# Montreal Royals Whitewash Saints 12 To 0

## Royals Blast Out 19 Safeties Against Two Saint Hurlers; In Daytona Today

The Montreal Royals, who've been giving even the Dodgers plenty of trouble during their exhibition tilt in Daytona Beach, indicated yesterday that they still retain the power of last year's International League champions when they blasted out 19 safeties off Jack Banta and Dick Lalady to whitewash the St. Paul Saints by a score of 12 to 0.

Henry Behrman went to the mound for the Royals and certainly did his share in the Royal victory. He limited the Saints to seven well-scattered hits during his six inning tenure on the hill before being relieved by Lloyd Fisher, who likewise held a line on the Saints. He held Ray Blades' aggregation of a pair of safeties, both coming in the eighth frame.

John Jorgenson, Royal third sacker, was the hitter of the day. The stacky infielder hit safely in six trips to the platter, a double and five singles.

Hostilities began in the opening stanza. The Royals shoved through a pair of markers on a double by Jorgenson and singles by Whitman, Furillo and Bread. In the second, they recorded three more on singles by Jorgenson, Whitman, Furillo, a walk to Carl Neumann.

The Royals continued to pound Malady in the third and accounted for four more runs. Basgall, Anderson and Racley worked Malady for free passes. Jorgenson, Whitman and Furillo singled, combined with error by centerfielder Dave Bride and second baseman Joe Vitter, Beard, Ferrell Anderson, Racley and Jorgenson crossed the plate.

In the fourth, Basgall singled, sent to second on Bread's walk and scored on a sharp double by Anderson. Another was added in the seventh on singles by Racley and Jorgenson. Basgall crossed the platter in the eighth for the final marker on a single Fisher.

The Saints threatened in the ninth on a pair of singles by Furillo and Racley. They were able to get men on the sacks but lacked timely hitting in the pinches.

Saturday afternoon, the Saints dropped a 2 to 1 decision to the Royals in Daytona Beach. Going into the ninth one run behind, the Saints knotted the count. However, in the tenth frame, the Royals shoved across the winning marker.

## Calumet Farm Stable Topped Owners In Purses At Hialeah

MIAMI, March 11. (Special)—W. B. Finnegan, trainer of Walter P. Chrysler, and F. S. Scarsie of Woodford Farm were tied with eight apiece as winners in purses earned at the races meeting by passing \$71,000.

The greater proportion of the total was accounted for by Armadillo, winner of the Widener. The victory was worth \$46,000 for the Chicago-owned Calumet Farm.

H. A. Murphy of Philadelphia, owner of Concordian, the Maryland winner, was second in the standings with \$51,000. All of the money was earned by four firsts and one second in his five starts.

Sanford Stud Farm of Amsterdam, N. Y., amassed \$36,700, mainly through the efforts of Round View, winner of the Flamingo Stakes.

Hirsch Jacobs, who has had a hammer-lock on first place in the trainers division until displaced in 1915 by Stanley Lipiec, was top conditioner with 10 winners saddled. C. M. Felner, trainer for Gustav Ring, and J. Leyland of Paradise Farm were deadlocked with nine winners to their credit.

## Bill Heerde Cage Star Today At 32

GALESBURG, Ill., Mar. 11. (AP)—Bill Heerde, the "old man of knock" who came back from the wars to become the nation's oldest collegiate griddle at the age of 32, is now cavorting on the hardwood for Old Siwash like a 17-year-old freshman.

Heerde, a receptive southpaw, is holding down his old guard post from which he captained Knox in 1910-11, his last year of play before enlisting in the marines.

A veteran of Guadalcanal, Iwo Jima and Saipan, Heerde entered Knox for his senior year last fall and attracted nationwide attention as the oldest football player.

Heerde's athletic career stretches across 17 years since he first starred as a prep at Maine, Ill., in 1920. He enrolled at Knox at the age of 26.

## Final Month Of Racing At Oval Starts Tonight

## Two More Races Are Added To Program; 1st Race At 7:38

LONGWOOD, Mar. 11. (Special)—The Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club opens its last 30 days of the season at Longwood tonight with a ten race program, two more than have been run the present meet.

