City dumps sewage into river

SANFORD — A Sanford sewage treatment plant dumped about 7 million gallons of partially treated sewage into the St. Johns River over the weekend, and faces possible punishment for failing to alert health officials.

Health officials in Seminole and Volusia counties are warning people to avoid contact with the river water. However, officials are concerned that the precautions may be too late. The foul water by now

may have flowed out of Lake Monroe and been diluted.

Workers at the Sanford Water Reclamation Facility dealt with an equip-

ment malfunction for 21 hours Saturday and Sunday by emptying two giant retention ponds until 7 million gallons of wastewater had flowed into the river on

the west side of Lake Monroe.

Workers did not notify environmental regulators except to call the state Department of Environmental Protection and leave a message on an answering machine on Saturday. The workers did not call area health departments.

John Bowles, an environmental specialist with the state Department of Environmental Protection, said some sort of punishment is likely, although plant officials have until the end of this week to

Four kittens found in trunk of tree city cuts down

Resident complains that 'healthy' trees are cut

SANFORD — When city workers cut down a dead Laurel Oak tree, they found a surprise — four tiny kittens, their eyes still shut, living in the base of the rotted trunk.

The tree was one of three the city cut down Wednesday because they had become hollow, said Sanford's landscape architect Howard Jeffries. Two of the trees,

including the one the kittens were living in, were at the corner of Palmetto Avenue and 5th Street.

"They were both hollow on the inside," Jeffries said. "They had been dropping branches, and there was dead growth. They were an accident waiting to happen."

Jeffries estimated the trees were 40 to 50 feet tall, about 3 feet in diameter and at least 75 years old. But he never figured the tree would be home to a litter of kittens.

When Jeffries first inspected the trees last week, he did discover a black cat inside the smaller tree on the 5th Street side. The cat had become trapped inside the tree when someone placed a bottle in one of the holes in the tree. When Jeffries removed the bottle, the cat

A grave situation Abandoned cemeteries discussed

What can be done about abandoned and neglected cemeteries in Florida? The state's Funeral and Cemetery Legislative Advisory Board discussed the problem at a meeting in Orlando Friday.

Unfortunately, according to board chairperson Dana Evans, there were not enough board members on hand to have a quorum, "so we just discussed the problem, we weren't able to reach any decisions."

A survey conducted in 1998 indicated that of the state's estimated 3,580 cemeteries, almost half are not maintained or totally abandoned by their owners.

Bill Welborn, Funeral Director for Brisson Funeral Home in Sanford, said the problem occurs mostly in family or community cemeteries established decades, possibly over a hundred years ago. "The families have since died off themselves, or moved away, and the land on which they had their relatives and neighbors buried is now unkempt," he explained.

Seminole walkers can help fight MS

More than 400 people living in Seminole County are affected with Multiple Sclerosis, a chronic, often disabling disease of the central nervous system.

Most of the victims are diagnosed between the ages of 20 and 40, but the unpredictable physical effects can be lifelong.

Although the severity and specific symptoms of MS cannot be predicted, advances in research and treatment give hope to those affected by the disease.

To show their support of MS research efforts and treatment in Central Florida, as many as 1,000 residents of Seminole, Orange and Osceola counties are participating in the MS Society Mid Florida Chapter Annual Walk on Saturday, April 8. It begins at 9 a.m. from Glenridge Middle School located near the old Navy base in Winter Park.

"We want to involve as many people as possible because this year's Walk is to inform and educate people about MS and advocate for more federal funding for MS research," said Walk Committee Chairman Jim Constantine.

The money raised from the Walk will See MS Walk, Page 5A

A mother's mission to rid the world of MS

She was always in motion — dancing, swimming, scouting. But when Elizabeth Henry was 19, she began losing her balance.

"I keep falling all the time," she told her mother.

The young woman's life would not be the same again, and neither would those of the family that loved her.

"Elizabeth was diagnosed with MS — multiple sclerosis," said Ruth Gaines, a Sanford woman who is a coordinator for the MS Walk 2000 Saturday in Winter Park. Gaines has been doing volunteer work for the MS Walk for almost 20 years. She is Elizabeth Henry's mother.

"For every person with MS, there are four or more family members affected," Gaines said. "Wives, husbands, parents, brothers, sisters, children. All are affected."

