

Increase in Incomes Of Railroads Shown

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—(AP)—A 19-fold increase in the net income of class 1 railroads for the first eight months of this year over the same period in 1940 was indicated Monday in estimates by the Association of American Railroads.

The Association estimated the net income of class 1 railroads, after interest and rentals, up to Aug. 31 was \$296,524,000 against \$20,350,000 in the corresponding period last year.

English Conservatives Unanimously Agree On Aiding Russians

Party Welcomes Reds As Allies And Offers To Fortify Their Resistance

Belligerents To Trade Prisoners

Czechs Say Leaders Being Shot To Induce Slave Labor

LONDON, Oct. 2.—(AP)—The conservative party today unanimously approved the Churchill decision to welcome Russia as an ally and "fortify their resistance by every possible means."

Reports from a southeast British port says Britain and Germany will call off the war temporarily in a restricted zone this weekend to exchange 1,500 prisoners each, the first of the war.

Two British hospital ships are to take them across the channel under an agreement providing for the withdrawal of weapons and warships from the zone.

While Czech sources in London said the wave of executions in Germany is increasing, they also say heavy industries from London, Hamburg, Bremen and Berlin are reducing the population of slave labor through the release of prisoners.

The British coast reported anti-aircraft shells burst in the night sky near Calais and rumbling bomb explosions from the direction of France.

At dusk Wednesday, British fighters swooped on a formation of E-boats near the French coast and set two afire.

In the meantime, the Germans launched their night raids on Britain with a big altitude attack on the southeast coast.

During daylight Wednesday the air ministry reported, British planes swept the channel all day long. Swarms of Messerschmitts and other German fighters at times flew over the British coast.

Police Look For Attackers Of Rivers And Wife

LAKELAND, Ga., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Valdosta Police Captain J. L. Murphy is seeking today to clarify whether more than one person was involved in an attack last night on former Governor and Mrs. E. D. Rivers.

Three shots were fired in the struggle. Rivers was hit over the head with a pistol butt, and Mrs. Rivers was wounded.

Murphy said it seemed to be a kidnap plot from the notes left by a man who shot himself to death in the attack on the Rivers' aroused a chase.

He was named as Horace B. Kile. In New York, Mrs. B. Kile said her husband, a former school teacher, left for Georgia a month ago.

She is headed south for the body. Murphy said the B. Kile note attributed the attack to political reasons.

Pittsburgh school authorities said Horace B. Kile left there in 1932 seeking a southern teacher post. His parents left for Georgia, his being a prominent business man and a prominent banker.

Air Student Burns To Death In Crash

ALBANY, Ga., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Army Aviator, Cadet Albert E. Kaufman of Norfolk, Va., burned to death and Cadet Charles G. Kadel of Memphis, Tenn., was critically injured in the mid-air collision of two training planes near Turner Field Wednesday.

In the formation of 12 planes, preparing to land at the advanced air school, the two ships collided and burst into flames. Cadet Kadel bailed out and drifted down with his clothes afire. Kaufman died in his burned ship.

Senate Group Urges Merging Of Wire Firms

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—(AP)—A Senate subcommittee on interstate commerce recommended Congress permit the merging of the American telegraph companies, adding that the Postal Telegraph is in "financial danger."

Harold L. Ickes, secretary of the interior and petroleum coordinator, hotly disputed Wednesday a Senate committee's conclusion that there is no imminent shortage of petroleum products on the eastern seaboard and challenged the credibility of some of the testimony on which the conclusion was based.

"I have said that there was a shortage," the peppy cabinet officer told the committee, "ignoring the petroleum situation, and I mean as I have always meant, a shortage in transportation. I still say that there is a shortage."

"To me, if your reserves have dropped, and your replacements have facilities, and your transportation facilities have been cut 20 percent or more with prospect for still greater cuts, your demand is up 10 or 11 percent—to me that means shortage."

"It doesn't mean that there isn't enough for today, but it does mean that, if this trend were allowed to continue, there would not be enough for next winter."

Ickes took sharp exception to testimony by John J. Pelley, president of the Association of American Railroad, on which the committee based in part a finding that there was no shortage of transportation facilities.

Asserting the committee's report was "gravely handicapped" by the program of the railroad coordinator's office by creating "a wholly unjustified attitude of complacency" on the part of the public, Ickes and Pelley had been in the mouth, letters from Nazi-occupied Norway and written in Norwegian.

Lars Harry Wester was starred with Miss Dinah Shore, Eddie Cantor's songstress who was voted the outstanding new radio star of 1941 by leading radio editors, when she guest starred in the fifth Field Artillery Training Regiment's musical revue, "Khal Wacky."