The dogs will go on the track for the first race at 7:38 and the windows will close at 7:55 and as soon as the odds can be posted the race will be run. Pops, Walter Connolly announces the races will be run promptly on schedule and, regardless of the number of fans waiting at the windows when

the closing time arrives, the windows will be shut and the race started on its way.

This is necessary because it is against Florida's law to run the race after midnight, and in order to get the tenth race underway at 11:45, all other events must be run on schedule.

Five quinela's will be run tonight, the daily double will remain on the second and third events. Large signs have posted about the betting paddock and grandstand informing fans of the closing time for windows on each race, no deviation from the published time will be permitted, Connolly said.

### Young Men Urged To Investigate Navy Enlistments

In a special message to young men between 17 and 31 of Seminole County this week, Chief Kienker, recruiter in charge of this territory urges young men to investigate the many outstanding advantages offered to them by the U. S. Navy.

Men enlisting in the Navy are still guaranteed all veterans privileges, including all benefits under the "G. I. Bill of Rights" at the end of their enlistment, to say nothing of the valuable training they will receive while in the Navy. The educational provision of the G. I. Bill alone, gives the honorably discharged Navy veteran, 36 months of college at any accredited college or university in return for only two years active service with the Navy. However, the man who stays in the Navy longer than two years may take additional training. The length of this additional training will correspond to the number of months served.

While the Navy veteran is attending college, he receives up to \$500 per year for tuition, books, laboratory fees, hospital fees and others. In addition, the young man receives \$65 per month to defray his personal expenses. The married veteran receives \$90 per month to be used in like manner, continued Chief Kienker.

The Chief will be at the Post Office the first Friday of each month at 1:30 P. M. and urges interested young men to see him while he is here to discuss these as well as many other opportunities offered young men by the Navy.

### Graw To Present Appeal To OPA To Remove Ceilings

(Continued from Page One) Many farmers are guaranteed to the distributor, the secretary, handler or jobber and the retailer. Paradoxically, these are both too low and too high; too low, because they do not allow for anticipated loss to the handlers, and too high, because every handler tries to market at himself by charging the full fee, even if this requires juggling the produce around town. It is not the distributors, but the situation, and it is the consumer who is the distributor for protecting his interests.

In effect, OPA pricing guarantees that the consumer will pay the ceiling for fresh vegetables, even when the producer is not getting back his cost of production. This has happened repeatedly. Pricing officials have admitted privately to me it is impossible to adjust the consumer ceiling, so that the consumer would get the benefit of reduced farm prices.

"We contend the blame for all this rests on OPA. It would follow its own de-control program, it would exempt every Florida fresh vegetable from price control and permit the industry to carry out an orderly postwar merchandising program which would result in better vegetables at lower prices to the consumer. Until OPA recognizes that the full production to which it aspires has been already attained by the winter vegetable industry, Florida vegetables will continue to cost the consumer several times as much as the grower receives for them."

While in Washington, Graw and representatives of the vegetable industry from other areas will testify before House and Senate committees which are considering renewal of OPA legislation. They will say that the present cumbersome perishable food regulations are keeping consumer prices at a high level in spite of reduced income to the producer.

In another instance, a Utah Indian legend would have it, the survivors of a great battle were saved from famine by lilies which miraculously sprang up on the bloody field.

Neither is there any sign that the Russians are fortifying it. Bornholm could be turned into a strategic fortress because it is occupied northern coast of Germany.

An Associated Press correspondent who recently toured the island did not find any fortified area. There were no Russian gun emplacements, and no guns. What he did find was a large number of military camps with their entrances covered with pictures of Lenin and Stalin. The only airfield he saw was a mere landing strip cut out of the fields on one side of the island's biggest farms. The Russians permitted the AP correspondent to go wherever he wished, without interference, and they bridled at the mention of the word "occupation." When he referred to it, one Red Army lieutenant frowned and said: "We are just here—that's all." The Russian commander, by enforcing a strict curfew on his troops, has kept friction to a minimum. Nevertheless, there is to be found among the Danish islanders a certain amount of anxiety over the presence of the Russian troops.

