CASSELBERRY — A 9-year-old girl was reportedly assaulted Monday at a Casselberry bowling alley.

Tomorrow Project to expand Seminole YMCA

LAKE MARY — Tomorrow last year, when the Seminole County YMCA went through its rebuilding stage, every body made a big deal about it.

That was nothing compared to what's going on now.

The Lake Mary facility held groundbreaking ceremonies Monday for its Tomorrow Project, a \$4.5 million expansion and renovation designed to make the YMCA one of the best and most up-to-date anywhere.

The expansion was deemed necessary to keep up with the rapid growth in North Seminole County, so over 20,000 square feet are being added to include an expanded wellness center, a larger child watch area for children whose parents are using YMCA facilities, expanded and renovated locker rooms, an 8,000-square-foot gymnasium and a new children's playground.

Nov. 1, 1998 is the scheduled date for the grand opening and YMCA officials urged its members to be patient. Some of the YMCA's current programs is expected to be interrupted and all present facilities including the expanded weight room will remain in operation.

Updates won't just be taking place on the inside. There will be over 100 new parking spaces as the community has simply outgrown the current parking lot.

In conjunction with the Tomorrow Project, the YMCA is looking to boost its membership.

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Dream a big dream of college education

SANFORD — The 14th annual Seminole Community College Dream Auction will be held at the Orlando Expo Center this Saturday, Feb. 7. The auction is designed to help those students who can not afford tuition due to some circumstance that would deny them an education.

For example, Alex Serreas, a consultant at the college, relates one such case where funds from the Dream Auction helped a young lady whose father had a major heart attack and she could not afford an

education. "Through the auction, she is doing well," said Serreas.

In another case, a single mother was interested in secretarial work, but could never pursue the ambition because her husband had left her with the kids. Through the funds raised in the Dream Auction, she now has that chance. "It helps those students that have fallen through the cracks," said Serreas.

The Dream Auction started in 1985 by founders Art Gundle and the late Bill Schaffner. Gundle is this year's auctioneer and according to Serreas, has remained highly involved

in the auction since its inception.

Serreas said that the Dream Auction has grown out of its normal location, the Hilton in Altamonte Springs. The Hilton could only accommodate 400 people maximum. This year, the event is sold out with over 600 reservations, thus prompting the move. "The auction has outgrown its facility in Seminole County," said Serreas.

There will be three separate auctions: silent, board and live. Each auction will contain three levels of gifts. The silent auction will be for smaller items like restaurant dinners,

sides of beef, etc. During the board auction, the prizes will be more extravagant like stays at condominiums and getaways to Orlando Solar Bears and Orlando Magic games. In the live auction, the top 20 to 22 prizes will be up for bid. Some of these items include a trip to Cancun, a trip to Ireland, a one-day trip for three to Houston with a ride in a 757 flight simulator and a round of golf at the Legends of Golf course, a skybox for four at a Jacksonville Jaguars game, etc.

Gov. Chiles helps kick-off endowment campaign

HEATHROW - On Thursday, Jan. 22, Gov. Lawton Chiles lent his support to the American Diabetes Association by attending a private event in Heathrow to kick off a campaign to raise money for a research chair at the University of Florida. The campaign will result in an endowed \$2.5 million research professorship for diabetes research in the Center for Immunology and Transplantation at the College of Medicine at the University of Florida. A second \$2.5 million research professorship to be called the American Diabetes Association Research Professorship has been privately funded by an anonymous donor from Central Florida. Association endowed chairs at UF will total \$5 million.

Gov. Chiles, a UF alumnus, holds a personal interest in the funding of diabetes research. The Governor has family members who have the disease and has seen first hand how brutal diabetes can be. As a United States Senator (1971-1989), Chiles worked to increase funding for diabetes research from the National Institutes of Health.

The speaker at this event was Dr. Mark Atkinson, director of the Center for Immunology and Transplantation at UF's College of Medicine and ADA Research Professorship funds administrator. Dr. Atkinson highlighted the groundbreaking diabetes research being conducted at UF.

Diabetes is a serious disease in which the body either does not produce insulin (type 1) or does not effectively use or produce adequate amounts of insulin (type 2). Insulin is a hormone that allows blood sugar to enter the cells of the body and be used for energy.