Ruth Gaines tells her daughter's story with deep love, although it is extremely painful. She still pictures the active child whose eyes were full of awe and wonder. She sees Elizabeth in the swimming pool at Trinity Prep or working as a Disney World dancer.

"She was no couch potato," Ruth Gaines said, tenderly.

Gaines said that her daughter met James Henry while both were employed at Disney. They married in 1983 and now live in Dandridge, Tenn. Although Elizabeth found out she had MS a year later, she was able to give birth to a daughter named Tiffany (now 14). For the last seven years, however, Elizabeth has been confined to a wheelchair.

"Elizabeth has a chronic, progressive form of MS," her mother said. "For awhile she needed the wheelchair when she was out of the house. Now, she needs it all the time. She's had vision problems, too. She's right-handed but there are days she says she can do simple chores better with the left hand. Some days her tremors are so bad it seems as though she has Parkinson's."

The key to coping, Gaines said, "is for everyone to take one day at a time, to be optimistic to be together as a family. James is there for her and Tiffany is truly a blessing. Tiffany reads with her mother and they watch films on the

TV. Tiffany's health is fine. MS, as far as they know, isn't passed from one generation to the next.

Aware of the emotional effects to her daughter and family, Ruth Gaines does whatever it takes to make others aware of MS, which she said strikes 200 or more people in the U.S. each week. Gaines envisions a world free of MS. First, researchers must find both the cause, advance therapies and a cure for the disease.

"We're going to succeed," she said.

submit a report explaining what happened.

"It's important that if partially treated wastewater is released to surface water, the public should be notified as soon as possible," Bowles said. "They should have notified health officials."

"The message was not nearly what we would have liked," Bowles added. "We had no idea that the discharge was so large."

The city called state environmental and health officials at 9:30 a.m. Monday, Bowles said.

Paul Moore, director of utilities for the city, said the equipment malfunction began at 2 p.m. Saturday. The malfunction resulted in partially treated effluent mixed with fully treated effluent being discharged to the St. Johns River near Seminole County's Wayside Park.

The discharge continued until Sunday at about 11 a.m. During this time, a total flow of 9.2 million gallons were discharged to the river. The flow consisted of reclaimed water, reject water not meeting reclaimed water's quality standard, and partially treated sewage or effluent.

"All required river discharge samples were taken," Moore said. "No water quality permit violations occurred on the flow discharged to the river. All the water that entered the river met all permit requirements."

Moore defended the city's actions.

"We did what we are supposed to do according to state requirements," Moore said.

Moore said the discharge was the culmination of a series of problems related to the filtration of unusually high algae levels in

the city's water supply over the last two weeks.

On Saturday, partially treated but unfiltered sewage was released from a tank and clogged filters at the plant.

The sewage then flowed to a pair of large retention ponds, designed to hold more than a day's worth of treated water. They were partially filled because of the previous high algae levels. By 2 p.m. Saturday, the ponds had reached their capacity, and the plant had to release millions of gallons of partially treated water into the river, Moore said.

The water had to be pumped from the city's treatment plant near the Central Florida Regional Hospital to the discharge point several miles to the west.

The water that ended up in the river had gone through a

first phase of cleansing, so it was cleaner than raw sewage.

However, it had not been disinfected of potentially dangerous bacteria and did not meet the standards of "reclaimed water" used by the city to irrigate lawns.

Moore said that it is unclear how much untreated sewage was released into the river. At the most, 7 million gallons were released. However, as little as 3 million gallons may have been released.

Tests performed by the city on Saturday and Sunday showed that the amount of the Fecal Coliform bacteria in samples of the water was well below state environmental limits.

The state requires that no more than 100 colonies of Fecal Coliform can be found in 100 milliliters of surface water.

Saturday's tests found 25 colonies per 100 milliliters. Sunday's tests showed there were 190 colonies per 100 milliliters, said Bowles, the state environmental specialist.

"There was a potential risk to people, but based on those numbers I wouldn't call it an extreme risk," Bowles said.

This is not the first time that a discharge has occurred at the Sanford plant. The state Department of Environmental Protection fined the Sanford plant \$3,400 in October 1998 for a wastewater discharge in which workers dumped water into the river three times during a two week period but did not tell the agency for another week.

In addition to Fecal Coliform, partially treated sewage can contain communicable diseases and bacterial or viral infections, said

John Cochran, director of the Seminole County Health Department's environmental health section.