Played before the 16,000 Spectators undergoing their basic military training here, Pvt. Wester took part in one of the most outstanding entertainment programs produced in the center.

Czechs' Premier And 2 More Generals Shot

BERLIN, Oct. 2.—(AP)—The Nazi-picked premier of the Czech protectorate, Benes-Moravia, and two more Czech generals and an undetermined number of other persons were shot or condemned to death Wednesday in stern and continuing suppression of what the Germans term a treasonable plot.

The generals, described by a German spokesman as brigadiers, were the fourth and fifth of the general rank to be executed since the Nazis announced they had smashed a conspiracy to overthrow German rule in the protectorate.

Mrs. Miley Dies Of Bullet Wounds

LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Mrs. Fred Miley died of bullet wounds Wednesday two hours after the burial of her daughter, Marion Miley, the golf star, who was shot to death early Sunday in their apartment at the Lexington Country Club.

Mother and daughter were shot, apparently by burglars, but under circumstances so strange that detectives stood for hours watching the thousands who went to Marion's funeral. Club members and club employees have been questioned day and night, but no clue was forthcoming.

Nazis Hang 170 Persons In Hungary, Belgium And Old Czechoslovakia

W. Averell Harriman, head of the American delegation, said the agreement "adheres to a resolution of three governments to establish, after the final annihilation of Nazi tyranny, a peace that shall include all countries of the world."

The Swiss telegraph quoted Budapest dispatches as saying the Greeks attempted to put down by German military forces Monday.

Paul Collette, youthful Frenchman, was condemned to death for the attempted assassination of Pierre Laval Aug. 28 by a French anti-Fascist court in Paris.

The tri-power conference in Moscow closed two days ahead of schedule, with the agreement that practically every Soviet supply request would be filled by the U. S. and Britain in return for Russian raw materials.

The Finns announced the capture of Petrozavodsk, capital of Soviet Karelia on the isthmus of the Gulf of Bothnia, and an important point on the railroad running from that city to the Arctic port of Murmansk, which still is in Russian hands.

Red casualties, said the Finnish communiques, were heavy and a mass desertion by Soviet officers also was claimed although it was stated many of the Red army's political commissars killed themselves rather than be captured.

As to the south, the Germans reported that their own forces had captured several Russian batteries east on Dniepropetrovsk, toward the industrial Donets River basin, and that to the north of that action 45 Soviet tanks had been destroyed and the remaining units of a force totaling 80 had been put to flight.

A German-Italian encirclement northeast of Dniepropetrovsk was said in Berlin to have knocked out three Russian divisions; the Italians went a little further and said they had captured 7000 Red prisoners and were dissolving the last Soviet resistance in a large pocket somewhere east of the Dnieper River.