Diabetes can lead to severely debilitating or fatal complications, such as blindness, kidney and heart disease, stroke and lower-extremity amputations. It is the seventh leading cause of death in the U.S. Currently, there is no cure.

The American Diabetes Association is the nation's leading voluntary health organization supporting diabetes research, information and advocacy. Founded in 1940, the Association has offices in every region of the country, providing services to more than 800 communities.

Meet the raptors you didn't see in 'Jurassic Park' at PETsMART opening

LAKE MARY - Steven Spielberg's "Jurassic Park" and "The Lost World" may have you dreaming of dinosaurs when you hear the word "raptors," but the animals that go by that name today are birds of prey. Similar to dinosaurs, some of our nation's raptors have teetered on the brink of extinction; yet, preservation efforts have recently brought many birds, such as the Bald Eagle, off the endangered species list.

This Saturday, Feb. 7 and Sunday, Feb. 8, PETsMART is offering its guests the opportunity to see three birds in the raptor family - a Golden Eagle, a Red Tailed Hawk and a Great Horned Owl - up close at the grand opening of its Lake Mary store. The birds will be down to PETsMART from The Raptor Center at the University of Minnesota as part of a public awareness and education campaign.

"All of the birds that we bring to PETsMART were found injured in the wild and

rehabilitated, but cannot be returned to their home," said Ron Osterbauer, associate director of the University of Minnesota Raptor Center. "Bringing them to cities across the country enables us to educate people through a 'beak-to-nose' encounter they won't soon forget. With the depletion of bird habitat, most people would never otherwise have the opportunity to see one of these magnificent animals."

The raptors and their trainers can be seen from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday at the PETsMART store located at 4550 W. Lake Mary Blvd. The trainers will present a program about the birds and their role in the environment.

The new 26,000 square-foot superstore contains more than 12,000 pet food and supply items, and offers numerous services ranging from low-cost obedience classes to professional grooming. Leashed pets are welcome to shop with their owners, as the store's extra-wide aisles are designed for both pets and people.

Import/export user fee exemption proposed for small businesses

ATLANTA - The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is proposing to exempt certain wildlife shipments containing furs, hides, and skins from user fees charged under its wildlife import/export regulations.

"Our goal in the proposed rule is to provide economic relief to small businesses and individuals while maintaining an efficient inspection program for wildlife trade," said Kevin Adams, chief of the Service's Division of Law Enforcement.

The Service published a proposed rule in the January 22, 1998, Federal Register and invites public comment on the suggested fee exemption.

Commercial importers and exporters of wildlife and wildlife products now pay user fees for each shipment they bring into or out of the United States. These fees include a \$55 inspection fee at the Nation's 13 designated ports and higher administrative fees if goods are shipped through other approved locations. The current fee system, established in 1996, allows the Service to recoup more of the costs of the wildlife inspection program from the companies that use it.

The proposed rule would waive these basic inspection and administrative fees for certain shipments. The fee exemption would apply only to shipments containing 100 or fewer raw furs; raw, salted, or crusted hides or skins; or separate parts of furs, hides, and skins from animals legally taken from the wild in the United States, Canada, or Mexico, that are imported or

exported between the United States and Canada or Mexico.

The exemption would not cover shipments that require permits because they contain injurious wildlife, endangered and threatened species, protected marine mammals, migratory birds, or animals and plants subject to trade controls under the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora. Nor would it apply to manufactured products or live animals of any kind.

To qualify for the proposed fee exemption, the wildlife shipment must be imported or exported by the person who took the animal from the wild or by a member of that person's immediate family: spouse, parent, sibling, or child. The contents of the shipment cannot have been previously sold, and the importer or exporter must hold a valid wildlife import/export license. These criteria are intended to limit the fee exemption to small, low-volume businesses that trade furs, skins, or hides on a small scale, or to individuals who hunt or trap as a hobby or to supplement their income. "We've carefully tried to focus on small shippers who are disproportionately affected by user fees," Adams explained.