Samples were taken Monday by Seminole and Volusia officials at the spot where the sewage was discharged and 500 yards upstream and downstream. The water was discharged near Wayside Park off of U.S. Highway 17-92 on the Seminole-Volusia border, just west of the Interstate-4 bridge.

Preliminary results of Monday's tests showed water quality is within safe standards. However, Cochran said he would wait until test results are confirmed. The results are expected by this evening.

"I've never dealt with a discharge of this magnitude during my time as director," Cochran said.

He cited the Upsala Cemetery as one of the examples.

"I don't mean to pick on that cemetery in particular," he said. "But that's an example of a community cemetery where the original caretakers have since gone and continued maintenance is always in need."

Some of the reasons for continued concern by the Advisory Board were the negative impact they have on property values, their attractiveness to the criminal element, the loss of valuable archaeological and historic information, and the dispersal shown to final resting places.

Evans explained that a request for consideration of the abandoned cemeteries was made to the 1999 Florida Legislature, but it failed to take any action. Now, the matter is being placed in the hands of the Advisory Board.

"We would like to have a new approach written up and presented to the next legislative session for consideration," Evans said.

This past Friday's meeting was to have discussed changes in the original legislation, but that was as far as the matter was taken.

Williams said one of the proposals expected to come forward is to have the legislature mandate that the abandoned or neglected cemeteries be taken over by the counties or cities in which they are located.

"Not full care," he added.

"but at least mowing occasionally and basic maintenance."

He explained that most of these cemeteries involved are not set up as Memorial Cemeteries, which are for-profit cemeteries and must be maintained as a condition of their license.

In Sanford, one of the questions several years ago concerned the area known as Page Jackson (Pace Jackson) Cemetery, located half within the city limits, and the other half on county property. Ownership was undetermined, and maintenance was described at an all time low. As a result, the city and county split maintenance responsibilities. The city launched into a \$66,000 cleanup project in late February of 1998. Seminole County reportedly still has further maintenance to be accomplished.

Chairman Evans said the next meeting of the Funeral and Cemetery Legislative Advisory Board on the subject is scheduled for May 23.

"I hope by that time, we can get enough interest in this problem to draw enough board members to take an official stand," she said.

The Advisory Board members were questioned by Comptroller Bob Milligan last year.

Legislative members include State Senator Ron Klein of Delray Beach and State Representative Larry Crow of Dunedin.

San away. "I don't know who would stick that bottle there," Jeffries said. "Maybe the person didn't know there was a cat inside. But, that cat was sure glad to get out."

He said he never saw any kittens.

Jeffries conducted three inspections of the trees before recommending that the Laurel Oaks be removed because they had deteriorated beyond the point that they could be saved.

The city received a complaint regarding the trees on March 28 from Ponciano Lopez, who owns a home at 419 Palmetto Avenue. Lopez said he was concerned that the trees could fall on top of his house during a storm.

"There were so many holes all over the place, especially on the Palmetto one," Lopez said. "Right in the middle, it was all gutted out. I just spent \$25,000 making repairs on my home, and I'm not going to let a tree fall on it. They were both in really bad shape."

Lopez said he had previously seen the black cat living inside the tree.

"When I saw that the tree was so hollow that a cat could live inside, I said this tree has got to go," Lopez said.

That was not the opinion of Carl Zendell, a neighbor who lives on Palmetto Avenue.

Zendell was despondent when she came home to discover the trees were being cut down. She said she moved to 400 Palmetto Avenue from Orlando's Bay Hill community in December, and said she is frustrated by trying to fix up the home and then finding nearby Oak trees taken away. Zendell said more effort needs to be placed into beautifying the area.

"We're here pouring money into the city," Zendell said. "Anything that beautifies it,

they take out and put in soup kitchens. They're going to drive us out."

Her neighbor Michele Otero wonders if the trees could have been saved. A lifelong Sanford resident, Otero has resided at 409 Palmetto Avenue for eight years.

"We realize that to the city it's just another tree on paper," Otero said. "That's part of the history of the historic district lying there as mulch."


As for the kittens, city workers said they took shelter with their mother under a nearby home.

