Riot Occurs In Camp During Investigation

One Killed And Ten Injured In Fighting Between Jews And German Police

STUTTGART, Germany, Mar. 29, (AP)—A fierce two-hour riot in a displaced persons camp has caused the death of one person and wounded ten others, including five other displaced persons, four German policemen and an American soldier.

Military government officials announced that the savage fight broke out when German police—accompanied by United States military police—started a search for counterfeit ration stamps. American armored cars were summoned and their appearance put an end to the riot.

Military government officials said they began the search about 6:30 A.M. German troops with about 135 German police, accompanied by 85 German investigators and a group of American military police. The displaced persons were informed by loud speaker that a black market deal was in progress. They were instructed to permit police to enter homes which make up the camp on the outskirts of Stuttgart. The German police were met by a shower of bricks and bottles. They then opened fire after being fired upon by a sniper.

Schools will also be closed and with the closing of most stores almost everyone will be free to take part in the celebration. It was also decided to recommend at the next general meeting of the association the addition of two new classifications for representation by membership on the board of directors. These two classifications are for laundry and dry cleaners and for beauticians and barbers.

Walkout Of Soft Coal Miners Now Appears Certain

Battle Says Lewis Is Attempting To Prevent Agreement

WASHINGTON, Mar. 29, (AP)—A walkout of 400,000 soft coal miners at midnight Sunday now appears certain. The national coal association said today that there is no prospect of an agreement in time to prevent the walkout.

United Mine Workers President John L. Lewis several days ago said that the miners would stay home starting Sunday midnight if a new agreement is not reached by that time. The executive secretary of the National Coal Association, John D. Battle, says there is no hope of an agreement being reached by then. Battle accused Lewis of making no effort to reach an agreement and said that on the contrary, Lewis is trying to prevent an agreement by that time. Battle declared that Lewis is only going through the motions of collective bargaining. He said the mine workers chief had turned down an offer by mine operators which followed the wage pattern already set in the steel, oil and automotive industries.

Battle added that Lewis has refused to discuss wages and hours until his demands have been met for a miners' welfare fund of coal mined.

Hitler Warned England Would Defend Empire

Ribbentrop Violently Denies He Ever Described British Degenerate People

NUERNBERG, Mar. 29, (AP)—Former German Foreign Minister Joachim Von Ribbentrop told the Nuremberg war crimes tribunal today he warned Adolf Hitler of the danger to the British empire. Von Ribbentrop denied vehemently he ever had described the British people as "degenerate."

The Nazi diplomat denied as false allegations that he told Hitler from London that England was degenerate and would not fight. Von Ribbentrop then went on with a long recitation of his asserted efforts to effect an understanding between Britain and Germany prior to the outbreak of the war. The former German foreign minister dragged in the names of Stanley Baldwin and Winston Churchill in the course of his testimony.

However, the tribunal warned Ribbentrop repeatedly to shorten his speech and stick to the pertinent facts.

Von Ribbentrop was described by an earlier witness as not a typical Nazi. Today, the Nazi diplomat himself declared: "I always made every effort to be a good National Socialist (Nazi) and I was proud to be one of a small group of idealists who wanted to bring prestige back to Germany."

Ala Says Movements Of Red Troops In Iran Does Not Remove Current Issue

NEW YORK, Mar. 29, (AP)—The Iranian Ambassador has told the United Nations Security Council that he has been authorized to take whatever action he considers necessary to protect the security of his country. The ambassador, Husein Ala, made his statement this afternoon at the Security Council session on the Russian invasion of Russia again not represented.

The Iranian Ambassador for the first time disclosed that he has been given practically a blank check in the handling of his country's charges against Soviet Russia—charges growing out of continued Russian occupation of parts of Iran.

Ala made his assertion in answer to a question from the Polish representative on the council, Oscar Lange, a question submitted at a previous meeting. He also answered another Polish question—whether Russian troops are withdrawing from Iran as announced by Moscow. Ala said that he has no information, official or otherwise, that any Soviet troops have crossed the border. He added, "of certain troops movement inside Iran, but that does not remove the issue."