Importers and exporters covered by the exemption will still have to obtain an import/export license from the Service at an annual cost of \$50, pay any overtime fees or other charges associated with inspection and clearance of the shipment, and complete and file the declaration form required for wildlife imports

and exports. They will also be required to sign a statement certifying that they or a family member took the animals from the wild.

The Service's wildlife inspection program helps the Nation control the importation and exportation of wildlife and wildlife products. Its staff of trained inspectors stationed at U.S. ports of entry and border crossings provides a front-line defense against illegal wildlife trafficking—a threat to animal species worldwide.

Comments on the proposed user fee exemption should be

park. If that were true, the land could revert to the donating family if the city used it for any other purpose, including development. City Manager Bill Simmons said an extensive title search has been made on the property, "and we have found no deed restrictions which would keep us from doing any other developments on the property."

Simmons said the CRA and city have agreed to allow PRA, a development company, one

full year to investigate the possibility of leasing the property from the city. "I understand PRA has recently heard from DoubleTree Hotels Corporation, which has shown an interest in a hotel which combines with a conference center," DoubleTree already has several such major developments across the country.

The one year allowed for the PRA to investigate the possibility and seek possible financial supporters and partners was from November through November.

"If we could bring this about," Simmons concluded, "it would put the property back on the tax rolls and the city would benefit. Then, with a well written lease by the city, we could still have some control over the property, and have a final say when the lease has run out."

The dilemma of Fort Mellon Park

Fort Mellon Park located between New Tribes Mission and Sanford Avenue, and between East First Street and Seminole Boulevard is probably the most valuable piece of property in the City of Sanford. Hardly anyone could disagree with that point.

But when it comes to development, there appears to be a growing division between those who see the potential of a possible hotel and conference center versus others who apparently want only the serene atmosphere of a park and the view it affords of Lake Monroe from the Sanford Museum and east First Street.

There is no doubt the park is pretty. Many people have worked long and hard to give the citizens and visitors as pretty a location as possible. The city keeps it in top condition at all times.

While many look at the park however, how many actually use it? Except for the ball field and some children's equipment, it is a passive park in which we rarely see a crowd unless there is a major function, such as the Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration or Fourth of July fireworks. Sure, there was a need at one time. People who lived in the area had a place to gather, play ball or have a picnic. Fort Mellon Park was the focal point of these activities.

What if it wasn't there? We have other parks for picnics and children's activities. Other ball parks could be created on much less valuable park property. After all, the city owns many pieces of property (all off the tax rolls) and rather than being vacant, they could certainly serve us better than they have been.

Side note - Take Fort Mellon property and put it back on the tax rolls when it is developed and we'll see how we have wasted money by not doing it sooner.

What else is it? In the past it has been a park for the neighborhood. But that was before people had a car (or two) in every driveway. How many people who presently use the facilities at Fort Mellon Park walk and how many drive? That factor alone should show you that location is not a factor.

As for the beautiful view from east First Street, across the present park area, to the lakefront: has the city obtained one cent in taxes from a view? Has it made any tourist stop a car on the side of First Street to look at the lake (or do they drive to the lakefront itself)?

This isn't a new idea. A number of years ago, former Sanford City Commissioner Bob Thomas told his fellow commissioners that he believed the park area was the biggest waste of city owned property, that it would be remain as such until such time when it is developed for a hotel or some type of conference center.

At that time, most of the other commissioners poo poo'd the concept and it never got off the ground much less into the running start where it is today.

There is such a thing as a beautiful natural area where people can enjoy themselves and the view. There also is however, common sense that says the city's most valuable property has been too long off the tax roll - too long costing the city money rather than making it, and too long putting the growing cost of city services on the backs of homeowners, with Sanford laying claim to the highest millage rate in the county.

In the business world, the three most important things to consider are location, location, location. Perhaps it's time more people gave that some consideration.

If we plan development carefully, and that could include a shared use of Fort Mellon and the surrounding area, possibly affording something for everyone: passive space with a view and a draw in a hotel and conference center that would boost the tax rolls. And, a city with parks located throughout would still draw people to various locations for that passive enjoyment.

