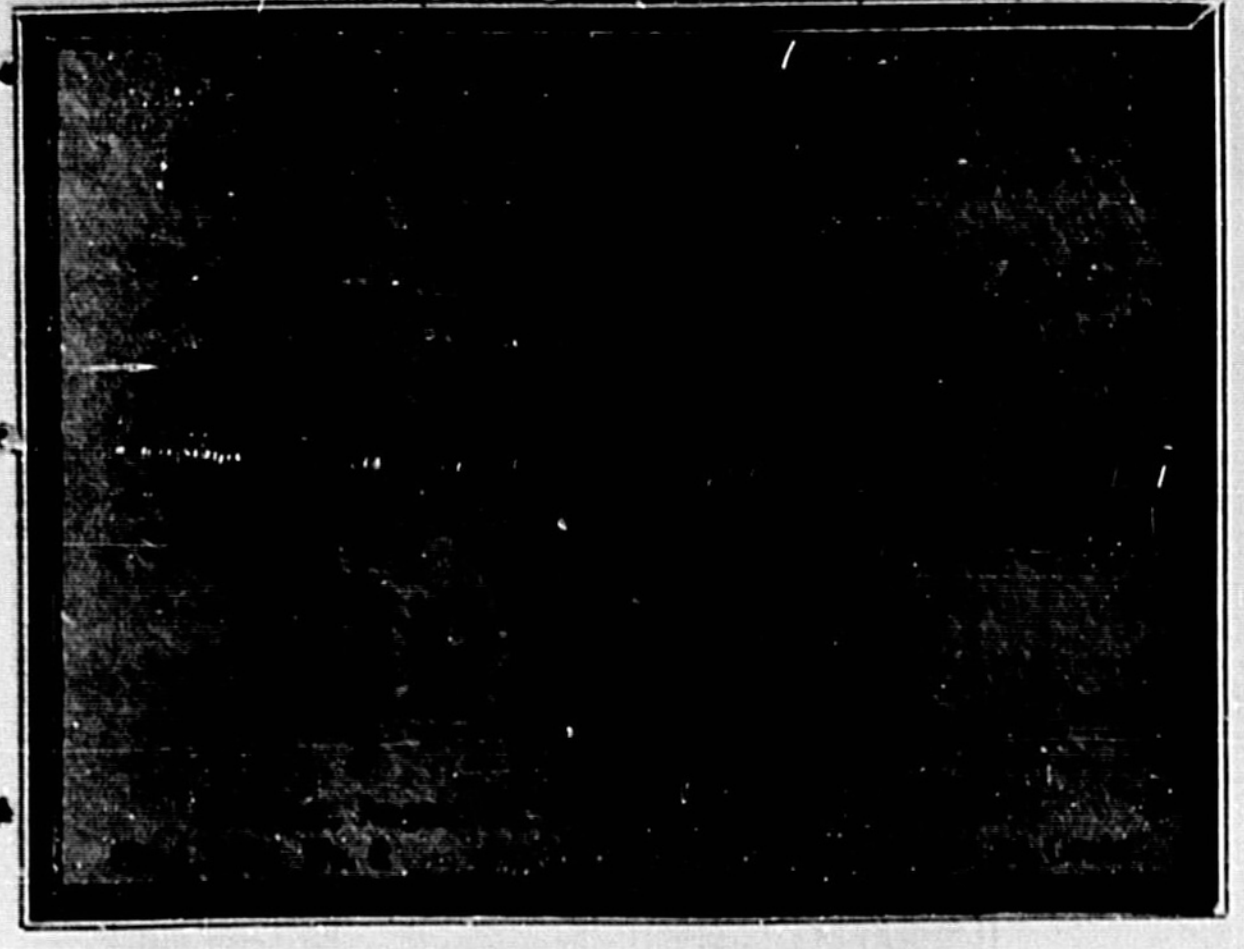

Airport Is Ours, Sen. Gurney Says

Sanford Airport, a 1,600-acre site that once served as a U. S. Navy base, will become city property in a \$1 purchase from the federal government, Mayor Lee Moore announced Monday night.

Moore told the City Commission he based his announcement on word from Sen. Edward Gurney (R-Fla.) in Washington. The base was abandoned 18 months ago in a military budget cut-back.

The Sanford city government attempted since then to buy the property for the token \$1 price. Four months ago the site was reclassified as industrial and the price tag leaped to \$80,000. City Manager Warren E. Knowles went to Washington to appeal the case with the General Services Administration and Federal Aviation Administration.

The positive reaction to Knowles' trip was released through the Florida junior senator's office and the base was reclassified again and dropped to \$1 for city purchase.

The GSA informed Knowles that the move was precedent setting. The agency said there are four other such situations in the country that will be ruled on.

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Property Deed For Airport Expected Within A Week

Sanford City Manager W. E. Knowles said today that deed to the Sanford Naval Air Station, now known as Sanford Airport, will be given to the city "about the middle of next week."

Knowles said he arrived at this opinion after consulting with General Services Administration (GSA) Regional Atlanta office this morning after first calling Hart T. Mankin, GSA general counsel, at his Washington headquarters.

He received additional information on the title transfer after receiving word from Sen. Edward Gurney late Monday that the city would receive all of the 1,600-acre base under provisions of the Surplus Property Act.

Gurney, in a telegram to city officials, newspapers and radio stations in the area, advised the title to the former military site had been given to Sanford after several months of serious negotiations with GSA, the U. S. Atomic Energy Agency and Federal Aviation Agency (FAA).