Junior's win highlights an exciting weekend

FORT WORTH, TEXAS
Sunday was "Little E Day" here, and the punch line to the DirectTV 500 was an Earnhardt family reunion in Victory Lane, this time with Dale Jr. being toasted by a proud father for the first time on the Winston Cup tour — but probably not the last.
— And NASCAR's marketing gurus would dearly love for this 25-year-old son of the nearest, toughest stock car driver of them all to become the sport's next superstar. The Earnhardts shared the day with the race itself, the track and Ruston Smith's vision of racing's future.
At the end of the day, after 223,000 people had watched Earnhardt Jr. get his first Winston Cup win, the question of why NASCAR runs 10 Winston Cup races a year within three hours of Winston-Salem and only one within 1,000 miles of Dallas-Fort Worth makes all the marketing whizzes in Daytona Beach kick pretty silly.

The racing itself was, if not great side-by-side stuff, certainly hot and heavy and more than entertaining enough to keep everybody's attention.

Indeed, one of the growing traits of super-fast Texas Motor Speedway is its extraordinary unpredictability. Perhaps one reason is the exceptional asphalt racing surface, possibly the best on the tour — although a 10 mph cut in speeds might make the second groove come in a little quicker.

What other place could bring Earnhardt to tears? NASCAR is already two months into the season with seven different winners, a pace that if kept up would generate 34 winners by the end of the season.
Earnhardt Jr.'s victory came with an overpowering performance, even more remarkable after his three straight wrecks at Atlanta, Darlington and Bristol, that he concluded nearly tested his confidence. He drove almost flawlessly this time, on a day that many of the best in the business couldn't quite handle the track.

And then Junior crawls out of the car and dishes out that humorous, infectious "Yo! Yo! Yo! Yo! Yo!" stuff, with just the right touch of self-deprecating humor. Imagine what it must be like to be Dale Earnhardt's son, how tough listening to the taunts and teasing over the years. Then imagine what it must be like to get in a race car and try to live up to the man's reputation, to live up to his standards, on the track and off.

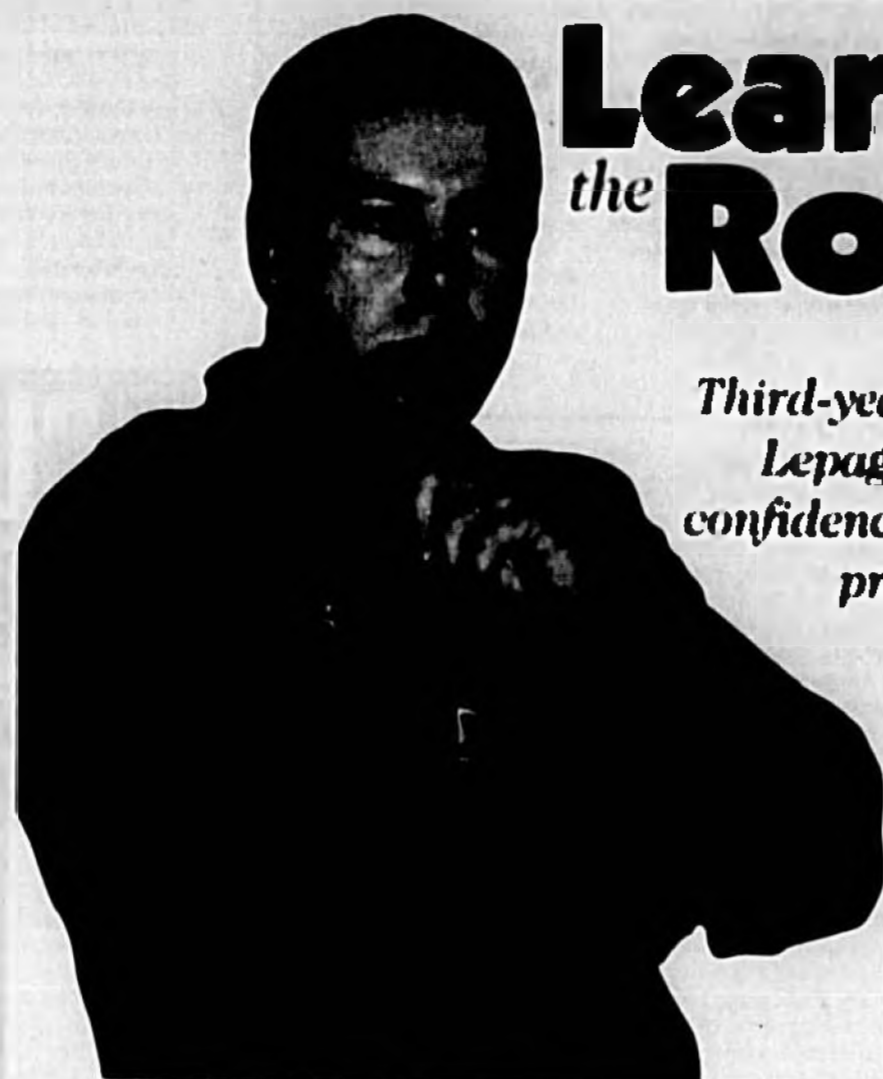
And then imagine what it must be like to finally succeed. But Sunday's win was not just a personal triumph for Dale Earnhardt Jr., and not just a family victory for a son who too often while growing up missed the old man who was busy out on the road making a living. It was also a triumph for Dale Earnhardt Inc., the business that Earnhardt Sr. cranked up only four years ago.

