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Dempsey Pleased As Receipts Mount To Sizable Figure

400,000 Dollar Gate Is Predicted By Enthusiastic Promoter Referee Row Ended Low Magnolia Chosen To Officiate Fight

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 20.—(INS)—Jack Dempsey, promoter of the Strickling-Sharkey fight at Flamingo Park arena one week from tonight, peered intently at the office statement and smiled. For there he found consolation for his other troubles, such as the squabble over the referee which ended with the selection of Lou Magnolia of New York. Dempsey smiled with satisfaction that the receipts are nearing the total of \$400,000.

Dempsey, with all the enthusiasm of an ambitious young business man, is now certain that the "gate" will reach \$350,000, and perhaps \$400,000.

Behind millions, congressmen, United States senators, judges, Wall Street brokers, mayors of cities all over the country, bank presidents to the number of at least 200, society men and women, actresses, governors of states and other luminaries are pouring into town on every train.

Press reservations for the fight are unprecedented. Already there are 42 more requests than the total accounted for in the Dempsey-Tunney "battle of the long count" in Chicago. With only 200 second-class reservations for the working press, 314 requests have been received.

Newspapers all over the country have sent in conversations. In Florida alone 18 newspapers have made applications. New York has 24 correspondents on the ground. Boston has 16, Chicago 12, Kansas City eight, St. Louis eight, Cleveland 20, Atlanta 12, Buffalo two, Philadelphia 10, San Francisco four, Salt Lake City two, Toronto one, Montreal one, and Havana four.

The list of people already here is coming, ready like a record from "heaven's who." Seven governors will see the fight, perhaps more. They include Governor Albert Ritchie of Maryland, Lieutenant Governor Sterling of Illinois, Governor Green of Michigan, Governor Carlson of Florida, former Governor Fuller of Massachusetts and possibly former Governor "Al" Smith of New York. Governor Smith is in Florida questioning and while he personally has made no application practically all of his companions have.

Reservations also have come from more than a score of congressmen in Washington, from 16 United States senators, from 16 United States judges and more than 200 bank presidents.

The list of names such as names as Harvey S. Firestone, J. I. Hertz, Irene Castle, McLaughlin, Jacob Ruppert, Kissel, Ford, Bernard Glubel, John McCord, William Muldoon, James J. Connelley, Rex Beach, Max Baer, Whitney, Gertrude Phillips, the Shakespearean actress, Jimmy Walker and Walter Chrysler.

SHARKEY PROVES INTEREST GETTER IN COMING FIGHT

Silence Of Talkative Tar Causes Stir In Newspaper Circles

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—(INS)—When Jack Sharkey is through with the prize ring a brilliant journalistic career awaits him, if he chooses to become a news gatherer. For in the weeks preceding his bout with Young Strickling the bombastic Bostonian proved to the satisfaction of sports writers that he has a nose for news.

Because of the general apathy of the sporting public, the fight publicity was a flop at the start. Even the most confirmed ringworms yawned over the first items from Boston, New York and Miami Beach concerning the coming "Battle of the Palms."

Then the garrulous gob came to the rescue and revived interest in the fight by wrapping himself in a mantle of silence. The once "talkative tar" became the "silent sailor." He abruptly ceased his blather of the peripatetic pronoun and refused to boast as to what he was going to do to the pride of the South. A polite "Glad to meet you" (in the best Boston accent) and not his customary "gimme the killer" marked the rabby gob's introductory. Strickling, the public, astounded, sat up and took notice. For which the promoters were truly grateful.

Christie's Vocal Victory
It may be that K. O. Christie started Sharkey on the road to vocal oblivion. Meyer from Oheyer Lithuanian in the verbal preliminary outpointed the loquacious arias to their bout in New York. He spotted two 12 to Jack's one. Sharkey was fairly defeated by the static from the Akron heavyweight's loud speaker. Christie's training camp was so quiet that you could hear a bowling pin drop.