NEW YORK, Mar. 29, (AP)—Members of the United Nations Security Council added a secret meeting to their agenda today. It is said that the purpose of the session, scheduled for 2:30 P.M. (Eastern Time), was to put the finishing touches to a direct request to Moscow and Iran for information on the Iranian question. The meeting was scheduled for one-half hour in advance of the public session at 3:00 P.M. (Eastern Time).

It is indicated that the United States and Britain seek to get unanimous agreement of all council members but Russia to support the request for information on Iran. Secretary of State Byrnes is said to have taken the leadership in the whole affair.

Soviet Ambassador Andrei Gromyko earlier said he still has not decided whether to accept or tend this afternoon session of the United Nations Security Council. He has declined to say whether he will make known his decision in advance to correspondents.

The Russian representative on the Security Council also explained yesterday's misunderstanding. Newsman understood him to say he intended to attend yesterday afternoon's session. Instead, he drove around and from New York for nearly an hour but did not go to the council meeting. Gromyko said today that he had not "yes" to questions as to whether he intended to attend yesterday today's session.

A special communication today issued a plea to the United Nations Organization to see to it that there is true freedom of the world press.

The commission is a private body which operates under a grant, by Time, Inc. to the University of Chicago.

In a special report, the commission asks for an international covenant within the framework of the United Nations to remove political and other barriers so that information can flow freely between countries. The commission asks the United Nations Economic and Social Security Council to remove artificial barriers that restrict the flow of news.

1,522 cars were shipped.

Average planted in celery in Central Florida has been estimated at 6,400 acres, and that remaining for harvest in Sanford, (city), 2,000 acres is about 2,000 acres.

The four states which had 5,000 acres of which 1,800 are estimated to remain. The West Coast had 1,400 acres at Sarasota with 400 acres remaining. North Florida average was estimated at 500 acres most of which crop is yet uncutting.

Citrus shippers are against a serious problem that may result in the shipping season winding up much earlier than had been expected, possibly by May 1, the shippers report. This is due to the fact that celery are now having prices which are more than half what they were a year ago. For all grades and sizes. There has been an unusual consumption of both fresh pack and canned citrus this year. Canning methods have been improved, demand has steadily increased and canners have no backlog of the product which moves right to the market.

Ideal weather has resulted in heavy citrus bloom and growers appear very good for a heavy yield next year.

Sanford sandlot cabbage is reported to be of extra fine quality and shippers expect good supplies through April. Other Florida shippers are finishing and total Florida supplies should drop sharply. At the Sanford State Farmers Market the price was quoted today at \$2.00 a 50 pound crate which will be in moderate car and truck.

Sweet corn plantings of golden varieties which made such a successful impression north of Sanford last year are about the heaviest on record with an estimated 2,000 acres planted in the Sanford section and shipments should start about April 25. Most plantings of which there is a loss.

OBSERVATIONS
By TURNER ROCKWELL

A bulletin recently issued by the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta points to the industrial changes in the South during the war years and calls attention to the possibilities for retention of many of the gains made and the betterment of the economic status of this section.

There has been such a marked development of the industrial phase of the South's economy that we may well look to the future in the full confidence that the South will no longer depend almost entirely on farm products for its livelihood.

In the war period, as the bulletin tells us, there was a notable increase in the number employed in manufacturing as compared to agricultural employment. Not only is this true but many parts of the South that formerly knew little or nothing of manufacturing activity became centers of industrial plants.

For the first time in its history the South finds itself with ample capital to finance both industrial and agricultural expansion.

Indications are that there will be a strong demand for agricultural products for some time and this should give assurance that the farmers of the South will continue to receive favorable returns from their crops.

The South is no longer looking upon itself as unable to fight its own battles and chart its own future. It is awakening and looking to the future with confidence and there is the firm conviction that never again can it be justly referred to as the nation's economic problem number one.

On the other hand, there is good reason to look to the South as the nation's number one opportunity.

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