When Earnhardt Sr. announced that he was forming a race team of his own, naysayers said that he wouldn't spend enough money to get the good guys, that the venture would falter like so many run by star drivers who turned out to be less than star businessmen. But the elder Earnhardt has clearly proven them wrong. Of course, it helps that he has two of the biggest sponsors in the business.

The Earnhardts weren't the only son-and-father team on the track. Adam and Kyle Petty had their little bit of history, too. Adam, just 19, made his Cup tour debut (he'll run next at Charlotte) and did well, running 215 of the 334 laps before losing an engine. He experienced that moment of terror that comes when Dale Sr. or Tony Stewart takes the air off your spoiler, and he kept his nose clean.

"At least I didn't tear it up, and we learned a lot," Adam said.
"When the race started, I didn't know my limits. Then Tony Stewart took the air off me a couple of times, and I realized my limits then. And I realized how to race those guys. This is totally different than the Busch series. I think I'm a 10-times better race-car driver now than before I started this race."

Learning the Ropes

Third-year driver Kevin Lepage is gaining confidence as the season progresses

They took no time to relish their stellar run. On Monday, Kevin Lepage's team headed to Talladega Superspeedway to test for the April 16 race. This is what a team that wants to win does — learns from one race and immediately starts planning for another. There's little time to relax in the success of a moment.

So instead of celebrating tying his career-best Winston Cup finish of fifth, Lepage headed to Alabama to test. Or so he planned.
Instead, he watched it rain at the track. He headed to his hotel, only to be sequestered in the lounge with the other guests waiting for a tornado front to pass.

Ah, the glamorous life of a professional driver. Days such as Monday may not be the greatest, but Lepage and crew chief Pat Tryson mind them less and less. When things are going right, it's much easier to deal with the setbacks.

The two started working together shortly before the fall race at Darlington last year. Lepage qualified ninth for that race and wound up with his other fifth-place finish.

"For me, as a confidence-builder [that] was a boost," Lepage said.

To that point, his 1999 season had been a bit of a roller coaster. Tryson smoothed out the rough spots and started changing the pit crew and building new cars. In the off-season, the team auctioned most of its cars, determined to copy the one that put Lepage on the pole at Atlanta last fall.

"We worked real hard together, and through the off-season one of the things that we decided we were going to do, we were going to make all our race cars the same," Lepage said.

"When he [Tryson] came on board, they weren't the same. There were a lot of mismatched cars."

Things looked great. Then the team lost its sponsor and seemed in danger of folding. Jack Roush shocked the garage by promising to keep Tryson and Lepage together — sponsor or no sponsor. They started this season with a blank car.

Their autograph cards had driver "For Sale" ads on them. Finally, two races into the season, they signed FamilyClick.com.

Tryson and Lepage were free to concentrate on racing.

"I wouldn't say it distracted me," Lepage said of the sponsor hunt. "It was disappointing to have one of the finest car owners in the sport and here he is with a car without a sponsor on it. I felt bad for my team because they want to be on the track wearing plain, generic uniforms with nothing on them. The guys were not in genuine uniforms. Everyone else got furnished a uniform with a sponsor on it. I felt bad for them."

But Roush's support gave the team something more important than a logo.

"Jack had a commitment to the team to run with or without a sponsor, and that made them feel more special just walking around," Lepage said.