Hacking at people's lovelessness

WASHINGTON--Let's talk about love. Actually, let's not. For all of our spouting about love in music and movies, for all our casual wrapping of our lips around the notion--"I love that shirt!"--few of us swallow its deeper meanings. Some of us embrace love the way we embrace sports--from afar, with as little or no active participation.

Let's talk about the lack of love, about which we know more.

Perhaps because he's a romantic who calls Rachmaninoff's melodies "natural wonders" and Anita Baker's warblings a salve that makes him "a better person," Randall Robinson never stops being surprised to find love so lacking. Particularly toward people of African descent.

Now, experience has taught me that some readers are now asking: Must a discussion about something as universal as love be ruined by the insertion of race? Must we veer in a direction of no real concern to anyone but blacks?

Sure we must. The challenge--the loving challenge--is for people to recognize not only that everyone is affected by questions of race, but that to think otherwise indicates a lack of love.

It's a lack that Robinson, founder and president of TransAfrica, the lobby for Africa and the Caribbean, knows well. The activist who sparked the American civil unrest juggernaut that helped topple South African apartheid realizes that discussing race, like love, is tricky--yet tackles both in

his new book, "Defending the Spirit: A Black Life in America."

As a romantic, Robinson told me recently, "You have to believe...that you aren't human alone. That we are more alike than we are different."

Robinson's very American story describes his parents, Maxie and Doris, college-educated blacks in an era when that meant little in terms of income, and his three siblings--including big brother Max, the pioneering news anchor who died in 1988 of AIDS. It's a primer on our nation's shameful policies toward Africa, a continent whose triumphs are rarely celebrated and whose troubles are endlessly showcased--without any acknowledgment of America's role in the awfulness.

"I don't know how...to set my voice," Robinson writes. "The urge is to scream, but...emotion is off-putting when unshared. ...But what the United States has done to

Zaire and much of Africa--done with gloves on so as to leave no fingerprints--is unpardonable."

Dusting for racism's fingerprints, Robinson finds plenty: In the segregated Richmond, Va., of his childhood, in the U.S. Army, in which a white sergeant made the young private take a frigid ride in back of a flatbed truck as white grunts traded jokes inside the warm cab. At Harvard Law School, where--despite his shirt tie and deadpan of law journals--he was mistaken for a janitor.

You begin to understand how a child who once thought grown-ups "quite ally" for making a fuss about race became a national figure who explores the subject with world leaders--and yet found himself, at age 53, being called "boy" by a young white man in rural Virginia.

Who knows why we choose the paths we follow? Robinson ignored what he calls the "paved, open road" of a conventional law career to peep into "the dense foliage" of human need. He saw "a road that needed building. And I headed into it."

How...romantic. So after years of hacking at people's lovelessness with only mixed results, why does he continue?

"Because you don't want to die spiritually long before you die physically--it's just not worth it," he explains.

"Success to me is just having tried. Victory--that's a bonus."

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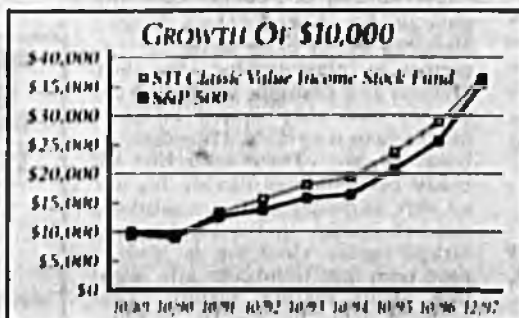

Kershner kept his calm on the sideline throughout the first quarter. Oviedo got good shots off, they just weren't dropping.

