

Defense Accidents

News from Chicago is that the zero hour for the greatest mass attack against accidents in the history of the country will be October 6. The attack was ordered by President Roosevelt, who asked the National Safety Council to lead an intensified emergency campaign against accidents that are crippling national defense.

"Why," asks the National Safety Council, "should enemies of the United States be pleased by items in the newspapers such as the following

"A pedestrian was killed by an automobile today and the driver of the car was injured severely, when, in an effort to miss the pedestrian his car crashed into a lamp post

Answering the question, W. H. Cameron, managing director of the Council, says, "The pedestrian killed was." let's say, a skilled lathe operator in a factory producing Inland Newspaper Representation guns for the navy. The next morning his lathe stands idle the national field of advertising. for several hours while a new operator is being hired and introduced to the job. 




