was recently sold to the Phillips Petroleum Company, which intends to erect a gasoline station at the corner. The exact site of the new Congregational church has not been designated as yet.

The church must tear down its present structure. A bid may be let at tomorrow night's meeting.