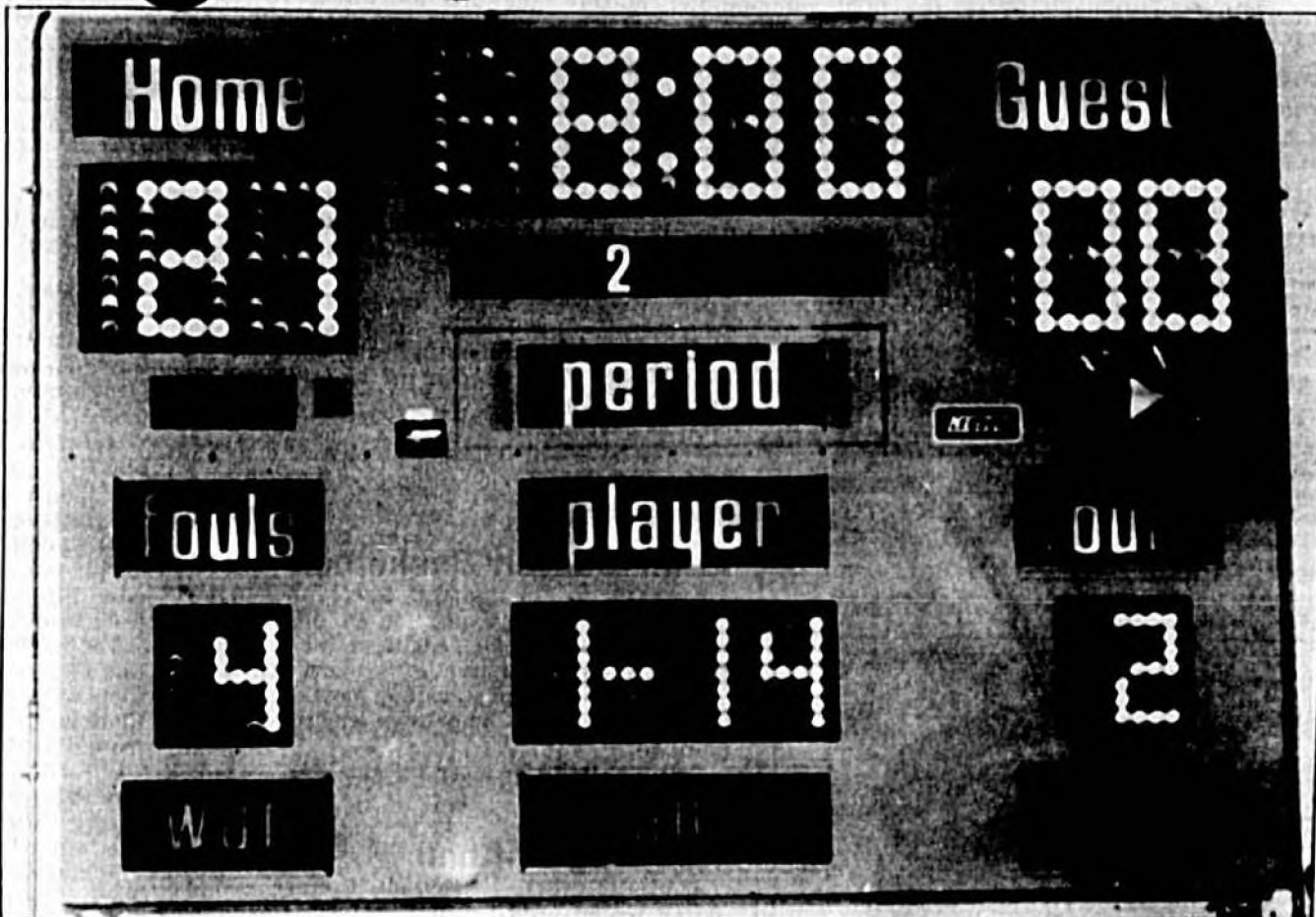
Oviedo was 0-18 shooting in the first quarter and missed its first five shots of the second.