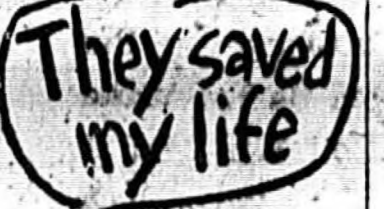

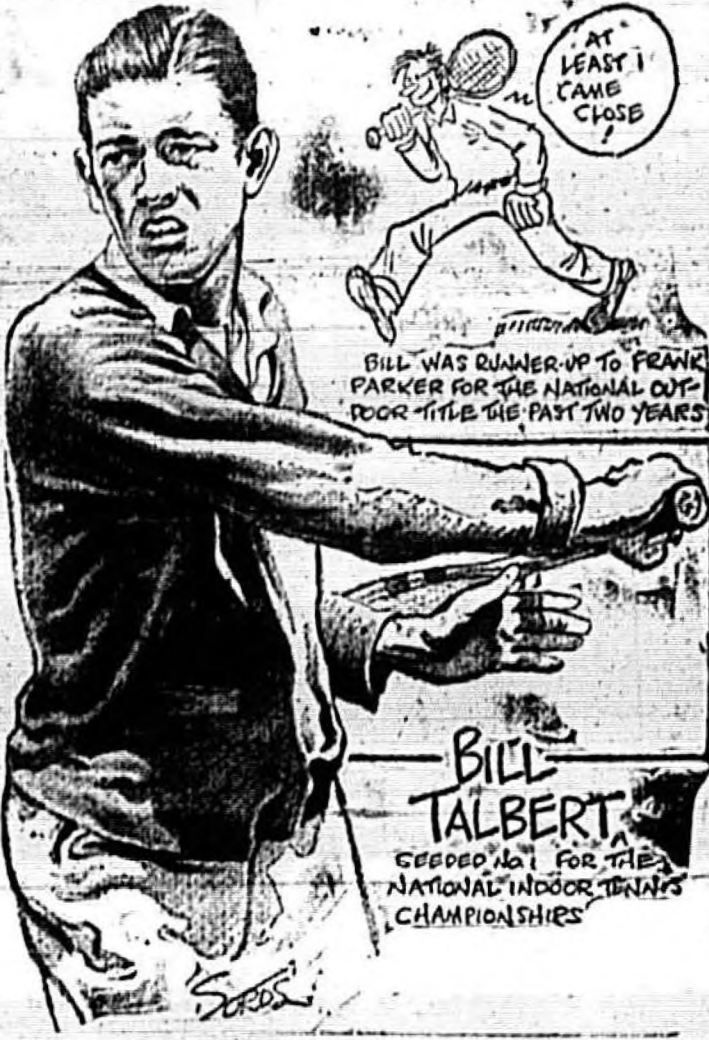

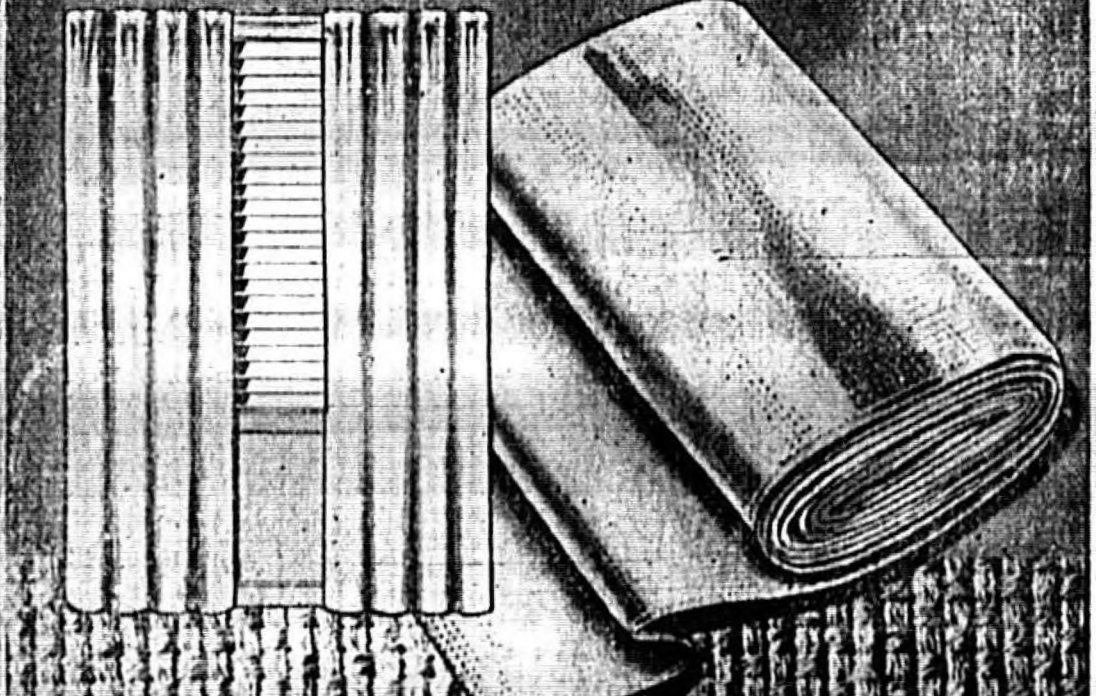

## Movement of Red Forces in Iran On Considerable Scale

### British Seek Moscow Reply For Continued Presence Of Troops In Iran

LONDON, March 13. (AP)—The British Foreign Office says information reaching London today indicates the Red Army troops movements in Iran are on a considerable scale. The British spokesman discloses that the troop movements first were noticed on Mar. 4 two days after the date set for withdrawal of British and Russian forces under terms of a British-Soviet-Iranian agreement.

The President said he acted at the request of Pauley himself, and the announcement came almost simultaneously from the White House and from Chairman David Walsh of the Senate Naval Committee.

NUERNBERG, Mar. 13. (AP)—Field Marshal Werner Von Goering today took the witness stand in his own defense before the Nuremberg tribunal trying him as an arch war criminal. Goering's defense counsel expects to take six days to complete presentation of its case for the former chief of the German Luftwaffe. Goering himself may be on the witness stand for three days.

Meanwhile, Nazi field Marshal Albert Kesseler told the tribunal today he was a principal advocate on invading England in the summer of 1940. Kesseler is responding to a query from Chief United States Prosecutor Robert Jackson. Justice Jackson asked Kesseler whether he had recommended to Goering that the invasion take place immediately after Dunkerque. Replied Kesseler: "Yes, and I still represented that view later on. Yes, the invasion was only called off because there were not sufficient seagoing craft."

DETROIT, Mar. 13. (AP)—The General Motors strike was settled today on the basis of a 2½ percent an hour wage increase offered by the company. The CIO United Auto Workers Union lost its long fight to get the company to pay 1½ cents, the recommended amount of the presidential fact-finding board. The wage negotiations wound up successfully after an uninterrupted day and night session.