Since signing the sponsor, the team has put itself in good position in every race except Bristol. A mechanical failure sidelined the team in Atlanta, but Lepage was running strongly to that point. He finished 11th at Las Vegas, 10th at Darlington and fifth in Texas.

Just what has caused this sudden revival of the team? Lepage credits Tryson — and the relationship the two share.

"He understands what I want in the car the longer the run goes and what I want in qualifying," he said. "We surprise people. When you look at the sheet, I'm 20th to 30th in practice, then I'm in the top 10 in qualifying. I've always been a driver who doesn't show all he has in practice because it doesn't pay off."

But it's not all Tryson. Lepage, in just his third full Winston Cup season, has only 71 races to his credit. He's becoming more comfortable and confident on the track.

"I am qualifying better," he said. "I am a better race car driver this year, a smarter race car driver."

Does that equate to continued success?
"I hope so, I really do," he said.

NASCAR legend Lee Petty passes on

GREENSBORO, N.C. — Lee Petty, the patriarch of the legendary Petty racing family from Level Cross, North Carolina, died of complications from a stomach aneurysm on early Wednesday morning at Moses Cone Hospital.

Petty, the father of Richard and Maurier, the grandfather of Kyle and the great grandfather of Adam, who ran his first Winston Cup race last Sunday in Texas, had surgery for the ailment on February 9th but never recovered. He was 86.

"Our thoughts and prayers are with the entire Petty family," said John Graham, President of Daytona International Speedway. "Lee Petty will forever hold a special place here at Daytona as winner of the first Daytona 500 and for all he meant to our sport, both on and off the track."

In addition to winning the first Daytona 500 in 1959 in a photo finish with Johnny Beauchamp in a Pontiac, Lee Petty was a three-time NASCAR Winston Cup Champion and won 54 races in a career that ran from 1948 to 1964.

In 429 career starts, the elder Petty finished in the top five 283 times (66 percent) and in the top 10 376 times (88 percent), both NASCAR records for drivers with more than 100 starts.

He competed in the Grand National beach races at Daytona in 1950, 51, 52, 54, 55, 56, 57 and 58. His best finishes on the hard-packed Sands of Daytona Beach came on February 21, 1954, with a first place finish in a 1954 Chrysler, on February 26, 1956, finishing second in a 1956 Dodge, and on February 22, 1958, in the convertible race, finishing second in a 1957 Oldsmobile.

After winning the 500 in 1959, Petty finished seventh in the 1960 500, but was injured in a 1961 qualifying race crash with Beauchamp in which both cars left the track and only ran six more races, none at Daytona, before retiring in 1964.

The district game against which will be played at Lake Brantley may not be as important as it seems, but it will be a good test of the Lions' ability.