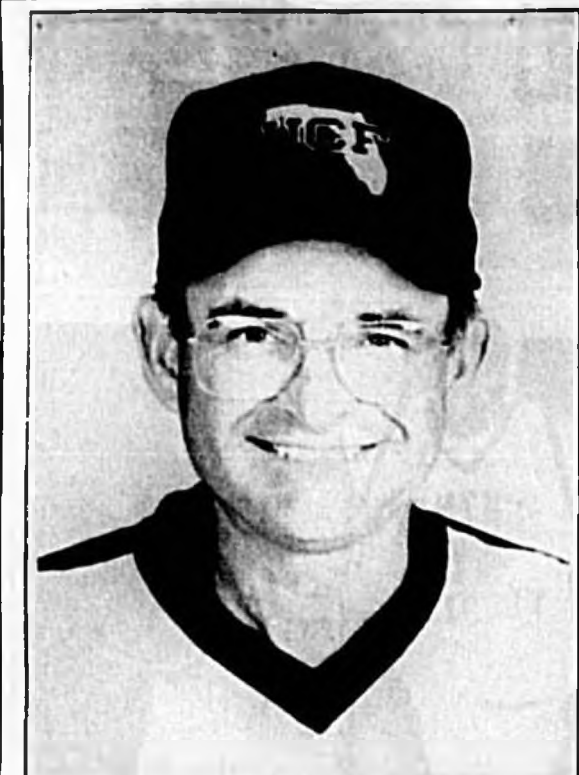

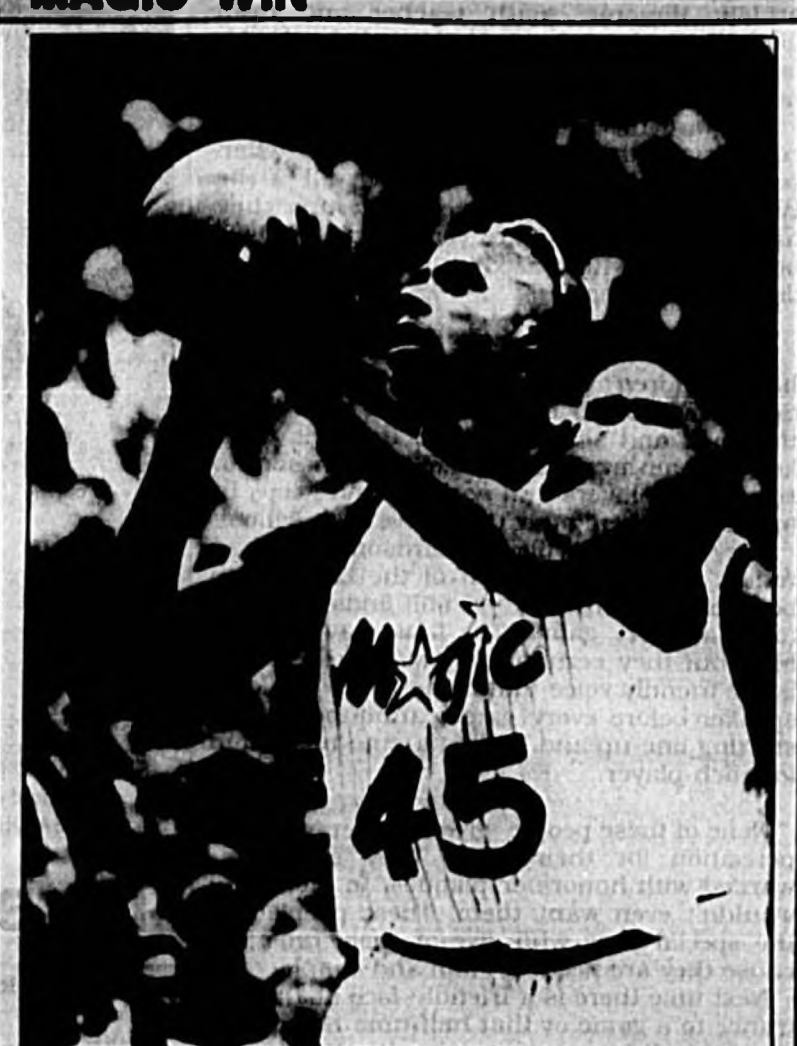

Depression may have physical cause

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: In many of your columns, you seem to favor medication for physical problems but not for mental problems, such as depression.

Are you aware that many types of depression have a physical cause? In such instances, anti-depressant drugs can make an enormous difference in the quality of life.

DEAR READER: Many types of depression are indeed related to the imbalance of brain chemicals. This is, as you pointed out, a physical disorder that can be helped by appropriate drugs. I am sorry if I gave the wrong impression. I take depression seriously and agree that affected patients are usually helped by drug therapy.