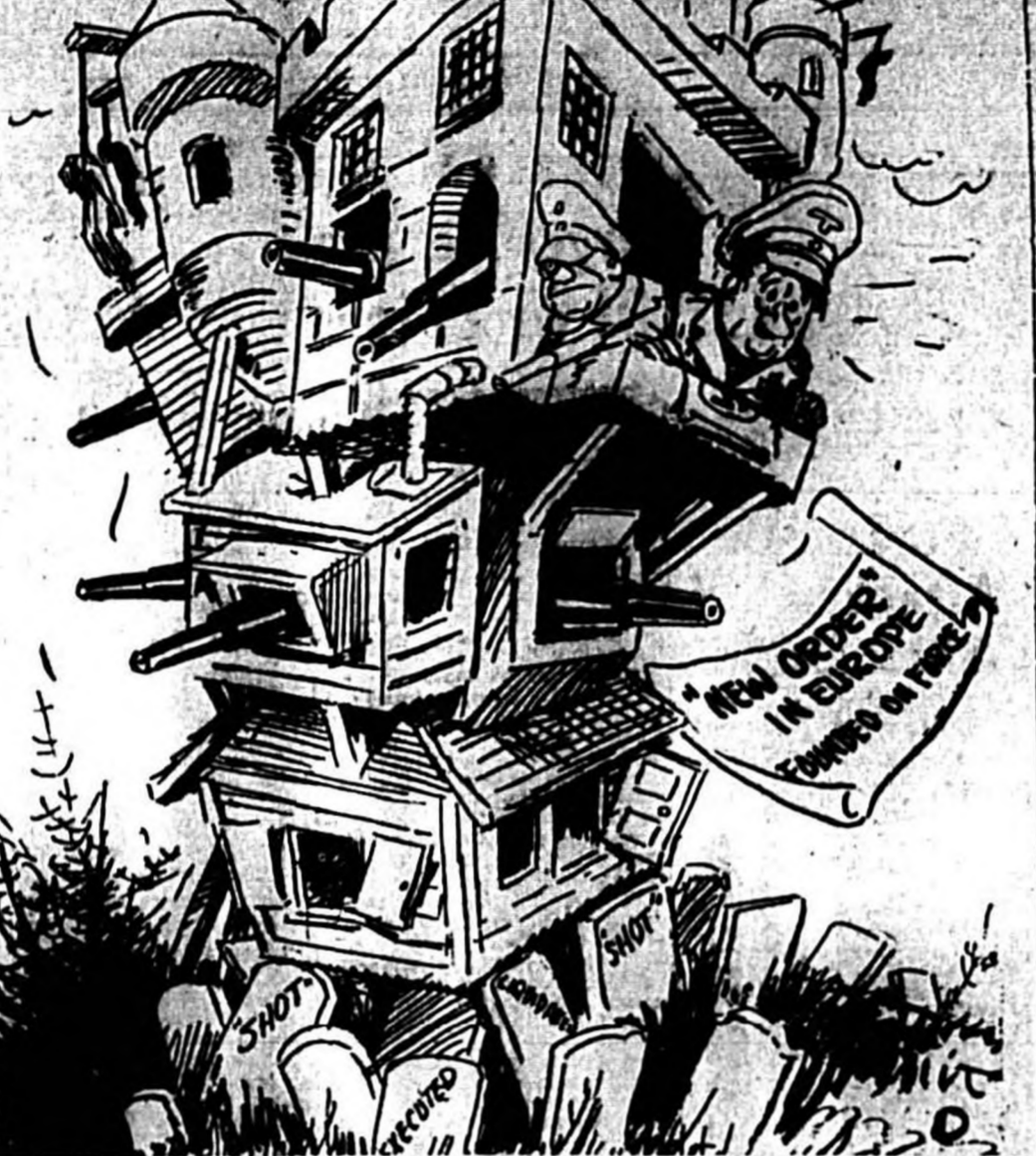

Slim Pockbook Can Still Allow Simple Parties

By MRS. ALEXANDER GEORGE

Don't think that because your pocketbook is slim and your preparation time short, you can't give the party you had planned for the bunch.

Scan the refrigerator for leftover dabs of meat, fish, vegetables and cheese. Buy some inexpensive meat cuts, relishes and crackers, and get busy on hors d'oeuvres. Make up dozens of these fascinating little tidbits that go so well with hot beverages, chilled fruit, vegetable juices and cocktails.

Here are a dozen and one things for you to make for your informal fun fest:

1. Top inch squares of toast with dried herring (cut with scissors), and spread lightly with pickle relish and brush with melted butter. Heat for extra freshness.
2. String up half-inch cubes of dill pickles with pearl onions or corn cobs, and hang in a shiny eggplant when time to serve.
3. Fashion cottage cheese in to inch balls, roll in chopped dried beef and parsley. Surround a platter of chopped bean relish spread on round crackers and toast.
4. Season snappy yellow cheese with minced green peppers, onions and celery, spread on large pieces of dried rye, and roll up. Spear with pickles.
5. Mix crushed salted peanuts

with broken crisp bacon, and spread on toast squares. Brush lightly with mustard mixed with salad dressing. Heat until crisp.

6. Mash sardines with fork, season with chopped sweet pickles and salad dressing, and spread on small crackers. Heat.

7. Stuff celery sticks with garlic. Chill. Cut in half-inch crossway slices and perch the slices on top toast rounds spread with mayonnaise, highly seasoned.

8. Spread round veal bologna with mild mustard. Center with thin sweet or sour pickle. Bring bologna up and around pickle, holding in place with picks.

9. Mash liver sausage, thin

lightly with cream, add small amount of chopped olives, and spread on toast fingers. Brush lightly with melted butter and toast until brown.

10. Spread thin sliced white bread with mustard and salad dressing, cover with ham relish spread. Roll up quickly, wrap in waxed paper and chill until serving time. Cut in half-inch rounds and stick on pickles or surround a tray of assorted canapes and hors d'oeuvres.

11. Mix yellow cream cheese (rather stiff) with salad dressing, chopped ripe olives and dried celery. Add clove garlic one minute and then discard. Spread the cheese mixture on buttered

Graham bread slices. Cover with other slices and butter. Cut into small squares and toast well, serve fresh.

12. Spread small loaf round, with salad dressing and chopped pickle relish. Top with chops, sprinkle with lemon juice and brush with melted butter. Toast until brown.