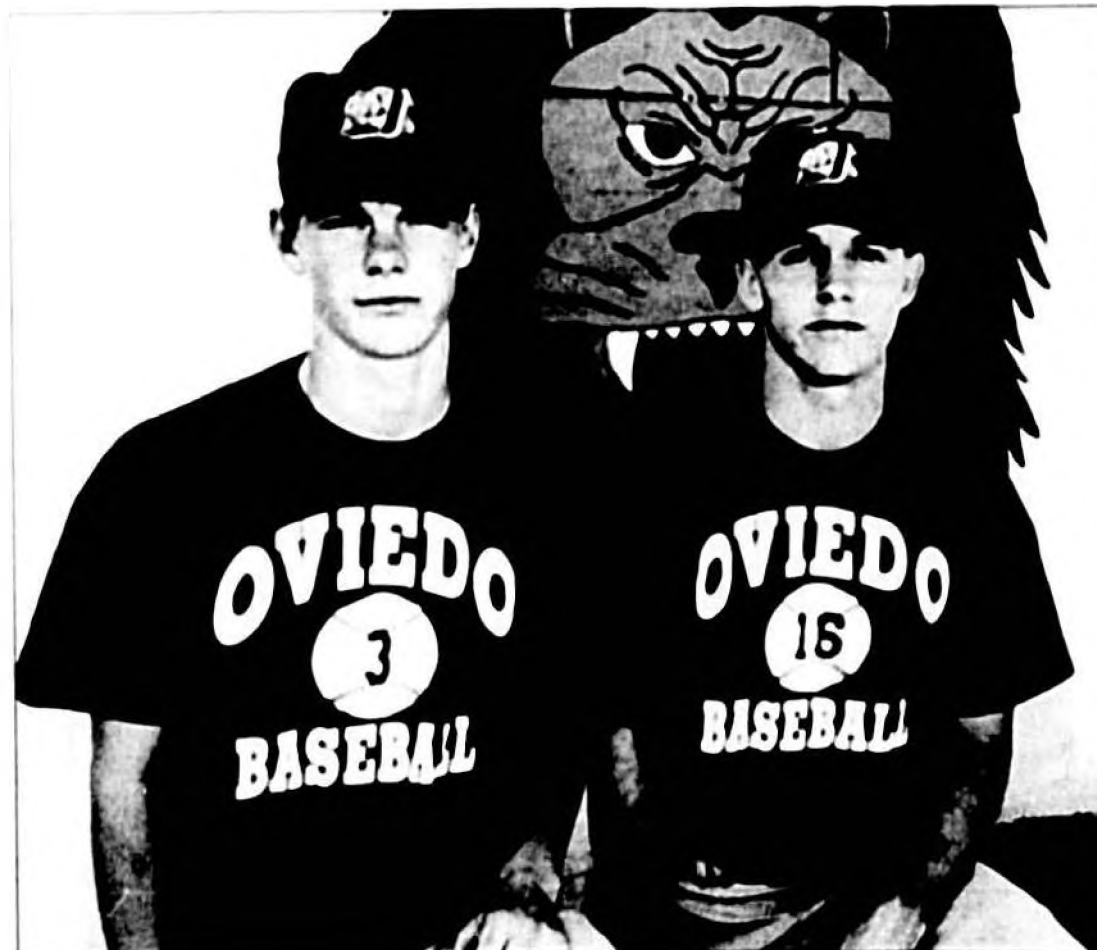
After a shutout in the first inning, Ovidio's offense came alive in the second, scoring on the top of the first, second and third innings to take a 3-0 lead.

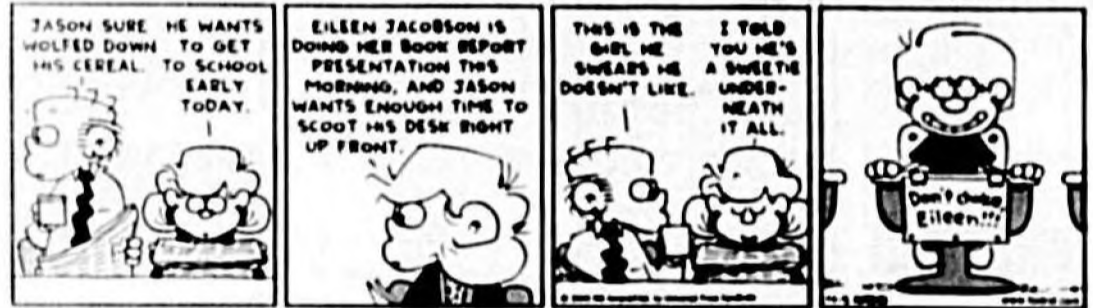

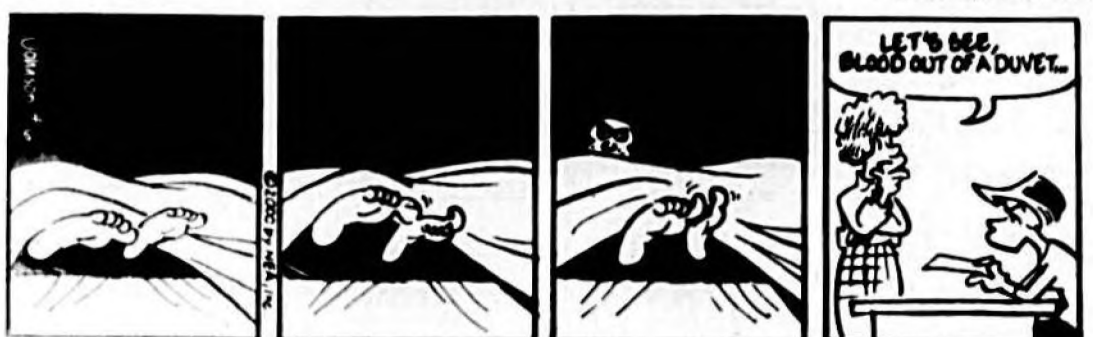