DETROIT, March 13. (AP)—Hopes for an end of the 113-day-old General Motors strike, the longest in automobile history, kept on rising late this afternoon as company and CIO United Workers officials continued their present session which has been going on since 9:00 o'clock last night.

A union official, asking that his name not be used, has disclosed that a settlement of the automotive strike appears imminent and that an announcement may come at any moment. The all night meeting went on through the morning and into the afternoon. At the session, the 22nd hour, one management representative said that the ticklish wage question had been settled. The settlement would pave the way for a reopening of almost 100 plants across the nation and the return of 175,000 production workers who have been idle since last November. The unprecedented and dramatic negotiating session is being held on the 113th day of the GM strike. United Auto Workers president Dewey says that both sides are trying to settle the strike.

## Representatives Of UMW Discuss Lewis Demands Results Of Survey Of Miners' Position Is Revealed

WASHINGTON, Mar. 13. (AP)—Representatives of the United Mine Workers began elaborating today on the general demands laid down by President John L. Lewis for the nation's 100,000 soft coal miners. A union council report of a survey of miners' attitudes on a number of issues, including the UMW's proposed "Harrison" contract, was also made.

## Jap Defense Council Seeks Truth Of War

TOKYO, Mar. 13. (AP)—Attorneys for the defense of ex-prime minister Hideki Tojo promise that his defense against war crimes charges will be conducted to obtain the truth about the origins of the Pacific war. Dr. Ichiro Kiyono and Tokimura Hibara say they will cooperate fully with the prosecution to seek the truth. Defense attorney Kiyono says he understands that war crimes trials are not for vengeance, but to put it, propose to clarify the justice of this war and investigate its origins so future conflicts can be prevented.