13. Season leftover cooked meat or chicken with salad dressing, chili sauce or catsup. Spread on toast fingers and toast.

McCarthy, dripping with perspiration, and he looked as if he had just walked a hundred miles. Striking out Dolph Camilli three out of four times don't make much of an impression on the red-faced Ruffing. He insisted he threw nothing but ash balls to the Dodgers' first baseman and cleanup hitter.

McCarthy refused to get excited over the victory. Reporters pried him with questions in an attempt to get him to open up. McCarthy remained calm.

"What the hell," he said, "it was just another ball game. You fellows saw the game. What can I say? You had a better seat than I did. It was hotter than hell in that dugout."

"We made the longest hits, but they had men on base. It was anybody's game. It's nice to get off in front, however, and I hope we can stay that way."

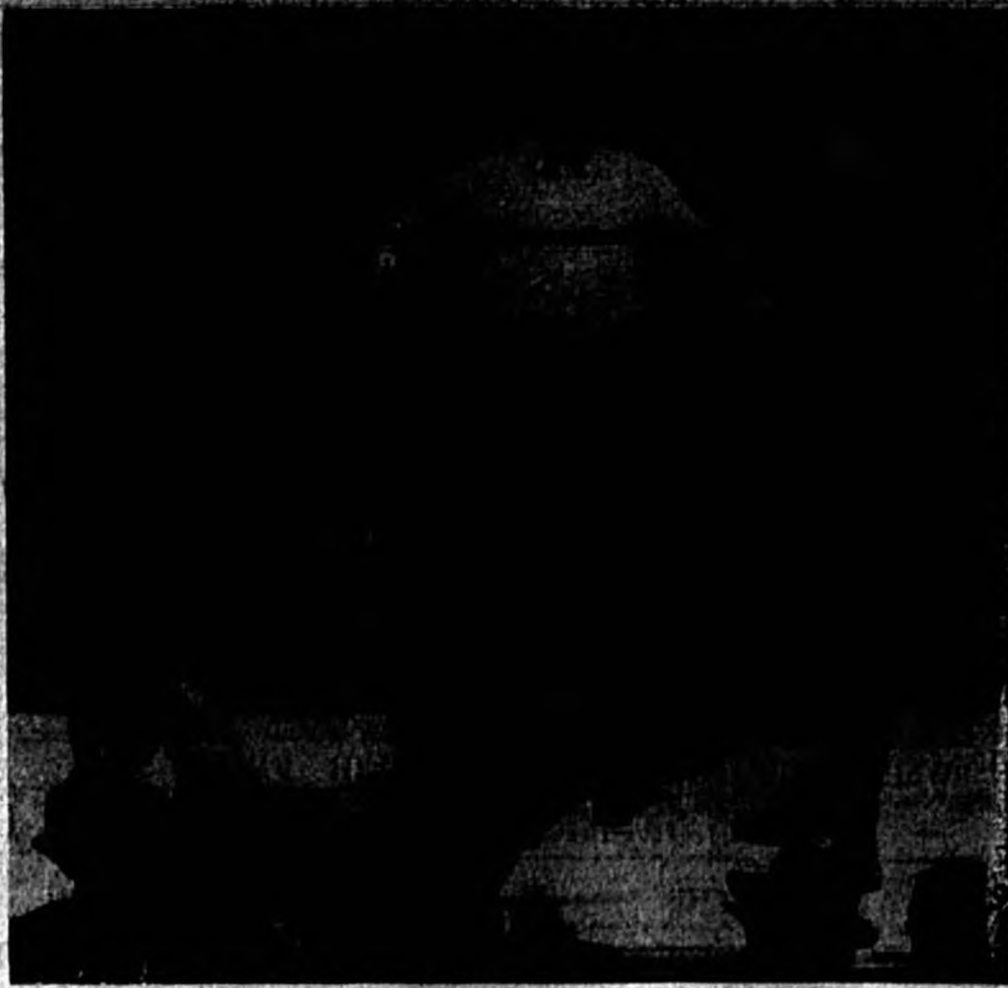
"Ruffing pitched a very good game," the Yankee boss continued.

Second Lend-Lease Fund Is Approved

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—(AP)—The \$5,958,000,000 second lend-lease fund was approved by a House appropriations subcommittee Wednesday and a short time later Jesse Jones said he would favor Russia getting the benefits of the bill.

In submitting his request for the new appropriation two weeks ago, Roosevelt suggested the legislation permit him to authorize contracts to supply foreign governments with defense articles, information or services.

This would apply to any country whose defense the president deemed advisable to the interests of this nation.