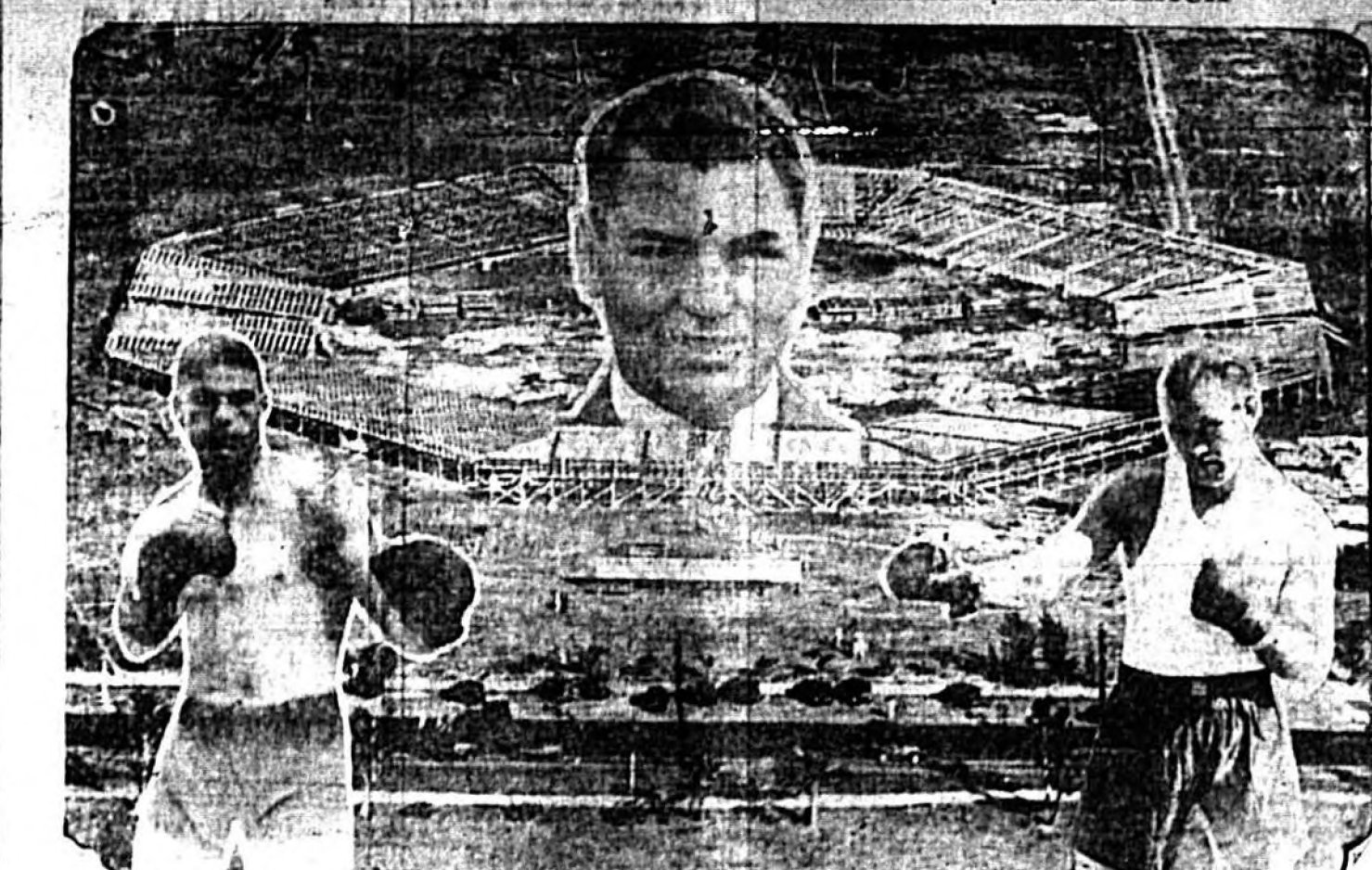

Footing of rewards totaling \$3,500 has resulted in the police department being flooded with clues, all of which have been investigated but none of which has resulted in any definite information regarding the child's whereabouts.

Three notes, purported to have been written by the girl's abductor, have been received by the Murphy family but police are inclined to believe they were written by a crank. That the child had been kidnapped by some member of the family, rather than by a stranger, was first believed, was gaining credence today. The child's stepfather, Edward J. Murphy, has repeatedly been questioned by police, but the nature of the questioning was not made public.

Meanwhile, an effort is being made to locate Doris' father, U.E. Smith, who was reported to be working on a steamer plying between New York and Europe. In some quarters it is believed that he may have come to San Francisco and is now in this vicinity with his child.

Strickling Predicts He Will Win Miami Fight By Knockout

Georgian Says Battle Is Biggest Opportunity In His Career Mother Confident Says She Will Be Surprised If Son Fails

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 21.—Young Strickling of Macon, Ga., predicted today that he will win the fight with Jack Sharkey, of Boston, by a knockout, in their bout at Flamingo Park arena on night of Feb. 27.

"I've got to win this fight, and I'm going to do it," the husky young Georgian told International News Service this morning as he prepared to resume his daily workouts at the gym. "It's my big chance and I'm not going to squit. I am in great shape and expect to put up the battle of my career next Wednesday night."

Strickling, a modest chap of 24, discusses the forthcoming fight reluctantly. There is nothing of a bragging nature in his conversation. He is just a young, ambitious fighter who realizes he faces a big opportunity and is determined to win.

His mother, Mrs. Lillie S. Strickling, told this writer that she will be very much surprised if her son does not flatten the Boston gob. She said she is convinced her son will "take" Sharkey just as he has beaten the many fighters he has been battling all over the country in the last year. She explained her son's more showing against Paul Hehenbach, in New York, by saying that "every fighter has a bad night or two in his system."

"I don't want to seem to be bragging, but I think my son will be the next heavyweight champion of the world," said "Ma" as she sat at the bedside while her son was cuffing sparring partners around the gym. Her son's wife and William L. Strickling, the third, sat with her. Mrs. Strickling showed keen interest in the proceedings, and seemed to be enjoying herself.

She revealed that she and "Pa" Strickling were on the stage for years as members of the "novelty Grammys." "Have you seen your son on the floor?" asked her. "What would your action be if he is knocked out, Sharkey?"

A smile lighted up her blue eyes. "No," she said, "I have never seen him on the floor. I don't think I would enjoy anything like that. I would like to see him win. It is all in the fight game. I did see my other son, Baby Strickling, knocked out by Albe Lanky in Augusta, Ga., happened to be in Baby's corner because 'Pa' Strickling was somewhere else that night. Baby was fine until the seventh round when he ran into a right uppercut. I don't faint or anything like that. I simply say to him that he was given attention. He came out of all right. It was experience. Baby, he had to have it sooner or later."