Gurney said the title also would give to the city all easements, buildings and improvements made at the airport.

Gurney stated, "I am particularly gratified that, by this opinion, there can now be developed in the city of Sanford a base for the future economic growth, increased property and in the long run will more than offset the adverse economic impact resulting in the closing of the SMA."

Mankin speaking today to The Sanford Herald by phone, stated, "There are no strings attached, the city gets everything."

He advised that FAA received proper certification yesterday and everything is now in agreement.

The official said he had asked all operational people to call him about title transfer and work on this would begin immediately.

"The Atlanta regional office is being advised today to prepare the deed and there are no more hangups," Mankin said.

Mankin acknowledged that Gurney had helped "quite a lot" in Sanford receiving the base property without having to pay the \$200,000 for the industrial area as first sought by GSA.

Teenager Relates Being Attacked Storekeeper Formally Charged In Rape

A Mobile Manor man charged with the rape of a 16-year-old girl during the morning hours of Aug. 19 was bound over to Circuit Court by Peace Justice W. Thomas Lovett following a four-hour preliminary hearing last night.

James C. (Jim) Gray, 30, operator of a small store in the trailer park, was defended by Gordon Frederick and Fred Leone.

The pretty light-brown Leone gaily cross-examined the teen-ager who testified in a calm manner for more than an hour. Showing no nervousness, the girl related in detail being raped three consecutive times in a wooded area off Montgomery Road.

Loone gaily cross-examined the girl who said she was accompanying the 51-year-old storekeeper on a shopping expedition to buy his daughter or daughter-in-law a gown for which he wished to spend "at least \$100." She said he pulled off SR 435 onto Montgomery Road and then turned into a wooded area. "Let's make out some," she stated the older man told her.

The incidents were testified to have happened between 9:40 and 10:30 a.m. The girl said she and "Jim Gray" left the pool at 9:35 and got to the scene of the attack six or seven minutes later. However, during testimony from one of the sheriff's deputies, it was reported it took some 20 minutes to get to the site from Mobile Manor.

No testimony was given by the physician who examined the girl after the alleged attack.

The deputies said a plaster cast was made of tire marks at the alleged rape spot but admitted that there were no unusual markings on the tires. A man's undershirt also was found at the scene and sent to the Florida Bureau of Law Enforcement in Tallahassee for analysis. The shirt had a stain upon it described as light brown by one deputy and yellow by another.

Motions of Frederick and Leone to dismiss the charge on grounds there was no show of resistance and because the girl "gave different answers to the very same questions" were denied.

Marine Jet Lost Over N. Vietnam

By GEORGE ESPER Associated Press Writer SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. Command disclosed today that a Marine F4 Phantom fighter-bomber was lost over North Vietnam last Tuesday while escorting a reconnaissance plane. The two crewmen are missing. It was the first American plane reported lost over North Vietnam since June 5 and sixth since U.S. bombing of North Vietnam halted last Nov. 1. Although this bombing stopped regular reconnaissance flights have continued. The U.S. Command said the plane "was reported missing while escorting an unarmed RF4 reconnaissance aircraft near the demilitarized zone." A spokesman said other planes in the flight saw no evidence of enemy action and the loss was attributed to "unknown causes."

Israelis Threaten Arabs For Blasts

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Jerusalem (AP) — Israel threatened the Arabs with more retaliation for sabotage Monday night as the Arab nations moved closer to a summit meeting to discuss the situation in Jerusalem. Israeli Transport Minister Moshe Carmel, after learning that a bomb had exploded Monday in an Israeli shipping company office in London, warned that Arabs could not "sit in safety in their various offices throughout the world unless safety prevails in the offices of Israeli companies."

4 Czechs Die In Riots

8 States Face Cut Of U. S. Road \$\$

WASHINGTON (AP) — Eight states have yet to meet federal requirements for traffic safety programs. And unless they do, a portion of their federal aid will be cut off next year. Federal officials have tentatively approved highway safety plans of 42 states. Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia. Initial plans of five of the eight remaining states have been rejected. Decisions on the other three were postponed pending additional information.

The architect of the \$250,000 complex was authorized to submit final bids for the furniture and other furnishings for the facility and Mayor Curtis Blevins gave authority to provide for shifting of funds if needed to pay for furniture estimated to cost some \$17,632.

N. Ireland Cops Balk At Army

Sir Ian Freeland's orders to stack their weapons in central armories and to withdraw from their homes and under strict controls.

Every Florida wild "sure thing" lure comes along for fishermen. For awhile it's the hottest thing in the country, fish are taken on almost every cast (and some rates), and the city hall to use if you want to catch fish.

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Airport Operation 'In Black'

According to information from Sanford Industrial Director Tom Rathel, the Sanford Airport operation by the City of Sanford is "in the black" after four and one-half months of SIC operation.

Rathel, in a special report for the city commission, listed the total annual income from leasing properties at the former Navy base at \$176,728 and compared this to the proposed budget of \$102,252 being considered by the commission for 1969-70 airport operation.

"This shows an excess of \$64,476 over cost of operating the airport," Rathel said.

The requested airport budget is for \$153,802, but according to the SIC office, \$25,520 of that amount is expenditures involving building repairs, equipment purchases, use of city equipment, legal fees and consulting engineer fees, and will be deducted unless reserves are available to pay the costs.

The SIC director said, "we expect to end this fiscal year with \$5,000 of the \$10,000 loaned the SIC by city in the bank."
