Johnson Explains Enforcement Of Road Sign Law

TALLAHASSEE, Sept. 23.—(Special)—Thomas A. Johnson, chairman of the State Road Department and administrator of the Outdoor Advertising Law enacted by the Legislature of 1941, said today in a prepared statement:

"I wish to make it clear that in my letter of the 15th to State Highway Engineer Dowling it was requested that he direct division engineers of the department to cause to be removed advertisements and signs found on right of ways of state highways and that the removal of such begin Wednesday the 24th.

"I regret that a number of advertisers gained the impression from a dispatch sent from Tallahassee Monday that signs and billboards located within fifteen feet of the outside boundaries of right of ways were also to be removed beginning next Wednesday. The dispatch did not state that any were to be removed other than those on right of ways.

"As appeals from orders made by two circuit judges upholding the validity of the Outdoor Advertising Law of 1941 are pending before the Supreme Court and are scheduled to be heard during late October or early November, I do not intend to attempt to enforce the 15-foot and other set-back provisions of the law unless the court decides that the act is constitutional and, not then, until advertisers have had reasonable time in which to comply with the law—say 30 to 60 days after the court renders such a decision.

"I suggest that, in the meantime, every person who will be required to comply with the law delay becoming well informed regarding its provisions and thereby be in position to comply promptly with them."

The ships and their ports of call were the battleship Resolution, Philadelphia; the battleship Malaya, Brooklyn; and the battleship Rodney, Boston; the auxiliary Canton, Brooklyn; the auxiliary Southern Prince, Baltimore; the auxiliary Montclair, Boston; the auxiliary Balolo, Baltimore; the auxiliary Alania, Boston; the corvettes Tulp and Clarkia, Charleston; the destroyer Richmond, Boston; and the armed merchant cruiser Aurora, Newport News.

Air Corps Will Use Non-Pilots And Navigators

ORLANDO, Sept. 23.—(Special)—The War Department is calling for one thousand Aviation Cadets for non-pilot training as Aerial Navigators for each of October, November, and December classes. This was announced today from the headquarters of Colonel Oscar Foley, cavalry recruiting officer for the states of Florida and Georgia.

The Recruiting Officer stated that this is a wonderful opportunity for men otherwise qualified but who cannot meet visual tests now required for Air Corps pilots, or for those not interested in pilot training. THE VISUAL MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR NAVIGATOR ARE TWENTY OVER FORTY, BOTH E. V. S. CORRECTIBLE TO TWENTY OVER TWENTY WITH GLASSES.

In order to be eligible for training as Aerial Navigator, it requires the candidate to be unmarried, male citizens of the United States, who at time of application have reached their twentieth but who have not reached their twenty-seventh birthday. An applicant must present an official transcript from the office of a recognized college or university, showing that he has completed satisfactorily at least one-half of the necessary credits leading to a degree, which normally requires 4 years work, or must pass written examination in lieu thereof. Applicants must be of excellent character and must present evidence of that fact. They must be of sound physique and in excellent health.

As a Cadet they will receive \$75.00 per month, plus uniforms, equipment, and board and lodging during the 7½-month period of instruction. Upon successful completion, they will be commissioned Second Lieutenants in the U. S. Army Air Corps Reserve, and placed on active duty with

The Regular Army Air Corps, with pay the same as for Air Corps Pilots, ranging from \$205.50 to \$245.50 per month.

NYA Air Training To Remain In Ocala

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 23.—(AP)—State Youth Administrator Levin said Monday arrangements had been made to keep the NYA's aviation mechanic and flight training project at Ocala, although it will have to be moved from the airport which is being taken over by the federal government for Army training purposes.

The project, which had served to furnish ground for a new landing field, build hangars and shops and furnish other assistance in re-locating the project, said Levin.

Several cities had sought the project in the event it should be moved from Ocala, he explained.

Long Shots Win Top Honors At Belmont Park

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—(AP)—A crowd of 22,500 turned out at Belmont Park Monday to watch an ordinary racing card and contribute heavily to the incomes of a few long-shot backers as only one favorite came home in seven races.

The featured Summy Slope handicap went to a \$19,000 for \$2 shot, Bogy, owned by T. H. Heard, Jr. which raced a mile and one-sixteenth in 1:42 2-5, only a fifth of a second slower than the track record. Olympus, the favorite, showed only brief early foot and came in seventh.

Boysy, rated along close behind the pace-maker by Carroll Brierman, charged through the last furlong to win going away by a length from Mrs. G. C. Winfrey's Hard Jester. J. W. Dill's Llanero was another half length back in third place.

The day's only winning favorite was Fiery Steel, which paid \$5.70 in the last race on the card.

News from Chicago is that the zero hour for the greatest mass attack against accidents in the history of the country will be October 6. The attack was ordered by President Roosevelt...

"Why," asks the National Safety Council, "should enemies of the United States be pleased by items in the newspapers such as the following... 'A pedestrian was killed by an automobile today and the driver of the car was injured severely...'"

Answering the question, W. H. Cameron, managing director of the Council, says, "The pedestrian killed was, let's say, a skilled lathe operator in a factory producing guns for the navy. The next morning his lathe stands idle for several hours while a new operator is being hired and introduced to the job..."

Mr. Cameron said Council records show that of 96,500 persons killed in all types of accidents last year, 44,000 were gainfully employed in some kind of a job. Each of these cases resulted in comparable delay, expense, suffering and waste.