Of course, it's a matter of degree. People who suffer an acute and profound sense of loss — from a divorce, death of a loved one, or financial reversal, for example — usually become depressed, but can work through the difficulty without supporting the pharmaceutical industry. On the other hand, chronic depression that is not caused by situations in the environment almost always responds to the judicious use of anti-depressant drugs. In such instances, medical attention and prescriptions are in order.

Nonetheless, we — as a society — rely too heavily on drugs. Many of us incorrectly believe that there is an antidote for every ailment, that happiness comes in a pill bottle, and that you can feel good simply by taking the right medication. We forget about the very real — and sometimes dangerous — side effects that any drug can produce.

Therefore, in my columns, I tend to harp about harmony and balance. It's all right to stop whining and get on with your life — and all of us know people who could profit by this type of tough-love advice. It's all right to exercise more (because exercise can relieve mild depression), drink less alcohol (a depressant) and rely on our gargantuan capacity to heal ourselves without medication. Each of us feels blue now and then. We get over it.

My comments are not meant to malign the very real problem of depression that millions of people experience. Such patients, after a thorough medical examination (to rule out hypothyroidism, anemia and other causes of depression), can lead happier and more productive lives if given anti-depressant drugs. Depression is real; it can be incapacitating, but it is treatable. Yet, as is true with any medication, we must

carefully weigh the risk-benefit ratio.

DEAR DR. GOTT: When I was a child, my pediatrician often prescribed tetracycline for upper respiratory infections. Now, as an adult, I

have tetracycline stains on my teeth. Why did this happen? Can the process be reversed?

DEAR READER: Tetracycline is a good antibiotic that is useful in treating many kinds of infections. However, it does have one glaring drawback: It combines with the growing portion of teeth, and can lead to a marked, yellowish discoloration of the tooth enamel. This is why tetracycline is not prescribed for children until their permanent teeth have erupted. Tooth discoloration from the drug was not recognized until several years ago, when generations of youngsters grew up with mottled teeth. Until that time, tetracycline was widely prescribed for children. Now it isn't.

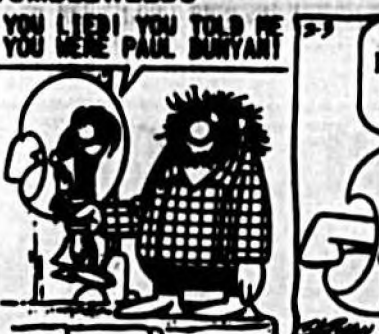

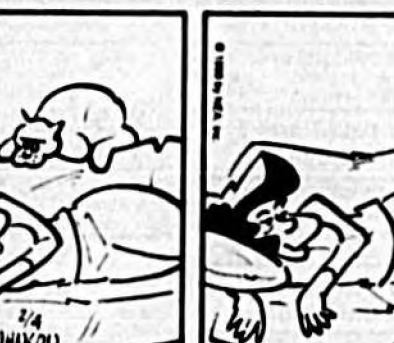

WIN AT BRIDGE

It started as auction

In the very first Auction Bridge Magazine, as it was called for three years before losing the Auction moniker, there was a competition to raise money for King's College Hospital, London. It cost one shilling to enter. KCH was trying to raise 500 pounds to reopen a closed ward. (Nothing changes, does it?)

The second KCH problem featured these North-South hands. South opened one no-trump, which, as it was Auction, was passed out. (In Auction, your score was based solely on the number of tricks won. So, by taking nine tricks, South would collect the game bonus.)

The opening lead is the heart four. South wins with the ace and cashes his two top clubs, but West discards the spade three on the second. How should South continue?

The key clue is West's opening lead: the heart four, which, as declarer can

see the two and three, announces that West has only four hearts. (Fourth-

highest leads started in whist, which predated bridge.) And when West turns up with only one club, presumably he began with 4-4-1-1 distribution. So, the diamonds are breaking 4-0. This means South must continue with the sneaky diamond six, hoping West will thoughtlessly play the four. Then declarer can win five diamond tricks and nine in all.

The composer, W. Dalton, congratulated the "many solvers" who worked out this answer.

Note finally that if South cashes the

diamond ace at trick two, West must score a diamond trick. Only by playing on clubs first does South learn the lie of the diamond land.
